## Man Killed By Power Saw While Working On Survey

Forty-three year old Charles Wassayjeesick of Pickle Crow, Ontario was instantly killed yesterday while working 65 miles north-west of Central Patricia, Employed by Marshall, Backlin & Managhan of Don Mills, Ontario on a survey project, the unfortunate man was working with five companions clearing trees from a meridian line which was being marked. Power saws were being used to fell the trees, and it was a falling tree which a second man cut which knocked Wassayjeesick over, and into his still-operating chain saw. The moving blade struck him on the top of the head.

An inquest will be held.

## Letter Carrier Service Extended To Norman Area

The Hon. William Hamilton, Post Master General, has informed Pete Robertson that it is now possible to provide an extension of the present service to include the residents of Norman.

The system will be placed in operation when 80% of the homes affected have been equipped with suitable letter slots or boxes and house numbers that are clearly visible from the street. Any home lacking these facilities will not be provided with service. Arrangements are being made to close the Norman post office when the door to door delivery becomes effective. With the present day transportation as it is, residents will be served by the Kenora office as are the rest of Kenora citizens. The people of Norman will be very pleased at this good news from Ottawa and the Post Master General.

## Kenora Joins In Marking Canada's 92nd Birthday

Tomorrow, Wednesday, July 1st, all Canadians join in celebrating the 92nd birthday of our country. It will be an historic occasion this year since Canada's Queen will be in the capital to help with the celebrations. Her Majesty will address her people tomorrow from Ottawa. Radio Station CJRL will carry the Queen's message from 11.00 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. There will be a rebroadcast resume of the speech later from 6.15 p.m. to 6.30 p.m.

Here in Kenora, the town is in a holiday mood. Town workmen have erected flags on the lamp standards in honor of the day. Since the holiday is in the middle of the week, too many visitors are not expected.

In keeping with the holiday, the Miner and News will be closed for the day, giving staff and carriers a well earned holiday.

## AT DISTRICT JAIL THOMAS YOUNG HANGED EARLY THIS MORNING

Twenty-six year old Thomas Young, non treaty Indian from Ear Falls, paid the supreme penalty early this morning at the Kenora District jail when he was hanged for the murder last Christmas Day of Constable Calvin Russell Fulford of the Ontario Provincial Police. He was also accused of killing four other people, including his father.

Tom Young learned late Monday that the cabinet at Ottawa had refused to interfere with the death sentence passed last March 21st by Mr. Justice J. E. Thomson. The five day trial was heard here at Kenora.

**RESIGNED TO FATE**  
Sheriff Bruce said there was no trouble with the prisoner. He had shown no interest in books, hobbies, writing or any other activity while in the death cell. He had given guards no trouble and from the first was resigned to his fate.

Thus the penalty was exacted according to the law. It was the last chapter in the story of a night-marish hour that was unfolded at the five-day trial in Kenora in March.

Jail officials reported that Young remained calm in keeping with the nonchalant manner he adopted during his trial and since entering the death cell.

The execution is reported to have taken place around one o'clock this morning. Both sides of the highway leading to the jail were reported to be lined with cars, many with young children in them. Dean L. M. Watts of St. Alban's Pro-Cathedral who has visited Young during his prison stay was with him last night.

Sheriff D. M. Bruce said Young had one visitor Monday. He was Jim Young, 21, brother of Tom, who prior to the shootings lived with Tom, another brother, David and their father, Albert, in a shack at Ear Falls.

Albert Young, 47; George Williams, 47; James Gordon, 26 and Gordon's wife, Clara, 17, were all shot to death a short time before Constable Fulford was slain.

For two days the chief topic of conversation in Kenora has been the possibility of a commutation to a life term for Young instead of hanging. This was thought possible because of the presence of The Queen in Canada. When word spread Monday evening that the death sentence would be carried out most people agreed it was the right decision.

## Fishing For Trout Catches Lantern

While stories concerning the big fish that have been caught are making the rounds, it is not every day that a fisherman goes out after a trout and hooks a lantern. That's what happened to Mr. W. Whiddon, River Street.

Mr. Whiddon in company with M. Pekarchuk and D. Balchin were having a merry time fishing. Suddenly, Mr. Whiddon yelled, "I've hooked a big one." After reeling in some 350 feet of line, imagine his surprise when the lantern appeared instead of a trout. The lamp with CPR on it was one of the older type lanterns but in good condition after its years in the water.

The fishing trip had a successful ending however, since all three fishermen caught their limit of trout and the lantern!

## Police Continue Investigation Of Sunday Break-In

Kenora Police are continuing the investigation into the breaking and entering of Parson's Airways office on Second Street dock which took place early Sunday morning. Company personnel discovered the break-in at 6:50 a.m. when they showed up for work. They found the office completely ransacked, a check revealed several dollars worth of stamps and a cheque writing machine stolen. No arrests have, as yet, been made.

## Off the Cuff by Rick Hunt

### SKOL... SVENSK STORFEST

Now it is over. Now it is done. The right hand has been landed. The right hand of myth has turned into reality; therefore, it is a right hand that is really fast... truly devastating... and the hand of a new champion, Ingemar Johansson.

Ingemar Johansson, who looks like an Ivy League fullback, barrel-chested, with the dimpled, boyish face has thrown his steadfastly concealed atomic weapon on the slow moving chin of Floyd Patterson. Once was enough; although Patterson, the champion at heart, stood and received it seven times. A new champion has been crowned after three short rounds for the Heavyweight Boxing Championship of the world. Two minutes and three seconds had faded in the third round and the first Swedish heavyweight champion of the world was aiding Floyd Patterson, the tiger on two human feet, to his corner, after sending the former champion to the canvas seven times during that very short space of victory time.

The boy, from Goteberg, Sweden has succeeded in something

that four other boxers have failed to do in three years' time. He has beaten Floyd Patterson rather decisively, in Patterson's severest test to date. It was the same punch in that historic performance at Goteborg, last Sept. 24, when Johansson nailed Eddie Machen on the side of the head and sent the latter to the canvas for the first of three rips. Machen was then the number one contender. Patterson lasted exactly two rounds longer... and he was the champion.

The rethen match should be the greatest fight of the decade. We will then know if Johansson is another "Louis" or another "Schmeling" in boxing. It was a great "Svensk Storfest" celebration in Goteberg Saturday and the 25% - 35% Swedish composition of Kenora were in jubilation too. The smorgasbord was prepared. First the drinks for Ingo's victory: glogg, punch, branvin and pilsner... and kaffe. Then the main dishes: skinka, inlagd sill, kory ost, rullader, stekt lax, limpa, knackebrod, kyckling and kantareller. Then the dessert: glass and laggortia... Skol to the new champion... It was indeed a "galt middag" in many Swedish homes.

The fight was extremely interesting to listen to over the radio. The announcing was superb but the programme producers

went too far when they threw in a commercial right after the TKO.

Johansson's victory is a great thing for boxing. We were growing tired of the monopolies, competition, politics and stagnation of the American Heavyweight scene. We were also tired of Patterson's manager, Cus D'Amato keeping his fighter on ice and then turning him against the likes of London and Radermacher.

The people were once skeptical of European fighters; especially when Georges Carpentier was found to be a minor farce against Jack Dempsey in 1921. However, with Ingemar's victory over Patterson we are beginning to see brighter boxing prospects coming from Europe. We are not selling Patterson short on the return match... too many people!

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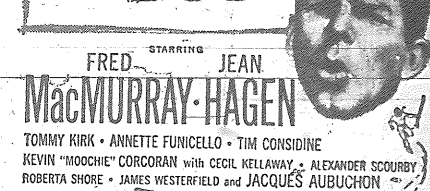

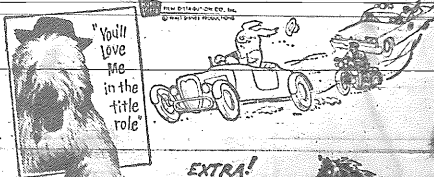

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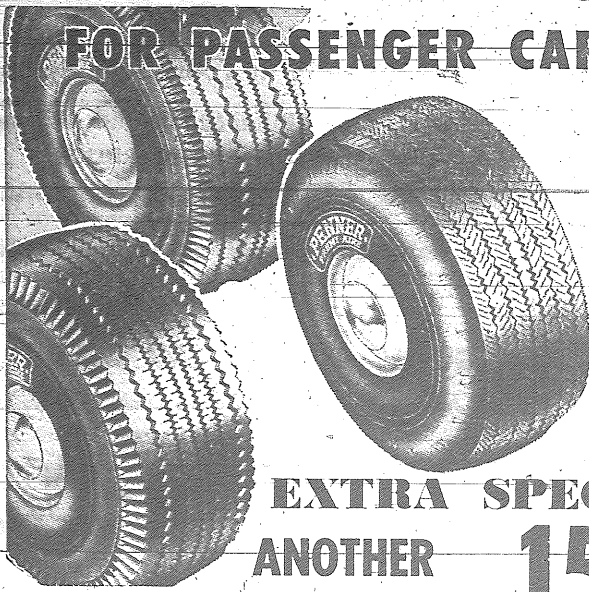

did that to Joe Louis when Max Schmelling knocked him out in 1936 but we are saying that the Swede is the best boxer to come from Europe in a long time. It's a good thing for boxing.

Nat Fleischer, United States boxing expert, suggested earlier in an article in a Stockholm newspaper that Ingemar's training nabobs showed a great weakness because the Viking liked night life and dancing.

Johansson kept his trade secret, "the right hand punch" all the way through his training schedule and he was criticized for not unlimbering his heavy artillery against his spartrates. Bill Rosenholm, the promoter of the fight pleaded with him to show his great punch.

Ingemar replied to Rosenholm, "I pay my sparring mates good money, but they are no good to me on the floor. No one can stand up when I hit him hard with my right . . ."

It certainly looks like Ingemar Johansson, the new world heavyweight champion, was right . . .

There have been many strange heavyweight title fights and there have been a number of strange fighters who have fought in the heavyweight class.

In one of the greatest heavyweight fights in history, John L. Sullivan not only lost his title Gentleman Jim Corbett, but in addition it cost him a scorching \$35,000 to lose the title. That fight took place on September 7, 1892, with a \$25,000 purse and a side bet of \$49,999—the winner to take all. Corbett flattened the champ in the 21st round, winning the mighty Sullivan's crown and purse and bet. It is the only time in recorded boxing history that a heavyweight champion never received a cent for fighting a title bout.

Tommy Burns was one of the smallest heavyweight champions in the boxing world. Being 5ft. 7in.—the champion performed many outstanding feats during his career. In 1908, on St. Patrick's Day in Dublin, Burns knocked out Jess Roche, the Irish champion in one minute and twenty-eight seconds. It was the shortest championship fight in the history of the heavyweights. Burns knocked out an amazing seven challengers in thirteen months and at one time won two bouts in defence of his crown on the same day.

The largest purse in boxing history was made on September 22, 1927 when Gene Tunney defended his heavyweight championship crown against Jack Dempsey. We imagine that a number of you Kenora-fans remember that fight. It took place in Chicago Soldier's Field and 104,943 spectators were on hand to see Tunney win. In thirty minutes of fighting Gene Tunney earned \$990,000.
