Jail Term For Cashing Worthless Cheque Locally

A fairly heavy docket faced Magistrate J. V. Fregeau this morning upon his return from Red Lake where he conducted Court Wednesday and Thursday. A man of no fixed abode managed to cash a cheque, drawn on a local bank, which proved to be worthless. The visitor will spend 30 days in jail.

Motorists were in trouble today. A Pine Falls man paid a fine of \$100 and costs and lost his driving privileges for 30 days when convicted of impaired driving.

A local man went for a drive in another man's car, without first securing permission. Although the car was returned, the driver will pay \$100 and costs or spend 30 days in jail.

A careless driving conviction was secured against another local man who was the driver of a vehicle involved in an accident July 7th on Highway 17 west. The fine was \$25 and costs or 30 days.

A Kenora motorist backed his car into a parked vehicle in Keewatin. Today he was fined \$50 and costs or 15 days for driving while his licence was suspended. The accident took place in Keewatin.

Failure to pay a parking ticket promptly brought a \$5.00 fine to another motorist.

There were five drunks before the magistrate, 2 of them local men. The usual \$10 and costs or 7 days was levied. Illegal possession of wine brought a similar fine to a visitor.

The governor's letter reported Kenora in second place in the district for attendance, with Melfort-Saskatchewan on top by a small percentage. The district average was 84.85%.

A business session followed with plans discussed for the year's activities, which will be announced shortly.

Mr. Saie said the "Frontenac" represents an entirely new concept in styling, convenience and comfort and that many of the features of the new car will be exclusive to the Canadian automotive market.

The car will be priced below that of any North American type models currently sold by our Meteor and Mercury dealers and is intended for those buyers seeking the advantages of a compact car with distinguishing performance and styling characteristics. The Frontenac will have accommodation for six passengers and its interior appointments have been carefully selected for the complete comfort and pleasure of the driver and passengers.

In addition to its exclusive styling the car will bear a distinctive Canadian insignia identifying it with the name "Frontenac" which has a rich heritage in Canadian history. The Comte de Pallau et de Frontenac, the noted statesman and general, was governor of New France during the latter part of the 17th century and founded Fort Frontenac, now Kingston, Ontario.

Molson's Offers Big Fish Prizes

With the 1959 fishing season for bass and maskinonge underway, many fishermen throughout Ontario are hopeful of landing a whopper that will earn them a substantial cash award in a "big fish" contest being conducted in Ontario under the auspices of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.

Molson's Brewery (Ontario Ltd.) is co-operating with the Federation in the promotion of the tournament by contributing cash awards of more than \$3,000.

A sum of \$100 will be awarded for biggest fish in each of the following categories: large-mouth black bass, small mouth black bass, maskinonge, yellow pickerel, great northern pike, lake trout, speckled trout and rainbow trout. They must be caught in Ontario waters during the regular open season, on rod and reel and line and must be played by only one person.

In addition, a Molson badge of honour will be presented each fishing enthusiasts submitting an entry which complies with the minimum weight requirements.

The tournament continues through until October 31st and all entries must be submitted and received by November 8th. Entry forms and other details may be obtained from any member, or from the Secretary-Manager, of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, Ridgeway, Ontario.

Driving Instructors Now Need Licence

Effective July 1st, all motor vehicle driving instructors operating within the Province of Ontario must be licensed by the Department of Transport.

Application forms for Driving Instructors' Licences and copies of the regulations governing instructors may be obtained from: Ontario Department of Transport, Licensing Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto 2. Upon receipt of the application and the required fee, a temporary licence may be issued pending qualification of the applicant.

A driving instructor is defined by regulations as: "A person who teaches other persons to operate motor vehicles and receives compensation therefor."

Lakeside Park Proving Popular

Despite the limited capacity at the Town of Kenora's Lakeside Park some one hundred and seventeen parties have used its facilities in the 260 days it has been available, and the total number of visitors from outside points using the park have totalled 401.

The bathing facilities are good and are also used by a large number of local residents as well. Six electric hook-ups are available and used regularly, and in fact more electrical outlets could be used to advantage.

**Steamer Service
 To Victoria To Be
 Closed Sept. 26**

Vancouver, July 9—Canadian Pacific will withdraw its direct steamship service between Vancouver and Victoria for the winter season beginning September 26, J. N. Fraine, vice-president and General Manager of the Company's Pacific Region, said here today.

The Canadian Pacific operated a single ship daily round trip service from February 25 until the opening of the summer service on May 15 between Vancouver and Victoria.

The present move will terminate direct service between the two cities during the winter months. The night ships were withdrawn in February of this year.

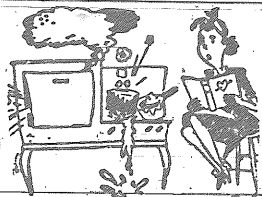
Mr. Fraine felt the regular summer service between the two cities would be resumed next spring.

He said that in addition to the dayliner on the E. & N. railway, Vancouver Island coach lines were continuing to operate express service between Victoria and Nanaimo providing a frequent fast connection with Canadian Pacific Ferries to the Mainland.

KITCHEN CLASSICS

A RING TO EAT
 Summertime conjures up pictures of picnics by the lake, patio dinners, and gardening in the back yard. But whatever the agenda for the day, there are few better ways of reviving flagging energies and refreshing the spirit than a break for a long cooling drink, accompanied by some tasty snack such as Date-Banana Ring Cake.

As the name itself suggests, the main flavor ingredients of this cake are bananas and dates, with just a dash of ground cinnamon to add a touch of spiciness. The cake has rather a light texture, reminiscent of a loaf cake, and it keeps very well if stored in a covered tin. Although it is certainly flavorful enough without added garnishments, a lemon or vanilla glaze gives the cake a party air for those special entertainments.

DATE-BANANA-RING CAKE
 Yield - 1 dozen ring cakes

1 1/2 cups once-sifted all-purpose flour
 or 2 cups once-sifted pastry flour
 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 1 cup fine granulated sugar
 3/4 cup chopped pitted dates
 1/4 cup soft shortening
 2 eggs
 1 cup mashed ripe banana
 2 tablespoons milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Grease a ring cake pan, 8 in-

ches in diameter. Preheat oven to 350 deg. F. (moderate).

Sift together twice, then sift into a bowl the all-purpose or pastry flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and sugar; add and mix in dates. Add shortening, eggs and half of the mashed banana; stir to combine, then beat with a wooden spoon for 30 strokes or with an electric mixer, set at medium speed, for 2 minutes. Add milk, vanilla and remaining banana; beat batter for 150 strokes or 1 minute with electric mixer. Turn into prepared pan and spread evenly. Bake in preheated oven 1 to 1 1/4 hours. Stand cake in its pan on a cake rack for 15 minutes, then

turn out cake and allow it to cool completely on rack. Store in a covered tin.

Paper is made from wood fibres or from other cellulose fibres like cotton and esparto.





Juvenile Baseball

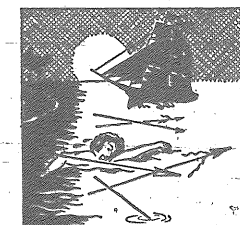

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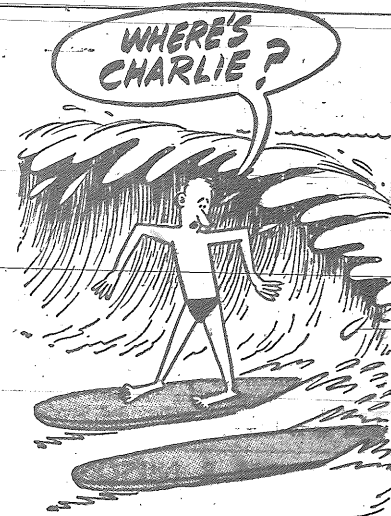

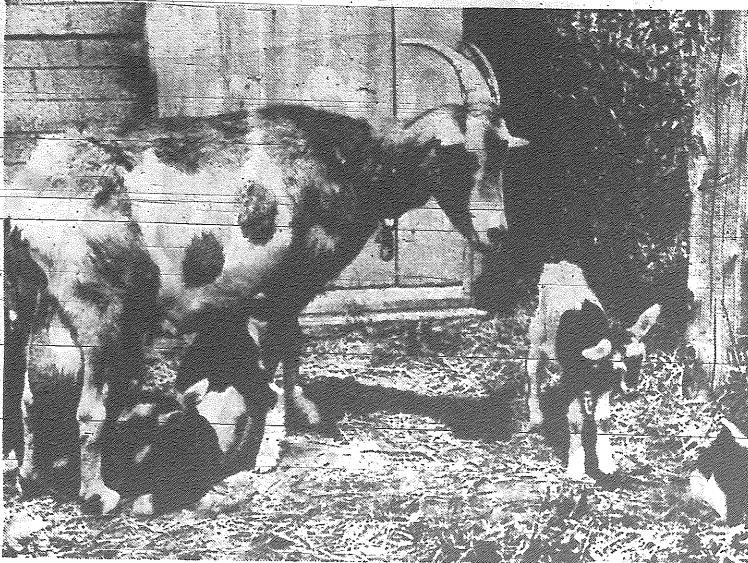

Students Attend Summer Classes

London, Ont.—For the first time in Ontario about 650 London high school students have enrolled at summer classes.

At G. A. Wheable Collegiate-Vocational Institute, 385 students registered Monday for credit classes to make up a maximum of two failed subjects and pass their year; 175 registered for courses to broaden their knowledge of school subjects or study

subjects not available in the regular curriculum. A small percentage are from outside the city.

Dr. A. B. Lucas, London's director of education said that for credit students, who otherwise would repeat their year, the special classes could be a tremendous advantage, "even if only half of them passed."

At this time of the summer season when numerous gas boats and pleasure craft are operating and company tug boats are towing pulpwood and logs, we respectfully solicit your co-operation in our endeavour to keep the lake clear of floating pulpwood, logs and dead heads. When gas boats run too close to a tow of pulp or logs, the swell has a tendency to wash out some of the pulp and logs, and it is for this reason that we ask you to:

- (1) When passing a tow, either being towed by tugs or in storage, keep at least 100 feet from boom. When it is not possible to do this, if in narrows, slow down till past the tow or boom.
- (2) When following a tow of pulp or logs, watch for any stray logs or pulpwood sticks which may have worked out from rear of tow.

If these precautions are observed by all boat owners, it will keep the lake free from floaters and will help eliminate damage to small craft.

Replacing Window Pane Easy Task

When replacing a window pane all broken glass, putty and glazier's points should be removed from the rebate or groove. This can be done with a knife, an old chisel, or other similar tool.
Before fitting the new pane a film of putty should be spread on the face of the groove parallel to the glass to act as a seal and cushion. This is known as "bedding the glass". On wood sash a filler should first be applied to prevent the wood from absorbing too much of the oil contained in the putty. A light coat of paint will also serve this purpose.
Triangular pieces of tin known as glazier's points are used with wood sash to keep the glass in place. They are laid flat against the pane and wedged into the rail by tapping with a flat tool.
Applying the putty requires a little practice. If the putty is too stiff or if it crumbles, adding a few drops of linseed oil will make it workable. The putty should be rolled into lengths and then pressed into place. A regular putty knife should be used to smooth the putty with a single, long stroke. This is a small, inexpensive square-edged instrument with which a professional looking glazing job can be achieved. Holding it at the proper angle between sash and glass makes the job easy.

To replace a broken pane in metal sash, remove the metal glazing strips which hold the glass to the sash by means of screws. After cleaning the groove, a new bed of putty should be applied, the glass set in place and the glazing strips replaced.
Prepared putties recommended for the purpose are available at hardware and paint stores. When dealing with patented devices other than glazing strips to secure glass to metal sashes the maker's instructions should be followed.
