Construction Forges Ahead At Causeway Site

A new phase in construction of the impressive Rainy Lake causeway has begun as the Atlas Construction (Toronto) Company tackles the transporting and erecting of thousands of tons of girders, pier caps and fillings.

A sturdy tug, the "Salta," and steel barges that are being assembled on the waterfront near J. A. Mathieu's old sawmill will carry the tremendous loads—175 girders, each weighing 27 to 45 tons, more than 80 pier caps weighing 61 tons apiece, and 37 carloads of big steel pipe that will be welded together for the piling.

The girders and pier caps are being built at a rapid rate on the lake's edge near the Indian school by the C. A. Pitts Construction Company. One of their engineers, Bob Shorter, declared this operation is the largest pre-stressing concrete job underway in the British Commonwealth today.

To load the giant components of the causeway onto the barges, the Atlas Company will have to build a trestle from the Pitts storage site. The trestle, it was learn-

ed, will be left on the site after the job ends for use by anybody interested.

90 men are busy on the spectacular job of prefabricating the girders and pier caps, and 25 or more employed on the start of the Atlas job. Capt. Bill Martin of O-M "Hallett" fame is at work supervising assembly of the Atlas barges.

Mr. Noden reported that elsewhere on the route of the Fort Frances-Atikokan highway, there is plenty going on too. The Boyle Brothers Company was soil testing for the road bed at Windy Point on Rainy Lake and 25 surveyors were active at Glenorchy. The surveyors, it was learned, planned to make their next base at Mine Centre.

New Dickenson Pours Brick 1,000

On August 17, New Dickenson Gold Mines poured their 1000th gold brick, representing 10 years of mill operation and \$20,000,000 in gold bullion.

Representatives for the mines in this area attending the event were P. J. McCarthy, manager of McKenzie Red Lake Gold Mines; J. Christolm, general manager of Campbell Red Lake Mines Ltd.; Brock Tribble, Manager of H. G. Young Mines; J. E. J. Fahlgren manager of Cochenour Willans Gold Mines; and E. G. Crayston, general manager of Madsen Red Lake Gold Mines Ltd.

General Manager F. Bell announced, after the pouring had been completed that the 1000th brick would be later melted down and poured into small gold bars which would be sold to the Bank of Nova Scotia, and available to anyone who wishes to purchase a bar for a souvenir. These bars, he said, would have inscriptions of the events and the price was estimated at \$37.50 an ounce.

At a dinner later held in the Cookery, H. G. Young, known as the "granddaddy" of Red Lake, stated that he wished the mine the best for "higher grade ore" and that he had estimated some years ago, when the price of ore was \$11 a ton, that it would go to \$16 a ton. It is now valued at \$17 a ton and he predicted that it would go a lot higher.

Thayer Lindsley, prominent mining man, and geologist, also attended. Mr. Lindsley, who is in his 80's is still out to create new fields in mineral wealth. J. C. Byrone, president of Consolidated managing director of Fairbairns, came down from Yellowknife, to watch the pouring. Fairbairns is a new mine in the barren lands in the North West territories. It is being financed in part by New Dickenson Gold Mines Limited and Consolidated Discovery and also Brewis and White Ltd.

J. K. Booth, exploration manager for Rio-Canadian Explorations, was also in attendance.

Mr. Bell also stated that in their 40 years of production 1,273,394 tons of ore was milled and 595,544 ounces of gold produced. The company has not needed "cost aid" since 1953 and

it is predicted by Mr. Bell that they will not need any cost aid for 1959.

A new re-grind ball mill has been placed in operation as of August 4, 1959. The daily milling rate has been increased from 450 tons to 475 tons per day and the recovery is expected to improve by 2 per cent. The weight of gold so far produced is approximately 25 tons and the space it would occupy is 41 cubic feet.

The operating shaft is at the present time 2,965 feet underground with 20 levels spaced at 150 feet apart. Most of the mining has been done above the 10th level and at the 17th and 19th levels cross cuts are being driven southerly to the ore zone locations and news on new ore is expected within the year. The equipment that the company is now using is capable of going to a depth of 3,400 feet.

On the 17th level, 600 feet southwest of the shaft they unexpectedly ran through a body of ore 31 feet long and 9 feet wide averaging 6 ounces of gold per ton. Mr. Fell said.

9 Charged In Court With Speeding On Highways

Highway signs denoting speed limits are put up for a purpose, and they are to be obeyed. A great many motorists found this to be true when they were apprehended in the past few days for breaking the law. The drivers were all charged by the Ontario Provincial Police who are maintaining a close surveillance on the district highways.

Friday afternoon, in Magistrate's Court, nine motorists, mostly from out of town appeared on speeding charges. They were fined in accordance with the speed they were going and paid anywhere from \$10 to \$20 plus costs as well as losing points on their driver's licences.

Also at court numerous offences dealing with liquor laws were heard. A Whitefish Bay man charged with driving his motor boat while impaired was fined \$50 and costs or thirty days.

Largest fine of the day was paid by a man from Morrison, Ontario who was found guilty of unlawfully selling liquor. He paid \$300 and costs or sixty days.

Evidence given by the Ontario Provincial Police showed that the man in question was taking advantage of Indian rice pickers in the area. Knowing that they had money from selling rice, the accused had gone to the area with liquor to sell.

A Rat Portage man charged with assault of two persons occasioning bodily harm, damaging property and supplying liquor to minors, was given three months concurrent on the second and \$100 and costs or 30 days consecutive on the third.

Having liquor not purchased on a permit cost a Minaki woman \$100 and costs or 30 days. A man from the same town paid \$100 and costs or 30 days for supplying a minor and \$10 or 7 days consecutive for being drunk.

Three minors charged with consuming were each given the option of fines or jail sentences. A North Bay man was fined \$25 and costs for having liquor at a place other than a residence and the usual drunks were given the usual fines.

Silver Falls Power Station To Open September 25

Construction operations are moving into the final stages at Ontario Hydro's Silver Falls development and plans are now being made for the official opening Friday, September 25.

Located on the scenic, serpen-

tine Kaministiquia River, about 30 miles northwest from Fort William, this new station will have a capacity of 45,500 kilowatts from one unit and will be radio controlled from Port Arthur Transformer Station. The project takes its name from Silver Falls, the largest and most impressive of a series of falls and rapids in the five-mile stretch of the Kaministiquia above the powerhouse site. To circumvent this tortuous section of river, it was necessary to excavate a 10,400-foot-long tunnel with an intake at Dog Lake where the Kaministiquia has its source. This tunnel, which is 14 feet in diameter, extends to the powerhouse at Little Dog Lake, to effectively utilize the full head of 350 feet available at this location.

Another interesting feature of this development is a giant surge tank, which reaches to a height of 190 feet, some 900 feet back of the powerhouse. This tank has two functions. Its primary job is to act as a safety valve and to protect the tunnel, penstock, straight flow valve and turbine passage gates from the "back-up" pressure exerted by the water in the tunnel, should an emergency necessitate immediate shutdown of the turbine. Its second function is to provide a ready supply of water to take care of sudden increases in electrical demand on the generator. The surge tank will hold up to 1,250,000 gallons of water the level in the tank corresponding more or less to the level in Dog Lake.

The Silver Falls station is one of several developments being built by Ontario Hydro to meet the increasing demands for power in northern Ontario.
