TOWN FATHERS DEAL WITH ROUTINE AGENDA

Last night's regular meeting of the town council was one of the shortest meetings to be held this year with town fathers dealing with purely routine matters in record time.

Prior to regular business, Mr. E. J. Perrault, 216-Second Street North, addressed council. Mr. Perrault advised that recently on two separate occasions, his basement had been flooded due to the backing up of the main sewer which runs diagonally across his property and he proposes to submit a bill to the town for retreating damage. He pointed out that the sewer main was inadequate to handle heavy rains and asked that the condition be rectified.

Mr. Perrault was advised by Mayor Ratuski that the matter would be investigated immediately and a remedy sought for the trouble.

The Kenora-Keewatin District High School Board be notified concerning the raising of two manholes in the area known as the "Fond" that following a meeting of representatives from both bodies and an inspection of the area in question, that Council has agreed to raising the elevation of the top of the manhole

Golden Hawk Pilot Killed At Calgary

A pilot of Canada's famous RCAF Golden Hawks was instantly killed Monday evening when his Sabre Jet crashed near Calgary. The jet, piloted by twenty-five year old Flight Lieutenant P. J. Kerr of Welland, Ontario, crashed into a field after colliding in mid-air with a light plane. The two Americans in the civilian plane were also killed.

The accident occurred as both the jet and the small plane were preparing to land at Calgary's McCall airfield. It is reported that the Sabre overshot the runway on its first approach, pulled up and was preparing for another landing when the accident happened.

The Golden Hawks were organized to take part in the activities celebrating the Golden Anniversary of Flight in Canada as well as the RCAF's own 35th Anniversary, the Golden Hawks in their gold, red and white Sabre jets, are one of the few Canadian aerobatic teams to perform on a nation-wide basis since the famed "Siskins" toured the country in connection with the Trans-Canada Air Pageant of 1931.

Formation aerobatics have long been a part of military flying and teams such as the U.S. Navy's Blue Angels and the Royal Air Force's Black Knights are world famous. Now joining this select group of precision-perfect pilots are the RCAF's Golden Hawks.

Bestor's request to purchase 10 feet of lot 51, Plan M40 for the purpose of building a garage or car port.

Municipal accounts of \$29,436.54 and Utility-Accounts of \$18,759.99 were authorized paid. Also

J. N. Davidson Is Attending National Meeting

Rotarians Hear About Purchasing Stocks and Bonds

The important business of purchasing stocks and bonds is a combination of obtaining the best advice and using sound judgment. Don Knight, a member of the Investment firm of Wood, Gundy and Company, told members of the Kenora Rotary Club at their regular meeting on Monday. The speaker also outlined the history of the investment business, and surveyed present conditions.

President T. A. O'Flaherty was in the chair, and twenty visiting Rotarians were welcomed, seven from Canadian clubs and twenty one from U.S. Clubs. Attendance this week was 90.91% and last week, 98.18%.

Introduced by the president, Mr. Knight, a resident partner of the company, paid warm tribute to this area and its bright future. Celebrities from all walks of life spent their summer holidays on the lake, and he could see this year more boats than ever before.

Wood, Gundy and Company had started in business with two men and a girl in 1905 and today has offices in England, New York and twelve other centres in Canada. In the period 1911-1912 Canada could not raise sufficient money for development, and British capital came to the rescue and pioneered industrial development. After the first world war, English sources were diverted elsewhere and United States capital entered the Canadian market.

Bonds and shares were a fascinating business, Mr. Knight stated, and it went back to early Venetian times, and the formation of the Bank of England by a Scotchman, William Paterson in 1690, when one million shares had been sold carrying 8%. He had recently attended the two hundred and ninth annual meeting of the Hudson's Bay Company, the oldest continuing structure in the world, except for a Swedish bank.

British government bonds, those of the United States and Canadian bonds were sound investments, and the British government bonds were the longest

"They sure have. In fact, so many people have come in to ask the same question, you've asked me to think of something for them some of the credit for the success I've had. They all bought cups of coffee, ate a meal, and some of them are regular customers. I had meeting with those people, and some day, maybe, I'll get out to see the town they all tell me about. It must be a real nice place. In the mean time, I'm glad I chose such a nice name."

name for my place'. 'Famous' is the word he used; by that time, he was anxious to finish his day's work so I didn't detain him further. If I had, I might have mentioned to him that his restaurant, at one time, was called the "Cole Porter" restaurant!

Thursday sees the opening of the Western Interprovincial Football Unions 1959 schedule.

Before the season gets underway the experts have already conceded the top spots to the 1958 Grey Cup Champion Winnipeg Blue Bombers and the Edmonton Eskimos, although not many think Edmonton can upset the Grant machine.

The third and last playoff spot is the one in doubt. The other three teams are all contenders of this spot.

Winnipeg opens their season on the road playing at Empire Stadium on Thursday, Friday in Regina, the second game of the season see the Roughriders' hosting the Calgary Stampeders.

On Monday night Winnipeg moves home to meet the Stampede and the Lions roar into the Eskimo camp.

Last year the Stampeders were squeezed out of the last playoff spot by the Saskatchewan Roughriders. The cowboys got off to a good start last year but fell badly. The Lions lost their first ten ball games last season, and finished last.

Winnipeg has done the least reorganizing. Quarterbacks Jim Van Pelt and Kenny Ploen backs Leo Lewis, Charlie Sheppard and John Varone, Canadian stars Ron Latourelle and Gerry James, out with a broken leg most of last season, all are returning. Most notable Bomber newcomers are tackle Fred Cole of Maryland and halfback Carver Shannon from Southern Illinois.

Saskatchewan is in a state of

reorganization. There are three quarterbacks in camp, with the most likely prospect, George Herring, acquired from British Columbia. Most impressive new halfback is Neil Worden, who is big and fast. The team still has last year's WIFU scoring champ Jack Hill in the backfield. The Roughrider line is better than last year.

The Lions are determined to do better this year. They pin their hopes on quarterback Randy Duncan, halfback Willie Fleming, a more experienced line and a tough training period.

Stampeders, who usually start fast, are in excellent pre-season shape. Coach Otis Douglas, has cut his imports to 16, the lowest number on hand of any club. He says his players are the best he's had in three seasons. Edmonton still has Jackie Parker and has strengthened its punting and halfback positions and hopes to tighten the end and tackle slots.

DUCKS BETTER MESSAGE CARRIERS

Washington.—You've heard all these arguments about the relative merits of various missiles.

Now comes another question: Was the army wrong all along in using pigeons as message carriers?

At the annual convention of the Association of the United States Army Col. Robert Partridge of the continental command told this story:

In 1954 the army-mustered out

its last message-carrying pigeon. It had used those birds for a century or more.

Just as this happened, a college professor sent the army an analysis proving that ducks, not pigeons, would have made better message carriers. The professor said ducks could fly farther, had a better homing instinct than pigeons.

And furthermore there would have been a logistic advantage, said the professor.

Ducks consume less seed per mile flown than pigeons.
