Kenora All Set To Welcome Holiday Visitors

As well as seeing the sights, whether by car, boat or plane, many things have been planned for citizens and tourists alike.

Foremost event is the mammoth Rotary Picnic planned for Coney Island beach on Monday. Keewatin also has a full day planned with many activities slated to be held at the park.

Baseball games too have been planned with games Saturday to Monday for Little Leaguers and seniors alike.

It's a certainty that all who will be in this vicinity for the weekend will find much to their liking and enjoyment whether it be a lazy relaxing weekend or one spent taking in the planned events.

Solid Progress Noted By Phillips In Annual Report

Mr. Alexander Phillips, manager of the Northwestern Ontario Development Association today presented his fourth annual report to the directors of the Association at the Prince Arthur Hotel in Port Arthur. The 35 page summary of activity notes with satisfaction the completion of the seaway and the start of a terminal at the Lakehead for ocean-going vessels; expansion of newsprint capacity to above the million-ton per year mark; progress in developing hydro-electric and thermal-electric power equivalent to 1,000,000 horsepower; aerial exploration of 70,000 sq. miles to assist in mineral exploration; substantial progress on highways, including the Rainy Lake causeway; a population increase to 218,000 and building activity which topped the \$30-

000,000 mark; substantial and successful publicity programs including the publication and distribution of a 100-page book and solid growth of the natural gas and other established industries.

Mr. Phillips noted some "road-blocks to progress", including high freight rates; high production costs in the pulp and paper industry which is affecting its competitive position and the lack of roads and a seaway terminal. Looking ahead, the speaker saw no let-up in the pace of development, and cited numerous promising developments, several of potentially substantial size. The most exciting of these he noted was the "prospects of iron ore development. Mr. Phillips said: "A future verging on the spectacular looms in the iron ore industry. One of Canada's outstanding geologists has predicted that our area ultimately will produce 45,000 tons of ore, a development which will add more than 100,000 to our population."

Woman Rescued From Lake Near Argyle Dock

An unidentified woman today owes her life to Ken Howell of Winnipeg. At two-thirty this afternoon, Mr. Howell who was in the vicinity of the Argyle dock spotted the woman floating in the water some fifty yards from the dock. He dived into the water and towed her back to shore. Lou Fimet also of Winnipeg assisted in pulling her out of the water.

The men immediately applied artificial respiration pending the arrival of the town police and firemen. Dr. Leckie was also called and pronounced the woman well enough to be moved to hospital.

Spectators in the vicinity said that the woman had been seen loitering on the dock previously. At press time her name was not known. She is thought to be around 35 years old.

While the rescue was taking place a small fire was noticed burning on the dock. This was promptly put out before any damage resulted.

RED CROSS TO MAKE PRESENTATIONS TONITE

For nearly 800 children, (and adults), today marks the finale of a whole month of hard work at beaches throughout the Kenora-Keewatin area. Under the expert supervision of the Canadian Red Cross Society, these children have been engaged in swimming classes since the beginning of July.

Due to Kenora's location among so many beautiful, but dangerous lakes, the Kenora Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society has undertaken as its special responsibility, the teaching of basic and advanced swimming courses to any interested person. However, its work among the younger children of the area has been most significant.

This summer, under the capable direction of Miss Lois Rogiani, there was a record enrollment of approximately 800 pupils from almost every part of the Kenora District. Next year, and in succeeding years, the number is sure to increase.

To cope with this huge enrollment, and to provide more individual attention to each pupil, the swimming classes are held at three different locations in the local district.

Kenora children attend the classes held daily except Saturday and Sunday at Coney Island from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m. in the afternoon. Free and adequate transportation is provided to and from the island.

For the convenience of children living in the Rabbit Lake area, classes are held at the Lion's Club Dock on Rabbit Lake, also from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m.

Keewatin children attend classes at the Keewatin Park beach from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. in the morning.

At these classes, the children are given expert instruction and advice and may work and practice for such awards as the Beginner, Junior, Intermediate or higher degrees.

Unlike many similar organizations across the nation, the Kenora group this year featured special adult swimming classes at both Coney Island and Rabbit Lake. In these classes, adults who are unable to swim can undergo lessons leading to the Beginner, Junior and higher awards. Judging from reports of both teach-

ers and pupils, these popular classes will undoubtedly be held in succeeding years.

However, the pupils are not the only ones who are subject to strict tests of knowledge and ability in the water. This year, as in the past, all of the Instructors and Leaders have been working on Red Cross and Royal Life-Saving examinations.

In an effort to improve both themselves and their classes, these devoted young people, (Continued on Page 14)

Even swimming classes fulfill the Red Cross motto—"Help us to help others."

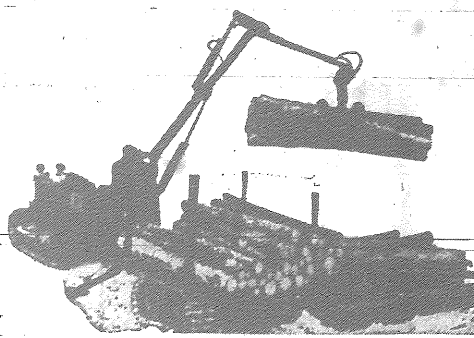
United Church Sets Edmonton As Site 19th Council Meet

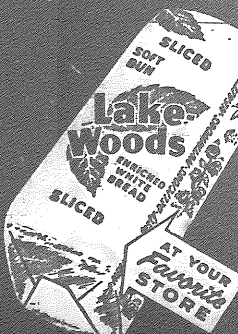

Falls Taxpayers To Vote On Bond Issue For School

International Falls— Tuesday, Oct. 6, has been set as the date for a special school bond election when residents of District 361 will vote on the question of funds for a new high school building in the Falls.

In setting the date of the election, members of the board of education did not definitely set a figure for the bond issue. A citizens' committee that studied the situation has recommended a bond issue of approximately \$1,800,000—the saving to be made by revising the building plans.

THE BOARD instructed the architects to prepare new sketches embodying the major suggestions of the citizens committee, so far as they are practicable. The major recommendations of the citizens committee, submitted to the board two weeks ago, were some reduction in the size of the building, plus a reduction in the size of the bond issue.

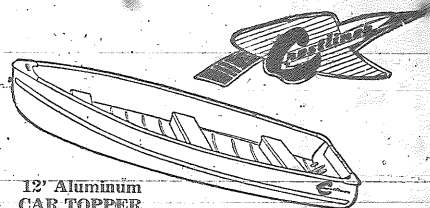
Voters in March, 1958, turned down a \$2,000,000 bond issue for the construction of a new high school building.

IN FEBRUARY of this year a 30-member citizens committee was named to study the school situation. After four months of weekly meetings to review the problem the committee submitted a detailed report to the board, in which they fundamentally approved the original school plans, except for some suggested building revisions with an eye to reducing cost of the project.

The committee report, plus recommendations and suggestions

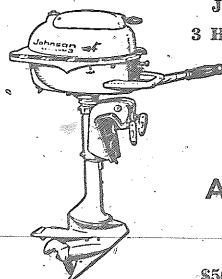
by high school teachers, were re-board last evening, and at that time were directed to prepare together with Duluth Architects A. R. Melander and John Peck. The architects also met with the
