KENORA BASEMENTS FLOODED

HIGHWAYS WASHED OUT AS STORM HITS AREA

The violent electric storm which struck shortly after midnight dumped torrents of rain on the area with disastrous results. Highways have been washed out and basements flooded. A record 2.8 inches of rain fell on Kenora while the figure to the east of here is closer to five inches.

Worst damage was done to highways 70 and 17 with the roads at the junction east of Kenora being entirely washed out. Department of Highways officials stated today that Highway 70 to Fort Frances is completely washed out near the junction and will take considerable time to repair since even the pavement is gone. Trucks are dumping gravel as fast as possible and officials hope to have one lane traffic late this afternoon.

Highway 17 to Dryden is also expected to be open in traffic this afternoon although there are two wash-outs to contend with, the second one being six miles from the junction. Department workers have been working steadily since two o'clock this morning. This highway is flooded some 1,200 feet and nothing much can be done till the water goes down. Water is so high that it is up over truck wheels making passage almost impossible.

Mr. A. Snerrett manager at the Tourist Bureau said this morning that they have been besieged with calls from stranded visitors. This couldn't have happened at a worse time said Mr. Snerrett, with Kenora expecting a record influx of tourists since this is the big holiday weekend for American visitors. Cars are being held up at Sioux Narrows and Vermilion Bay.

Many stories of stranded motorists have reached this office, with one man stating that he took his wife and family to safe ground and on returning to get his car found the water up to the dash board.

The detour at the hospital was also reported to be washed out but is now in working order.

Shoulders on the west highway have been badly washed out and motorists are advised to travel with caution.

At press time today, highway officials asked the Miner and News to seek the co-operation of all motorists by asking them not to travel to the scene of the washouts. There have been hundreds of sightseers out at the junction and they are really hampering our work they said. When the roads are possible, it will be broadcast over radio station CJRL or motorists may phone the department for information.

Mrs. John Duncan, Keewatin Resident Died Today

Margaret Tolmie Duncan, Front Street Keewatin, died at the Kenora General Hospital early this morning, Saturday, July 4th, following a lengthy illness. Born in Inverness, Scotland, April 8, 1893, she was in her 66th year.

She received her education in the Old Country and came to Canada and Keewatin in 1920. She was married at Toronto, April 21, 1920 to John Duncan. She was a member of the Keewatin United Church, the Ladies' Aid of her church and Wagon Chapter of the Eastern Star. She is survived by her husband, John; one son Ian Gordon of Ottawa, a squadron leader in the RCAF; two brothers, Alex of York, England and Charles of Edinburgh, Scotland; one sister Joan in Scotland and one grandchild.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home, Tuesday afternoon, July 7th at two o'clock. Rev. A. E. Dunn will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Iceland Confers Highest Honor On Mrs. John D. Eaton

In a recent edition of the Toronto-Globe and Mail, a large three column picture and a news item, reported the conferring of Iceland's highest civilian honour, on Mrs. John David Eaton, when she became a "Knight of the Falcon." Icelandic Canadian Consul, J. Ragnar Johnson, conferred the award on Mrs. Eaton, wife of the president of T. Eaton Company Limited, in recognition of her interest in Icelandic people in their own country and in Canada.

Mrs. Eaton's father was a native of Iceland.

People of Kenora-Rainy River will be interested to know that in 1951, the Order of the Falcon, most sparingly awarded by Iceland was conferred on our own Federal legislator, W. M. "Bill" Benidickson, MP for Kenora-Rainy River, a fact which has been known to very few. Bill's father, Mr. C. Benidickson, well known to many local business was born outside Canada, knowing, on arrival, as an orphan, only a foreign language.

Debate Sparked Again On Ancient Liquor Laws

Ontario's liquor laws are again being discussed in the east. Press reports from Toronto have taken up the controversial issue following remarks by a distinguished visitor.

The visitor is Prince Philip. Yesterday he discussed the liquor laws with the progressive member of the legislature for Middlesex South, Harry Allen, Mr. Allen says Prince Philip asked him "When are these obsolete and old-fashioned liquor laws going to be changed?"

The statement is said to have been prompted by an incident Thursday night at the Stratford Shakespearean Festival. Bars were ordered closed at 11:30 p.m., shortening a reception which followed a visit to the theatre by the Prince and Queen Elizabeth. Neither the Queen nor her husband had been scheduled to attend the reception.

Today Ontario Liquor Commissioner W. H. Collings wondered just what experience the Prince has had to back up his statement. Mr. Collings declared, "That's quite a statement he made and I'm not sure I know what he means. He'd have to be more specific before I'd care to comment further."

The General secretary of the Canadian Temperance Federation, the Reverend John Linton, said today the Prince, in Mr. Linton's words, "Does not know Canadian laws are not able to handle liquor."

"For that matter," Mr. Linton continued, "Neither can the English."

He added: "People who come here from England and start talking had better look to their own country. Alcoholism is quite a problem there."

The Managing Director of the Ontario Hotel Association, Clint Melville, said, as he put it, the Prince "is only saying what most tourists say when they visit the province."

BACK TO THE BIBLE BROADCAST COMES TO CJRL

This week the BACK TO THE BIBLE BROADCAST added CJRL to its network, which extends to 46 states and 10 provinces in Canada and nearly every foreign land. The program features instructive Bible teaching by Rev. Theodore Epp and high

quality sacred choral sections by a talented choir, it was announced. The broadcast originates in Lincoln, Nebraska, and is heard over station CJRL Monday through to Saturday at 1:00 p.m. The Saturday broadcast is directed primarily to young people.

Fourth Causeway Contract Awarded At Fort Frances

Fort Frances — Two major highways will join at Fort Frances and funnel tremendous volumes of travel through the border communities, W. G. Noden, MPP, said Thursday.

Noden, nicknamed "Causeway Bill" for his successful efforts to have the Ontario government bridge Rainy Lake with a highway leading to Atikokan, was referring to a new Ontario highway 11 and the Great River road.

"THE JUNCTION will put this region at the 'hub of the wheel' for both east-west and north-south travel and make it a center of importance exactly in the heart of North America, the legislator predicted.

He brought the Kiwanis club up to date on important developments on both roads:

A new, \$1,500,000-plus contract that has been signed, has just been awarded on bridging for the Rainy Lake causeway to the Atlas Construction company of Montreal. This is the fourth contract on the causeway which now is rated the biggest construction project in Canada, Noden said.

"THE OVERALL JOB is being supervised by the Foundation Engineering company and C. A. Pitts company presently on the scene give the causeway the benefit of two of the outstanding companies of Canada.

Next, probably in August, tenders will be called for a fifth contract for road construction at Atikokan. After the Fort Frances-Atikokan highway is finished it will become a section of Ontario highway 11, a secondary trans-Canada route that will shorten the Fort William-Winnipeg distance appreciably.

"We'll cross the international boundary at Rainy River where Noden reported another Ontario contract for an approach to a new bridge will be given soon.

EVENTS are moving just as swiftly on completion of the Great River road north from New Orleans to this American entry

Do's and Don'ts For Safe Boating To Stay Afloat

With thousands of square miles of open water available to boating enthusiasts, it is sometimes hard to believe that boating accidents are possible.

The Outboard Marine News Bureau has compiled a list of do's and don'ts which, if allowed, will keep novices and "old hands" safe afloat—and dry.

DO — Check maximum horsepower rating of your boat as re-

commended on the power load capacity plate on the transom, or make certain your boat and motor are "balanced."

DO — Step aboard a boat as nearly to the centre as possible. Keep lines taut or have someone steady the boat.

DO — Fill your tank carefully with a minimum of splashing and spilling.

DO — Carry one department of transport approved life preserver for every person aboard.

DO — Learn basic signs of impending weather changes. Always head for shelter at the first sign of an approaching storm or squall.

DO — Cross the wake of a large boat at a safe angle if avoiding it completely is impossible.

DO — Punch holes in both ends of cans so that they will not float. Sink them only in deep areas in lakes so that they won't harm swimming and small craft.

DO — Slow down or stop before changing position standing in a boat.

DO — Bring your boat into harbors and docks at low speed and respect the property of others.

DON'T — Buy a boat without regard to the load or horsepower the boat can stand safely. Never crowd a small boat beyond its obvious or stated capacity. The number of seats in a boat do not indicate capacity.

DON'T — Jump aboard. You may go through the hull. Don't step on the gunwale; you'll spread-eagle into the drink.

DON'T — Smoke while filling a gas tank.

DON'T — "Run" from waves in a rain storm. Always keep your boat headed into large waves.

DON'T — Be a "cowboy" with your boat at any time. Don't take your boat too close to swimmers.

Never "run down" another boat or swimmer, "just for fun." Your boat has no brakes.

DON'T — Throw floating refuse overboard to drift on beaches.

DON'T — Ever stand up on or change seats in a fast-moving boat.

DON'T — "Cowboy" your boat around other craft through a crowded anchorage or at dock-side.

Thousands of Canadians live beside railroad tracks. Small children of these families may wander onto the tracks and be killed. A verandah with a strong gate or a large play pen, homemade if necessary, will help to keep toddlers from running into danger.

port, Noden reported.

The Ontario legislature expressed confidence that Minnesota will build its section of the Great River road, also known as the Mississippi Parkway, to cross the boundary here. The four-lane highway is paralleling the Mississippi river through central U.S. where 50,050,000 Americans—"vast potential wealth on wheels"—live within 19 miles of the road.

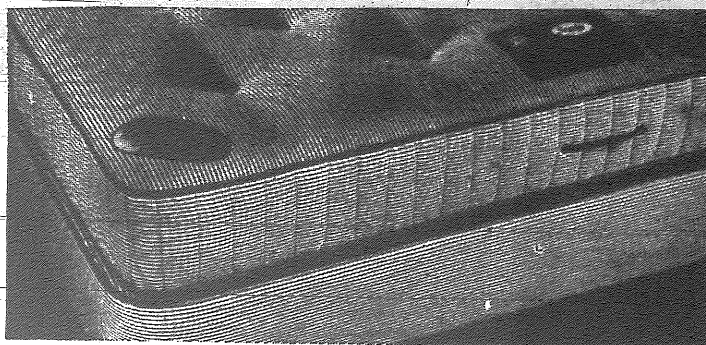
MINNESOTA this month started field surveys for its section of the big, 10-state highway and the state governor informed Noden recently of the choice of Fort Frances as the Canadian terminus of the road. At least, Noden said the governor asked him whether designation of the highway route would make it easier for the Ontario government to start building a new, international bridge here.

It is planned eventually for the American highway to stretch south past New Orleans into South America and thereby multiply the travellers using it, Noden reported.

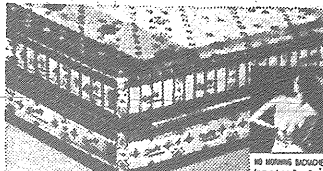
