## MAYOR AND MRS. RATUSKI TO SPEND HOLIDAY IN EUROPE

Mayor and Mrs. P. Ratuski leave tonight on the Dominion for a trip that will take them to most of the major cities of Europe. When in Europe, Mayor Ratuski will go to Germany where he will attend the World Conference of Mayors. While, his Worship will represent our town at this world conference, he will do so entirely at his own expense.

"This is a trip my wife and I have planned for years," said Mr. Ratuski when interviewed, "and it is most fortunate that our trip coincides with this world conference." We had included Germany in our agenda and now I will have the opportunity of

meeting mayors from many cities of the world."

Prior to leaving Canada, Mayor Ratuski will represent Kenora at the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Reeves to be held at North Bay, Ontario.

Wednesday, the couple will leave for New York and will fly from there on Friday. First stop on the trip will be Lisbon, then two days in Madrid. From there they will fly to Italy for visits to Rome and Venice.

Austria will be the next country on the town with a stop at Vienna, then to Munich. Five days will be spent in Germany, Cologne and then three days in Paris will see the end of the visit. On June 28th Mr. and Mrs. Ratuski will board the plane in Paris for the flight home.

Mayor Ratuski's visit to the world conference of mayors will mark the first time that Kenora has been represented at this convention. Kenora is most fortunate too, that we will have representation at this world meet, at no expense to the town.

## WREN CHARGES FREE BEER BEING OFFERED IN EXCHANGE FOR VOTE

Albert Wren, the Liberal-Labour candidate was in fighting trim in Red Lake Friday evening when he addressed wildly cheering capacity audience in the Legion Hall that the Tory campaign group in the Riding were attempting to suck the whistle at the same time. The two term Member of the Legislature for Kenora pointed out how the P.C. propaganda was aimed at him personally while they stated that nothing had been done in Kenora Riding since 1951. In the same breath they pointed out what had been done in the Riding. "You can't suck and whistle at the same time", Wren answered a heckler, to the delight of the audience, "A great deal has been accomplished; a great deal remains to be done and it is noteworthy that I did not ever say that everything brought in to the Riding was my doing. I have pointed out what has been done to refute deliberate misinformation that nothing could be done without a Government Member". Wren added, "Now", Wren added in a bristling tone, "the local Tories resort to personalities so far from the truth as to be labelled downright malicious gossip." "If these people will consult the Press in Toronto or the record they will find my attendance matches that of any Mem-

everything I have said or advocated. And what I have advocated has not been advanced since the election was announced but over many years, Wren added.

The meeting which was the largest for a long time in Red Lake loudly acclaimed the fighting Liberal-Labour Member when he stated that he would not submit to control of this Riding by a local clique many of whom were directly and indirectly employed by the Government. There was nodding agreement right through the crowd when Wren outlined the tactics used in Red Lake among the Indians. "Here", he said, "you are witnessing again the spectacle of Tory campaigners passing out campaign buttons which are exchangeable for free beer." Indiscriminately money is passed out to purchase beer to Indian men, women and any others who might be expected to sell their vote for a drink. It is a shocking situation that a vote extended to the Indian people should be so exploited by agents without fear or conscience. It is proof positive that an association which resorts to these methods is barren of any positive approach to the public and must rely on "beer politics" to influence what they regard as an uneducated vote to swing the Riding."

Said Wren, "This election will be fought cleanly and decently and I shall just as quickly order the arrest of one of my own followers as I will my opponents if they should offer to these unsuspecting people alcohol to deaden their senses and influence their voting."

**To the Electors of the Red Lake District

It becomes apparent from press reports in the Kenora riding of last week that Mr. Wren proposes to set his own plane of electioneering and set a new stage in this election by personal attacks on myself, Mr. Keffer and other Progressive Conservative workers. ## Five Girls To Take Ballet Exams

Five Kenora girls have qualified to take the grade two international ballet examination which will be held in Winnipeg on June 20. They are Mary Jane Cooke, Susan Colley, Cheryl I.amm, Marlys Wilson and Christine Alcock, their instructor, Mrs. Gerda Vidovic announces. In ballet the classic steps and positions are standard, so when a child passes an examination in one school he can advance to the next grade in any ballet school throughout the world and carry on smoothly where he left off.

It is interesting to watch the eager pupils at work in the studio dressed in leotards, long sleeved to keep the muscles warm, the traditional tights, and soft leather ballet slippers. They are beginning to get excited as examination time draws near,

and concentrate on executing the steps called for by the instructor.

"I will be celebrating my birthday on the same day as the graduation party," one of the girls said eagerly. They all plan to carry on with ballet work when they pass to the next grade, they assured.

There are four barres in the studio where the lessons are given, and most exercises are done with one hand on the barre for support. This helps to develop the proper carriage and balance for a budding ballet dancer. But before the lesson the pupil goes to the rosin box where she rubs the soles of her slippers to prevent slipping.

Since French has been for centuries the language of the ballet, the pupils will not have to relearn the names of the classic steps and positions if they should study in another country. Though the instructor might be Russian or Italian or English, when he calls for a "demi-plie" or a battement tendu the smallest dancer will understand.

The beauty of the dance is already apparent in the movements of these young students, but much training is necessary before they are expected to jump, spin and dance. This training is reflected in the graceful carriage and movement of the learner. Cpe mother tells how after two years training her little daughter has developed high arches in her formerly flat feet with the consequent improvement in walk and posture. All of the girls are learning the same steps and positions and doing the same exercises as the great ballerinas of history.
