J. N. Fraine Gets CPR Appointment

Montreal, June 14 (AP) — N. R. Crump, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, today named the officers who on July 1 will take charge of the four regions set up in a coast-to-coast reorganization of territorial administration by which the present eight districts are being replaced by regions having direct control over the operating divisions and reporting to system headquarters in Montreal.

J. N. Fraine formerly of Kenora, becomes vice-president and General Manager, Pacific Region, with headquarters at Vancouver. This region now includes Medicine Hat, Lethbridge (excluding Altawan) and Notouke subdivisions, Calgary, Edmonton, Revelstoke, Vancouver, Kootenay and Kettle Valley divisions, Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway, B.C. Lake and River Service and B.C. Coast Steamship service.

G. E. Mayne becomes vice-president and general manager of the Prairie Region with headquarters at Winnipeg. This region includes Fort William terminals, Kenora, Winnipeg terminals, Portage, Brandon, Regina, Saskatoon divisions and the Moose Jaw Division including the Altawan and Notouke subdivisions.

J. R. Strother, presently General Manager of the Eastern region at Toronto, is appointed General Manager of the newly-

established Atlantic Region with headquarters at Montreal. Tabulation of the service vote in the June 11 Ontario election began Wednesday and announcement of results is expected Monday.

Chief Election Officer Roderick Lewis of Toronto said he expects counting of votes cast by Ontario service-men stationed in Canada and the United States will be completed Saturday and the overseas vote by next Monday. He plans no announcement until the counting is finished. Mr. Lewis won't know until the count is complete how many service votes are cast in each riding.

Standing in the 98-seat House on basis of the civilian vote:
Progressive Conservative — 71,
Liberal 22, CCF 5.

The constituency with the narrowest winning margin in civilian voting is Kenora where Liberal Albert Wren, member since 1951, had a four-vote edge over Howard Keffer, Progressive Conservative. Mr. Wren had 6,511 votes, Mr. Keffer 6,507 and W. C. Sherman, CCF, 1,491.

In the 1955 election, 14 service votes were cast in Kenora riding, 10 for Mr. Wren and four for his Conservative opponent.

OFTEN CLOSE
The riding is noted for its close races. Mr. Wren's final margin in 1955 was 128 votes. He won by 133 in 1951. A conservative candidate had a 179 margin and a CCF candidate won by 190 in 1945.

There are four other seats where the winning margin in the June 11 civilian vote was under 300.

Only in one — Ottawa East — was the total service vote in 1955 larger than the June 11 civilian vote winning margin. There Progressive Conservative Jules Morin won re-election with a 233 vote edge over Liberal Paul LeDuc, one-time Ontario mines minister. Of the 246 service votes in Ottawa East, Mr. Morin got 120, his Liberal opponent J13 and the CCF 13.

In the 1955 election, service men cast 4,681 votes. Liberal candidates received 2,244 or 48 per cent; Conservatives 2,159 or 46 per cent; CCF 287, five per cent; others 30, less than one per cent.

Civilian vote percentages in 1955 were PC 48, Liberal 33, CCF 17, other 2.

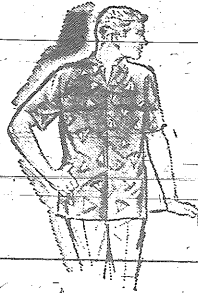

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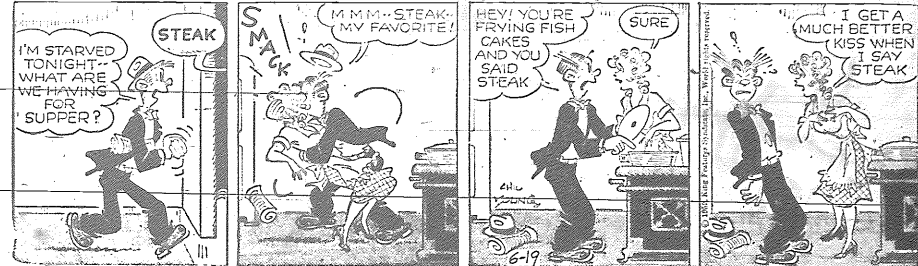

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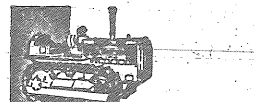
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More Aid For Cancer Research

It is a sad commentary on these times that we must depend largely on voluntary contributions for the support of cancer research, Health Minister Dymond last night told the Canadian Cancer society.

"It is my hope that the Ontario government will continue to support and, if I have anything to do with it, increase its contribution to this great work," Dr. Dymond declared before the grand council of representatives from each of the 10 provincial divisions of the society.

He told the 200 persons present that early treatment is still the key to successful cure of cancer. "All the great strides made in surgery, radiation and other forms of treatment will not help the case that's discovered too late."

He commended the society for "undertaking the welfare of patients and their families, patients who often have exhausted their savings seeking a cure through some form of quackery or another."

Earlier, the society's annual meeting was told by Carl B. French, national president, that a greatly expanded cancer research program planned by the National Cancer Institute will require a great deal more money from the society.

He said more than 17,000 patients in 2,500 communities received help during the past year.

Altogether the society spent

close to \$3,000,000 on cancer control in Canada, \$2,650,000 of which was raised by the 1958 campaign he said.

The development, known as Douglastown, was built by Black Creek Properties, of which Douglas is president. The home-owners pay Douglas \$3.75 monthly for water from his filtration plant. 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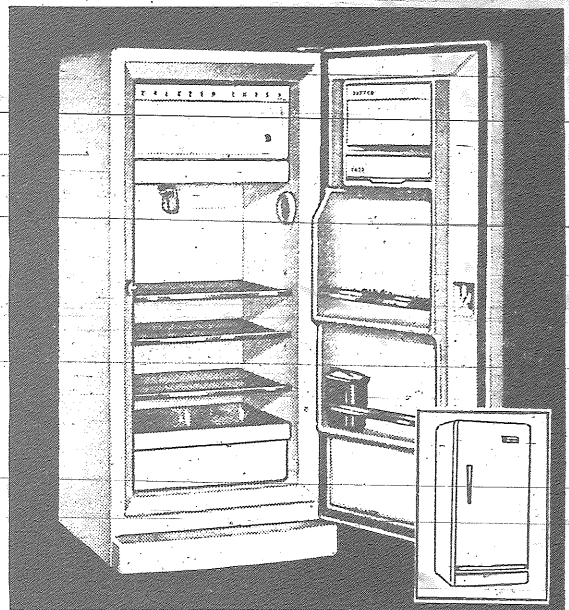

Forestry Officials Meet At Lakehead

Toronto, June 20—Problems pertaining to the development of Ontario's forestry profession are to be fully discussed at Port Arthur on Monday (June 22) when the Executive Council and members of the Ontario Professional Foresters' Association hold an all-day session in the Prince Arthur Hotel.

The morning meeting, attended by the Executive, will hear the views of OPFA officials representing the various provincial sections.

The afternoon session will be devoted to a discussion on public education with an address by Prof. D. V. Love, RPF, University of Toronto, on the question of how to achieve public understanding of the work of the professional forester.

A general meeting will be held during the evening with the main address being given by Dr. J. W. B. Sisam, RPF, Association president and dean of the University of Toronto's faculty of forestry.

He is expected to discuss association objectives, legislation, public relations, professional status and the OPFA's relationship with the Canadian Institute of Forestry. His address will be followed by a question period and discussion from the floor.

The OPFA which was established in 1957 has a membership of nearly 500. It seeks to promote the activities of the forestry profession and make the general public aware of the forester and how his work is related to the management of the forests.

A Good Driver Doesn't Attempt To Beat The Law

Speculative investors and car drivers should have plenty of margin available - far more than seems necessary for immediate requirements. An investor can lose his entire holdings if he does not have the "margin" to carry him over a sharp dip in the market. A driver can lose his life if his margin of control is just not sufficient to meet a sudden emergency.

Few drivers get into accidents merely through lack of skill. Most motorists immediately before a crash, had complete control of their cars in the situations they expected. But they didn't have enough margin to adjust to the unexpected events that led to the collision.

It is largely a question of mathematics, comments the Ontario Safety League. Few people will take much trouble to avoid a thousand-to-one risk that only arises occasionally. But if that 1,000-to-1 risk is one that you accept every day you drive, you

can expect to be in hospital from that risk within three years.

To take one example, if you cruise along a crowded highway at 50 m.p.h., less than 25 feet from the car ahead, you'll probably arrive safely, and may never realize there is any danger. But you are in danger, even though for any reason (and it can and does happen), you will inevitably slam into the rear of

his car. In this respect, the control of your safety has passed out of your own hands. Your margin has decreased, unnecessarily, and you are vulnerable. You can restore your margin to a safe level by keeping 80 feet (five car lengths) from the other 50 m.p.h. car.

The good driver doesn't attempt to beat the law of averages. He gets it on his side.

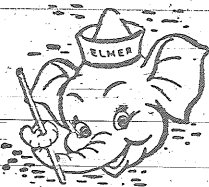

Sees Need For Luxury Resorts

OTTAWA — Canada needs large-scale luxury resorts to attract wealthy United States tourists and to publicize resort areas to Americans with average incomes, the Commons mines committee was told today.

Alan Field, director of the Canadian government travel bureau, said, however, that risk capital for big resorts "is rather reluctant in coming forward in Canada."

The committee today approved the travel bureau's spending program of \$2,319,342 for the 1959-60 fiscal year. This completed the committee's study of the estimates of the northern affairs department and it will now meet in camera to prepare a report to

the Commons.

Mr. Field said large luxury resorts would do more than attract American tourists who can afford to spend \$100 a day. They would give the areas in which they are located a "tremendous amount of publicity" which would attract to Canada Americans with much less than \$100 a day for a holiday.

TO ATTRACT TOURISTS

Lawrence E. Kindt (PC—Macelod) said steps should be taken to create conditions in Canada to attract tourists. This could not be done by establishing a new office across the line.

Douglas Fisher (CCF — Port Arthur) said he believes the federal government should be in the business of attracting tourists. He said Mr. Kindt may not agree with this and may feel that this is a job for private industry.

It is that is what is bothering Mr. Kindt perhaps the committee should meet in camera to discuss the matter, Mr. Fisher said. "I don't think that is bothering the committee as a whole," said Gordon Aiken (PC—Parry Sound, Muskoka).

Weather Affects The Heart

TORONTO — The effects of weather on heart conditions were described to the Canadian Federation of Biological Societies by Dr. G. A. Mayer of Kingston.

Dr. Mayer said he has discovered a direct relation between barometric pressure and the blood's clotting ability, and added that a sudden break in the weather can increase chances of a heart attack.

By using the barometric pressure principle, said Dr. Mayer, it had been possible to cut the death rate for certain heart conditions in Kingston hospitals from 30 per cent seven years ago to seven per cent today.

Heart attacks increase during

periods of unsettled weather in early spring, Dr. Mayer said.

The Kingston doctor said research has proved that the anti-clotting ability of certain drugs has been somewhat impeded by atmospheric conditions.

Dr. Mayer said it is not known what mechanism in the body governs the rate at which the blood clots, although some doctors believe the liver is involved.

"Alcoholics seldom die of heart attacks, though," said Dr. Mayer.

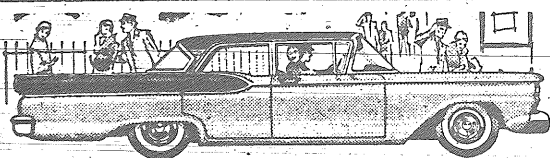

TWO CHINESE FILLED IN FOR ESKIMOS

CALGARY —A Calgary explorer and historian told Tuesday how he slipped two Chinese into an Eskimo exhibit at the Canadian National Exhibition in 1937 and fooled the Toronto public for two weeks.

Philip Godsell, 70, said in an interview he was reminded of the incident by an announcement that the Calgary Stampede would feature an Eskimo exhibit this year.

An authority on Canada's northland and its Eskimos, Mr. Godsell said he was commissioned by the CNE to set up the first real Eskimo village seen outside the Arctic. Subsequently he arranged with the federal government to have some Eskimos sent to Toronto—from Churchill, Man., and went ahead to build plaster igloos and snowdrifts.

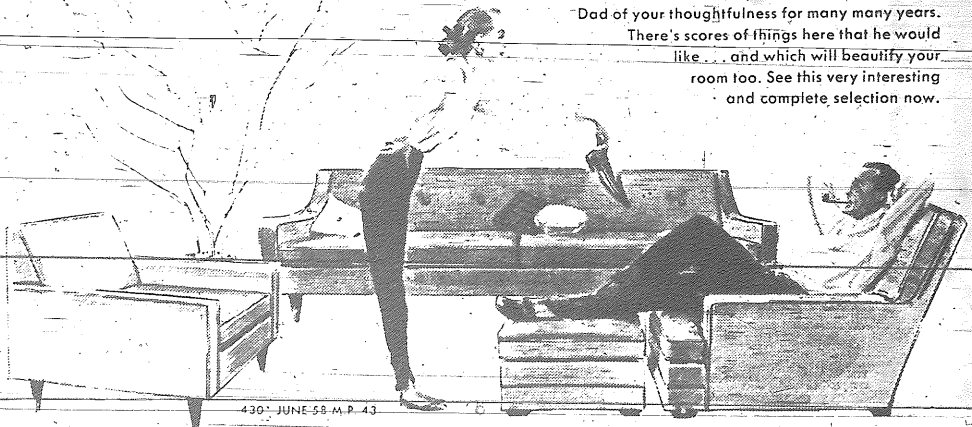
Shortly before the CNE opened the Eskimos sent word that a religious festival prevented them from attending. With plans too far in advance to be called off, Mr. Godsell said he located Fred Wong and Charlie Mah, Canadian-born Chinese living in Toronto's Chinatown who were willing to fill in for the Eskimos.

More problems developed when Toronto reporters asked for a press conference with the Eskimos. This difficulty was overcome when Mr. Godsell arranged with a former RCMP interpreter to ad lib a translation to unintelligible replies the Chinese gave to reporters' questions.

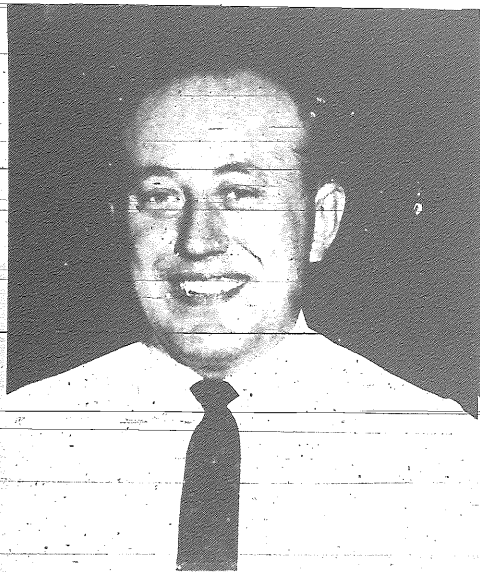

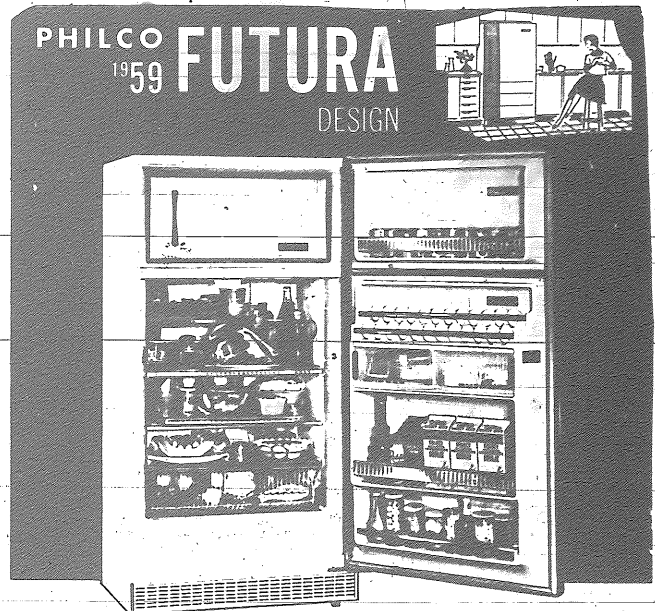

Says High Schools Let Engineers Down In University

TORONTO (CP) — Professor H. G. Conn, dean of the faculty of engineering at Queen's University, Kingston, said Monday that many engineering students failed at Queen's as a result of defective teaching in high school.

"Coaching students to answer a certain kind of question is not sufficient," he said. This was partially responsible for the failure of about 50 per cent of those who enrolled in engineering at Queen's. Prof. Conn spoke at a press conference at the beginning of the annual meeting of the Engineering Institute of Canada. He headed a committee representing 13 Canadian engineering schools which met with the EIC education committee.

NEED BETTER SELECTION
He said "more effective means of selecting students" would have to be devised as the number of applications increased.

Referring to a much-discussed shortage of professional engineers, Dr. Conn said he felt the answer is to train more technicians at a junior level to do the jobs now being done by trained engineers.

(University of Toronto President Dr. Claude T. Bissell announced Monday night that U. of T. will replace its engineering and business course with a course to be known as industrial engineering. He said the new course will meet a growing demand for graduates with specialized knowledge not normally found in conventional engineering branches.)

OPPOSES AMALGAMATION
In his annual report to the engineering institute council, EIC President Dr. K. F. Tupper of Toronto criticized a proposal that

EIC amalgamate with the 11 provincial licensing associations. He said membership in EIC is voluntary. But the amalgamation plan would make every licensed Canadian engineer an automatic member of EIC.

Amalgamation negotiations will

proceed only if a current mail ballot of members shows support.

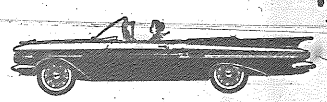
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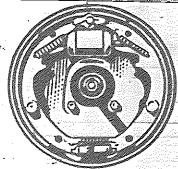
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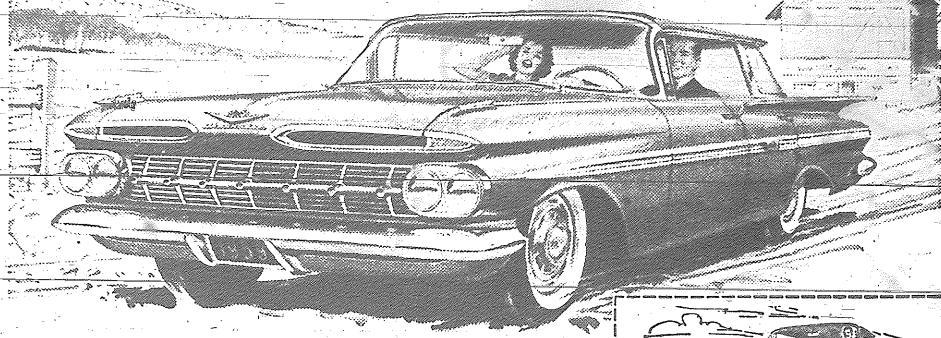
