## HEALTH UNIT REPORT FOR MONTH OF MAY

A definite declining trend in the incidence of Infectious Hepatitis was in evidence during the month. Although twelve new cases were reported in the Kenora area it was possible in almost all of these to trace the direct line of contact.

Work in the Tuberculosis field was to the fore again this month particularly in the Red Lake area where follow-up on the High School survey results was carried on. If ever there were any doubts on our part as to the value of this Annual High School Tuberculin survey as a case finding measure they have been more than adequately dispelled by experience in this area over the past two years.

84 Mantoux tests were performed in Red Lake in May. Adult poliomyelitis clinics have been held in the Red Lake area and in Kenora during May. Total attendance up to the end of May in Red Lake were 456 and in Kenora 558.

A rather high percentage (about 25%) of people attending for the first dose of vaccine failed to turn up for the second when it became due after four weeks. It is worth pointing out that the protective value of a single dose of poliomyelitis vaccine is very low indeed and the full course of two doses a month apart (or thereabouts) followed by a third or booster dose is needed to give maximal protection.

Though the above three dose schedule of poli immunization is regarded as adequate to achieve protection, additional doses are being given to school children and preschoolers as the vaccine is combined with the Diphtheria and Tetanus immunizing material.

Any child who attended Health Unit clinics as an infant starting at 3-4 months of age and then continued on the regular schedule through preschool and school years would receive in all 9 doses of vaccine by the end of grade VIII.

Four more adult clinics will be held in Kenora and three more in Red Lake area during June. This will complete the extraordinary clinics until the end of the year when special clinics will again be held for 3rd doses.

In addition to the special clinics adults have been accepted at all the preschool immunization clinics and this policy will be continued at all clinics.

The volunteer help in Red Lake and in Kenora from the Rebekahs and Oddfellows was invaluable during these clinics and allowed for very smooth and rapid operation.

Temporary alteration of the situation at the St. Mary's Indian School was brought about by the creation of two large cess pits.

These were put in to allow the school to run to the end of term. A permanent solution is to be found by the beginning of the next school year.

## Kenora District Leads In Number Of Moose Killed

Kenora District led the way with reported hunters' success in last fall's moose hunt, according to figures released this week by the Ontario department of lands and forests.

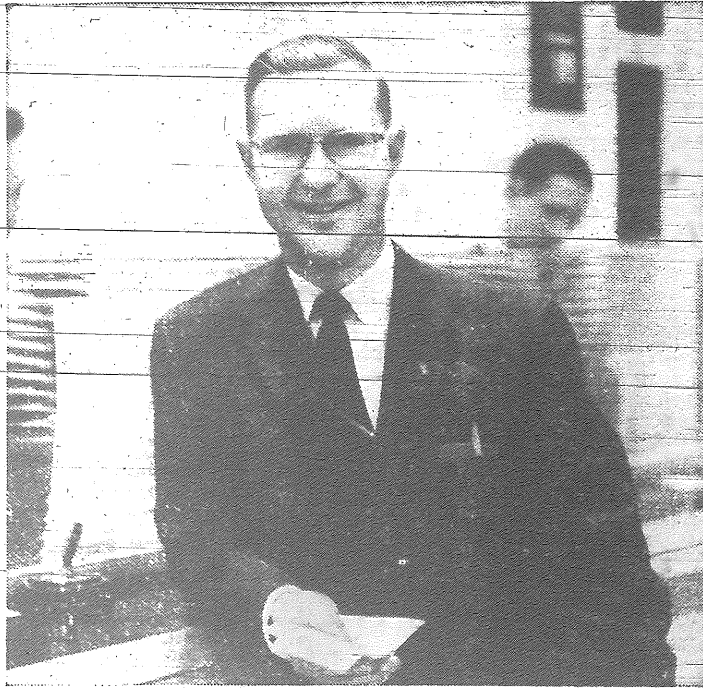
Fifty-four percent of hunters reported success in this area and the average number of moose seen per hunter was 2.3.

Kenora District was also listed as heading non-resident moose hunters' expenditures. The total estimated expenditures by non-residents is given as \$292,225.06. The expenditures for Sioux Lookout District was \$177,745.93, Port Arthur \$96,981.95, and Geraldton, \$51,404.

The following is an account of work in the Sanitation field for the month of May:-  
**Food Control:**

There were 8 routine inspections made of eating establishments in the Kenora area and 12 in the Dryden district. One restaurant in Kenora was given a clean-up order. This received prompt attention.

There were 51 swab tests taken of eating and drinking utensils and all but 2 showed normal counts. No coliform was present in any sample.

A class for food-handlers was held in early May at Kenora, Red Lake and Dryden with 159 restaurant personnel attending. Mr. Hakenson and Mr. Lemoine conducted these classes giving talks on food-borne diseases and showing two films. The classes were well received by the food-handlers.

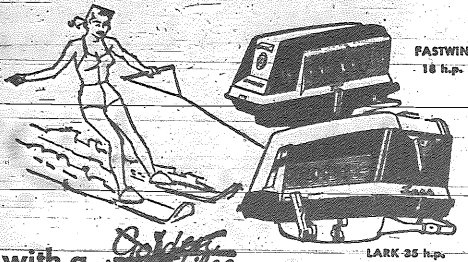

Seven samples were reported as containing B. Coli, the remaining 4 unsatisfactory tests were due to high plate counts. The above results give an average of 84% satisfactory.

Raw milk samples were taken from 113 producers shipping milk to Kenora and Dryden dairies. The results were 96 out of 113 or 85% satisfactory. There were no producers shut-off this month.

Lakeland Dairies will be using bulk haulage next month for all shippers and raw milk sampling will be carried out by the Grader and Department of Agriculture. Sampling of Vacationland Co-Op shippers will be continued from this office.

**Water Supplies:**

There were 50 water samples taken during May with 11 from public supplies, 30 from private supplies and 9 from rural

schools. All samples from municipal supplies were reported as free from contamination. Adverse water reports were received on the Rabbit Lake school on two occasions. The School Board was notified and they had a chlorinator installed on the water system within 48 hours. Subsequent samples have been satisfactory.

A new automatic gaseous type chlorinator is being installed in the Dryden pumphouse. The old chlorinator is to be factory rebuilt and used as a standby. One well in Dryden and one in Keewatin had to be disinfected due to poor laboratory results. The Keewatin well cleared. Sewage Disposal: There were 5 permits issued for septic tank installations in the Dryden area and 8 in the Kenora area.

**Area Subdivisions:** Two proposed subdivisions for summer cottage lots were inspected regarding suitability for sewage disposal and available water supply.

**Cemeteries:** A proposed cemetery site at Far Falls was inspected and approved.

**Complaints:** There were seven complaints received concerning water supplies, nuisances and sewage disposal.

**Interviews:** There were 43 persons interviewed concerning sanitation

matters and problems. General:

# B.C. School Tops For Canada In Math. Contest

A high school at North Bend, B.C. (pop. 351) was top Canadian school in a recent annual international mathematics contest entered by 114,297 students from 4,166 schools throughout the North American continent.

Over-all results in the maths contest, written last March, have just been made available, and were announced today by sponsoring bodies in Canada, the Canadian Association of Actuaries, and the Canadian-Mathematical Congress.

The British Columbia school - North Bend Elementary Senior High - ranked thirteenth in the entire contest, and was second in a region including B.C., Alberta, Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

Second and third places in Canada were won by the University of Toronto Schools, and Ridley College, St. Catharines, respectively. U.T.S. was thirty-fifth overall; Ridley, fifty-fourth.

The three top Canadian students were Judy Koch and Lorraine Moodie of the North Bend B.C. school, and William A. Butler, of the Beamsville, Ontario, District High School. Judy Koch ranked thirty-fourth in the entire contest; Lorraine Moodie, thirty-eighth; and William Butler, forty-fourth.

Only one of the 114,297 students obtained a perfect score of 150. He was David M. Segal, of Brooklyn Technical High School. The first eight students all came from the Metropolitan New York and New Jersey areas.

The maths paper, based on algebra and geometry, contains 50

questions which must be answered in 80 minutes.

Open mainly to pupils in grades 12 and 13, the contest is designed "to bring recognition to students who have demonstrated mathematical ability, as well as

to their schools and teachers," according to a spokesman for the Canadian Association of Actuaries.

"Three years ago," he said, just a handful of Canadian schools and pupils were entering the contest, but since that time

participation has increased very rapidly, particularly in Ontario, where this year 209 schools and 3,200 pupils took part.

"The grades for the Ontario schools were slightly above the average for all of the schools tak-

ing part," he said. "They were generally above the grades for the Upper New York state schools, but below those of the schools in Metropolitan New York and New Jersey areas."

identified with natural gas in-  
stallation and utilization in the  
Company's service area will be  
installing using as their guide,  
this uniform and standard set of  
requirements. This will mean an  
improvement in the effectiveness  
of the already existing regula-  
tions designed to provide our  
customers with the best possible  
efficiencies and the highest stan-  
dard of safe operation".

The codes are divided into two  
manuals; one 34 pages applies to  
equipment up to 400,000 BTU's  
per hour and the other 220 pages  
manual covers large volume  
equipment.

Mr. Bagley pointed out that  
the following checks of each in-  
stallation will help to ensure a  
system wide uniformly safe uti-  
lization of the new fuel.

- (1) All residential equipment  
with maximum inputs up to  
400,000 BTU's must bear the  
CGA's approval seal.
- (2) Larger equipment must  
bear other authoritative inspection  
approvals.
- (3) Installer must have Utili-  
ties approval to install or con-  
vert equipment.
- (4) A pre-installation inspec-  
tion.
- (5) A post-installation inspec-  
tion.
- (6) All installations must com-  
ply with the Ontario Fuel Board  
Codes and Utility codes. Field  
inspections are made by both  
the Fuel Board and Utility In-  
spectors.
