KENORA BOARD AGREES TO

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The month of June is the busiest in the school calendar and the Public School Board was made aware of this fact when it dealt with one of its lengthiest agendas at its regular meeting on Monday night.

Some time ago, it was stated the Kenora-Kewatin Ministerial Association offered to give religious instruction in the schools. This offer was referred to the Principals who have agreed to accept it. The Board therefore approved in principle an arrangement for religious education in the schools but decided to leave the actual programme in the hands of the Principals and the Ministerial Association.

It was reported that enquiries have been received from parents who are Separate School Supporters with regard to enrolling their children in Public Schools, Kindergarten classes, as the kindergarten class has apparently been temporarily discontinued at Mount Carmel School. The Board agreed that the Principals would

have to decide if they had room for these children. If room is available, the parents would be asked to change their tax support or failing this to pay a tuition fee of \$15.00 per month.

Since delays have occurred in the building of the West Ward addition and it will not be ready until some time in 1960, and as the Principals and the West Ward Home and School Association have recommended the establishment of a third classroom for Grades 5, 6 and 7 in Norman in temporary accommodation, it was agreed to rent the Norman Community Club building for \$125.00 per month until such time as the School Addition is complete.

It was reported that a delightful dinner party had been held for retiring South Ward School Principal, Miss Jessie Francis, on June 12th, at Shelton's Canadian Camps. Guests included Mr. McBurney, Public School Inspector; the Principals and members of the Board. Miss Francis was presented with a set of luggage by the Board.

The resignations of Miss Janet Baueh and Miss Mary Hamilton from the teaching staff were accepted with regret and the appointment of Mrs. Joan W. Maccoch confirmed. It was also agreed to offer Permanent Contracts to the following teachers: Marilyn Anderson, Mrs. Dorothy

Twenty-four heavy duty Westinghouse automatic washing machines have been installed and six giant sized gas dryers. Adding to convenience and time saving is the fact that laundry may be washed in three machines, one with white clothes, one with coloured clothes and another for extra dirty clothes and then one dryer will take the three loads. Another novel feature of the Laundromat is that it will be open twenty-four hours a day for seven days a week, including holidays.

Those using the Laundromat will also be able to buy soft drinks, candy etc. from the coin machines, while waiting for their laundry.

Harold and Carl Haybert, owners of the new shop are to be congratulated on this fine addition to Kenora.

Free demonstrations will be the order of the day Friday and Saturday.

Customers are assured of ample supplies of hot water since three giant hot water tanks have been installed at the rear of the building. A water softener tank has also been put in to ensure the utmost in efficiency in washing.

WREN WINS ELECTION BY 34 MAJORITY

Albert Wren, Liberal Labour candidate has been elected to his third term in the Ontario Legislature. Figures released today by Returning Officer J. O'Flaherty, give Wren a majority of 34 over Progressive Conservative Howard Keffer.

PRESBYTERIAN CONFERENCE SETS UP INDIAN - ESKIMO ASSOCIATION

The Indian-Eskimo Association of Canada has been set up as an independent body of voluntary agencies and individuals concerned with the total well-being of Canadians of Indian and Eskimo background. John Melling of Toronto told a conference of Indian workers meeting at the Cecilia Jeffrey School at Kenora under the auspices of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mr. Melling is the director of the National Commission on the Canadian Indian which resolved last week to change its name to The Indian-Eskimo Association of Canada. It is comprised of representatives of welfare groups, local and national churches, movements like the Boy Scout organization, the Canadian Labour Congress, the Indian Organization of Alberta, and the like.

Its general aim is to work towards the full participation of Indians and Eskimos in Canadian life, and to promote mutual understanding between them and other Canadians.

Four provinces, from Ontario to Alberta, are represented at the Kenora conference by the sixty people participating in the Presbyterian conference, and their membership is comprised of missionaries, teachers and leaders, including Indian men and women. There are three Indian chiefs participating in the discussion, which concerns the future policy and purpose of Presbyterian educational and church work among the Indian peoples.

Speakers today included Rev. Dr. J. Alan Munro of Toronto, secretary for home missions, Miss Freda Matthews of Toronto, director of national missions for the Women's Missionary Society, Mr. S. T. Robinson, principal of Cecilia Jeffrey Indian residential school maintained by the Presbyterian Church at Kenora, and the Rev. Walter Donovan, missionary to the Indians in the Lake of the Woods area.

continuing residential schools came up in informal discussion today, when it was pointed out that in the higher grades Indian children are encouraged to attend the local schools together with non-Indians, even where they come from a distance and have to live in residence.

"I would like to see residential schools continued said Samuel J. Dreyer of the Saskatchewan, reserve in Saskatchewan, "if we teach in both white and Indian schools that we are all equal in the sight of God then it won't be hard to mix and meet."

Integration means making entire or forming into a whole, and it implies integrity, which is defined as uprightness in mutual dealings, the Rev. John Marnock of First Presbyterian Church told the conference on Indian work here last night. It is integration in this sense, and not assimilation, that is being discussed by those interested in the Indian Canadian, the speaker said.

Because of improved health and living conditions including control of tuberculosis, Indians are the fastest growing ethnic group in Canada. Mr. Marnock pointed out. This means that mixing will become inevitable. It is the

OLD PARROT GETS BRANDY FOR LIFETIME

VICTORIA — Louis, the gar-
gantuan, 101 year old brandy drink-
ing parrot who lives on Court-
ney Street, is in no danger from
demolition of part of the prop-
erty on which his house stands.
Louis may have been disturbed by
the noise of drills, hammers
and bulldozers nearby, but he will
be allowed to live out his days in
peace.

Part of the property is being
torn down to make way for a
parking lot, but the bird house,
in which Louis lives with his
Chinese servant, Wah Wong, can
not be touched.

The property consisting of
five choice lots formerly belonged
to Miss Victoria Wilson, a bird
lover, who died in 1949.

In her will, Miss Wilson pro-
vided that Louis' home must not
be altered or torn down as long
as he lives. She also willed that
Louis must receive a daily ration
of his favorite brandy, with Wah
Wong as bartender.

THE CHICKWEEDS

As if one were not enough, two
kinds of chickweed thrive in Ont-
ario. Common Chickweed, some-
times called just plain chickweed,
is a hardy annual which has the
power to reproduce both by seeds
and by rooting at the points of its
stems. Mouse-Ear Chickweed is a
perennial which runs neck and
neck with Common Chickweed as
the home gardener's number-one
problem. Both chickweeds are
commonly found growing together
in lawns and both succumb to the
same control methods reports the
Field Crops Branch, Ontario De-
partment of agriculture.

Common Chickweed is a low-
lying, matted plant, with small,
star-like flowers appearing from
early spring to late fall. The
leaves are opposite, smooth and
oval-shaped with fairly long
stalks.

Mouse-Ear Chickweed is simi-
lar to Common Chickweed, but
easily distinguished from it. The
plants are covered with downy
hairs which collect dust, giving
them a dirty appearance.

Mix 1 ounce of 2,4-D amine and
4 ounces of Potassium Cyanate
in 4 gallons of water. Spray to
dampen the lawn but keep the
spray off all shrubbery.

Apply on a calm day in spring
or fall, when weeds are growing
rapidly. This treatment will
brown the grass but it will soon
recover. A word of warning: Do
not use 2,4-D on bent grass
lawns.

A newer chemical called Kuron
also will control chickweeds. It
should be applied at the rate of
1 1/2 pounds in 30 gallons of water
per acre or 1 ounce in 5 gallons
of water per 2,300 square feet.
This chemical should be used in
late October or March.

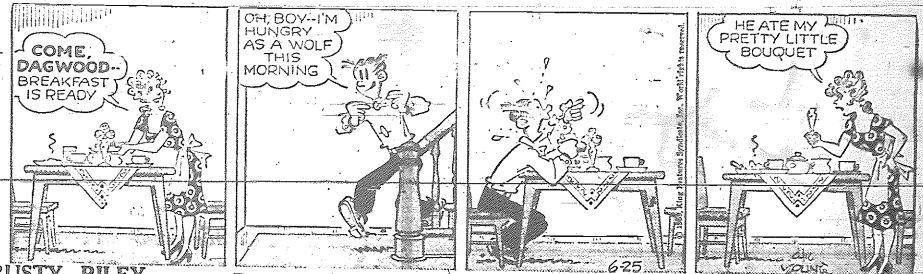

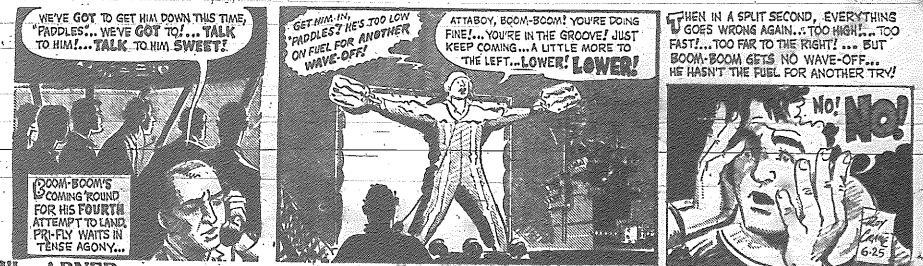

Liquor Referendum Vote In December For Fort Frances

FORT FRANCES — A liquor referendum issue was scheduled for the annual election in December by the Fort Frances town council Monday night.

At the request of the Chamber of Commerce, municipal voters will be asked their wishes on opening of two new types of liquor outlets.

Public Sanction is needed to establish liquor sales in "dining lounges," that is hotels and restaurants, and other lounges such as cocktail bars. A similar referendum will be held at Port Arthur, the council was informed.

Two other Chamber proposals also gained council's clearance. The meeting approved the plans of North Central Airlines to institute passenger plane service between Duluth, Fort William, and Winnipeg and council will notify the Canadian Board of Transport to this effect. Chamber President H. A. L. Tibbets, who was present, said his organization also is supporting North Central's plans.

W. C. Noden, MPP, urged council to seek renaming of Ontario Highway 71 west of Fort Frances to make it No. 11 which would also be applied to the Atikokan highway and put the district on a trans continental highway from the east. The council as well as the Chamber earlier, considered the idea as good promotion to put the district "on the map."

Mayor J. P. Livingstone and council members decided to ask for a joint meeting with the board of education before approving expenditure of \$405,000 for a new, 11-room addition to the high school. The school board is attempting to have the extension constructed before cold weather.

Off the Cuff by Rick Hunt

MAN WHO BEAT GAUDAUR IN 1901 FOR WORLD SCULLING CHAMPIONSHIP STILL LIVES IN AUSTRALIA

While the column and I were off the beat for two months, our "Ottawa correspondent" Danny Kitt sent us a very interesting letter . . . Danny, who is with the Civil Service, works with a chap from Australia and it so happened that they brought up the topic of rowing during one of their coffee breaks . . . The Aussie was surprised to learn that the 10,000 people of Kenora had a rowing club of some merit and was astonished that Danny Kitt knew about George Towns of Australia, their grand old man of rowing . . . Kitt went on to explain about the famous

Gaudaur - Towns race in 1901, which was held in Rat Portage, and on our tourist mecca, the Lake of the Woods . . . A few days later the Australian handed Danny a copy of his hometown newspaper, "Daily Telegraph", and there was a complete page devoted to the famous rower, George Towns, who had just celebrated his 90th birthday . . . This was on February 19 of this year . . . We imagine that there are still a number of local citizens who remember that very famous race on the Lake of the Woods when the Australian, (an underdog at the time) defeated Canada's and Rat Portage's Jake Gaudaur for the Sculling Championship of the world . . . George Towns still remembers the race and here is part of the story from this recent copy of the Daily Telegraph . . . "Gaudaur was expected to defend his Sportsman's Cup on the Thames. The holder of the cup was regarded as champion of England and Towns was determined to be one of Gaudaur's opponents. But when Towns reached England he learned that Gaudaur had decided to forfeit his English title and remain home in Rat Portage on the shore of the Lake of the Woods in the heart of Canada. Towns went on to win the English title but the elusive Gaudaur would not give him a match. Finally a Canadian newspaper representative fixed the match for a \$200 stake, which noted sculler Tom Sullivan, then Towns' manager, provided.

"Towns still had to get to the Lake of the Woods, as Gaudaur insisted that the race take place on his home waters. Towns and his manager made the long journey by boat, ship and train, and finally turned up at Rat Portage. After four years of determined battling, Towns was in sight of his goal. But the locals laughed when they saw this 5 ft. 8 in. challenger, who weighed 10 stone, 10 lb. (note a stone is equal to 14 lbs.) and compared him with their local champion, who was 6 ft. 2 in. and weighed 14 stone. "Then just before the race Towns fell ill, went to bed, and lost weight. But he wouldn't call the match off . . ."

The Daily Telegraph interviewed George Towns on his 90th birthday and here is what he said about the 1901 championship race on the Lake of the Woods.

"I led from the start. The race was three miles, and towards the end I eased up. I didn't want

to show the poor chap up too much before his home towners. I contented myself with winning by four lengths."

After winning his race Towns returned to Australia where he lost his title in 1905 to Jim Stanbury but regained it in 1906. In 1908 Towns returned to England to contest the English championship again, but Ernest Barry beat him in record time. That was George's last big race.

Today Towns lives in Gladsville, Australia and helps his two sons build the odd rowing shell . . . He still sits on his verandah and watches rowers train on the river that runs past his house . . .

He contents himself daily with a glass of beer in company with a few of his friends . . . It should be noted that 75% of all the racing shells used in Australia are made in the Towns' boatshed and they supply boats for New Zealand, Canada and other countries . . .

It is certainly a great milestone in Kenora's sport of rowing that at one time a world championship sculling race was held on the Lake of the Woods, and that it is still remembered in the highest of rowing circles through-

out the world. It is also very pleasing to know that one of the men that made it famous through his determination, George Towns is still alive today and still re-
