District Municipal Association Meets At Keewatin

At the annual meeting of the Kenora District Municipal Association held at Keewatin, Saturday, the meeting went on record as favouring the following resolution:

- The establishment of a police college in Ontario.
- Municipalities to have better control over budgets of school boards, and police commissions.
- An assessment of all provincial properties.

These resolutions will be presented at the October meetings of the Northwestern Ontario Municipal Association which will be held at Keewatin. The meetings, marking the first time they will be held in Keewatin will be sponsored by the town of Keewatin with Kenora assisting.

Highlighting the noon luncheon on Saturday was an address by Magistrate J. V. Fregeau of Kenora, chairman of the Board of Management of Pinecrest, District Home for the Aged. Speaking on behalf of the board, Magistrate Fregeau told the meeting of the need of expanding Pinecrest. He said that the board would be asking for \$300,000.00 to provide a 75 bed addition to Pinecrest. The home is filled to capacity with a long waiting list, he said, and additional space is needed immediately.

Gordon W. Chatterton, Assistant supervisor of Elementary Education for the Province of Ontario was the dinner speaker.

"We are not going through the motions - we are going to win the election on June 11th, John J. Wintermeyer, Ontario Liberal leader told an enthusiastic luncheon gathering of party followers at the Kenricia Hotel today. "The people of the Province don't expect us to go back into opposition; rather they want a return to Liberalism and responsible government."

INTRODUCES LEADER

"June is a bad month for Frost," said Albert Wren, the party's candidate, in his introductory remarks, as he presented the guest speaker. In addition to the brilliant sunshine which greeted Mr. Wintermeyer's visit, (in contrast to the blizzard which greeted the P.C. leader). Mr. Wren noted that the head of every municipality in the riding, with one exception, was a party booster. Mr. Wren drew smiles when he said that "McCarthyism" is an issue in the election; "and I'm not referring to the late Senator McCarthy but rather Charlie McCarthy. The Conservative campaign is a "me-too" appeal." Mr. Wren said that personal issues were creeping into the Kenora campaign, which he would meet when and where it appeared. He said that the Liberal's policy to assist men over 40

with employment problems was a good platform; one which deserved support. His stand on liquor was well known, and he illustrated the "stupidity and hypocrisy" of present regulations which they concern camp operators. He said that "no great revision is sought but rather common sense in administration. Mr. Wren, in making his 4th appeal in a provincial election, defended his record of attendance in the House. Reporters from the Globe and Mail and the Toronto Star (present at the luncheon) could testify, said the M.P. that his record in the Legislature has been one of the best of the 98 elected representatives.

Mr. Wintermeyer, noting that this was his first visit to Kenora, said he had flown to Winnipeg and then driven yesterday to Kenora. On the Manitoba side of (Continued on Page 10)

Two Men Killed Saturday In District Accidents

The Ontario Provincial Police report two deaths over the weekend in Northwestern Ontario.

At 8 a.m. Saturday, one man was killed and a passenger injured when a car went over an embankment and plunged into a rock pile, 3 miles west of Ignace. A German immigrant, whose name is being withheld was the driver, of the 1959 Volkswagen and was killed instantly. The passenger was taken to hospital in Dryden. His condition is not serious. An inquest will be held.

Also on Saturday an explosion at Vermilion Bay, killed one man. Cause of the explosion is not known. The dead man was a recent immigrant, and his name is being withheld pending notification of next of kin. A report earlier said the cause of death was by fire. It has been reported there was no evidence of fire. Police are investigating.

the boundary, everything was fine, he noted. But once across the border, the difference was quickly apparent. He wondered why the Conservative Government, in office 16 years, had been so slow in discovering the needs of this area.

Ontario's northwest has been treated by the Conservative Government like a neglected step-child, Liberal Leader John Wintermeyer said.

If the Conservatives had done little for the north in all those years, their election gestures now could not be taken seriously. The Liberal leader said the logical way to bring genuine attention to the problems of the Northwest was to elect a Liberal government which has a real policy of development for the North.

He described the Liberal party platform on the North as one which would open up vast and rich areas. For instance, he said, it would be his party's policy if elected to build access roads to open up the country rather than wait until areas were populated and then start on inadequate road systems.

Mr. Wintermeyer said that no delay could be countenanced in the building of the Trans-Canada highway and that secondary and township roads must be rebuilt at once and turned over to local authorities.

To give the north of the province the attention it must have if it is to be developed in a proper way, Mr. Wintermeyer said the Liberals would establish a separate government department of Northern Development. The North, and particularly the Northwest, had to be considered in a special category in Ontario because there were problems in the North that existed nowhere else in the province. At the same time, he said, it must be recognized that the potential in the Northwest had only been scratched.

Secondary industries, improved freight rates, road development and intensive study of the best means of developing the great potential of northern resources were among the duties which would come under a separate government department. No area in all of North America . . . to say nothing of the European and Soviet northland . . . had been so badly neglected as Ontario's Northland, Mr. Wintermeyer explained. He said Conservatives had "visions" for the North but they were visions of snow-covered Arctic lands instead of sensible plans for those parts of the populated northland.

In outlining the Liberal platform, Mr. Wintermeyer said the Northwest would be particularly interested in the party's low cost housing scheme. This, he said, would allow people to build homes for as little as \$500 down over a long term. People with modest incomes could then own their own decent homes, he said.

He described the portable pension system, which the Liberals will inaugurate if elected. This is a plan to permit pensions to be carried from one job to another through the worker's life without loss of benefits. The Liberal leader said this would be of great benefits to those over 40 years of age who were seeking new employment. At present, he said, many cannot get jobs over that age because employers have pension plans and want to take on only young people. A government-administered portable or transferrable pension arrangement would overcome this difficulty.

Mr. Wintermeyer said this scheme, which would not be difficult to set up, would be one of the greatest forward steps in this century toward ensuring opportunity for those over 40 in seeking new employment.

He described also the Liberal Party's intention to establish a sensible liquor policy that would recognize the wishes of the people and bring some logic into the regulations which under the Conservatives have been nothing but hypocritical.

Mr. Wintermeyer said the Li-

beral Party's policy of recruiting good teachers and insisting on highest qualifications would be a boon to the Northwest. There is no reason, he said, why areas remote from the centre of the province should suffer from inadequate teaching standards. The Liberal Party will, if elected, take over the greater portion of education cost at the provincial level. This, said the leader, will relieve the local areas of a great burden of cost and it will make possible the proper payment of teachers regardless of where they teach.

He said that every part of the province should have the same quality of teaching, without discrimination.

Mr. Wintermeyer said that Albert Wren, the Kenora M.P., had been the champion of the Northwest in the Ontario legislature. He is, said the Liberal leader, one of the hardest workers in the House. His knowledge of the Northwest and his deep interest in its welfare had been of the utmost value to him as leader, Mr. Wintermeyer said.

In Toronto, said the Liberal leader, Mr. Wren devoted himself wholeheartedly to the concerns of his constituency and the northwest generally. "No member arrived earlier in the morning or left later at night than Albert

Wren", said Mr. Wintermeyer. He said that Mr. Wren's advice had been of the greatest value. Mr. Wintermeyer said that, if elected, the Liberal Party would extend hospital insurance benefits. One thing which could be done, he explained, was to make premium payments easier. Instead of having to pay months in advance, it should be possible to pay monthly. One way this could be arranged by the province would be to permit payments through banks in the same way hydro bills are sometimes paid.

The Liberal leader said he had been greatly impressed on his visits to the Northwest but he had been shocked on Sunday in a drive from Winnipeg to Kenora to discover how greatly inferior Ontario's roads were to

those of Manitoba. He said that Ontario was the richest province in the nation but its roads in the northwest did not compare with those in some of the smaller and less prosperous provinces.

The overall Liberal highway scheme, he said, was not aimed at building a road here and a bridge there but would provide a general system of modern highways at the earliest possible time.

Dryden High School Conservation Camp Set For June 3 - 6

The Dryden High School Conservation Camp, the only one of its kind in Canada, will hold its third annual, four-day field courses June 3-6 at the Contact Bay Depot on the Dryden Paper Company limits, south of the town of Dryden.

Thirty-six grade ten students - boys and girls - will study conservation in the woodlands classroom. The project is sponsored by the Dryden High School Board and the paper company.

Chief Instructor on the course will be James D. Coats, R.P.F., Toronto. Secretary-Manager of the Ontario Forestry Association. His staff will include personnel from the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, and other authorities on conservation from Guelph, Toronto, Port Arthur, Kenora and Dryden.

Students attending the course are selected on the basis of scholastic standing, participation in other school events, attitude, etc. During the course they will make actual measurements of forest growth, water flow, fish populations and soil erosion. On-the-spot lectures will be given to explain the natural processes taking place. The pupils will be required to report upon their findings each evening so that success of the program can be gauged.

It is not all work at the Camp, and time is made available for skits and entertainment in which the students take part.

The Dryden High School Conservation Camp is highly rated by all who have visited it.

John Wintermeyer Ont. Liberal Leader

John Joseph Wintermeyer, leader of the Liberal Party in Ontario, is a man whose background, education and experience has eminently fitted him for a career as a major Canadian political figure.

Born in Kitchener, December 4, 1916, he is the eldest son of Alfred C. Wintermeyer, prominent businessman, and the fourth generation of the Wintermeyer family in Kitchener.

After graduating from the elementary and secondary schools of Kitchener, Mr. Wintermeyer decided on an education that would give him a sound commercial background. On this basis, he decided to take a Bachelor of Commerce degree at famed Notre Dame University in South Bend, Ind.

At this college, where Knute Rockne and the fabled Four Horsemen made football history, Mr. Wintermeyer took up sports with enthusiasm, although he always had a reputation as more of a student than an athlete. He did go out for the track and field team, and played some baseball, too.

But basically, he was at Notre Dame to study. His studies, and membership on the college debating team, took most of his time. He graduated magna cum laude in 1939.

As a final preparation for a business career, Mr. Wintermeyer decided to study business law, and applied for admission to the Graduate School of Law at Harvard, one of the top legal training schools on the continent.

The entrance requirements of the School are very high indeed (they require applicants to have a mark average no lower than 91%), but Mr. Wintermeyer had no trouble meeting them, and was granted a Bachelor of Law degree.

During the course of his studies, he literally fell in love with the law. His previous plan to go into business was dropped and he decided to adopt the law as his profession.

To qualify for the Canadian bar, he went to the Law School of Dalhousie University in Halifax. He completed his studies in one year and was admitted to the bars of Ontario and Nova Scotia.

While a student at Harvard, Mr. Wintermeyer met Helen Delaney, of Cambridge, Mass., a vivacious history student at Emmanuel College in Boston, whom he married in 1943.

Only after marriage did her husband learn that Mrs. Wintermeyer had a strong political penchant herself, of Irish extraction, she is a direct descendant of Daniel O'Connell, the "Great Liberator" of Irish politics.

The Wintermeyers settled into a two-room apartment in Kitchener, and Mr. Wintermeyer joined the law firm of Sims, McIntosh, Schofield and Sims. After five years he opened his own firm, now Wintermeyer, Askin, Casey

and Smith.

The firm flourished and grew rapidly, and in 1956, Mr. Wintermeyer was appointed Queen's Counsel.

Meanwhile, the Wintermeyer family was growing, too. Today there are six children: James, 11; John, 9; Judith, 14; Mary-Ellen, 13; Gretchen, 5; and Sarah, 4.

John Wintermeyer began his political career as an alderman in Kitchener in 1952, when he was elected handily on his first try for office. He served three months and in the third election topped the polls.

In 1955 he defeated the sitting Conservative member for Water-

loo North in his first provincial campaign. When he entered the Ontario House, he was immediately made Liberal financial critic and his flair for this type of debate soon came to the fore. Three years of solid, constructive debate in the legislature and in the work of the Liberal Party were capped by his election as leader of the Liberal Party in Ontario at the leadership convention April 18-19, 1958.

Immediately on assuming the leadership, Mr. Wintermeyer began one of the most intensive and far-reaching grass-roots tours ever undertaken by a political leader in Ontario. In the six

months after he was chosen, Mr. Wintermeyer covered more than 30,000 miles, visiting all parts of Ontario and meeting thousands of individuals and groups.

KNOW THESE NEW TRAFFIC LAWS

Effective - Monday, May 25th.

- 1 You must lower your headlights:
 - (1) when within 500 feet of an approaching motor vehicle; and
 - (2) when following another motor vehicle within 200 feet.
- 2 It is an offence to place signs on the windows and to hang objects in the motor vehicle which obstruct the driver's view.
- 3 It is an offence to load a truck or trailer in such a way that any part of the load falls on the highway during transit and the penalty for such offence has been increased up to a maximum fine of \$200 and in addition the licence or permit may be suspended.
- 4 Passing on the right is now permitted in cities, towns and villages including Metropolitan Toronto but only:
 - (1) When overtaking a motor vehicle making or signalling a left hand turn;
 - (2) on streets having two or more lanes in each direction; and
 - (3) on one-way streets.
