BYLAWS GET ATTENTION AT COUNCIL MEETING

At the regular meeting of the town council held last night, with Alderman Bruce Paterson as acting mayor, two minutes silence was observed in respect to the late Mr. Stan Houghton who had been the council's representative on the District of Kenora Board of Health.

Three bylaws were given attention at the meeting. Third and final reading was given the by-law to stop up a lane allowance on Tunnel Island lying between the Kenora General Hospital Property and Lot 27 in Plan M-18. Second reading was given a by-law to provide for the proposed water works and sewage projects to serve the Norman area, and first reading of a by-law for stopping up the road allowance bordering the Lakefront in the south limits of the Town of Kenora, extending from the production westerly of the North limit of Lot 43A in Plan M185 to the south limit of the Town of Kenora.

The Playfairs Leave For Tour Of Europe

Doctor and Mrs. Peter Playfair, accompanied by Janet and Ross, left Kenora Monday for Montreal where they will embark on the S. S. Ivernia for Southampton. They will spend some time in and around London then cross to the Continent and travel by motor coach through many interesting and historical spots in France, Italy, Belgium, Switzerland and Germany.

Returning to London, they will go by train to Edinburgh where Dr. Playfair will attend the joint Canadian-British Medical Association Convention. They will spend a short time in Scotland following which they will sail from Glasgow for Belfast where their itinerary takes them to Londonderry by car, and to Dublin and intervening points by train.

Crossing the Irish Sea to Liverpool, they will have a Morris Station Wagon waiting and will motor throughout the British Isles, the Isle of Skye, The Trossachs, Aberdeen, Old St. Andrews in Scotland, Cardiff in Wales, around the South Coast of England and back to London. They will revisit the Church in Hershams, Sussex where Dr. and

Mrs. Playfair were married during the Second World War. During their stay in London they have reservations for the now famous "MY FAIR LADY".

They will fly from London for a short tour by KLM Airways to Amsterdam, Woffendam, Island of Marken, Rotterdam, The Hague, in the land of the dikes. They will re-embark on the S. S. Ivernia at Southampton early in September and hope, to be back in Kenora around September 20th.

Pigeons Not Town's Responsibility

Pigeons and the situation created by the dumping of raw sewage into Laurenson's Creek were the problems presented to council by two delegations.

Mr. Harold Ferguson sought council's help in destroying pigeons who were damaging his property. Said Mr. Ferguson, "Now that the town has torn down the old ice house (favorite haunt of the pesky birds) they have all come over to roost at my house and they are creating a real nuisance. Since I can't shoot them, (being in town limits) can council do anything?"

Acting Mayor Paterson told Mr. Ferguson that while it was not the town's responsibility to get rid of pigeons, the matter would be investigated.

Mr. E. L. Carter, headed a delegation of residents from the 500 block on Second Street South who sought alleviation of private sewers and septic tanks discharging raw sewage into the creek. This creates an unhealthy situation, said Mr. Carter and on hot July evenings, the air in our neighbourhood is not very nice. Mr. Carter asked what plans had been made to hook up existing sewers to the town's new trunk interceptor sewer, or said Mr. Carter has this section been entirely forgotten?

Mr. Carter was advised that if at all possible, this problem will get attention, and will be taken up with the consulting engineers and if economically sound, something would be done.

Everett S. Dusang Former Resident Died At Kingston

Word has been received of the passing Monday, of Everett S. Dusang, a former resident of Kenora.

The late Mr. Dusang was born at Fesserton, Ontario, September 2nd, 1895 and was in his 64th year. He came to Kenora with his parents in 1911, being employed with his father the late Albert J. Dusang, at the Rat Portage Lumber Company for a time. Later he worked with McDonald Wholesalers and with the Canadian Pacific Express Company until the time of his enlistment in the First World War. He served overseas and upon discharge returned to Kenora for a time. He went east and took employment with the Dupont Corporation in Buffalo, New York, U.S.A. and later was transferred to a Canadian affiliate Canadian Industries Limited at Shawinigan Falls, Quebec. He subsequently went to Kingston Ontario with his company where he worked

until ill health forced his retirement one year ago.

He was married in Buffalo, New York to the former Vera Fleming. Surviving are his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Jack Holmes and one grandchild all of Kingston; his mother Mrs. A. J. Dusang, Kenora; four brothers Reg. Arnold, Gerald and Clarence all of Kenora, two sisters Mrs. R. D. Hatch and Mrs. P. W. Jones both of Kenora.

Funeral services and interment will take place at Kingston, Ontario.

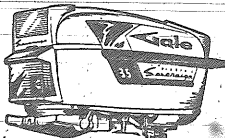

D. B. S. Weekly Highlights

Dominion Bureau of Statistics

Labour:

The number of persons with jobs in May was estimated at 5,852,000, an increase of 183,000 from April and 102,000 more than in May last year. Those without jobs and seeking work were put at 334,000, down 111,000 from April and 36,000 less than a year earlier. Most of the month's gain over April was in farming, construction and transportation.

Transportation:

Railway carloadings in the first June week were up slightly over a year earlier, after dropping off in the last ten days of May. Both urban transit systems and intercity and rural bus lines had fewer passengers in April than a year earlier.

National Accounts:

The gross national product, seasonally adjusted at annual rates, was at a level of \$33.4 billion in the first quarter, which is 2% higher than in the fourth quarter of 1958 and 4% above the level for 1958 as a whole.

Construction:

Value of building permits issued by municipalities during April was 16% higher than for April last year. Largest increases were in Quebec, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Motor Accidents:

Deaths in motor vehicle traffic accidents were down substantially in April to 182 from 224 a year ago, most of the decrease being in Quebec and Ontario.

Mining:

Asbestos shipments to the end of April this year were well above last year at 232,823 tons. Gold output was down 1.3%. Sil-

ver and lead production had marked gains, but lead was down.

Manufacturing:

Steel ingot production in the week ending June 13 was 101,746 tons, or 68.3% of rated capacity. Shipments of washing machines and clothes dryers were substantially greater from January to April this year than last and those of refrigerators smaller. Smaller domestic electrical appliances were generally shipped in larger numbers in April. Factory value of shipments by the chemicals and allied products industries during 1958 were 8% higher than in 1957 reaching a new peak.

As recommended by a Committee of the Whole, to whom the matter was referred, approval was granted of the draft plan of the subdivision dated March 20, 1959 of part of Location 16V, part of parcel No. 18441 registered as Plan M341, covering property owned by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and known as part 2 of the Kenora Land Assembly Project, subject to certain minor changes incorporated in the report of J. A. McCoombs, Town Engineer dated May 21st, 1959; and this council's recommendation that the Park Area shown in the draft plan as Block O be increased in width by 50 feet taking 25 feet from Block M and N respectively (Separate and Public School areas).

PUBLIC WORKS

Council authorized paving of the Chipman Street parking lot at an estimated cost of \$2,000. The Department of Highways advised that they will assume certain landscaping responsibility of the new right-of-way of

the Trans Canada Highway. Pavement repairs are to be carried out on Main and Second Streets at a cost of \$2.00 per running foot. A water main will be carried through the tunnel under the CPR tracks at 16th Ave. North. The Firm of Proctor and Redfern, advised that existing Town sewers would be capable of handling the sewage flow from the St. Mary's Residential School if and when the connection is made. Referred to the public works dept. was a petition from Norman residents

requesting improvements to McQuillan Street to alleviate flooding conditions.

WATER SERVICE

Council granted approval, subject to the approval of the Ontario Water Resources Commission, for the commencement of the preliminary part of certain extensions to existing water mains on Pine Portage Road and charges be \$9.00 per lineal foot for some 300 feet of main these figures excluding customer's branch services costs.

The Town will participate

in the cost of the servicing of the Shegelski property at 517 Eleventh Street North with water and sewer, and as recommended by the Public Utilities Committee, the usual allowance of \$80.00 be assumed by the town with the excavating work being handled by J. Edwards Ltd.

A report of J. A. McCoombs, town engineer stated that it is difficult to estimate the cost of providing sewage and water services to the residence of Wm Miller, 210 Mellick Ave., as

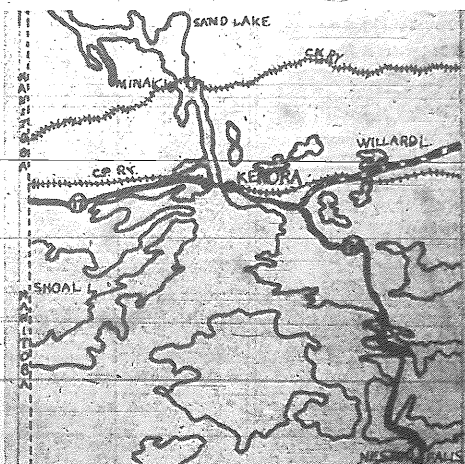

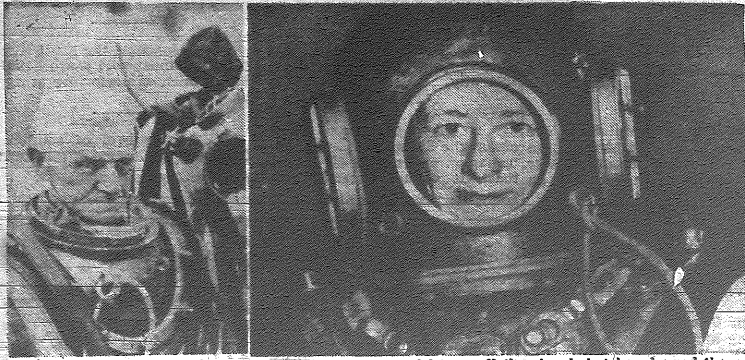

New Traffic Regulations Now in Effect

New traffic regulations, designed to reinforce the safety provisions of the Highway Traffic Act, became effective on Monday, May 25th, the Department of Transport announces.

Motorists must now lower headlights (1) when within 500 feet of an approaching motor vehicle, and (2) when following another vehicle within 200 feet.

It is now an offence to place signs on the windows of a car, and to hang objects in the motor vehicle which obstruct the driver's view.

It is an offence to load a truck or trailer in such a way that any part of the load falls on the highway during transit. Penalty for such an offence has been increased up to a maximum fine of \$200 and, in addition, the licence or permit may be suspended.

Passing on the right is now permitted in cities, towns and villages, including Metropolitan Toronto, but only: (1) when overtaking a motor vehicle making or signalling a left-hand turn; (2) on streets having two or more lanes in each direction; and (3) on one-way streets.

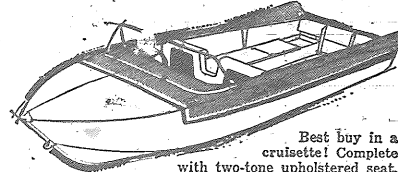

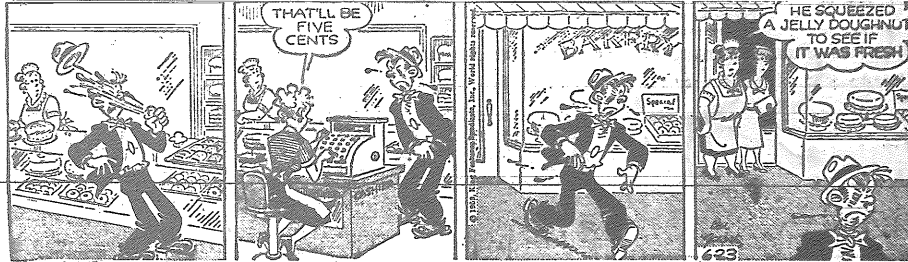

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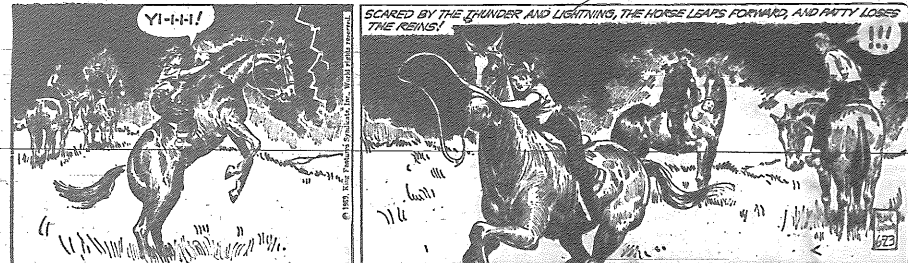

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DIocese of Keewatin Held Synod Meetings at Fort Frances

Bishop H. E. Hives of Kenora described a busy year for the Anglican Diocese of Keewatin when he addressed 35 clergymen from throughout the vast area attending their annual synod in Fort Frances held last week.

The synod was the first ever held in Fort Frances. Rev. J. W. Temple of St. John the Baptist church was the host pastor.

There were 385 church members confirmed, four deacons and four priests ordained, one church consecrated and another dedicated during the past year. Building programs were begun at Big Beaver House, Round Lake and Big Trout Lake, all outposts in the diocese that stretched from the international boundary into the northern reaches of Hudson's Bay.

Bishop Hives also announced several appointments.

In his charge, Bishop Hives asked that the clergy of Indian missions continue to emphasize Christian stewardship and evangelism. He warned of the danger of erring in over-paternalism, assistance and direction in Indian

missions. There is a need to teach obligations, duties and privileges that go hand-in-hand with church membership and, indeed, with Canadian citizenship.

The synod was reminded of the necessity of regular visiting of the homes, by both clergy and vestrymen of the church, if the church is to grow and expand.

Speaking for church union, the bishop stated: "Other nations are not the exclusive regions where racial tensions mar the face of God's creation. The same tensions exist here in Canada and while thinly veiled under a cloak of respectability can be discovered even within the orders of this diocese."

"There is a need to unite in a common purpose to find the solution for Society's ills."

Church unity and prayer book revision were subjects to be discussed by regional conferences of clergy and lay memberships.

The charge of the synod was concluded with the statement: "We must have our impetus and our course controlled by the purpose of Him who guides our des-

Ontario Hydro Welcomes Nuclear Announcement

The announcement made in the Federal House last week, was recognized as being a major step forward in Canada's nuclear power program by W. Ross Strike, Ontario Hydro's First Vice-Chairman. In Ottawa, the Minister of Trade and Commerce stated that Atomic Energy of Canada Limited will begin immediately the final design and construction planning for a large-scale nuclear electric station, estimated to cost \$60 million, at a site to be determined.

The decision to proceed follows an agreement between Ontario Hydro and AECL. It will ensure that full-scale work will be pressed forward on a plant of some 200,000 kilowatts with the object of having it in service in 1964 or early 1965.

When in operation, the station will be staffed by Ontario Hydro, which will purchase the power generated. After it has been established that the station can be suitably operated as part of the Hydro system, the Commission will purchase the plant.

Of prime importance, stated Mr. Strike at a Toronto press conference, is the fact that the basis on which the plant will be purchased will permit production of power at a cost competitive with that produced by modern coal-fired plants of similar size. Ontario Hydro will thus fulfill its obligation to provide power at the lowest possible cost, he said, and at the same time will have contributed to nuclear pioneering work in Canada.

Apart from providing a further market for Ontario uranium, the decision will also decrease the Commission's dependence on fuel brought in from elsewhere.

The new project, to be known as CANDU (for Canadian deuterium uranium), will employ natural uranium as a fuel and will be cooled and moderated by heavy water. Operating principles will be similar to the 20,000-kilowatt Nuclear Power Demonstration plant under construction on the banks of the Ottawa river, some 150 miles from the Capital City. Ontario Hydro will provide the new site and place at the disposal of AECL the services of its engineering and construction organization.

Ontario Hydro has been closely associated with AECL on an increasing scale since 1954, when preliminary design of the NPD plant was first undertaken. This station will be operating in 1961. Last year, a nuclear power plant division of the Crown agency was established in Toronto and the Commission assigned to this group a number of engineers and certain facilities. Prime responsibility of this division has been to undertake the preliminary design and development work for the CANDU project.

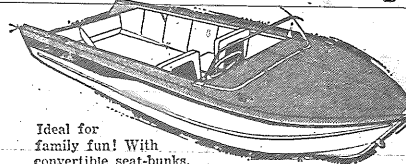

Ontario Hydro Welcomes Nuclear Announcement

The announcement made in the Federal House last week, was recognized as being a major step forward in Canada's nuclear power program by W. Ross Strike, Ontario Hydro's First Vice-Chairman. In Ottawa, the Minister of Trade and Commerce stated that Atomic Energy of Canada Limited will begin immediately the final design and construction planning for a large-scale nuclear-electric station, estimated to cost \$60 million, at a site to be determined.

The decision to proceed follows an agreement between Ontario Hydro and AECL. It will ensure that full-scale work will be pressed forward on a plant of some 200,000 kilowatts with the object of having it in service in 1964 or early 1965.

When in operation, the station will be staffed by Ontario Hydro, which will purchase the power generated. After it has been established that the station can be suitably operated as part of the Hydro system, the Commission will purchase the plant.

Of prime importance, stated Mr. Strike at a Toronto press conference, is the fact that the basis on which the plant will be purchased will permit production of power at a cost competitive with that produced by modern coal-fired plants of similar size. Ontario Hydro will thus fulfill its obligation to provide power at the lowest possible cost, he said; and at the same time will have contributed to nuclear pioneering work in Canada.

Apart from providing a further market for Ontario uranium, the decision will also decrease the Commission's dependence on fuel brought in from elsewhere.

The new project, to be known as CANDU (for Canadian deuterium uranium), will employ natural uranium as a fuel and will be cooled and moderated by heavy water. Operating principles will be similar to the 20,000-kilowatt Nuclear Power Demonstration plant under construction on the banks of the Ottawa river, some 150 miles from the Capital City. Ontario Hydro will provide the new site and place at the disposal of AECL the services of its engineering and construction organization.

Ontario Hydro has been closely associated with AECL on an increasing scale since 1954, when preliminary design of the NPD plant was first undertaken. This station will be operating in 1961. Last year, a nuclear power plant division of the Crown agency was established in Toronto and the Commission assigned to this group a number of engineers and certain facilities. Prime responsibility of this division has been to undertake the preliminary design and development work for the CANDU project.

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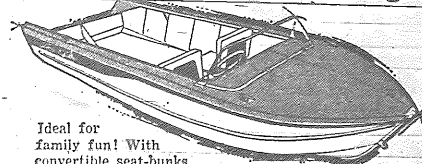
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
