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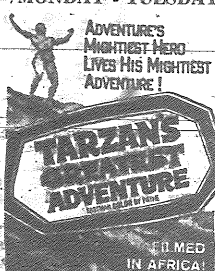

Goldie's Business Manager, Terry Hind, called us the other day to tell us Max Patkin, baseball's funniest clown will appear at the Winnipeg Stadium as a special added attraction when the Goldie's play the Minot-Marlards at 8.00 p.m. on Wednesday night.

Patkin is the diamond's dizziest. He is a natural comic, mimic and contortionist, who will panic the fans as he goes through his laugh provoking antics. Billed as the funniest man in the game, he will exceed his advance notices as he struts around the field doing his stunts and double jointed routines.

His ability to draw customers into ball parks was brought out by Bill Veck, who first hired him to "clown" for the Cleveland Indians and again signed him as a Coach when he took over the St. Louis Browns.

Patkin's pantomime was so hilarious that radio and television sportscasters featured his act when they covered the Browns games. Newspapers throughout the American League wrote rave notices about him, proclaiming Max the Clown Prince of Baseball.

Patkin became a clown by accident, when he turned to tomfoolery after throwing his arm "out" pitching for the Wilkes-Barre team of the Eastern League. The then Cleveland manager, Lou Boudreau, caught his act in an exhibition game and liked it so much that he prompted owner Bill Veck to sign a contract. His success was instantaneous and the turnstiles clicked merrily. Loose-jointed and crane-necked, Max continually comes up with new and funnier routines.

Patkin is constantly entering new entertainment fields and over 1,000,000 people saw him in sportsman's shows throughout the U.S.A. He was in a television show with Leo Durocher and is making a new series of TV show. These will make him more popular and a bigger drawing card. There will be NO game Thursday August 6th due to the Football Exhibition between Hamilton and the Blue Bombers but Baseball resumes on Friday, August 7th when the Aberdeen Pheasants open a 3 game series at 8.00 p.m. The Pheasants and the Goldie's also meet in a split double-header on Saturday with games at 2.00 p.m. and 8.00 p.m.

Attendance for the 36 gates played to date is 7,164, almost 3,000 ahead of the record attendance year in 1957 when the Goldie's drew 108,000 paid admissions.

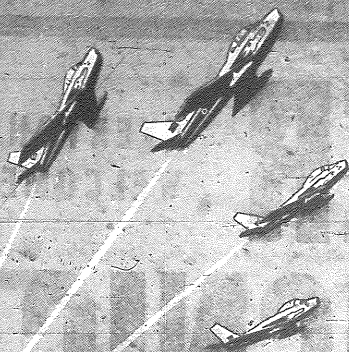

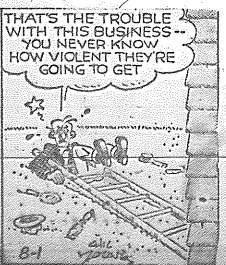

Garden Competition Is Open To All

first and second placed competitors in each class - a total of about \$125.00. However, the main attraction is the honour of winning, and the pride and satisfaction of having an attractive home. Also there is the Drewery Trophy.

Q. What is that? A special award?

A. Yes. The George Drewery Cup is an annual trophy awarded to the competitor who has the most points in any one section. The attractive thing about this award is that it can be won by anyone entering the competition from the most professional gardener to the newest novice.

Q. How is that arranged?

A. Well, the competition is divided into 4 main sections, Home Grounds, Lawns, Flower Gardens and Vegetable Gardens, these are again divided into open amateur and novice classes, with further divisions into large and small lots. Each section is judged on 100 points, and the competitor who has the highest number of points wins the George Drewery Cup. Usually the winner is in the Home Grounds Section or Flowerers, but an outstanding Lawn or Vegetable Garden could easily win this coveted trophy.

Q. What are points awarded for?

A. In the Home Grounds the arrangement or layout, variety of material, appearance, are each awarded 15 points, and condition and cultivation 20 points each. Actually all the conditions of the competition are set out in the local newspapers. They are also on pages 23 and 24 of the Fair Book and Prize List. By the way, there are a few copies of this Fair Book still available, if any-

one would like one.

Q. I see in the Fair Book that this Competition is scheduled for the period July 24th to 27th. Is there any special reason for the delay this year?

A. Yes. At a recent meeting there was considerable discussion about the time for holding the judging. Most people felt that with all the rain we had in June and early July the gardens were two to three weeks behind. And a date of August 13th was set. But with the recent hot spell they (Continued on Page 10)

Several Methods To Unplug Drains

Waste matter that tends to clog drains, especially material that will not dissolve in water, should never be disposed of through the drainage system of a house. Accumulations of grease, for example, will slow down and sometimes block the passage of waste water.

Plugged or sluggish drains can often be freed simply by using a plunger or force cup. In some cases, however, it may be necessary to employ other methods such as chemicals or mechanical devices.

Lye, the chemical generally used to clean out grease sediment and other obstructions in clogged drains, should be used only when proper precautions are taken. If a lye solution comes into contact with the body, especially the eyes, serious injury can result. Since the chemical is a caustic substance, clothes should also be protected against splashing. However, when instructions for their use are followed carefully, lye and other such chemi-

cals are both safe and effective for cleaning out clogged drains, especially in the case of an accumulation of grease.

When more persistent obstructions are met, and chemical flushing compounds prove ineffective, it may be necessary to use a "snake". This is a wire coil spring auger which can reach a considerable distance down the drainpipe chewing away at the obstruction by means of a metal bit attached to the end. Some types are operated by hand, others by means of a mo-

tor. Although these types are used mainly by plumbers, simple, inexpensive "snakes" suitable for homeowners, are available.

A newer method of opening clogged drains involves the use of an explosive charge or "gun". Like the motor driven "snake", this device is used mostly by plumbers who are familiar with its operation.

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
