At that, the Indians outthit the Sox by a 10-3 margin but the erstwhile Indian, Luke Bouchard scattered the ten Keewatin hits rather effectively as he was exceptionally rough in the clutch.

The Sox jumped on the scoreboard in rather handy fashion in the first frame taking advantage of Gerry Curle's wildness, something they couldn't do in the series opener. Curle walked Salonen and Darcis in the initial frame and then saw Lorne McDonald hit a one-one pitch far over the right field fence at the 335 foot mark. This was the first home run of the series and shot the Sox into a 3-0 lead.

A pair of singles and a passed ball gave the Indians one run back in the second. With one out,

Search And Rescue Unit Aid In Finding Missing Man

Late Friday night the O.P.P. at Kenora received a report of a man missing from Johnson's Tourist Camp on the East shore of Lake of Two Mountains, approximately 20 miles West of Kenora, after Mr. D. Ross' of Winnipeg, failed to return to camp from an exploration trip to a small lake in the vicinity.

After investigation by Constable Bergman of the local detachment, the Bush Search and Rescue Unit of Kenora were contacted and arrangements for a search started. Saturday morning the search got under way and at approximately 12 noon the missing man was contacted about a mile South of Lake of Two Mountains, by a member of the Bush Search and Rescue Unit, Mr. Ted Wilson, son-in-law of Mr. Ross was with the search party when contact was made.

On his return to camp, Mr. Ross stated, that on his return trip from the inland lake he had visited, he had veered off the trail he was following to allow a mother bear with cubs, the right of way. When attempting to return to the trail in a swamp he became confused in his direction and was forced to spend the night in the weeds.

In the morning he was attempting to find his way back to camp when he heard the whistles of the search party and was soon

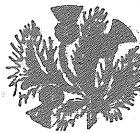

pitching department. Manager Laurie Brady yanking Bob McLelland, who had done a masterful job of holding the usually heavy-hitting Indians in check, and going with Luke Bouchard. Luke's first pitch to Ralph Smith found the Indian second sacker taking a healthy cut but fouling the ball off. The second pitch was high and away, the toughest one in the book to bunt safely, but Smith did just that pushing a perfect squeeze bunt down between the mound and the first baseline. Morgan scored easily to end the game.

The game, which took less than two hours to complete was one of the season's finest with the large crowd giving players of both teams well-deserved applause for the many fine plays turned in.

Pat Angers, who pitched an exceptionally good game allowing but two hits, and none at all until the seventh inning, used but nine pitches to retire the side in the opening stanza. Then his mates went to work and counted a pair of mighty valuable runs. Johnson worked McLelland for a walk, and then Ralph Smith punched a ground rule double through the fence in left field. Ortlieb struck out but a passed ball allowed Johnson to score and sent Smith to third. With Jorgenson at bat, McLelland balked allowing Smith to score. Jorgenson then flied out to centrefield and Gerry Curle fanned to end the inning.

That was the only serious scoring threat until the sixth inning with both pitchers working very smoothly. In the Dryden sixth, McLelland grounded out to start things, but Cliff Robertson was safe when Jackie Salmon drop-

ped his fly after a very hard run in right field. Robertson came all the way in to score when Angers threw Terry Brown's grounder away as he tried to retire him at first. Dyck and Darcis went out to end the inning.

In the Dryden seventh, the visitors assumed the lead for the first time in the series. Peterka flied to Salmon to open the activities, then McDonald drew his second full count base on balls. He went to second when Harpell also worked Angers for a free pass. Ed Wolanin's sharp single to left field scored McDonald and sent Harpell to third and Wolanin continued on to second on the throw-in. This was the first hit of the game for the

Sox. Harpell scored to send the Sox into a 3-2 lead when McLelland's sacrifice fly went to Jorgenson in moderately deep centrefield. At that a better throw might have had Harpell at the plate, the play was that close.

The Indians came back in their half of the seventh and aided by a hole in left field counted the equalizer. Whyte grounded out to Harpell on the first pitch, but Angers smacked a three-two pitch through the box for his second hit. Morgan then lined one to left field which hit a hole and bounced over the shoulder of the crouching Len Dyck allowing the speeding Angers to come all the way. Salmon grounded out and Johnson watched a third strike float by.

Terry Brown worked Angers for a walk to open the eighth and when Len Dyck beat out a hit to the mound, the Sox had runners on first and second with none out. Disdaining the bunt, which was later to beat them, the Sox went for the long ball and saw Bob Darcis pop up to Ortlieb, then saw the runners advance anyway as Angers threw wildly to second trying to pick off Brown. Peterka grounded to Angers who held Brown on third and McDonald did likewise.

McLelland was sailing along at this point retiring the Indians in the eighth and ninth frames on a total of only thirteen pitches. Then came the fateful tenth inning and the crusher.

In taking the loss, young McLelland scattered six Indian hits fairly well. He walked only three and fanned four. Angers meanwhile allowed but two hits, fanned six and walked a like number.

Angers helped his own cause with two hits while Morgan and Smith also had a pair each.

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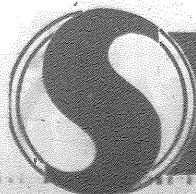

**DOVES GIVING
MISSILE MEN
'BIG TROUBLE'**

Alamogordo, N.M.—Doves perched on the rails of the 35,000-foot high speed captive missile test track at this air force research centre, are fouling up operations.

They may weigh almost nothing but they pack a terrific punch when a rocket test sled hits them.

The water-filled concrete trough between the rails, used to brake test sleds to a stop, apparently draws the birds from the surrounding desert.

They perch on the rails, and knock holes in quarter-inch-thick steel, as sleds hurtle down on them at supersonic speed.

This is a phenomenon of high velocity impact.

"It's one of the zaniest, least expected problems we've ever faced," said Lt. Col. Donald Vleck (pronounced vul-check), test track chief.

The birds never even hear our faster-than-sound sleds. The army is consulting an ornithologist to find a solution.

Said the oldest person in St. Catharines to receive the Salk vaccine: "It didn't hurt a bit."

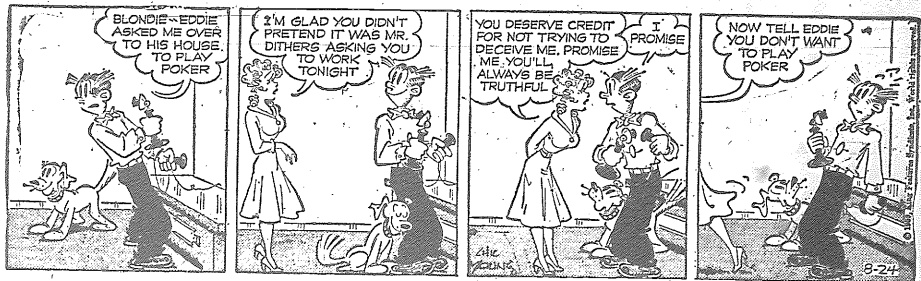

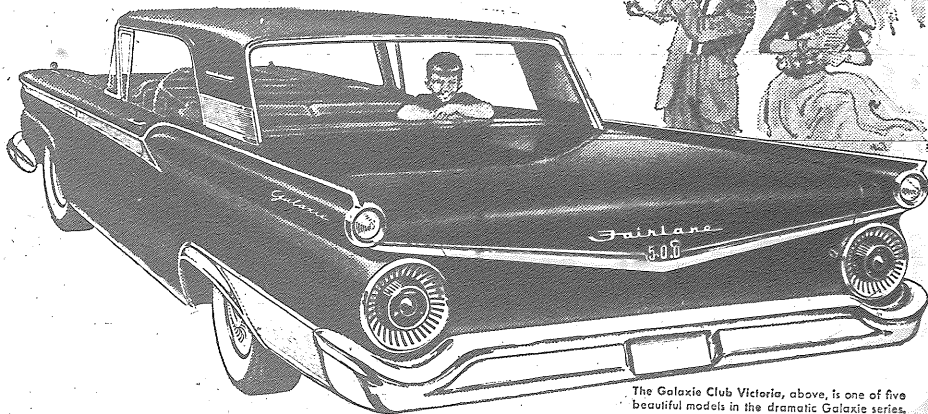

KITCHEN CLASSICS

Today's recipe for a Pineapple Coffee Cake is an ideal choice for the brunch menu, or for the afternoon kaffee klatch. The moist yeast dough is baked over a tasty, crushed pineapple mixture. Just before serving, it is turned over to show the sunny glaze of pineapple on top. Rings of pineapple and maraschino cherries may also be used to decorate the baked cake. Although it is especially delicious served warm the cake makes a tempting cold snack too. Since the recipe makes two cakes, it would be a good idea to serve on the day they are made and wrap up the other cake for freezing.

- PINEAPPLE COFFEE CAKE.**
 Yield - 2 coffee cakes
 ½ cup lukewarm water
 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
 1 envelope active dry yeast
 ½ cup milk
 ½ cup granulated sugar
 1½ teaspoons salt
 ½ cup shortening
 1 can (20 ounces) crushed pineapple
 1 well-beaten egg

- ½ teaspoon vanilla
 4 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour
 ¼ cup butter or margarine, melted
 ¼ cup lightly-packed brown sugar
 Measure lukewarm water into a large bowl; stir in the 1 teaspoon granulated sugar. Sprinkle with yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, then stir well.

Meantime, scald milk; stir in the ½ cup granulated sugar, salt, shortening and ½ cup syrup drained from pineapple. Add milk mixture to dissolved yeast along with well-beaten egg and vanilla. Stir in 2 cups of the flour and beat until smooth and elastic. Work in sufficient additional flour to make a soft dough - about 2 cups more. Turn out on floured board or canvas and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 1½ hours.

Meantime, grease two 8-inch square cake pans. Combine melted butter or margarine and brown sugar. Drain pineapple well and add to brown sugar mixture; spread in prepared pans. Punch down dough. Turn out on lightly-floured board or canvas and knead until smooth. Divide dough into 2 equal portions and roll out each portion into an 8-inch square. Place one square in each prepared pan. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 45 minutes. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 deg. F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Serve warm with butter or margarine.

 1 cup fine cubes of bread, toasted
 2 tablespoons garlic oil
 3 cups torn lettuce
 3 cups small, tender, washed spinach leaves
 1-¾ teaspoons salt
 ¼ teaspoon dry mustard
 A generous grating of fresh black pepper
 3 tablespoons wine vinegar

- 6 tablespoons olive oil
 1 whole egg, in shell
 1 cup canned salmon, drained and flaked
 Pour the two tablespoons garlic oil over toasted bread cubes. Toss. Place lettuce and spinach leaves in wooden salad bowl. Sprinkle on top the salt, mustard and pepper. Pour vinegar and six tablespoons olive oil on top. Cook

egg gently in simmering water 1-½ minutes; drop contents from shell onto ingredients in bowl. Add croutons. Toss and mix well. Add salmon and toss once more lightly. Serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.

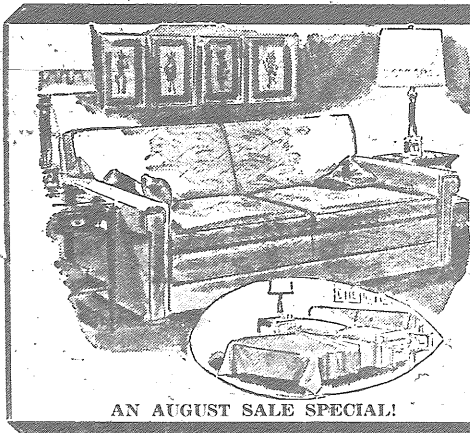


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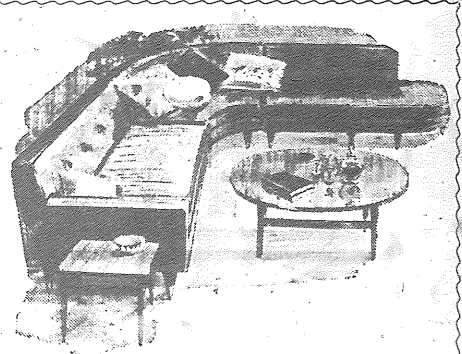
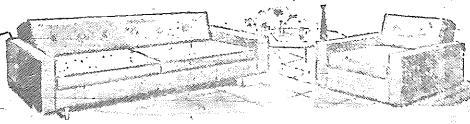

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Strand Of Wire Is Man's Lifeline

Harrisburg, Pa. - Earl Croumlick's lifeline is a thin strand of insulated wire.

His heart beats at one end. At the other is a little shock box. The box houses electric batteries which send impulses along the wire to the heart. This helps the heart to keep up a normal beat.

Without the electronic box - no bigger than a cigaret package and worn on a strap around the neck - Croumlick, 65, probably would die. So say his doctors.

Surgeons placed the wire, made of a special alloy, in Croumlick's heart muscle at Harrisburg Hospital two weeks ago, attaching the free end of it to the stimulator, which science recently developed.
