## CJRL WILL PROVIDE ELECTION COVERAGE

The best in radio coverage for today's provincial election is assured all listeners to Radio Station CJRL. Sharp at eight o'clock tonight, the station will commence broadcasting provincial as well as local results.

Kenora and Fort Frances are the only two ridings of the province to close their polls at eight o'clock daylight time. All other ridings in the province will be closed at seven o'clock, local time, there will be quite a bit of election news available for broadcast over CJRL.

Five station announcers will re-

port the results as quickly as they are available so that local listeners will be kept right up to date. CJRL will also be hooked up with Toronto for special election night broadcasts. It is also expected that interviews with the three local candidates will be heard later this evening over CJRL.

Local listeners as well as following the results in the Kenora riding, will also listen with interest to the results of the Rainy River District as well as the three party leaders of the province, Premier Leslie Frost, Liberal leader John Wintermeyer and CCF leader Donald C. MacDonald.

If voters continue to cast their ballots as they have done up until 3 o'clock, Kenora should report a record vote. In a pinpoint survey, Polls checked reported a fairly brisk business.

The Ukrainian Hall with 280 voters reported that 87 had cast their ballot, or roughly 31%. At the Council Chambers, almost 47% voted with 80 out of 190 voting; at Ken's Storage, 78 out of a possible 214 cast their ballot. ## Drivers Up To 21 Years Have Double Accident Rate

Windsor, Ont. — "Automobile drivers in Canada, up to the age of 21, have an accident rate twice as high as the rest of the population and they also kill 50 per cent more people in these accidents."

So stated D. L. McGillivray, Assistant Division Manager of Imperial Oil Limited, Toronto, in an address here in the finals of a province-wide safe driving competition.

This safe driving competition which was open to teen age boys and girls who had previously won regional tests in various parts of the province, was jointly sponsored by the Windsor Junior Chamber of Commerce and Imperial Oil Limited. It was also supported by Government authorities, civil officials, police and representatives of safety groups.

Mr. McGillivray was the guest speaker at a wind-up banquet, in Assumption College where, winning drivers were recipients of awards.

He stressed the growing importance of making youthful drivers more safety conscious and cognizant of their responsibility while behind the wheel of a car.

"In many parts of our country," Mr. McGillivray declared, "the car population is increasing twice as fast as the human population. The rate of growth of our car population is far greater than that of the United States. There is an enormous backlog of highway building to be done in this country. Our streets and highways are going to be more crowded than ever. This means there will have to be a much more concentrated effort to educate and create safe drivers among our young people today, so that they will carry these habits and attitudes into the more congested driving conditions of tomorrow."

The Assistant Division Manager of Imperial Oil Limited endeared himself to female members of the audience when, in the course of his remarks he said "Women drivers, including those in their teens, are known to be safer drivers than men."

High blood pressure or hypertension could be prevented in many cases, if those over forty would follow a certain course plan for living, with adequate rest, moderation in eating and drinking, and such exercise as approved by the doctor.

**BLUSHING BERRY TARTS**  
 1 cup fresh strawberries, sliced and sweetened  
 6 chocolate coconut tart shells, well chilled  
 2 cups cold milk  
 1 package vanilla instant pudding  
 Dash of salt  
 sweetened whipped cream  
 Place 2 tablespoons of the sliced berries in bottom of each tart shell. Pour milk into mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and salt and beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Do not overbeat; mixture will be thin. Pour at once, very carefully, over berries in tart shells. Let stand 15 minutes in refrigerator before serving. Garnish with remaining strawberries and the sweetened whipped cream. Makes 6 tarts.  
**To Make Chocolate Coconut Tart Shells**  
 Melt 2 squares, unsweetened chocolate and 2 tablespoons butter in top of double boiler, stirring until blended. Combine 2

tablespoons hot milk or water, ring well. Add 1-1/2 cups tender-ure into 6 paper baking cups and chill until firm. (Do not freeze.)  
 and 3/4 cup sifted icing sugar, thin flaked coconut and mix well, press firmly on bottoms and up. Feel off the paper before filling
