Gus Green Former Resident Died At Fort William

S. Gus Green, aged 64 yrs. former well known Kenora citizen and a resident of 737 South Marks Street Fort William, died in hospital early Thursday morning following a three week's illness.

Mr. Green had been an employee of the Kenora Board of Works for 30 years prior to moving to Fort William early in 1958.

A native of Jutland, Sweden, he was brought to Kenora at the age of twelve years.

In World War 1, he enlisted in the 197th Battalion and saw service overseas from 1915 to 1918 following his discharge he returned to Kenora.

He was married at Kenora to Miss Gladys Dowler on September 1, 1927.

A member of Zion Lutheran Church and a former member of the Civic employees Union at Kenora he was fond of children

and his home. Surviving, are his wife at the family home; 3 sons, Clifford and Douglas at home and Edwin of Kenora; 1 daughter, Mildred, Mrs. G. Beasley of Cameron Falls; 6 grandchildren also survive and 2 brothers, Oscar and Magnus Green of Kenora; 2 sisters, Katrina, Mrs. A. Wallman, Kenora, Mary, Mrs. W. Potts, Chase, B.C. Funeral Services will be held on Saturday afternoon, June 13, at 1.45 in the Chapel of the Jenkins Funeral Home, Rev. R. A. Wallin of Zion Lutheran Church will officiate and interment will be in Mountain View Cemetery.

BULLETIN

Returns from Amsedale give Keffer 7 votes and Wren 4. With 9 polls still to report, Wren's majority stands at 262.

Election returns in yesterday's Provincial election are still being received at the Returning Officer's office. With 10 polls still remaining to be heard from, mostly in the northern areas, Albert Wren is ahead of his Progressive Conservative opponent, Howard Keffer by 265 votes. The totals are:

WREN 6,484 KEFFER 6,219

W. Sherman, C.C.F. Polled 1,481 votes.

The ten remaining polls to be heard from are Goldrock, Dymnt, Amsedale, Sâchigo Lake, Perrault Falls, Bearskin, Deer Lake, North Spirit Lake, Trout Lake and Sowden. The combined number of names of the list amounts to 484 votes.

ELECTION SIDELIGHTS

Trust Kenora to provide the headlines. Yesterday's undecided election is the 4th in a row where the results have been close and remained uncertain long after other constituencies were finished their post mortems. This afternoon 10 polls remain to be heard from, and Joe O'Flaherty says that communications have been disrupted in the areas concerned. The Liberal vote in Kenora and Hudson has provided that party with its 265 majority, at this writing.

In 1955, two days after the June 9th vote, Wren held a majority of 518 over the P.C. candidate, J. V. Fregeau. Tuesday, when 8 northern polls reported, they have the P.C. Candidate 367 votes to 13 for the Liberal member, slashing the majority to 164. The final two polls reduced the Liberal majority by another 38 votes. Naturally, with about 300 votes in the predominantly Indian centres still to be counted, they remains an element of suspense.

In 1955, the deputy returning officer flew into Spirit Lake to conduct the poll and returned without a ballot being marked. It seems that the Indian encampment had up and moved. North Spirit Lake is one of the 10 unreported polls at this writing, and has 33 names on the voter's list. Bearskin is the largest unreported northern poll with 93 names, followed by Deer Lake with 58 names; Dymnt with 94 names; Perrault Falls with 67 and Ames-

Both Liberal and Conservative committee rooms are keeping a watchful eye on the remaining polls, recalling that in 1955, with all but 10 polls reporting, Mr. Wren enjoyed a majority of 518 votes. Two days later, with 8 more polls reporting, the majority had been slashed to 161 and the final tally was down to 128 votes.

An example of what can happen yet, was given by returns from Round Lake, north of Red Lake, which reported just before noon today. Returns there gave Keffer 62 votes against 5 for Wren. Returns from the remaining polls will be closely watched.

There were several interesting sidelights to yesterday's voting. One elderly lady told a Kenora polling clerk that she didn't want to vote for anyone on the list - she wanted to vote for Peter Heenan. At the New Rat Portage Reserve, on McKenzie Portage Road, Keewatin, none of the 17 Indians would vote. The only two votes cast there were by the deputy returning officer and the clerk.

dated with 35 are three of the uncounted polls and should be heard from today.

Provincially, the Conservatives dropped 2 percent of the popular vote at a cost of a dozen seats.

The Liberals picked up 4 percent and doubled their representation from 11 to 22 seats. The CCF tallied 17 percent, exactly the same as 1955 but increased their membership in the House from 3 to five members. Locally the CCF candidate, Bill Sherman, made a most creditable showing, entering the contest only 9 days before polling.

About 2,000 more ballots were counted this election than in 1955. The total counted to date is 14,184 of a total eligible of slightly over 22,000. The total may well reach 70 percent when all returns are received.

Comfort Station Now In Use At Rushing River Park

So far this spring the public has been enjoying free use of the popular Rushing River Park. The delay in putting the vehicle permit and camping charges into effect has resulted from repairs being made to the septic tank and field at the Comfort Station.

Now that the water has been turned on and the Comfort Station is once again in operation the usual charges for use of the Park have been put in effect. The Department of Lands and Forests. Additional camping areas and trailer sites are expected to be opened for use in the next few weeks.

Jaffray Melick Telephone Cut-Over Very Successful

The change over from manual to dial telephones in Jaffray-Melick on June 7 went off without a hitch.

Only a few minor troubles were encountered. A little diffi-

culty resulted from faulty dialing, mostly from subscribers confusing the letter "O" with the numeral "0".

Subscribers report a very much improved service has resulted from the change.

Violent electrical storms during the past week have caused considerable damage by trees blown down on lines and protective equipment damaged by lightning.

This damage has been wide spread in this district and has caused service interruptions in Jaffray-Melick, Red Lake, Minnaki, Sioux Narrows and the West Highway. Crews have been working overtime to restore service.

Summer Train Schedule For Lake Of The Wood Area

Summer train services from Winnipeg to Lake Winnipeg resorts and the Lake of the Woods were announced here today by the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Morning trains will be run to Lake Winnipeg resorts as far as Riverton, returning the same evening except for Monday and Thursday, June 27 to August 16 inclusive. They will also run on Civic Holiday and Labor Day.

To the Lake of the Woods, passengers will be handled on the evening eastbound daily trans-continental trains, the Dominion and No. 6 A special bringing campers and cottagers back to Winnipeg will leave Kenora Sunday evenings throughout July and August, except for Civic Holiday and Labor Day when the service will be on the Monday.

Dryden High School Conservation Camp Most Successful

The Dryden High School Conservation Camp, sponsored by the Dryden Paper Company Ltd. for the third year, was held on June 4, 5 and 6 on the Dryden timber limits with camp headquarters at Contact Bay.

Thirty-six students, half of them girls and half boys, were royally treated to a three-day round of conservation education, fun and good food.

Instructors for the course included Teachers, Foresters, Wildlife-Managers, Soil Conservationists and Water-Engineers. These included representatives from the Dryden High School teaching staff; Dryden Paper Company Forestry Department; Department of Lands and Forests; Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission; Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Ontario Forestry Association. A representative from the Metropolitan Toronto Conservation Authority was also present to garner some new ideas for the Metro Conservation School.

On daily field tours the students became familiar with basic resource management concepts through objective lessons in natural settings. They were introduced to soils, trees, plants, birds, animals and were shown forest measurement and cruising techniques and how to measure stream flows; they gained an understanding of soil formation processes, hydro electric power production, forest protection and fire fighting procedures, and were given an insight into how our timber resources are converted into dollars and cents through a tour of the Dryden Paper plant.

Throughout the course they were constantly reminded of the inter-relationship and inter-dependencies among our renewable

natural resources of soil, water, forests and wildlife.

In evening sessions, groups of students outlined the various units of information learned throughout each day and their summaries were evaluated and commented upon by the several instructors. The enthusiasm of the students and their ability in summarizing the day's events attested to the success of the undertaking. The last evening in camp saw friends and interested parties at Contact Bay to be entertained by the youngsters and

to witness the students' improvement. Everyone seemed to have an enjoyable time.

The Kenora staff of the Department of Lands and Forests are proud to have played a part in this worthwhile endeavour and hope that this splendid contribution of the Dryden Paper Company to conservation education will stimulate other industrial firms to provide similar opportunities in other parts of the Province.

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Hospital Expansion Business Canvass Now In Progress

At a breakfast meeting, Wednesday morning, under the chairmanship of Mr. A. E. Minor of the Key Gifts and Canvass section of the General Hospital Expansion Campaign, some 40 Captains and Team Members received their final instructions. General Chairman Judge L. A. McLennan outlined the progress which has been made in the Campaign, and the schedule which will be followed, terminating on August 1st. His Honour expressed the appreciation of the Central Executive Committee to Mr. L. A. Toole who, as Chairman of the Development Committee, had brought the organization into this second-base campaign activity.

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Spring Tree Planting Complete

Out of a total of 300,000 trees planted this spring in Kenora District, 137,000 were planted on a large island on Lake of the Woods, reports the local office of the Department of Lands and Forests.

Most of the planting on these islands was carried out on areas recently cut-over, on soil types where past experience has shown that natural regeneration of coniferous trees would not be adequate.

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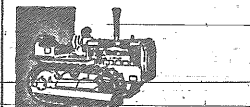

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White and Black Spruce and White and Red Pine were planted. These are species producing high quality raw material for pulpwood and sawlogs. Markets for some of the lower quality trees like Poplar, are limited to a few thousand cords annually as pulpwood.

The natural regeneration that generally appears first on a cut-over area is Poplar.

Purpose of the planting of conifers therefore was to help valuable coniferous species get established so as to compete with Poplar.

On these particular soil types it was towards producing the desired mixture of species that part of the planting effort was directed.

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TO ALL BOAT OWNERS AND OPERATORS ON LAKE OF THE WOODS

At this time of the summer season when numerous gas boats and pleasure craft are operating and company tug boats are towing pulpwood and logs, we respectfully solicit your co-operation in our endeavour to keep the lake clear of floating pulpwood, logs and dead heads. When gas boats run too close to a tow of pulp or logs, the swell has a tendency to wash out some of the pulp and logs, and it is for this reason that we ask you to:

- When passing a tow, either being towed by tugs or in storage, keep at least 100 feet from boom. When it is not possible to do this, if in narrows, slow down till past the tow or boom.
- When following a tow of pulp or logs, watch for any stray logs or pulpwood sticks which may have worked out from rear of tow.

If these precautions are observed by all boat owners, it will keep the lake free from floaters and will help eliminate damage to small craft.
