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EDUCATION RESEARCH BEGINS FOR ONTARIO IN SEPTEMBER

TORONTO — If you are a boy or girl entering an Ontario high school in September, it's likely the card you will fill out with the strange pencil may not mean much to you.

But to members of the department of educational research of the Ontario College of Education, the card, along with 25,000 others, will mark the start of the most extensive educational research project ever undertaken in the province.

Known as the Carnegie study, it is being made with the aid of a \$30,000 grant from the Carnegie Foundation of New York. The project will keep track of all students who begin high school this year until one year after completion of their course.

DUAL PURPOSE

Basic purpose of the survey, which in most cases will take from five to six years, is to identify and utilize talents of gifted students and study reasons why intellectually capable students leave school early.

Research authorities hope that from the results, means can be taken to encourage high school students to complete their education.

First step will be taken in the last week of September when Grade 9 students will be asked to complete a questionnaire on a special card.

Information will be written on the card with special electric pencils which will record the answers.

"The cards will be returned to Toronto where they will be run through a processing machine ordered for the project," says Dr. R. W. B. Jackson, director of the education research department.

STUDENT CHECKS

During the school year, two sets of aptitude tests and one "interest inventory" questionnaire will be completed by the students, while teachers will complete a questionnaire on the student's progress.

Throughout his high school years, the student will continue to record data for the department.

A similar project is being conducted by the University of Pittsburgh research department. Known as the Flanagan study, it will examine 500,000 students over a 20-year period.

"We feel the Ontario one will turn out to be much better than the Flanagan study," said Dr. Jackson, "because we're examining everyone and not just taking random samples."

Under the Ontario project, stu-

dents who drop out of high school while the survey is being conducted will be traced for one year. If they enter employment they will be judged on the degree of occupational success they attain.

Those who leave high school at any level, including Grade 13, to attend other educational institutions will be followed up for one year.

Dr. Jackson and his associate Dr. W. C. Fleming hope the Carnegie study will be "hooked on to" the Atkinson study which the department began in 1955 and the first results of which will be known this fall.

The Atkinson study followed the Grade 13 students who completed their courses in the spring of 1956 and either continued their education or entered an occupation.

The project was designed to iron out some of the problems encountered by the students at universities or at work.

Dr. Jackson admits the Carnegie and Atkinson surveys are being conducted in reverse order but said "we couldn't give the universities the information they wanted" if normal order was followed.

He said that if by the spring of 1964, circumstances surrounding the Grade 13 have changed considerably since the Atkinson study was inaugurated, the latter project may have to be repeated.

Former Keewatin Resident Died In Kenmore, New York

Keewatin citizens were shocked to learn of the sudden passing of a former well known resident, Mrs. Olive Bergsteinsson, beloved wife of H. W. Bergsteinsson of Buffalo, New York. The death occurred after a brief illness at Kenmore Mercy Hospital, New York, July 22nd.

Born in Reston, Manitoba in 1911, she received her education there and graduated with her B.A. degree from the University of Manitoba. The late Olive Bergsteinsson resided in Keewatin from 1938 to 1956 when she moved with her husband and family to Montreal. In January 1959 they took up residence in Buffalo, N.Y. She was a highly respected citizen and a faithful member of the United Church here, active in school and church work she was a past president of W. L. Robertson Guild.

She leaves to mourn her loss, her husband, three daughters, Ellen attending McGill University, Montreal, Margart, Lois and one son Edwin at home; her mother, Mrs. A. E. Smith, Reston, Man.; a brother Donald, of Montreal and sister Mildred of Saskatoon, Sask.

Burial took place July 21st at 2 p.m. from the Bury Funeral Home, Kenmore N.Y.

Vancouver Site For Chartered Accountants Meet

Vancouver — Chartered accountants from all parts of Canada will gather in Vancouver September 14 to 16 for the 57th Annual Conference of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. The event will mark the first time that the Institute has held its annual assembly in this province since the Victoria session in 1953.

Close to 1,000 delegates and their wives are expected to attend the technical and social functions at the Hotel Vancouver and the University of British Columbia.

Running for the three days of the conference will be a series of technical sessions on three main subjects — accounting for corporate management, research and taxation. Speakers include W. S. Owen, Q.C., of Vancouver, President of the Canadian Bar Association; Louis H. Penney, C.P.A., President of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants; L. G. Macpherson, F.C.A., Director, School of Commerce and Administration, Queen's University; Campbell W. Leach, C.A., Chairman of the Canadian Tax Foundation; James W. Kerr, President of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd.; R. B. Taylor, F.C.A., Vice-President and Treasurer, The Steel Company of Canada, Limited; and Dr. N. A. M. MacKenzie, C.M.G., President of the University of British Columbia.

Plan Circle Tours To Boost Tourism

Winnipeg — First international conference on tourism "in this mid-continent heart" M.J.G. McMullen called the meeting of 50 delegates that got down to work at 9 a.m. in St. Regis Hotel, Thursday.

Hi-Grading Charge Brings Year In Jail At Red Lake

A Red Lake man was sentenced to serve a one year jail term for hi-grading when he appeared before Magistrate J. V. Fregeau at Red Lake yesterday. Evidence was gathered by two special police agents working in Balmertown.

The accused was convicted when the Court accepted evidence of the officers, who told of finding a sample bag full of gold ore in the lunch box of the man when he was coming off shift at the New Dickenson gold mine. Two other bags, similarly filled with rich ore, were found in the home of the man. The total value of the ore was between \$400 and \$500.

Just how the accused proposed to dispose of the ore, was not brought out at the trial. The conviction was the first of the year, and the first major theft charge in two or three years.

Dead Lovers "Wed"

Taipei, Formosa — A wedding ceremony was held today for two lovers who drowned themselves four days ago because their parents would not let them marry. Ushers supported the bodies of Chen Wu-Chi, 20, and Miss Tsai Chao-Tze, 18, and made them bow to each other. The lovers were buried in the same grave.

An announcement received in Kenora today from Ottawa states that the federal and Ontario governments are to share the cost of servicing 113 buildings lots in Kenora. The release from Ottawa said that sewers, water and roads will be provided for the residential lots under the agreement. The cost of the project will be shared with the federal government paying 75% and the province 25%.

The lots in question are in the Pincrest subdivision number two.

In consulting town officials, the Miner and News learned that the two governments will share in the financing for the needed services, not pay the costs. This is similar to what was done for the first Pincrest subdivision.

Mr. F. J. Hooper, town clerk said that this is the usual manner of doing things, after a town has applied for assistance when there is a housing problem. After an application is made, he said, the property is surveyed and turned over to the Central Mortgage and Housing Association for management. The association then proceeds to sell the lots, incorporating into the cost of the lots, fifty percent of the costs of servicing. The remaining fifty percent is paid through taxes over a fifteen year period.

It should be understood though, Mr. Hooper concluded, that there are no land taxes until the lot is used but frontage taxes are necessary if the property is held for a period of time before building commences.

Town police report that a car driven by M. H. Marner of Winnipeg, and travelling west on highway 17 was in collision with two cars travelling east, and driven by Wm. Eidokinios of Port Arthur and Frank Marshak of Norman. The accident occurred as Marner was turning into the detour. Extensively damaged were the Marner and Eidokinios cars.

be replaced and other adjustments and repairs carried out by a qualified electrician to ensure smooth operation of the motors until the following spring.

Gas fueled furnaces require little attention, once the proper air shutter, gas valve and regulator adjustments have been made by the utility serviceman. A yearly check-up, however, is a wise precaution.

Chimneys should be inspected to see that the masonry is sound and that the mortar is holding properly. A faulty chimney can become a fire hazard.

At least once a year dust should be vacuumed out of hot air grills to permit clean circulation especially when they are located in the floor. If inflammable objects such as combs or plastic have been dropped in the hot air registers they should be removed

before the heating system is put into operation again.

The oil tank should be filled at the close of the heating season to prevent undue condensation inside the tank during the summer. Condensation gives rise to corrosion and sediment.

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Check Heating Equipment

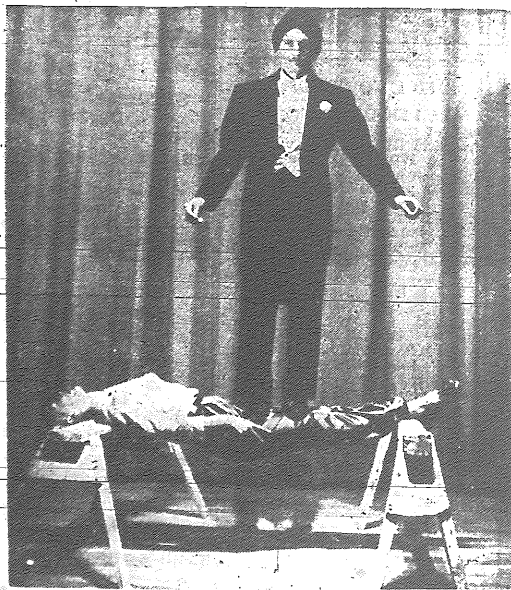
Hot water heating systems should be inspected every year by a qualified serviceman who will also check for corrosion, mineral deposits in the circulating system and leakages. The best time for this inspection is in the fall, sometime before the heating season begins.

Water should be left in the boilers during the inoperative period to prevent serious damage that might result from firing an empty boiler.

Electric motors that operate pumps, blowers, oil burners and coal feed screws should be examined. Worn out brushes should

The wise homeowner will attend to the seasonal check-up and cleaning of his furnace during the inoperative season to ensure that the heating system will operate efficiently when the cold weather sets in again.

On oil burning equipment, the electrodes, nozzles and both air and oil filters should be checked and any faulty parts repaired or replaced.

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cal suggestion that "anglers are insecure," James L. Tiller, of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, offers some holiday safety advice in SYLVA, the Department's bi-monthly magazine:

"If, as your wife will inform the neighbours, you go fishing and catch a cold, you may be lucky, at that," says Mr. Tiller. "Anglers often come home with fish-hook wounds, knife cuts, broken limbs, poison ivy and various other poisonings, diseases and injuries. Sometimes they step into a hole and never come home at all. This sort of thing annoys the insurance companies.

"As many anglers have learned to their shivering grief, shallow water can conceal holes and drop-off ledges. Therefore, anglers who can swim ought to carry waterproof matches so they can start a fire and ward off pneumonia. (Buy them prepared or dip your own in melted wax or paraffin). Anglers who can't swim needn't bother.

"A companion may pull you out of a hole, but he represents additional hazards. Unless he is highly proficient, be sure to stay far, far away when he is casting or swinging an axe. Overhanging branches seem to crowd the greenhorn. Lines snag, but axes can perform the most curious tricks — you could die laughing.

"Going wading. Many anglers seek their pleasure on the most

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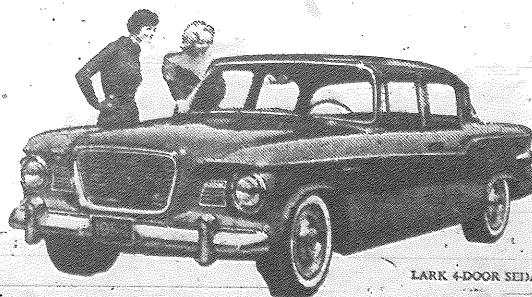

At this time of the summer season when numerous gas boats and pleasure craft are operating and company tug boats are towing pulpwood and logs, we respectfully solicit your co-operation in our endeavour to keep the lake clear of floating pulpwood, logs and dead heads. When gas boats run too close to a tow of pulp or logs, the swell has a tendency to wash out some of the pulp and logs, and it is for this reason that we ask you to:

- (1) When passing a tow, either being towed by tugs or in storage, keep at least 100 feet from boom. When it is not possible to do this, if in narrow, slow down till past the tow or boom.
- (2) When following a tow of pulp or logs, watch for any stray logs or pulpwood sticks which may have worked out from rear of tow.

If these precautions are observed by all boat owners, it will keep the lake free from floaters and will help eliminate damage to small craft.

**Care Of Heating
 System Saves
 Needless Expense**

All heating systems should be checked periodically during the operating season to ensure satisfactory service.

Soot and ash should be removed occasionally from all heating surfaces of the furnace, the smoke pipe, and, when necessary, the chimney. An excessive formation of soot may be an indication that the furnace dampers are not functioning properly, resulting in poor combustion.

The flue pipes leading from the furnace to the chimney should be inspected regularly. Pipes that are burned through or are becoming thin should be replaced as any leak will allow smoke and poisonous gases to escape through the house.

Oil-burning equipment with pot-type burners require regular attention to guard against the formation of an excessive amount of soot or carbon.

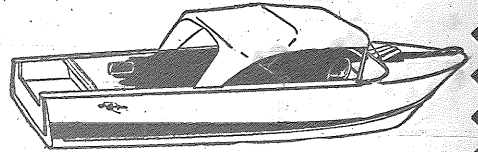
In coal and wood burning furnaces the ashes should never be allowed to accumulate in the ash pit, to the point where they reach the grates. Grates that become overheated through obstruction of air circulation may be damaged or ruined.

Repairs on gas burning equipment should never be attempted by the homeowner. If faulty operation of the mechanism is suspected, a serviceman should be called without delay. If necessary, the intake valve should be closed. The combustion chamber should be thoroughly aired to remove all free gas before attempting to rekindle the pilot light.

Filters in forced warm air furnaces should be inspected two or three times during a heating season, cleaned if necessary, or

changed if they are the disposable type. Dirty filters prevent the circulation of the warm air and result in reduced efficiency and higher fuel costs. Dust that collects on top of gravity warm air furnaces should be removed preferably by the vacuum method.

Home owners should also check humidifier troughs that refill automatically to ensure that the regulating mechanism is operating correctly. Scale or other obstructions which might interfere with the free movement of the regulator parts should be removed.

**125,000
Ont. Moose**

Ontario Department of Lands and Forests estimate the 1958-59 moose population in the province at 125,000.

From data compiled in a winter inventory by fish and wildlife division an increase in the number of animals is indicated in most parts of the province during the past 10 years.

Department pilots flew more than 384 hours to check the animals last winter.

Best estimates in the four provincial management regions show 22,500 moose in the northern area; 56,150 western; 22,950 central and 4,750 southern.

Based largely on trappers' reports, 700 moose were reported in the Geraldton district.

Flush Toilet Repairs Can Be Made By Owner

The flush tank toilet is standard in nearly all Canadian homes. Its mechanism and operation is simple and repairs can often be made by the homeowner himself.

Briefly, it consists of a float that rises or falls with the water level in the tank, closing or opening the water intake valve by means of a lever to which it is attached. A second lever, called the trip lever, is operated manually. It is connected to a rubber ball that seals the water outlet when down, and releases the flow of water into the bowl when raised. Suction holds the ball tight against the outlet when in the down position. An overflow pipe drains the excess water into the bowl after the proper level has been reached. Normally the intake valve is adjusted to close when the water reaches a point an inch or so below the top of the overflow drain.

A leak at either the intake valve or the outlet can be suspected if water is heard running through the pipes. The rubber ball in the outlet valve may not be making water-tight contact against the valve seat, or there may be some foreign matter adhering to the ball. Removing the sediment from the ball or seat is often all that is needed to ensure proper closing of the val-

ve. But if the ball is losing its resiliency or if the rubber is cracked or disintegrating, it will have to be replaced.

Another common failure which causes the outlet valve to leak is a bent or sticky lift wire. This will prevent the ball from falling all the way down or from sitting squarely on the valve opening. Straightening the wire or rotating the guide arm through which the wire is threaded will usually correct this condition. The tank will have to be emptied and the intake valve closed during this operation. Water can be prevented from entering the tank by maintaining the float in the "up" position.

If the trouble is with the intake valve, the float may be binding against the walls of the tank, or the float itself may be leaking or waterlogged. Binding can be corrected by bending the float arm and freeing the float. However, if the float is punctured or is no longer serviceable it will have to be replaced. When the water continually

Anglers Insecure Says

Insecure footing in the world - the slippery rocks and stones on water bottoms. In the consequent tumbles, they incur bruises and fevers and often, many miles from vehicular transportation, they break their expensive bones. As despairing insurers point out, this tends to spoil a man's holiday.

"Holidayers who fish from boats are also insecure as boats are apt to roll - pitch, or turn over. The formidable list of boating hazards is much too long to itemize here. Sudden storms may come, as a fatal surprise on lakes that seem small - until the boat capsizes. Either watch the weather or hope for a miracle.

"Nasty flash wounds can be prevented by using pliers to remove hooks from fish. For boaters, a landing net is a safety device. When using a knife, cut away from (not towards) your own anatomy. Be careful when chopping or, alternatively, wear safety shoes.

"If you bruise easily, don't camp under a dead branch. "If you want to enjoy life, avoid skunks and sunburn. As for the poison plants (ivy, oak and sumac) a moment of identification is worth a year's supply of lotion.

"Going fishing? Take along a frying pan in case you catch a fish, a box of tissue in case you catch a cold, and a kit containing First Aid textbook, flashlight, bandages, tape, band-aids, tweezers, spirits of ammonia, burn ointment and antiseptic - use it immediately on broken-skin wounds.
