## MINNESOTA HIGH SCHOOL BAND PLAYS CONCERT AT PINECREST

Due to previous commitments the appearance of the Floodwood Minnesota High School band was unfortunately limited to one appearance, but the residents and staff of the Pinecrest Home for the Aged, and many other citizens who took advantage of the invitation, heard an outstanding musical presentation on Friday afternoon on the lovely lawn at Pinecrest.

Fifty-three youthful artists under the direction of David Parmeter, music director of the school presented a varied pro-

gram of classical and popular music, and revealed themselves as an enthusiastic and accomplished group of players. They had excellent balance of instruments, sustained tone, and excellent soloists.

From "God Save the Queen" to their final number from the musical opera South Pacific, the work was done with sympathetic understanding and restrained volume. Clifford Howard of 1320 Trans Canada Highway, Kenora, beloved husband of Annie Wicks Howard, died at the Winnipeg General Hospital, Friday evening, May 22nd, following a lengthy illness. Born in Hull, England, August 24th, 1897, he was in his 62nd year.

He came to Canada and Kenora in 1927. A veteran of the First World War, he served five years with the Royal Navy. ora, and Mrs. Lee (Joyce) Conlee of Palatka, Florida; two sons, Donald of Fort William and Raymond at home; six sisters Mrs. Beatrice Chafer of Brantford, Mrs. Dora Daiken of Simcoe, Mrs. Ada McDonnell of Vancouver, Mrs. Harriett Archibald of Vancouver, Mrs. Ethel Cooper of Simcoe and Mrs. Roy (Edith) Sinclair of Kenora; three brothers Jack of Hull, England, Leonard of Kenora and Donald of Winnipeg. Twenty grandchildren also survive.

The remains will arrive in Kenora on Saturday evening and will rest in the chapel of the Brown Funeral Home until 1:45 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, May 26, thence to St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral for service at two o'clock. Canon L. M. Watts will officiate and interment will be in the family plot, Lake of the Woods cemetery.

## Wren Discusses Roads At Redditt Meeting Friday

At a well attended public meeting in Redditt's Legion Hall last night, Albert Wren told the audience of the projected planning for completion of the Trans Canada Highway and then the need to rebuild and turn back under subsidy all township and Statute Labour roads. Secondary and trunk highways should be brought up to grade standard and surfaced both for economy in maintenance and to meet present day demands from traffic movement.

Discussing education, Albert Wren said it was the aim of his group to spur teacher training to the end that fully qualified teachers be available for all schools at elementary and secondary level. Mr. Wren emphasized how necessary it was that the Province work toward full assumption of the cost of elementary and secondary education. Teachers, he said, should receive the same pay for equal qualifications no matter what part of the Province they choose to teach. Now, Mr. Wren added, Toronto has the money to out-

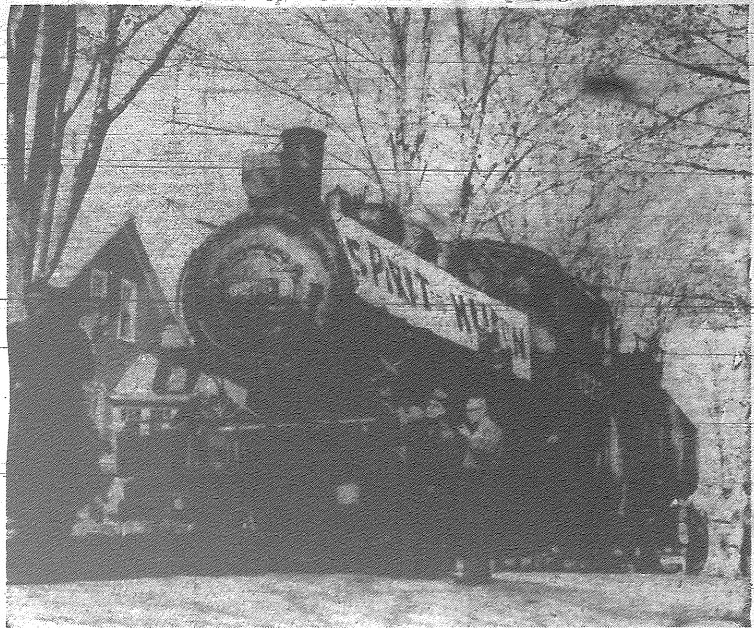

### The Home League Swings Into Action "Sans" Cubs

Baseball has penetrated winter's prevailing shield this week and Central Park is once again the centre of attraction for those who sharpen spikes during the Thistle Rink stand. It appears all the same. The ground is rough in patches with a small gathering of yellowish-brown grass here and there. The stands still look as if a tornado had swept the last bit of joy from its aging face. The new "latrine" stands out like a gem in a cluster of glass-grey surroundings, and the same fence runs down the third and first base lines. The store is

still across the road; although it's receiving competition this year from a mobile "chips" stand. Across the field one can still see the immaculate little green fence that divides the Little League Park from the old. The scoreboard is still out there, and one still needs twenty-twenty vision to read the score. Therefore, nothing greatly has been changed at Central Park, and it certainly feels like home again. Sort of a classical touch for the shoe stringers.

One element will be missing from the scene this baseball season. Namely the Norman Cubs, who ran into trouble for the past two seasons and found it impossible to enter a team into the local gathering this year. Still, there are a few of their former players still around and they figured prominently in the opening ball games thus far.

It will be sad for the Norman faithful this baseball year. It was sad in the past two seasons, but at least the Cubs were out there trying. The Cubs' past has been one of spirited greatness and truly in the tradition of baseball. They started out as a small rugged team and were built into champions overnight to win a league pennant. They were contenders for the finals a number of times and they introduced into the Kenora baseball climate the most colourful baseball players in the past decade. In 1956 the Norman Cubs had one of the strongest teams that ever played at Central Park, but they never did capture the baseball championship that season. Players like Schmall, Gardner, Troff, Hoffman, Freese etc., will be remembered by all the spectators, if they should turn back the pages of their 1956 memory book. There were other teams . . . other greats of local baseball for the Norman Cubs. We remember when Ron Mahood was blasting the ball into the farthest corner of the Park; when Lorne MacDonald and Laurie Bradle worked the mound for the Norman Cubs with Bert Jardin behind the plate. Other names, other acts that are baseball statistics, and which are valuable to baseball literature

have been recorded by the Norman Cubs, but they are certainly too numerous to mention here.

For the 1957 and 1958 seasons there were no worthy accomplishments by the Norman nine. Last year the Cubs were in hibernation from the dreary winter right through the summer and hardly won a ball game. This season they still sleep . . . at least as an organized team. Perhaps the future will once again see the Cubs back out on the field. The local fans are missing the spirited team.

So it was Sunday and Central Park was the place where the Keewatin Indians decided to hold their league opener against a new Dryden team, the "Dodgers". It was a grand day for baseball, but baseball wasn't played. The score was hidden in the press and the radio the next day as 11-0, but those on hand knew of the slaughter that was taking place on opening day.

Countless errors, no pitching and bats like toothpicks fell before the new version of the Keewatin North American Indians. Why fell the score? Even Alan Houston, the official scorer wasn't too sure of the final result. Houston, local chess champion, worked two hours after the game sorting out the runs, hits and errors.

The Dryden Dodgers are a young team, and it certainly isn't of any practical use to criticize them. They tried their best, but their best is not up to the standards of the Kenora Senior District Baseball League.

Keewatin have a strong team once again. Charlie Hoffman and Ron Morgan, late of the Norman Cubs are with them, with Chuck playing at first and Morgan in right field. They have other new comers, one in the pitching department, who will be worth watching. In all . . . it looks like the four town's year.

Then there is the Irishman, Patrick "Ciaci" Comber, who is toiling for the Legionaires' mound staff this year along with Bernie Major. Both were former Cubs. Pat lost his first start of the season Tuesday against the Keewatin nine, but the one-time Cub hurler pitched a fair game considering.

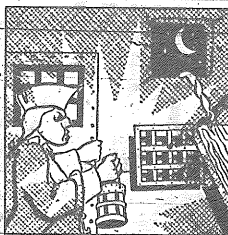

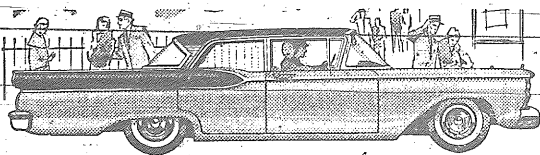

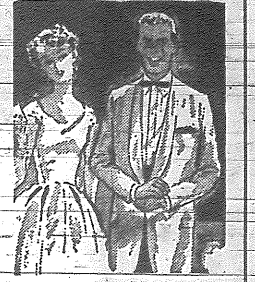

2 tablespoons melted shortening  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
Combine flour; sugar; baking powder and salt; then sift. Mix in bran. Beat egg; add milk;

apple and shortening. Add to dry ingredients all at once, stirring just enough to moisten. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Mix remaining sugar with cinnamon; sprinkle over muffins. Bake in hot oven 400 F for 20 to 25 minutes.

### Wild Mustard Robber Of Fertility

You can't retire on money wasted on weeds. A common wild mustard plant can produce 15,000 seeds each year and it is a true robber of the soil, decreasing crop yields alarmingly. It takes more moisture out of the soil than the grain crop, and reduces the needed yield of a productive crop. It takes twice the Nitrogen and Phosphorus and four times the Potash that is needed for an oat plant.

Wild Mustard, sometimes called "Herrick" or "Charlock", is one of the worst weeds of Ontario, reports the Field Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Wild Mustard (Brassica Arvensis) is an annual, with bright flowers and a many-branched stalk, making it easy to distinguish. The oil coated black seed may remain in the soil for many years and must be brought near the surface to germinate.

A dollar saved in controlling any weed, and especially mustard, is a dollar gained. "Yellow with Mustard," once a common saying, is no longer a necessity. Clean seed and good cultural practices, in combination with the timely use of 2, 4-D, are the best means of control. Two to five ounces of 2,4-D applied when the mustard plant is very young, at the three-to-five-leaf stage, if used together with good cultivation will eradicate all of the mustard at a cost of less than one dollar per acre for materials.

Special pre-season cultivation, the use of mustard-free seed, the use of harrows and finger weed-

ers, and good after-harvest cultivation should reduce and in time eliminate this robber of the soil. These practices, together with proper chemical control, will destroy mustard and allow better grain yields.

### PRAYER OF THE TREES

Trees are precious in any land. So, at the beginning of another forest fire season (April 1 to October 31) when destruction threatens so many thousands of trees every year, the "Prayer of the Trees," which has become international, seems timely.

Originating in Portugal, the prayer was translated into Eng-

lish by British foresters who distributed it in East Africa. A visiting forester from the African Gold Coast brought it to this continent and passed it on to Tropical Forester Elbert A. Schory, Sr., of Ft. Myers, Fla. Here it is:

You who pass by and would raise a hand against us, heed well our prayer before you harm us.

We are the fuel for your fires on cold nights, the friendly shade protecting you from the fierce sun, and our fruits are refreshments to quench your thirst and cheer you as you journey on.

We are the rafters of your roofs, the bodies of your boats, the seats of your stools and the boards of your beds.

We are the handles of your

hoes, the gates of your homes, the wood of your cradle and the shells of your coffins.

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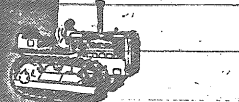
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**The Printed Word Has Not Lost Its Pride**

which is meeting this week in the Empress Hotel, Mr. Keate denounced "the growing demand for shadow instead of substance" in all areas of mass communication.

He stated that "while most responsible newspapers do try to educate as well as inform their readers, the problem is now to get people to read the so-called 'think pieces' which we faithfully reproduce."

Further Mr. Keate stated, "The problem is paradoxical." "On the one hand, readers, clamor for news of educational value, on the other hand, recent surveys have shown that the average reader spends only four minutes a day on educational news, that 79 percent of the group studied did not know what the letters N.A.T.O. stood for, that 54 percent were not familiar with the United Nations or its work, and that while 80 percent of the readers followed comic strips and letters to the editor, only 20 percent read editorials.

A partial explanation of the situation, according to Mr. Keate, is that "other media of mass communication have come along with alluring and glamorous distractions, and play to the new leisure with more and more anasthetics, many of them in living color."

"Yet," Mr. Keate maintained, "the printed word has not lost its pride. It invites the contemplative without shrieking, babbling or arresting the attention of readers with supersonic whistles."
