Dean of St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral

Canon L. M. Watts, First Dean Of St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral Parish

The Reverend Canon L. M. Watts of St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral was collated by the Bishop of Keewatin at the Diocesan Synod held at Fort Frances to be the first Dean of the Cathedral Chapter. This honour was given to Canon Watts as marking the growth of the Diocese over the past several years and establishing by this precedent the formation of a Cathedral Chapter to be an advisory body on the Mission strategy and extension of the Diocese prior to this, the position of Dean of the Pro-Cathedral has been residual in the Bishop's office, indicating that actually no dean was active in the affairs of the Diocese.

Dean Louis Mitchell Watts came to the Pro-Cathedral Church in Kenora to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of the Rev. Canon G. M. Wyatt. The Dean is a graduate of the University of Saskatchewan and of Emmanuel College in Saskatoon. Having come to Canada in 1924 to train for the ministry he served later in the Dioceses of Saskatchewan, Ontario and Edmonton. The new Dean will be installed in the Pro-Cathedral at the morning service

on June 28th by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. H. E. Hives. Also collated to the higher offices in the Church at the same Synod were other diocesan clergy: The Venerable Archdeacon G. W. Plumridge of Dryden who was formerly Archdeacon of Kenora and Rainy River was collated Archdeacon of Keewatin and Canon of St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral. His new title is one which bears significant reference to the whole Diocese of Keewatin. The Reverend L. R. Willis of Churchill was appointed Archdeacon of York, and collated as a Canon of St. Alban's. Other Canons appointed were the Rev. R. S. Boyd of St. Mary's, Sioux Lookout, and the Rev. J. V. Temple, rector of St. John the Baptist Church at Fort Frances.

The clerical members of the Cathedral Chapter other than the Dean will be installed in the Cathedral at dates to be determined when they are present to fulfill their canonical duties in the Pro-Cathedral Church.

Meetings of the Anglican Synod of the Diocese of Keewatin were held at St. John's Church, Fort Frances, Ontario on Wednes-

day and Thursday of this week under the presidency of the Right Reverend H. E. Hives, Bishop of Keewatin.

The business of the Synod was preceded by the Charge given by the Bishop. This Charge is similar to the Speech from the Throne in parliamentary procedure. In his Charge the Bishop referred to the growth of the Church in the Diocese and said: "To acknowledge the contribution of our personnel to this growth I have made the following significant collations, which will issue in the formation of a Cathedral Chapter with specific responsibilities relating to the missionary enterprise of the Diocese in an advisory capacity."

Church Awards Trophy For Next Year's Festival

The Kenora-Keewatin Music Festival Association was very pleased to accept the Janet Carruthers Trophy donated by the Presbyterian Church yesterday afternoon at the closing exercises of the Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School.

The trophy is in memory of the late Janet Carruthers who was a nurse at the Cecilia Jeffrey School and is to be placed in competition next year for Choral Reading of the Scriptures for grades 6 to 8 or equivalent. Mrs. W. Kidd, president of the Festival Association, accepted the trophy from Rev. Marnock of the Presbyterian Church and presented it to Miss Doris Skene to be given to the school for safe keeping.

The Festival committee is very appreciative of the support given by the Presbyterian Church in awarding this shield.

A group of students brought the enjoyable function to a close with Psalm 121 in choral reading and the singing of the 23rd Psalm.

Dividend Declared To Shareholders Of Vacationland

Shareholders of Vacationland Dairies Co-Op Limited had every reason for expressing satisfaction Friday night, following the annual meeting of the Company held in the Legion Hall.

Highlighting the meeting was an announcement by president Bill Kelso that the Company's first dividend would be paid this September. It will be six per cent.

Sharing the spotlight was the presentation of a "Leaders In Industry" plaque by Mr. R. S. Wilson, representative of the Ex-Cell-O Corporation of London to Mr. Kelso. Paying tribute to the wisdom and perseverance of the board of directors who have accomplished so much in the first four years of the Company's existence, Mr. Wilson said that it "was quite a step" four years ago to decide to merchandise exclusively with paper. In so doing, Vacationland was truly a pioneer and coupled with the fine daily management of the plant, assures the Company of a bright future. The speaker noted that while there are well over 100 dairies in Canada using paper cartons only 17 use them exclusively. Vacationland was one of the first of these.

"We are very proud of the presentation of this plaque," said Mr. Kelso in accepting the re-

KENORA-PATRICIA

TUBERCULOSIS ASSOC. ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

The annual meeting of the Kenora-Patricia Tuberculosis Association held Friday in Kenora saw delegates from Red Lake, Balmertown, Sioux Lookout, Dryden and Kenora present. Mr. J. H. Keane of Red Lake, president was in charge of the meeting.

Reports from committee chairmen showed a year of progress throughout the district, especially in rehabilitation work and health education.

Mr. T. A. Saul, district representative and newly elected President of the Ontario Provincial Tuberculosis Association gave an interesting and comprehensive report of the year's work of the provincial body.

A full account of Mr. Saul's report as well as the report of the rehabilitation committee will be published next week in this paper.

Following the annual meeting delegates and representatives from various local organizations sat down to dinner at the Kenora Hotel. Guest speaker was Mr. E. O'Brien, executive director of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association, who came from Toronto for the annual meeting.

Mr. O'Brien paid tribute to the

very excellent work being done by the local association and to the district representative, Mr. Saul. "We in Toronto, think very highly of Mr. Saul," he said, "and with him as provincial president, the second layman to ever be made president, this will be a banner year for Ontario under his leadership."

Mr. O'Brien, who represented Canada at the International Health Conference held last year in India told of the conditions relative to tuberculosis in that country as well as several other countries in Europe and Asia. Living conditions are appalling, he said, and world figures show that thirty million people have tuberculosis and of this number approximately six million will die from the disease. Sanatoria to look after cases are few and far

Judge for District Being Considered

FORT FRANCES

Appointment of a judge for the District of Rainy River is being given every consideration, Justice Minister Fulton has assured W. M. Benidickson, M.P. Following is

their exchange on June 9 in the House of Commons:

Mr. Benidickson: Mr. Chairman, while waiting for the bill to be distributed, I thought I would like to ask a question of the minister; I think he requires no notice of it. He is aware that in Rainy River in Ontario the district court judge was asked repeatedly to serve in a congested court in Toronto. The result was that for almost two

years his services were so much in demand in Toronto that he was not available for the court in Rainy River to which he was appointed. A short time ago the minister saw fit to appoint him formally to the Toronto court, but I would like to point out to the minister that in consequence of this co-operation during the past two years at least the members of the bar are complaining very fre-

quently about the lack of attention to the business of the citizens of Rainy River, I wonder whether or not the minister could inform the committee whether he has some optimism about having somebody in that court in the near future who would give full time service to the duties of the district?

Mr. Fulton: Yes, Mr. Chairman, I can. The hon. gentleman has been kind enough to discuss with me

personally on two or three occasions and I appreciate his interest in the matter. It is, as you know, an area which is not one of the easiest in the provinces, one that presents certain problems in connection with making these appointments, but I expect the problems will be resolved in the near future.
