DRYDEN CHAMBER SEEKS QUICK END TO HAZARDOUS HIGHWAY CONDITIONS

DRYDEN — The Dryden District Chamber of Commerce is strongly recommending to the Ontario Department of Highways that sections of the Trans-Canada Highway almost completed and ready for paving be maintained, graded and dust controlled.

"These conditions" will result in some fatalities unless immediate action is taken," the Chamber pointed out in a recent wire to Hon. Fred Cass, minister of highways.

Various communiques from the Chamber to the highways department and the replies were read by Tom Spence, Chamber highways chairman, at a meeting of the executive Monday evening.

Send Wire

The exchange started following dispatch of this wire by the Chamber of Commerce July 28:

"Road conditions from Manitoba border to the Lakehead are absolutely deplorable. Stop. Realize new contracts require discomfort to traveller. However, sections almost completed and ready for paving not being maintained, graded or dust controlled and dust conditions will result in some fatalities unless immediate action is taken. Stop. Delegates to Toronto last winter from all associated Chambers were assured that patrol would be made to assure the above would not happen. Stop. All businesses definitely suffering and season half

gone. Stop. All gravel sections require daily grading. Immediate action is imperative."

Chamber president Colin Proudfoot followed up the wire with a letter to the minister of highways, part of which reads as follows:

"People as far away as the Middle West are being warned not to take Number 17 east of Winnipeg but to go through the States.

Shun Northwestern Ontario The Motor League in Winnipeg and other Bureaux are telling the travelling public to shun Northwestern Ontario.

"Honourable Sir, it is not only this year that we will have to suffer. It may take years to eradicate the stigma that has been placed on our transportation system, not to say anything about loss of revenue."

"The livelihood of a great many people depends on this artery. We again ask that this matter be taken seriously and remedied with all dispatch."

The Minister of highways replied as follows:

"The recent wire from your Chamber of Commerce in connection with the roads under construction in your area is acknowledged. I have issued information that my officials in this area check into this at once. However, the public must realize that the construction of good highways does entail a certain amount of inconvenience to them which inconvenience, we believe, we have reduced to a minimum not only in Northwestern Ontario but throughout our Province."

Following receipt of Mr. Cass's letter, Mr. Spence wrote the following letter:

"Thanks for your letter in reply to the wire sent by the Dryden District Chamber of Commerce dated July 30."

"If you will reread the wire sent to you by the Chamber it referred to the fact that we expect discomfort and inconvenience on new construction sections. There is approximately 17 miles east of Dryden actually waiting for paving last fall and this stretch has not been maintained or dust controlled the way it should have been."

"I realize fully the easiest thing our Chamber can do is criticize. However, we have found in this District no severe criticism on roads either from Canadian or American vacationers if they see some effort being made on the bad stretches to put them in driveable condition. We, like yourself, are looking forward to

the day when we will put pressure on you and your department for a road up to Hudson Bay or some other remote area rather than keep pressing for our Trans-Canada Highway."

"From correspondence received here in Dryden from other Chambers: Long Lac, Nipigon, the Lakehead, Kenora, and other municipalities not on the Trans-Canada whose summer existence relies on tourist business (Sioux Lookout, Hudson, Ear Falls, and Red Lake) that you are perhaps receiving complaints on road conditions. The stretch of road between the Lakehead through Dryden and Kenora to Winnipeg is one of the most internationally important roads on the American continent today, particularly now the Seaway is a fact. We feel the above is quite familiar to you but we also feel you are letting us down on maintenance, dust control on existing highways and keeping a clear right-of-way and good detours on new construction areas."

"You are the only man who can insure that we get action and with your reputation for following through we expect action P. D. Q."

And there the matter rests.

Slightly more than one hundred amateur golfers with handicaps of 13 and under and about twelve leading Professionals from Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario will be entered in this popular tournament. Last year's Professional and Amateur winners, Ralph Allen, Kenora and Bill Badiuk of Fort Frances will be on-hand to defend their titles. Professional prize money will total \$300.00 with \$150.00 going to the first place winner. Merchandise prizes will be awarded to winners and runners up of all six flights in the amateur class.

Entertainment and a Dance will take place at the clubhouse on Saturday evening September 5th and all entrants will have free use of the course on the following Sunday. The official Tournament Draw will appear in the Press about September third.

Royal Tour Gifts Cargo Of "Junk"

London — Under a headline "From Canada—a Cargo of Royal Junk," the London Daily Sketch today reported that three great crates of gifts, "many of them useless," are on their way to Buckingham Palace.

Columnist Simon Ward said the gifts were given to the Queen and Prince Philip during the Royal Tour of Canada. He continued:

"The never-ending stream of Royal Tour gifts is a constant headache to the Queen's staff, a member of the royal household said.

"Most of the gifts will be carefully inventoried and ticketed and kept in the temperature-controlled basement of Buckingham Palace.

"When the right opportunity arrives some of them will be quietly and discreetly given to museums."

"The Canadian tour produced a particularly mixed bag of

gifts: A pair of snowshoes, a chunk of iron ore, a painting of a power station, two silver dollars, enough loyal addresses of welcome to paper a whole wing of Buckingham Palace and several "dull, weighty, leatherbound histories" of various corners of Canada."

Dryden Baseball Player Injured In Car Crash

An all-star outfielder with the Dryden Red Sox, Hugh Norman, 22, was injured Tuesday night when his automobile rolled on the Trans-Canada Highway east of Wabigoon. Norman was returning from a ball game at Sioux Lookout along with Don West, Bob Peterka, and Bob McLelland. He is in Dryden District General Hospital suffering from cuts and bruises and is expected to be hospitalized for a round a week.

The accident occurred around 11 p.m.

Norman's automobile was badly wrecked in the mishap.

Mrs. Hortense Desautel of St. Boniface, Man. is in Dryden District General Hospital suffering from a lacerated scalp and shock following an accident west of Vermilion Bay Monday morning. Mrs. Desautel's automobile is reported to have rolled on a stretch of highway being rebuilt in the area.

Legion Takes First Win In Baseball Semi-Finals

"Who said we're finished," said Lloyd Warner, manager of the Kenora Legion, as they defeated the Keewatin Indians nine to four to take their first win of the Kenora District Baseball League semi-finals. Keewatin now leads the best of seven series three to one. Next game in the series is scheduled for Central Park Sunday 2:30 p.m.

Keewatin took a four to three lead in their half of the third inning, but it was brief, as Bob Deke lead off batter for the Legion in the top of the fourth, hit a long home run to tie the score. Then with two out and two on, shortstop Brian Smith connected for another roundtripper, and Kenora ended the inning with a seven to four lead. They scored two more in the top of the ninth.

Gary Beyko got his first win of the playoffs giving up seven hits. Jimmy Whyte took the loss, he also gave up seven hits. Legion committed three errors. Keewatin two. Seventeen men were stranded, seven for Kenora, ten for Keewatin.

Next game is Sunday afternoon in Kenora.

It looks like Keewatin will start Pat Angers in an effort to wrap up the series. Just who will go for Kenora, remains a mystery, but it could be a real surprise.

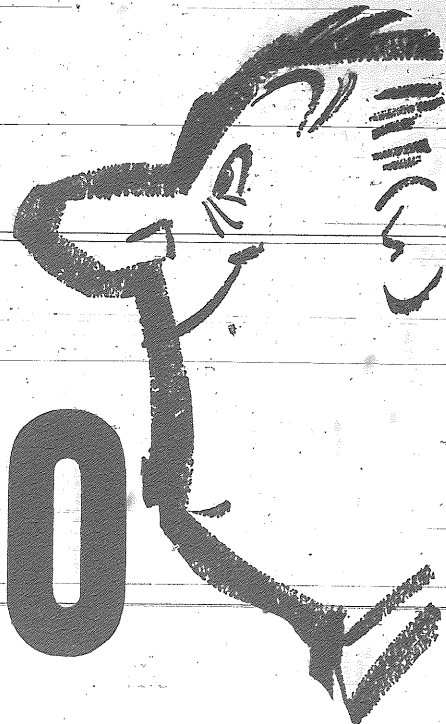

A Message For Our Day

THE KENORA MINISTERIAL ASSOC.

Before long the Sunday Schools of congregations which do not run through the Holiday season will be organizing classes once again and preparing for the year's work. There are some Sunday schools that continue uninterrupted through the full year. But even with these latter many pupils have been away from home for at least part of the summer and thus away from their regular class.

This is an appropriate time then for parents and children to ask themselves anew about their church life, and especially about the part the Sunday School should play in their lives.

For most families it can be taken for granted that they know the necessity and appreciate the privilege of having children faithfully taught the things of their faith and the way of living which comes down to us by the Gospel as that through which we may follow and please God. Such homes will be planning to enroll youngsters in Sunday School on the first day of the new term.

But there are many in our community who just never get around to doing that. This, in many cases, may be laid at the feet of the difficulty of getting

the children ready and off to church, Sunday by Sunday. Especially when they are smaller little people, they can't be expected to go by themselves.

Just here the Sunday School officer would want to say a word and make it known that there is a vast difference in holding the interest of a child who is "sent" and a child who is "brought" by someone from the home. Especially if Mom or Dad can accompany their children, the children are convinced that this is something right and proper for them to do. It is where there is no example set by parents in the home that children at a very tender age begin to feel that they are getting too old for that sort of thing.

But perhaps more fathers could provide the escort for their children. If they did, most of our Sunday schools would not only welcome the Home support thus given the work, but in many cases could readily find a job within the capacity of many such fathers. More men in positions of leadership and helpful service would strengthen nearly every one of our Sunday Schools.

In other cases of course mother would have the best opportunity of giving help, and seeing to her children. In which case, some, though not all, (depending on the nature of Dad's occupation), fathers could keep the home fires going and let Mom free to "get out" for a change while the infants got a Fathers Loving Care at home, and the other children the pride of having "my Mom come with me".

But in any case, it is getting near the time to think of the importance of this Christian Education in the life of parents and children. A little planning now will strengthen this most needed privilege for todays children, tomorrows citizens. And in our kind of world, what is more needed than a new Faith, a new

insight into the way by which we may come into a new Life?
