## PAPER MILL DELEGATES ATTENDING EDUCATIONAL COURSE IN KENORA

Twenty delegates from four paper mills have gathered in the Legion Hall, Kenora for a two-day educational conference.

Sponsored by the United Papermakers and Paperworkers, the courses are being conducted by Union officials from Ottawa and Albany N.Y.

Representatives at the conference are from the mills at Kenora, Fort Frances, of the O & M Pulp and Paper Company, the mill at Dryden of the Dryden Paper Company, and the Manitoba Paper Company at Pine Falls, Manitoba.

The conference was arranged by J. A. D'Aoust, Vice President and Regional Director of Canada of the United Papermakers and Paperworkers. Mr. D'Aoust informed delegates that the course will touch on six topics, ranging from local offices and steward training to Union Communications, Collective Bargaining, Economics, Legislation issues and trade Union ethics.

The instructors are Frank Grasso, general Vice-President and Educational Directors; Richard Logan, associate director. Both are from Albany N.Y., headquarters of the U.P.P. The Legislative course is conducted by Andy Andrus, legislation director of the Canadian Congress at Ottawa.

Kenora is the second stop on the Canadian tour which began at Port Arthur and will include Kapuskasing, Iroquois Falls and Three Rivers, Quebec. The tour of education will also include other paper mill areas in Eastern Canada.

## Man Shot In Mouth Sunday At Malachi

A man is in St. Joseph Hospital today suffering from a bullet wound in the mouth. The injured man, Jim Smith of Malachi, was flown to Kenora Sunday afternoon, his condition is reported as not serious.

Ontario Provincial Police report that they were called to Malachi at noon Sunday, to investigate a reported shooting. Upon arrival they found Smith suffering from a bullet wound to the head, the slug of a .22 calibre being lodged in his mouth.

Philip Williamson, aged 17, companion of Smith fled into the bush following the incident.

OPP reinforcements were called in and Williamson was captured near the Minaki Station shortly after dusk, Sunday. He was brought to Kenora where he was charged in Magistrate's Court with wounding with intent and being intoxicated this morning. He pleaded guilty before Magistrate J. V. Fregeau and was remanded till June 15th for sentencing.

## Hubert Hamilton Died Sunday

Hubert Weldon Hamilton, 1538 Pine Portage Road, Kenora, died at the General Hospital, Sunday, June 7, following a lengthy illness. Born in Fembroke, Ontario, March 6, 1895, he was 64 years old.

He received his education in Sudbury and came to Kenora in 1927. He was employed by the Grand Trunk Railway, by the Department of Lands and Forests for 21 years, as a guard at the Provincial Jail, Kenora, and was last employed by the Department of Highway, retiring in 1957. He was a veteran of the First World War, a member of the Canadian Legion, Branch No. 12 and a member of the Presbyterian

### Magistrate's Court

A sixteen year old Kenora youth lost his driver's licence for two years, received 37 days in jail or fines of \$110 and costs in court this morning. He was found guilty of criminal negligence by speeding on the wrong side of the highway and not having lights on his vehicle. The fine was \$100 and costs of 30 days. For obtaining liquor while under the age of 21 years, he was fined \$10 and costs of 7 days.

The young man was also found to be operating a car using a temporary driver's licence which had already expired. In this connection, the owner of the vehicle was fined \$50 and costs of 10 days for allowing the accused to operate his car.

A Kenora man was fined \$25 and costs of 10 days for discharging a fire-arm within the town limits.

Failure to pay parking tickets, cost two motorists \$5.00 each.

Driving without a licence resulted in a local motorist paying \$16.00, while another motorist

paid \$5.00 and costs for not observing a stop sign.

Five drunks each took the seven days in jail instead of paying the fine while a second offender took the thirty days.

A Sioux Narrows man paid \$31.50 for taking property belonging to Ontario Hydro, which he has since returned.

## Liberal Finances Said Shaky

Toronto—The Ontario Liberal Association met to discuss financial problems which a Liberal spokesman said have forced a heavy cutback in planned advertising.

"The Liberal party certainly is not broke in this election," he said. "It has been necessary to curtail some of our advertising and that's the extent of it. An ambitious program has just had to be cut back."

One reason for the weakened financial position of the provincial Liberals was the poverty of the federal party which has made financial contributions in previous Ontario elections.

"At this particular time I don't think they're in a financial position to help," the spokesman said. "But we have had help in

a variety of ways, such as through federal members speaking on behalf of the provincial party."

# The Norwesto Story

(Continued From Last Issue)

## Preliminary Experiments and Plans

Preliminary plans were laid for the establishment of the new communications company and some experiments with VHF (Very High Frequency) radio were conducted from Kenora during the summer and fall of 1947. Negotiations were started with the Department of Transport, Ottawa and the proposed operating plan, as presented, was so logical and of such obvious benefit to the district, that the Controller of Radio granted, in the summer of 1948, a licence authorizing the company to conduct experimental radio surveys throughout Northwestern Ontario.

## Incorporation

Coincident with these negotiations, a petition of incorporation was submitted to the Province of Ontario and Norwesto Communications Limited received its charter in May, 1948.

First officers of the company were:

Chairman of the Board, Sidney H. Linerooth, St. Paul, Minn.; President, Carl W. Johnson, Kenora; Secretary-Treasurer, W. Blair Starratt, Kenora; Directors, T. A. Brett, Kenora; W. C. Fisher, Winnipeg; James E. Guy, Kenora; Barney Lamm, Kenora; Arthur Worrell, St. Paul, Minn.

**Company Growth to June, 1950**  
Norwesto's first experimental radio-telephone circuit was installed between Kenora and Ball Lake Lodge, 42 miles north-north-east, in June, 1948. This circuit, which is typical of many now in the district, provided the only means of communication to the Lodge, other than airplane.

Following a summer of more experimenting and planning, radio facilities of Canadian Pacific Air Lines Limited, at Kenora and Red Lake, were purchased, and the Company entered the commercial telegraph field at Red Lake.

In December, 1948, five cars of a local Taxi Company were equipped with radio-telephone. By closely observing their operation, much further useful information on radio propagation characteristics, in the districts surrounding Kenora, was obtained.

Following these surveys and after concluding successful negotiations with the Department of Transport, regarding commercial licences, radio-telephone circuits were installed in rapid succession between the following locations in 1949: Sioux Narrows to Kenora; Ball Lake to Kenora; Mächlin's Shoal Lake to Kenora.

In the period of February to June 1950, the following circuits were completed: Dupont Mine, Shoal Lake to Kenora; Red Lake (VHF circuit relayed through Ball Lake) to Kenora; Chukini Lumber Co. Ltd., Snake Falls to Red Lake; Redditt to Kenora; Doug Hook's, Separation Lake to Kenora; Crow Lake to Sioux Narrows to Kenora; Nestor Falls to Sioux Narrows to Kenora; Elkar Lodge, Lake of the Woods to Kenora; Grace Anne 2, Lake of the Woods, to Kenora; Hudson Bay Company Trading Posts provided with terminal service from Kenora and Red Lake; Spicers Lodge, Echo Lake to Red Lake; Laclu to Kenora; Delaney Lake Lodge to Kenora.

By June 1950, the staff of the company had grown to 16 employees.

**Operations of the Past Year**  
Up until June 1950, only telegraph traffic was handled. In that month, however, arrangements were completed with the Town of Kenora to connect the local system to the Norwesto system.

A few more circuits were added during 1950, as follows: Minaki (Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests) to Kenora, July, 1950; Mobile Dispatch Service to four units, July, 1950; Experimental Circuit for Dryden Paper Co. Ltd., October, 1950.

Also, during the latter half of the year, the development of newly designed radio equipment was started in the Norwesto laboratory in Kenora and existing circuits were made more efficient. This was a direct result of the appointment of Mr. C. H. (Bert) Brereton as Chief Engineer, on July 1, 1950. Mr. Brereton's arrival heralded the beginning of a communications engineering group which is fast becoming second to none in the country.

On December 1, 1950, arrangements were completed to connect into the world-wide long distance telephone system. Long distance calls to and from many points in Canada and the United States are now a daily occurrence.

In 1951, the growth of the company has continued at the pace set in 1950. The staff now consists of 43 employees and the value of the operating plant has increased threefold.

Newsprint is Canada's chief export and manufactured product.

The average of weekly wages and salaries paid in Canadian industry stood at \$73.09 in February, 1959, compared to \$70.02 a year earlier and \$58.88 five years ago.

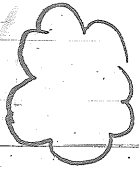

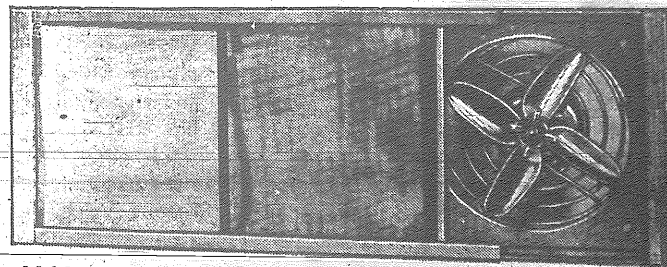

**Letter to the Editor**

Recently a letter appeared in your paper "Another Boat Owner"—the writer of that letter does not seem to be well informed either, re dredging of creek. The first attempt of dredging of said creek was done by a local contractor at the west end of 7th Ave. bridge, which there was about \$2,000.00 appropriated for same, and a piece of the ledge of rock was blown off and a two wheel scraper, a team was used to clean out same, work was done off a floating dock. Some time later the Trades and Labour Council took up the matter of dredging the creek that was the first move to have something done. Sometime later a creek committee was formed and were successful through the assistance of the late Hughie McKinnon, then Federal Member, to get Federal Government to appropriate a sum of money to dredge same. After a survey by an engineer the creek was copper dammed at 7th Ave. bridge and at the end of present crib on south side of creek and water pumped out, and a shovel was put in and approximately 16 inches of creek bottom was taken out which was solid clay, and was taken down to lake level. The clay was hauled away by truck, a few lots were lifted up and the rest of the clay was dumped on the curve

from 2nd St. South to 7th Avenue bridge, widening it to the width it is now as it was only a wagon trail before.

The contractor wanted to crib the north side of the creek and deposit the clay behind it, but some of the residents objected. Hence they hauled it away. At the same time there was a considerable depth of rock-blown off the two ledges of rock, that is west of the 7th Ave. bridge.

The second World War broke, and the government clamped down on all appropriations of that kind. This may be some news to some readers. The creek was classed as navigable water in the Law Suit re Hudson Bay and Town of Kenora, and Kenora lost the case. The town paid thousands of dollars through the years until Backus & Brooks took over the Power House and assumed the debt still owing. The authority for knowing the creek was classed as navigable water was the late Mr. J. P. Earnegy on the platform of the court house in Kenora. "This work was done with a dry creek", and the same government took out all the piles that stood up on the west end of the Lakeside bridge to which the booms used to be tied, and there is about 30 yards of dredging to be done that side also to complete the present dredging, if the town water mains crossing the creek on the east side will allow them to go through the bridge.

EDITORIAL FROM THE DRYDEN OBSERVER

Late last summer, Hon. Fred Cass, the newly-appointed minister of highways, took the trouble to come to the Dryden District to see for himself the condition of the Trans-Canada Highway. He did so at the request of the Dryden District Chamber of Commerce. It was an historic event for Dryden for it was the first time within memory that a minister of highways had set foot in the Dryden District. Previous encumbrants to the office had preferred to travel by rail or by air. All roads look pretty smooth from high in the sky, but Mr. Cass had been informed the Trans-Canada Highway through the Dryden area was hardly as smooth as it appeared to his predecessors.

The Chamber of Commerce meeting which he addressed while in Dryden packed River-view Lodge and it appeared for awhile that Mr. Cass's department had few friends. But the doughty little minister of highways was able to handle himself very well and to defend the policies of his predecessors, right or wrong, the previous ministers' promises elsewhere had to be fulfilled and Mr. Cass made it clear that he intended to do so, pointing out that despite the bad condition of the road here at that time, previous commitments would have to be respected.

But Fred Cass had some promises to make of his own and having seen the condition of the road and judged the potential of the area he gave assurance that something would be done about the highway and that it would be done as quickly as possible.

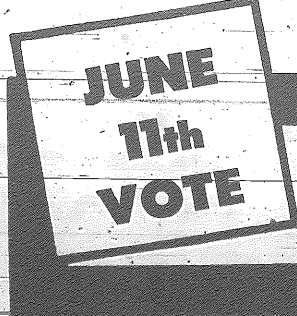
Oh yes, there were scoffers. There were many who said they had heard all kinds of promises before. There were those who had been fooled and perhaps this applied to most of us.

But there was something about this man Cass and the way he spoke that persuaded those of us who had a chance to meet him

and talk with him personally that he was in earnest. There was a determination evident. This man Cass was sold that day on the Dryden District and the importance of the Trans-Canada Highway through this part of the province.

If it is fair game to criticize governments and government officials for not doing things then surely it is fair to give them credit for what they do. A drive between Dryden and Kenora today strikingly reveals that the Hon. Fred Cass wasn't speaking empty when he appeared in Dryden last summer. His words have been transformed into action for today almost every inch of every mile of the Trans-Canada Highway between Dryden and Kenora except those stretches already paved is under heavy construction or re-construction. It is almost worth a trip to Kenora just to see the amount of work that has been commenced. It is a sight to behold for we have waited a long, long time. It does appear that within a few short years we will have at long last a first-class paved highway across this part of the province—a highway that is needed not for the butter and egg trade between local communities but to serve as a commercial lifeline between east and west; as a vital artery connecting the seaway ports with the west and as a lifeline of the great tourist industry in North-western Ontario.

As in all things successful there will be others eager to find the limelight by claiming to have brought such things about. We have all played our part. Many of us have been drawing to the attention of governments for years the woeful condition of the highway. But it was the Hon. Fred Cass and none other who turned the key. We hope he will come again when the highway is completed to bask in the warmth of our smiles.

## ECONOMIC SURVEY PREDICTS GROWTH FOR NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO

In a special economic study issued today, the Ontario Department of Economics concludes that the present rapid rate of expansion and development in Northwestern Ontario will undoubtedly continue in the years ahead.

The comprehensive 105-page Survey, covering the resource-rich Districts of Thunder Bay, Kenora and Rainy River - half Ontario's land area - notes that the Region's population has increased from 166,711 to 218,000 in only eight years and may well climb to at least 257,000 within another eight. The area's labour force has ex-

panded markedly since World War II, and has personal income up by almost 70 per cent since 1951 alone.

Still the largest and most important industrial segment in the Region, forestry and the forest-based industries have increased the value of their output by 52 per cent in the last decade. The production of the area's factories and mines has also expanded sharply in recent years. Spectacular strides have been made in the development of new industrial undertakings and the uncovering of additional mineral wealth. Agriculture, commercial fishing and trapping, and tourism are flourishing. Construction activity, gauged by the value of building permits issued, has accelerated more than 230 per cent since 1951.

"Rising incomes, improved housing conditions and modern household equipment and conveniences have raised the stand-

ard of living in Northwestern Ontario to a level similar to that in the more southerly urban centres," notes the Survey.

Present trends point toward a continuation of the Region's economic expansion. This will be based upon such developments as St. Lawrence Seaway transportation, Alberta natural gas, additional Ontario Hydro power projects, new highway - particularly the Trans-Canada Highway - new international bridges at Sault Ste. Marie, Rainy River and Fort Frances, the Government's sustained-yield forest management policy and the access roads program.

Moreover, the large-scale aerial exploration drive now under way will likely lead to the discovery of additional, rich mineral deposits. The Region may also become one of the most important iron producing areas of North America.

The Survey, 73 pages of descriptive and analytical material, plus 32 pages of economic statistics, is the third undertaken by the Ontario Department of Economics on the ten economic regions of the Province. Earlier ones covered the Georgian Bay and Northeastern Regions; the fourth, now in preparation, will study Eastern Ontario.

The purpose of these studies is to analyze the economic growth and assess the contribution of each region to the whole Provincial economy, and thereby to present business, industry and the public generally with facts and figures upon which rational plans can be based for new enterprises or the expansion of existing undertakings. The objective of the work is to aid the promotion of a balanced economic development throughout Ontario.

Due to the decline in business, employment on Canada's two major railways dropped to a 10-year low in 1958 as more than 18,000 workers were taken off the payrolls.

For the first time in 15 years the value of construction in Canada will show a decrease in 1959; the forecast for 1959 is \$7,202 million, compared to the 1958 all-time high of \$7,231 million.

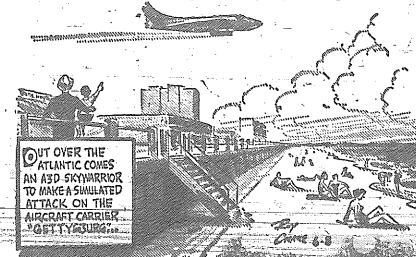

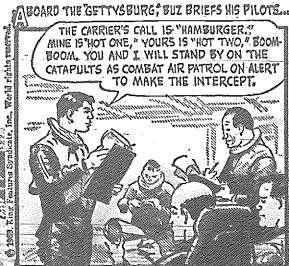

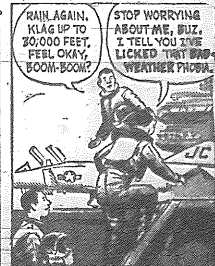

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**Minister Of Mines And Keffer Visit Sioux Lookout Area**

Representation came from almost every community in the Kenora Riding to the largest political meeting ever held in Sioux Lookout, Saturday.

Mayor Hannah expressed his heartfelt thanks on behalf of the people of Sioux Lookout to the Hon. Jim Maloney for finding time in his very busy election schedule to visit the home town of the Progressive Conservative Candidate, Howard Keffer.

Mr. Maloney spoke in Red Lake on Friday evening, visited several of the mines, and drove to Hudson to meet with the people there on Saturday afternoon.
