William Golebeski Died Suddenly Thursday Night

William Golebeski, died suddenly at the residence of his son, 621 - First Street South, Thursday evening, June 4th. Born in Poland, June 26th 1859, he was in his 90th year.

He came to Canada as a young boy in 1885. He was employed as a sectionman for the CPR for forty-five years, retiring in 1945.

Predeceased by his wife in 1935, he is survived by four sons, Kasmer of Kenora, Rufus and Mirron of Winnipeg and Stanley of Great Falls, Man., one daughter, Mrs. T. (Stefanie) Wishart of Starbuck Man., one sister, Mrs. L. Graboski of Tolstoy, Man. Nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive.

the Russell Funeral Home, Beausejour, Manitoba. Funeral service will be held at Beausejour on Monday, June 8th. Interment will be in the family plot, Roman Catholic Cemetery. The Brown Funeral Home, Kenora is in charge of local arrangements.

At a well attended meeting in Redditt - the Labour - C.C.F. candidate for the Kenora Riding told the gathering that he is determined to provide better representation for this constituency and for the working people, small business owners and farmers in particular, than they have had in the past.

Present at the meeting and speaking on behalf of the Labour - C.C.F. candidate was Mr. A. W. Godfrey, of Winnipeg General representative of the Canadian Labour Congress.

It was pointed out by both speakers that it was time for a change in representation as well as a change in the Provincial Government.

Bill Sherman stated that the Frost Government ignored its responsibilities to the taxpayers of Northwestern Ontario in that a much greater effort was devoted to development of good roads and bridges and public works projects in Eastern Ontario than was given to this portion of the province - despite the fact that considerable taxes are extracted from this section. 



Fort Farmers Install New Milk Coolers

Fort Frances—Tank hauling of milk has begun to revolutionize the dairy farms of Rainy River district.

SIX GIANT milk coolers were brought from Kenora last week and were being installed in dairy barns of the Emo area. For the cattle owners involved, the change in milk cooling methods represented an expenditure of approximately \$2,000 on the average.

Reason for the change from milk cans to refrigerated coolers was that Laktand Dairy of Kenora plans to commence transporting milk from the producers to the plant.

THE FARMER will empty his milk pails into the cooler machine, and probably twice weekly the tanker truck will arrive to pump the cooler empty.

When gas boats run too close to a tow of pulp or logs, the swell has a tendency to wash out some of the pulp and logs, and it is for this reason that we ask you to:

- (1) When passing a tow, either being towed by tugs or in storage, keep at least 100 feet from boom. When it is not possible to do this, if in narrows, slow down till past the tow or boom.
- (2) When following a tow of pulp or logs, watch for any stray logs or pulpwood sticks which may have worked out from rear of tow.

If these precautions are observed by all boat owners, it will keep the lake free from floaters and will help eliminate damage to small craft.

is too high in relation to the protection provided. He also pledges himself to support a better medical plan for the people of this province. This plan must include both optical and dental care. Mr. Sherman pointed out that many of our people are deprived of much needed medical attention because of the ever increasing costs of this service and to the terrific costs of drug prescriptions.

Sherman also introduced a Comprehensive Automobile Insurance plan that will provide maximum coverage at absolute minimum premium costs.

Others like to jump in just after a heavy meal or when overheated. Cramps usually occur in such cases. Changing places in a canoe in the middle of the lake is another favorite.

Apart from observing the rules for water safety the next best thing is to be sure that a knowledge of artificial respiration is at hand. Many a person who has seen a victim of drowning, feels certain that he is dead, because of the lack of eye reflexes, breathing and heartbeat.

On file at the Health League of Canada are records of people who have been brought back to life through applying artificial respiration for periods long past the time it seemed even likely that the victim was salvageable. The longest period on record was eight hours of artificial respiration.

The first and last thing to remember about the application of artificial respiration is to begin it right away—and not to cease until rigor mortis has set in, this last being a stiffening of the limbs which indicates death most certainly.

Send someone else for the doctor, but don't stop giving this aid—even on the way to the hospital in the ambulance. Keep the victim warm if possible.

L. Ingo Represents Kenora At Rowing Meet In St. Paul

L. Ingo, is representing Kenora at the Northwest International Rowing Association meeting to be held in St. Paul, Minnesota, Saturday June 5.

Dates of the 1959 annual Northwestern Regatta will be set and proposed changes in the association's by-laws will be acted upon.

The Northwestern International Rowing Association is comprised of clubs from Duluth, Fort William, Kenora, Minneapolis, Regina, St. Paul and Winnipeg.

Holger Neilson Life Saving Method

In 1932 Colonel Holger-Nielsen of Denmark had completed his studies and devised this method of artificial respiration. It has been used extensively and successfully in resuscitation of victims of cessation of breathing and with slight modifications is now adopted by the Canadian Red Cross as an alternate method to the Schaefer.

The method consists of pressure on the back to expel air from the lungs and pulling on the arms to expand the capacity of the chest bringing air in again.

The operator takes position at the head of the victim which permits assistants to remove wet clothing—place warm blankets, etc. without interfering with the movements of artificial respiration.

TECHNIQUE:

1. Turn the victim on his stomach with head slightly lower than his feet.
2. Extend the arms beyond the head; bend the elbows and place one hand upon the other with the fingers resting on the wrist. Turn the head to one side, resting the cheekbone on the hands.
3. Remove any obstructions in the mouth.
4. Kneel on one knee at the side of the victim's head and near the forearm. Place the other foot near the opposite elbow. If more comfortable, kneel on both knees, one at each side of the head.
5. With the fingers comfortably spread and ends of the thumbs just touching, place your hands flat on the back. The heels of the hands should be on an imaginary line drawn between the armpits.
6. Rock forward until your shoulders are directly above the heels of the hands. Keep the arms straight and hold the position for two seconds.
7. Slide the hand across the shoulders and down the arms to near the elbows.
8. Grasp the elbows just above the elbows and rock your body slowly backward. Keep your own elbows straight. Hold this position for two seconds. The operator should feel that he is getting a distinct "pull" on the victim's shoulders toward his head and easing the weight off the chest without disturbing the position of the victim's head on his folded hands.
9. Place the elbows on the ground. Don't drop them. Again place the hands on the back to repeat the cycle about 12 times per minute. Move smoothly and with even rhythm, counting "one-two-change one-two-three-change" - the complete count in five seconds. Do not jerk off the back or drop the elbows.

Plastic Bags Should Be Kept Out Of Reach Of Children

The National Institute of Dry-cleaning is saddened to learn that four infants in Phoenix, Arizona, have died of suffocation from becoming enveloped in plastic

film. Dr. Paul B. Jarrett, Chairman of the Safety Committee of the Maricopa County (Arizona) Medical Society, says that plastic from drycleaners' garment bags closed about these children's faces probably because of its static electricity and prevented their breathing.

Parents should never allow small children to use these plastic bags or any other piece of plastic film as playthings. The Institute has urged all drycleaners to be aware of the danger these bags can cause and to warn their customers.

Plastic bags have been in wide use by drycleaners for five years. They are in great demand. Customers and drycleaners find them practical, attractive and useful. Hundreds of millions of them have been delivered to drycleaning customers. Properly used, they are perfectly safe. Instances of fatal accidents with the film have been rare. However, this does not lessen the need for warning parents.

Headache pills, sleeping tablets, insecticides, sharp tools, toxic and flammable fluids, and many other common household items are also dangerous if given to children to play with. The Institute hopes all parents will be as careful to keep plastic film away from their small children as they are to protect them from these other dangers.

Canada's shellfish, which include such delicacies as scallops, oysters, mussels and clams; are not only delicious varieties of seafood but also are good sources of calcium and iodine.

One of their biggest bug bears at the outset had been the road to the centre and although a certain amount of volunteer effort had made it somewhat more passable it still was not the best. However, due to certain representations a survey crew was now on the site and it has been learned that by fall substantial improvements and changes will have been made. The most outstanding development plan for the future was a main lodge containing conference, office, and recreation facilities at a cost of approximately \$70,000.

N. Edmonstone, vice-president of SRIM, who was introduced by Mr. Thomas as a man with faith in a long-term project, gave the members some idea of the problems involved in the financial operations of the centre. This year expected revenue from user groups would be in the vicinity of \$20,000 to \$24,000. As against this operating expenses would probably total in the vicinity of \$26,000 or \$27,000. In the future it was hoped that the centre would be a totally self-supporting operation, with operating expenses met entirely by user groups.

In the early stages of setting up the centre, however, some financial assistance was needed and it was felt that a major part of this should come from large natural resource companies.

Following a review of the legal set-up and status of the QCTC by D. S. Cheadle, a group discussion was held on the following subjects: Ways and means of increasing number of user groups, how to enlarge membership, improvement of facilities, how and what, and possible ways of bettering public relations.

An election resulted in the following officers being elected: president, H. E. Thomas, F.W.; vice-pres. G. K. Eoll, Atikokan, sec. treas. C. M. McIntosh, Executive committee: N. E. Richards, F. 
