Mill Closing Will Raise Lake Level

The Water Resources office today indicated that the level of the Lake of the Woods will climb next week, due to the closing of the Norman Dam. The power-house will not be required, as Mando operations close down.

The overnight rainfall was .05 of an inch and the Lake level this morning stood at 1058.63 feet. The outflow today is 7,600 cu. ft. per sec. and the week's average will be 6,000 cu. ft. per sec.

Sioux Lookout Okays Integration In Public Schools

Integration of Indian children in public schools at Sioux Lookout was approved by a 90.7 per cent majority by residents of the community last week. A total of 547 persons voted in favour of integration and 56 against.

The Sioux Lookout Public School Board proposes to admit some 60 to 70 Indian boys and girls in grades ranging from three to six inclusively. For instruction in grades seven and eight and also high school, the Indian children will attend classes in Sault Ste. Marie.

Two additional class rooms will be added to Sioux Lookout's new public school to accommodate the Indian children. The Indian Affairs Branch will pay the entire cost of the necessary addition, as well as contributing yearly to the cost of operating the new school on the basis of the average daily attendance.

Magistrate's Court

Evidence was heard Friday afternoon at court when a Kenora youth was charged with careless driving and a further charge of giving false evidence concerning another automobile accident; he was in. He was found guilty on the false evidence charge and will be sentenced on July 2nd. He was remanded on careless driving charge.

Two men from Red Lake and two men of no fixed abode, charged with stealing a car were

found guilty. The Red Lake men were sentenced to 6 months definite, three months indefinite in an Ontario reformatory while the other two were given two year suspended sentences.

A Pellatt man found guilty of breaking and entering and assault received a term of nine months definite and six months indefinite in an Ontario reformatory.

Mrs. E. M. Edwards Former Resident Died In Winnipeg

Mrs. Edith Maude Edwards, former well known resident, died at Curran's Nursing Home, Winnipeg, Friday, June 26, following a lengthy illness. She was in her 84th year.

Predeceased by her husband Wilfred Henry Edwards, September 12th, 1946, she is survived by one daughter Mrs. William Margaret Sutton of Winnipeg, two grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

The remains will be forwarded from Winnipeg and there will be a graveside service at two o'clock, Monday, June 29th. Canon L. M. Watts will officiate and interment will be in the family plot, Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Re-Count Of Votes To Take Place Early In July

The re-election of Albert Wren, Liberal-Labour member in the Provincial House, remains in doubt today. Yesterday an official application for a recount was made to Judge L. A. McLennan. The official counting of the ballots possibly may take place on July 6th.

Mr. Wren received a 4 vote majority when all unofficial polls reported three days after the election. The Service vote boosted his margin to 13 votes and Thursday, when the official counting of the deputy returning officers' sheets took place, Mr. Wren's majority was increased to 34 votes.

Queen To Attend Church Sunday In Kingston

Her Majesty The Queen and His Royal Highness Prince Philip will attend an Evening Service at St. Denham Street United Church on Sunday, June 28th. It was confirmed today when the detailed programme of the Kingston visit was made public.

The Royal Party will arrive by barge from H.M.Y. Britannia at the Public Utilities Docks at 4.30 p.m. and re-embark from the Royal Military College Jetty at 7.00 p.m.

In addition to attending the Church Service, Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will stop at Richardson Stadium and at Fort Henry where they will witness a short drill display by the "Fort Henry Guard".

RAINY LAKE CAUSEWAY TO BE LARGEST STRUCTURE IN COMMONWEALTH

Three separate structures, joined by two man-made islands, will span Rainy Lake near the CNR tracks by the end of 1961. This 1,500 foot long prestressed precast concrete causeway is believed to be the largest structure of its kind in the Commonwealth. It will form part of the new Ontario Department of Highways link between Atikokan and Port Frances.

Approaches to the causeway have now been completed and general contracts for construction of the first phase of the project - the eastern sections of the causeway and the extension of two existing islands onto the course of the crossing - have been called.

The eastern sections which are expected to be completed by the end of next year, are both low level crossings. The western section, however, will provide 36 feet of clearance above the water level for navigational purposes. This section will stretch over 2,014 feet, and will be completed by the end of 1961.

The causeway has been designed by Foundation of Canada Engineering Corporation Ltd. (Fenco) and construction will be under the supervision of H. W. H. Casper, Fenco's Chief Field Engineer, and Per Andersen, Resident Engineer.

The Causeway will require 168 prestressed precast concrete girders, 65 feet long; eight prestressed precast concrete girders, 81 feet long and 80 prestressed precast concrete boxes for pier caps. In addition, the general contractors will cast, in place, two prestressed spans of eight 150 feet long girders.

The precast prestressed units are being made at Fort Frances by C. A. Pitts. J. T. Gregg, P. Eng., who supervised the design of the causeway for Fenco, says that, altogether, the structure will require some 5,500 cubic yards of prestressed precast concrete with an additional 18,000 cubic yards poured at the site for deck, slab piles, etc.

ONE-LEGGED ROBINS COMMON IN REGINA

Regina — Residents here have been told not to worry if they see one-legged robins bobbin' about the back garden.

Fourteen of the one-legged birds have been released by the Western Humane Society this

year after having a leg amputated. Society inspector Jack Studholme, says robins have a habit of picking up bits of string for their nests.

Some birds become entangled and occasionally break a leg. Mrs. Studholme says only three of the operations this year have failed.

DENIES COFFEE IS ANSWER

Rockland, Me. — An authority on alcoholic studies says pouring black coffee into an intoxicated person or making him jog around the block won't sober him up.

"All that happens is that you have a wide awake drunk on your hands instead of a sleepy one," said Dr. Leon A. Greenberg, director of the Yale centre of alcoholic studies.

He spoke at a meeting of the Maine Medical Association.

Police Fear For Safety Of Missing Keewatin Resident

Fears for the safety of Walter Ivanovich, age 65, of Keewatin are mounting, followed the discovery earlier Friday morning of his boat found drifting near Dodd's Camp, Keewatin Beach.

Chief Jack Beckworth of the Keewatin Police gave this account of the missing man: Mr. Ivanovich was last seen about 10 p.m. Thursday in Kenora. Apparently he was headed for home in his boat which is powered by a 5 h.p. motor. He resides at Olson's Cabins, which is located about 100 yards west of Keewatin Beach, a trip of possibly three miles. He was alone.

About 7.30 a.m. Friday, two men, working at Dodd's Camp, a half-mile west of Olson's Cabins, saw a drifting boat, which they brought to shore. In due course the boat's ownership was determined, and a search instituted. To date it has been unsuccessful.

In addition to his wife, Mr. Ivanovich has two daughters, ages 10 and 12 years.

Maskinonge Fry Being Planted In 'Muskie' Waters

Toronto—Five million maskinonge fry and 60,000 fingerlings reared at the Deer Lake Hatchery of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests in the Lindsay District, are being planted in "muskie" waters in the province this year. In the North Bay District, for example, 150,000 fry were planted during the last week in May in suitable waters, and Nipissing, Nonsbong and other inland lakes are being stocked.

Deer Lake is the only hatchery in the province which raises muskies. They're shipped by truck or rail to districts requisitioning them, then transported by Department vehicles to restocking areas where they are planted under supervision of officers of the Department's Fish and Wildlife Division.

The maskinonge fishing season opened in the north on June 20. Limit of catch (angings) is two in one day, not less than 28 inches in length.

Experience has shown that the most successful method of planting young muskies is by using a motor-powered skiff driven at

slow speed along the shoreline of protected weedy bays. Containers are then emptied over the side of the boat in from two to six feet of water for some distance, giving wide distribution and reducing predation.

Muskie fry being planted are 3 1/2 inches in length and will reach up to 14 inches under favourable conditions by this time next year. The eggs, stripped from females in the Kawartha Lakes chain and fertilized by milt of male fish of the same area, are placed in rotating jars for a time, then in rearing ponds which have been fertilized with soya bean meal to produce plankton. The young fish live on this marine life until old enough to eat minnows, when they are called fingerlings.

From here on, the young muskies' appetites become the hatchery man's headache. The minnow consumption, they say, becomes "terrific" often necessitating artificial rearing of sucker minnows. This complex situation is aggravated by cannibalism which often develops among the muskies and which is readily apparent because of the extreme growth of some individual fish in the tank.

"Small wonder," say the hatchery men, "that rearing them to the fry stage rather than the fingerling stage is welcomed."

Much Spent On Rehabilitation In Northwest Ontario

A total of \$27,086.01 was spent in Northwestern Ontario during the past year by the Rehabilitation Foundation for Polio-myelitis and the Orthopaedically Disabled (March of Dimes), it was revealed Monday night at a meeting of the executive committee of the Northwestern Ontario Branch.

In presenting the financial statement Bruce Falkows, president stated that expenditures covering appliances such as wheel chairs, braces, special shoes, etc., amounted to \$3,626.91; transportation to clinics and treatment centres \$1,557.70; hospitalization and physiotherapy treatments \$1,347.51; financial aid and house-keeping assistance \$1,344.27; special equipment such as batteries for portable respirators \$401.90; rehabilitation \$616.41; \$3,000.00 for the Kinsmen Hydrotherapy pool project at St. Joseph's General Hospital, as well as \$12,000.00 part of the current grant of \$25,000.00 to the Rehabilitation Centre at the Lakehead, part of the Foundation's plan to ensure the provision of adequate

treatment facilities in the area. This total amount of almost \$28,000.00 does not include staff salaries, administrative or campaign costs or any share of the general Provincial costs.

Campaign totals for the area last year amounted to \$23,915.31, while in 1959 the amount raised in Northwestern Ontario was \$28,896.65, which ranks as the highest contribution per capita in the province.

A grant of \$2,500.00 has been given to Queen's University to help finance a study to develop the use of electronics in bracing paralyzed limbs.

REGINA — The U.S. has a higher alcoholism rate than Canada partly because it permits more beer and liquor advertising, a Seattle expert said yesterday.

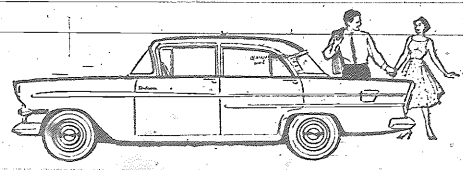
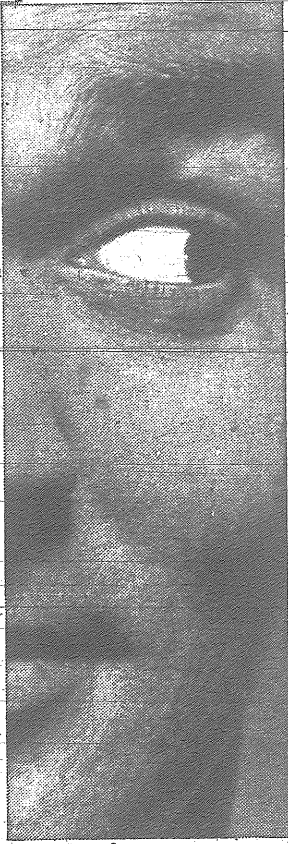

He lauded the restrictions most Canadian provinces have on beer and liquor ads.

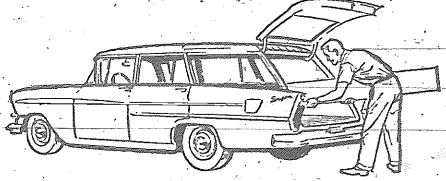
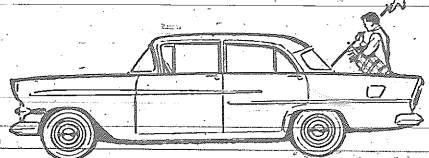
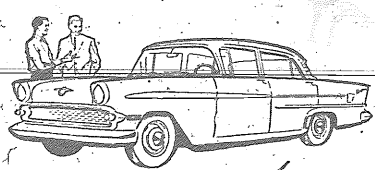

**Treat Power Mower
With Respect**

The power lawn mower is one of the newest of "Dad's helpers." It is a useful piece of summer equipment for almost every home, and for the mechanically-inclined man takes the place of the winter basement do-it-yourself shop. At the same time the power mower must be approached with caution and respect for it can become a dangerous weapon when carelessly used.

In keeping with Safety Week and the slogan "Take Care — Everywhere," we might run over the following safety tips for mower operating recommended by the Industrial Accident Prevention Association of Ontario:

- Don't use a power on ground littered with stones, sticks or wire;
- Don't make adjustments with the motor running;
- Don't allow children to operate mower or to stand near it when it is in operation;
- Don't work on an electric motor while the power is connected;

- Don't leave the motor running and unattended;
 - Don't refuel motor while it is running or hot;
 - Don't operate mower while barefoot or wearing thin shoes;
 - Don't allow domestic pets near mower while it is in use.
- The motor should be stopped when lifting the mower from one level to another; blades should be set at the highest cutting point in weedy ground and movement on terraces should be sideways to prevent the machine sliding back on the operator. The spark-plug should always be disconnected before working on a hot motor. Movement of the blade may restart the motor.

**ENSIGNS - SONS' FLAGS
TO GREET QUEEN**

Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will notice a distinct difference in the crowds when they visit Toronto next week.

Many will be waving Red Ensigns instead of Union Jacks. On previous tours, Jacks outsold the ensigns by a wide margin but current orders to flag makers show the demand has been reversed.

One department store reported over-the-counter sales on Ensigns were three to one.

Sewing Tips for Brides

Weddings are traditional - and every radiant bride-elect knows that the loveliest, bridal tradition of all is the fashioning of her own wedding gown.

How proud the groom will be of his bride, beautiful in a charming gown of her own making. And the bride's parents will welcome the boost to the wedding budget given by her daughter's sewing skill.

For the bride-to-be who sews, sewing center experts pass along the following tips. The first rule is: take your time! Start sewing well ahead of the big day. Two months isn't too far ahead.

Plan slowly and carefully, comparing patterns and fabrics. To determine the best line for your figure, it may prove wise to make up a few different designs in muslin.

Select fabric carefully, too, letting your complexion be your guide. If white is your choice, remember that there are numerous off-white shades, ranging from ivory through pinkish and beige tints.

It is essential to make pattern alterations before cutting into your fabric, caution local sewing center experts, for alterations made on such fabrics as satin may show stitch marks. It's a precaution to make a muslin first; however, a girl who has done considerable sewing usually knows her own figure well enough to by-pass this step.

Remember to fit gown over the

foundation garment you intend to wear under it. A waist cincher can whittle inches off your middle, slightly altering the figure above and below it.

The bride-to-be with a creative flair may want to base her wedding dress on an illustration seen in a bride's magazine. If so, her gown should be adapted from a commercial pattern of similar style.

Suppose that the photograph of your dream wedding dress shows a gown with an overskirt shirred in six places, and always on the seam. You might then select a pattern for an afternoon dress designed along princess lines, with seams at either side, and two seams on both front and back. Skirt made from pattern would be suitably lengthened and the sleeves cut shorter or longer as desired.

If you're fashioning your gown of satin, remember that this fabric has a tendency to ravel, making it necessary to overcast the seams. If you own a new slant-needle automatic sewing machine, you can zip along seam edges with an automatic zigzag stitch. If you don't pink the ed-

ges of the seam allowance and run a line of straight stitching just inside the pinking.

A word to the wise: don't work too hard on the dress. A worked-over look is bad. Put as much time as is needed into preparation - shopping, comparing, pattern

alterations. Then, when you start working with your fabric, proceed slowly but accurately.

Your reward? A fairy-tale gown which will enchant your Prince Charming.

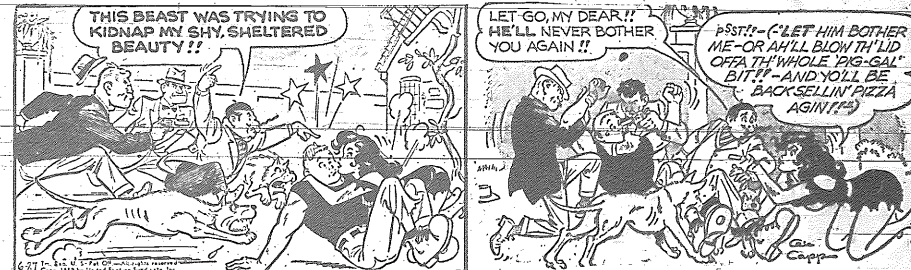

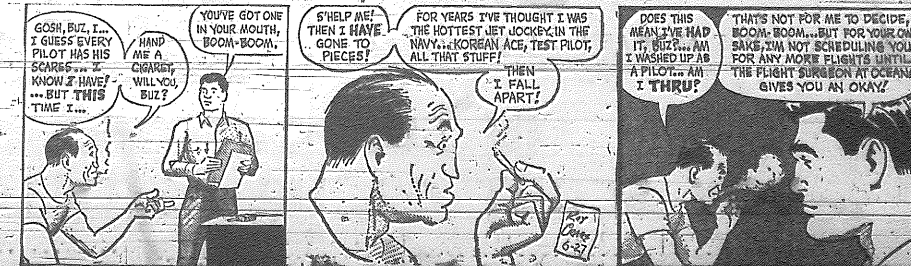

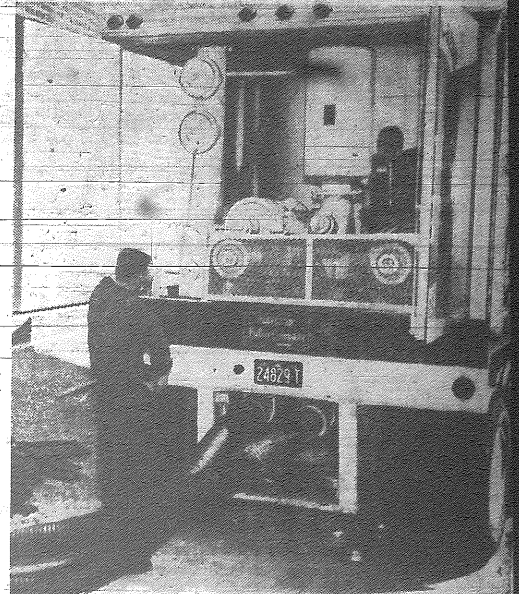

Ottawa.—Two opposition members Thursday night accused the government of falling down on election promises to help the small businessman.

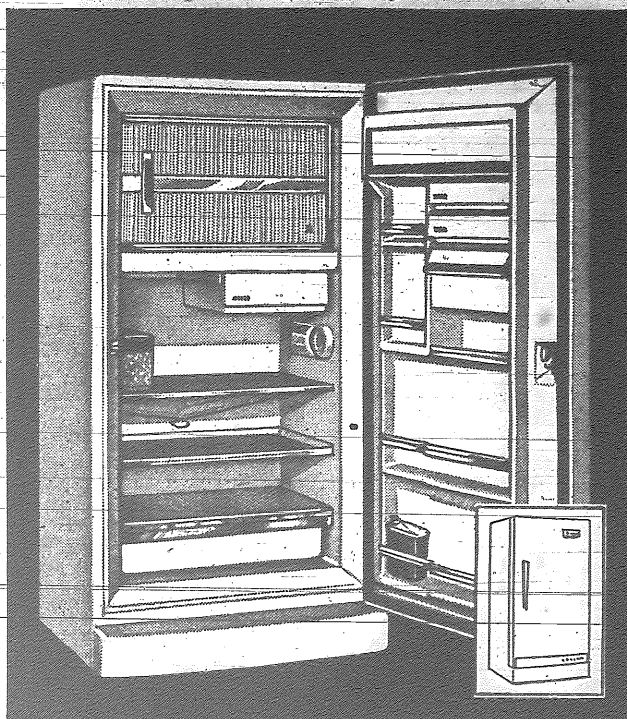
