Boating Accident Claims Lives Of 2 Winnipeg Girls

A boating accident on the Winnipeg River Saturday night claimed the lives of two Winnipeg sisters.

Drowned in the Winnipeg River when the boat in which they were riding capsized was Geraldine Courchaine, 22, and her 19-year-old sister, Victoria.

RCMP said the two were in a party of seven which had started down the river in a 14-foot outboard motorboat.

The motor of the craft failed as they were passing through the Lampro Rapids near Pointe du Bois, 75 miles northeast of Winnipeg. The boat tipped in the swift-flowing water, pitching the seven persons into the river.

One of the party, Robert Chase, helped three of the survivors to shore. The fifth swam ashore himself.

C. H. Clifton, Well Known Resident Died Sunday

Charles Henry Clifton, 832 First Street South, Kenora, well known resident of this community since 1901, died at the Port Arthur General Hospital, Sunday evening, June 14th, following an illness of two months. Born in England, September 2, 1876, he was in his 83rd year.

He came to Canada and farmed at Leamington, Ontario and was employed by T.N.O. Railway, prior to coming to Kenora in 1901. He entered the services of the CPR as a trainman in 1901, was promoted to conductor in 1904 and retired, October 1st, 1943. He was a member of Pequona Lodge A.F. and A.M. No. 414; Royal Arch Masons, Golden Chapter No. 90; and Gold Hill Lodge No. 261, I.O.O.F. He was a member of St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral.

Predeceased by his wife Leah in 1930, he is survived by five sons; Henry, Charles and Frank of Kenora; Kenneth of Fort William and Leonard of Los Angeles; three daughters, Mrs. R. E. (Leah) Reynard of Kenora; Beatrice of Blind River and Mrs. Colin (Margaret) Bulton of Red Rock, Ontario; and one sister, Mrs. Blanche Imeson of Leamington, Ontario.

The remains will arrive in Kenora, Tuesday morning and will rest in the chapel of the Brown Funeral Home until Thursday afternoon, June 18, thence to St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral for service at two o'clock, Rev. S. G. Tomes will officiate and interment will be in the Family plot, Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Death Lurks In Unpasteurized Milk

Many Canadians are under the impression that all milk in this country is pasteurized and therefore free from contamination. As a matter of fact, only Ontario and Saskatchewan have province-wide laws enforcing the pasteurization of milk.

This summer, people will troop into the north, to small towns and to cottages where the nearest milk supply is from a neighbouring farmhouse. In some localities, the sale of unpasteurized milk is legal.

Potential killers and cripples lurk in every glassful of unpasteurized milk - bone tuberculosis, typhoid and undulant fever, bovine tuberculosis, diphtheria, and scarlet fever are some of the

diseases which may be contacted quite effortlessly just by drinking raw milk.

Families going to out-of-the-way places this summer should make sure that all milk consumed is pasteurized, either by insisting on buying pasteurized milk, or by pasteurizing it themselves.

It is easy to pasteurize milk yourself - here are some simple rules the Health League of Canada offers for your summer protection:

Use a double boiler that will hold about twice the amount of milk you wish to pasteurize. Put enough cold water in the bottom pot to touch the top one. Pour the cold raw milk into the pot, and cover it. Bring the water in the bottom pot to a boil and keep it boiling for eight minutes, then cool the milk as rapidly as possible. Bottle milk and place it in a cold place (15 degree Fahrenheit). Remember never to put the newly-pasteurized milk into un-

sterilized bottles, or all your work will have been in vain. When a double boiler is used for home pasteurization, there is no change in the flavour - one of the objections sometimes heard concerning do-it-yourself pasteurization.

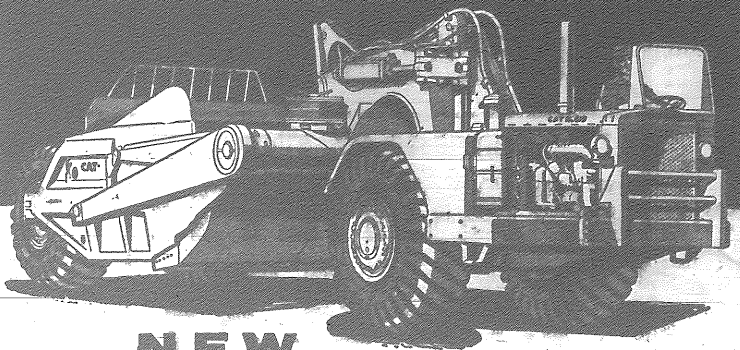

must sit on the curb alone. We can't sit in hotel lobbies or waiting rooms.

"Even when we have money we can only rest in beer parlours and such. Not even money, let alone 'friendship,' will take us into the hotels."

Cites Pressure
At the general assembly, Dr. Munro said a hostel is a must for the Presbyterian Church in Canada. "The local pressure on us is tremendous. We are the church in this area."

Interviewed after the assembly adjourned, Dr. Munro said Kenora favors the hostel and service clubs have offered to help raise money.

The hostel would have 12 beds, showers, writing rooms and lounges.

Dr. Munro said a community hall is being built in Kenora, but he was told Indians will not be allowed in it.

He said there are about 4,000 Indians in the area, earning their living by hunting, fishing, trapping and harvesting wild rice.

Names Released Of Persons Killed In Plane Crash

Transair headquarters in Winnipeg have released the names of the eight persons killed Friday night, when one of the company's Norseman planes crashed and burned in Northwestern Ontario.

Latest to be named by a Company spokesman in Winnipeg were six of the seven passengers who were in the plane when it crashed shortly after taking off from Big Trout Lake on a 60-mile flight east of Kasa Bonika, Ont. There were no survivors.

The six, all Indians from Kasa Bonika, have been identified as Peggy Aggie Meckanak, 15; her sister Genevieve, 18; Mrs. Dina McKay, about 28, and her two infant sons; and two-year-old Susan McKay, believed to have been travelling with Mrs. McKay but no relation.

The other victims were the pilot, Maurice Dubois, 41, of Sioux Lookout, Ont., and Denis John Martin, 23, of West Transcona, Man., a Hudson's Bay Company Clerk stationed at Big Trout Lake, 245 miles north of Red Lake, Ont.

"The wreckage was first spotted by an Ontario Lands and Forests Department plane, apparently soon after the crash. A ground party from Big Trout Lake later reached the scene, and reported no survivors.
