### Eight Killed In Plane Crash At Trout Lake

A ground party has reached the scene of a plane crash in Northwestern Ontario and reports none of the eight persons aboard survived.

The Transair Limited Norseman crashed and burned last night while on a 60-mile chartered flight to Kasa Bonika from Big Trout Lake, 245 miles north of Red Lake, Ontario.

The name of the pilot is being withheld until relatives are notified. Identity of the seven passengers - six Indians and a Hudson's Bay Company Clerk - is not known.

Transair president Ron D. Turner of Winnipeg says he doesn't know how or if the victims will be brought out but adds that a company plane will fly to the scene today.

The RCAF may drop a parachute squad to aid the removal of bodies.

### Ordination Service At St. Alban's Sunday Morning

The Reverend E. A. Weare of Red Lake, Ontario, and the Rev. Michael Revitt, formerly of Keewatin, Ontario, will be ordained Priest in the Church of God at St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral on Sunday morning at 10.30. The Right Reverend H. E. Hives, Bishop of Keewatin will officiate at the Ordination Service assisted by the Rev. Canon L. M. Watts. The special preacher for the Service will be the Venerable Archdeacon Plumridge of Dryden, Ontario, who will also present the candidates to the Bishop.

Mr. Weare is a former Kenora resident having received his primary and secondary education at Kenora and vicinity and later studied at Emmanuel College, Saskatoon, for the ministry of the Anglican Church.

Mr. Revitt is a native of Oxfordshire, England, and on arrival in Canada was in charge of the Parish of St. James, Keewatin.

After ordination Mr. Weare will be in charge of the Anglican Mission at Red Lake and Ear Falls, while Mr. Revitt will be assigned to the Mission of Gillam, Manitoba.

Following the Service on Sunday morning a reception will be held in St. Alban's Parish Hall so that parishioners and friends may have an opportunity to meet the newly ordained priests. Refreshments will be served.

## Moose Lodge To Hear Private Broadcast, Sunday

Members of the Kenora Moose Lodge will hear the Commencement Exercises for the graduating class of 1959 of Mooseheart High School over a special closed circuit network at the I.O.O.F. hall, Kenora, on Sunday, June 14th at 3:00 p.m. according to Governor Don Thompson.

The local Moose lodge is one of 630 Lodges throughout the United States and Canada which will hear the one-hour broadcast direct from Mooseheart over the largest closed circuit ever set up by the American Telephone and Telegraph Co., and Bell Telephone Co.

The broadcast will be narrated by Robert F. Hurie, a member of the Mooseheart Board of Governors and popular news analyst and vice president of the Mutual Broadcasting System.

Supreme Governor Henry F. Wallenwein will deliver the commencement address and will also distribute academic diplomas and vocational certificates to the 25 boys and 24 girls in this year's graduating class.

Paul P. Schmitz, Director General of the Loyal Order of Moose, will give a speech which will be heard by not only the record-breaking crowd expected to attend the event, but by thousands of members throughout the Moose

domain.  
 The 50 students in the class of 1959 have spent a total of 445 years and two months at Mooseheart. The number of years spent at the Child City ranges from Maxine Moon, who spent only one year and five months, to Richard Mills, who spent 16 years and 11 months.

Six members of the class have been at Mooseheart more than 14 years. Half of the members of the class have been at the Child City for more than nine years. Their average age at graduation is 18 years and four months. Anyone wishing to attend is welcome.

## Aid Indicated For Operators Of Tourist Spots

OTTAWA — Northern Affairs Minister Hamilton today indicated that the Government intends to come to the rescue of tourist operators, making available loans to expand their facilities to meet outside competition.

The minister's statement, before the Commons resources committee, came the day after the Canadian Tourist Association in a brief presented to the committee urged the Government to consider giving financial aid on easy terms.

"Some of us have concluded that advertising is not enough on the national level," said Mr. Hamilton. "We have to go beyond that and assist the industry in developing its plants to handle the tourists."

The minister's statement was welcome news to the tourist operators, who last year saw their business drop off measurably as tourists headed for Europe and to new resort areas of the United States.

Mr. Hamilton said Canada's tourist trade balance with the United States shows a deficit of \$160,000,000. There is no reason why, with Canadian tourists going south in the winter, U.S. tourists cannot come north to Canada in greater numbers to enjoy the cool lakes and mountain areas.

## Compressor Station For Ignace

A \$987,612.00 compressor station will be constructed at Ignace in the near future, Hon. Gordon Churchill, minister of trade and commerce, announced in the House of Commons last week.

Mr. Churchill made the announcement following a question by Hubert Badanal, M.P., Fort William.

Contract for construction of the station has been awarded Canadian Comstock Company, Limited, of Leaside, Ontario.

Two other compressor stations will be constructed in the northwest, one at Geraldton, the other at Parthia.

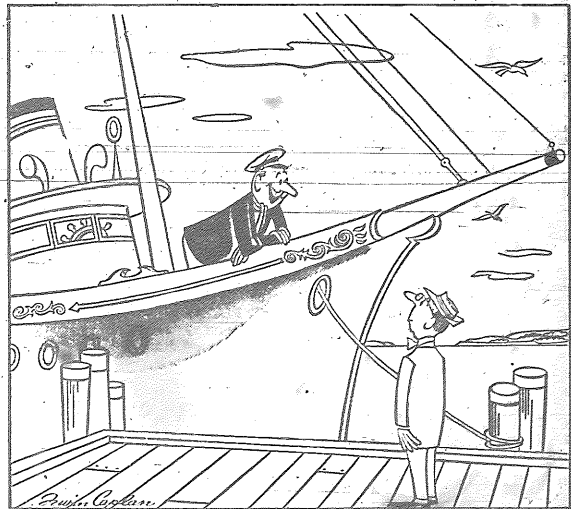

**Money Voted For Indian Hostel At Kenora**

TORONTO — The 83th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada Wednesday authorized the spending of \$35,000 towards cost of a hostel in Kenora as an integration centre for Indians.

"Such a centre is urgently needed in Kenora," said Rev. J. Alan Munro of Toronto, secretary for home missions. "No provision is made in the town for a gathering place for Indians as a place of recreation, apart from the beer parlors."

Dr. Munro said he had already received private gifts totalling \$4,500 and the assembly authorized additional funds as long as other work is not jeopardized.

After a great deal of discussion the assembly referred the matter of an increase in minimum stipend to a joint conference of the board of mission and board of administration.

**WOULD RAISE SALARIES**

It was proposed that all ministers and home missionaries should have their basic salaries raised to \$3,100 annually from \$3,000, beginning Jan. 1, 1960, as a first step toward a new minimum of \$3,300. An amendment to increase salaries by \$200 from Jan. 1, was defeated by a vote of 56-51.

On a motion of Professor John Hughes of Montreal, the general assembly Wednesday night expressed its profound concern at the impact of unemployment on family life and urged all corporations, governments and employers to exert every possible effort to help provide employment for all those who are seeking work.

It was decided to hold the 1960 general assembly in Knox Church, Guelph.

**ZHUKOV TAKES UP FISHING**

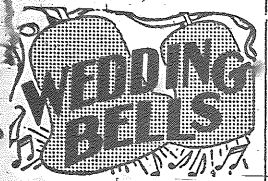

A Message For Our Day

THE KENORA MINISTERIAL ASSOC.

"If you have seen me you have seen the Father," said Jesus Christ. A statement of this nature tells us that we are made in the image of God. Many will argue for, and many against, this statement. But one great thing we have in common is a membership, a unity in the family, the vast family of all peoples with God supreme at the head.

This raises an important question. Are we masters of our own destiny - are we entitled to lead our lives in any fashion that pleases us? Remembering that most times the things that please us are the things that suit our own purpose. Should we not endeavour to obey the command of our Lord, when He said: "Be ye perfect as your Father in heaven is perfect."

This presents a great challenge. With the daily changing face of the world we must necessarily change, or modify our views as the occasion demands. Science is progressing so rapidly that Christian peoples the world over must be forever on their toes to grapple with new features, with new problems, as and when they arise.

Unless there is an advance in moral character, to correspond to the advance in knowledge the results must be bad. To ignore progress is a dangerous thing. To play the ostrich is similar to put-

ting dynamite into the hands of a reckless, ill-natured boy of ten. We need a civilization of people who are able to change with the times. People who can condition themselves to their environment. People who possess flexible mind. Not instability, not changeable minds - which stem from immature wills. But strong competent minds to deal and cope with any emergencies that may arise.

It would be of little use for a man to profess mastery over the land, sea and air - if he cannot control his own household. We have had four centuries of progressive conquest of nature by man. Since the sixteenth century man has gradually been taking control of nature-whether this process will ever be complete, we can only guess. The achievements to date are staggering. Many people wonder over what will come next - are we ready to take the responsibility of each new unveiling of nature's secrets?

Will science make prisoners of mankind? That is for us to decide. In the last century we saw great changes in the thinking of many people - we read of christianity being totally disrupted

with the rise of modern science. Thanks, however, to a handful of clear thinkers the Church was successfully steered through turbulent seas, and stabilized.

Particular truths, applicable only to special individuals, are not suitable as a mental diet for the whole of humanity. To be as perfect, or as mature, as our Father in heaven is mature, we must accept the full responsibility of the gift of free will - we must, after seeking His guidance endeavour and strive to fashion ourselves but to the advantage of the whole of mankind.

In this way we will travel quickly over a lot of hitherto un-

known territory towards the discovery of Thy Kingdom Come. No man has any right to say he is satisfied with my progress to date.
