After the presentation of prizes, there will be free ice cream for the children. The kiddies can enjoy aeroplane rides, pony rides and many other forms of entertainment planned for them, while adults can play bingo and other games of chance.

Police Ask Full Co-Operation For Safe Week-End

Appeals to residents and visitors alike to exercise extra caution this holiday week-end were issued this morning by local officials. A care-free attitude prevails for the last long weekend of the season, and it is a reminder that a moment of carelessness can bring a lifetime of tragedy which all have shared.

Ontario Provincial Police have cancelled all leaves for their officers, who will be alert on district highways to better control traffic. The co-operation of Kenora drivers is asked by Police Chief Jack Pike, who urged special care where children are concerned. His remarks were directed to motorists who are travelling the limit on long stretches of paved streets, who may not realize that they will be unable to stop in time if a youngster should suddenly run onto the street. Watching for unsafe water practices, the RCMP will be on constant patrol over the week-end, doing their part to assist in bringing everyone home safely after the holiday.

The rest is up to the general public.

Kenora Police report this morning that a 1959 Chevrolet, owned by Joe Sniezek of 121 Rupert Road was stolen from his back yard sometime after 1.00 a.m. this morning. It was found by an Ontario Provincial Police patrol shortly before 3.00 a.m. this morning 14 miles west of Kenora in a ditch. The driver apparently missed a detour on the new construction portion of the highway.

The OPP officer arrested the man, found in the car, and watched while a second escaped into the bush south of the highway. This latter man, now being sought, is of slim build, 5 ft. 10 inches to 6 ft. in height, dirty-blond hair, wearing a white T-Shirt and dark pants. The Provincial Police immediately set up a road block in the area and are also patrolling the railway line.

Mrs. Sniezek told the MAN that she had driven the car into the yard, and had stayed up making pickles until 1.00 a.m. She was unaware that the car had been stolen until awakened by Police early this morning. "The man must have been looking for a car to steal, because we live away at the top of the Rupert hill, and the car was in off the dark lane."

The investigation is continuing.

2 BRAND NEW KEEWATIN SCHOOLS AWAIT 600 STUDENTS ON TUESDAY

For the first time in the history of the town of Keewatin, when school bells ring on Tuesday morning, pupils of the public and Separate schools will both go to brand new schools.

The Keewatin Public School, of twelve room construction and auditorium, and costing approximately \$325,000.00, has been completed just in time for this fall's opening. All is in readiness except the placing of some of the desks, that have not arrived on schedule. So many children will be enrolling that four classrooms in the old school will be needed this term. Enrollment is expected to be approximately 480.

Mr. James Forbes B.A., the principal, will teach grade 8, and the following are the teachers and their assigned grades:

Nicholas Kohuch, vice-principal - Grades 7, 8; Miss Anne Welch - Grades 6, 7; Miss Joyce Demchuk - Grade 6, Music; Mrs. Clara Lund - Grades 5, 6; Mrs. Lenore Race, Grade 5; Mrs. Esmeralda Ritchie - Grade 4; Mrs. Lillian Gagnon - Grades 3, 4; Mrs. Kathleen Delaney - Grade

3; Mrs. Elva Madison - Grade 2; Miss Anne Fitzmaurice - Grade 2; Mrs. Verna Pannebaker - Grade 1; Mrs. Jean Saunders - Grade 1; Miss Marilyn Loudon - Kindergarten; Mrs. Janet Merredew - Principal's Supply.

New teachers on the staff are: Mrs. Elva Madison - Grade 2 - an Ontario teacher who formerly taught in this school, both on the regular and the supply staff, is now returning to full-time duty.

Mrs. Lenore Race - who comes originally from the Dryden area has Ontario qualifications, and has a number of years of experience in this district, having taught formerly at Redditt.

Mrs. Clara Lund - from Pellatt Township, has Ontario qualifications and taught some years ago in Kenora. She has done considerable substitute teaching in the Keewatin School.

Miss Anne Welch - a former pupil of this school, returns to begin her teaching career after attending the Manitoba Teachers' College last term. Children will assemble to be

grouped in classes on Tuesday September 8th, at 9.00 a.m. This year's kindergarten pupils will go directly to the kindergarten, Room 2, New Building. All other pupils will assemble in the Auditorium.

Classes will begin at 9.00 a.m., Wednesday, September 9th. Laclu and Pellatt buses will leave the school for this day only at 12.00 noon.

One hundred pupils are expected to enter the doors of the new four room St. Louis Catholic School now in the last stages of construction. Still to be completed is the all purpose room which will serve as auditorium and music room. This school features the new green chalk boards, fluorescent lighting with special spotlight on the "black" boards, ample cloakroom space with shelves for books, a kitchenette for use of the staff, office that will double as a room for the use of health nurse and doctor, all new furniture including one unit desks with arborvitae tops, and one large desk per classroom which will accommodate six pupils for special works. The school will also feature a special device which will bring in outside fresh air as needed. The building will be heated by oil.

Principal of the school will be Sister Agnes, who returns to Keewatin after a short time spent in Manitoba. Her staff will consist of two new teachers, Sister Claire Elenore who will teach grades 3, 4 and 5, and Sister "Matie" Leontine who will teach grades 1 and 2. Sister Agnes will teach grades 6, 7 and 8.

A Message For Our Day

THE KENORA MINISTERIAL ASSOC.

Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father and of the Son, and the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.

Teaching them to observe. Teaching whom? Who else but the converts. Sometimes our early Christian training causes us to think of the converts as those accepted from pagan countries.

We seldom, if ever, think that our own homes are places where you and me have the express command from Jesus to teach. The children that we are privileged to arise are in much the same condition as those who have for years lived without the knowledge of Jesus Christ.

Perhaps the mother in the home has the greatest part in the teaching of her off-spring. The mother and wife in this busy modern world is just as much a missionary as the three Marys who stood at the foot of the Cross. We often tend to forget the various tasks that women are called upon to undertake and perform. How many are conscious of their great missionary endeavour?

Yet looking back upon the lives of our children we are made increasingly aware that the mother is in almost every sense the medium through which the knowledge of God is passed on to succeeding generations.

Invariably it is to mother that intimate questions are addressed to mother to find the time to explain the scriptural stories brought home from Sunday School. But perhaps the greatest gift mothers possess is the maternal love that is second nature. A love that is akin to Christlike love - a human attribute that allows us to understand in full the love we must bear towards each other, although in our immaturity we direct it almost totally upon our immediate families.

Yet we're not wholly unaware of the fuller implications - what mother is there who would deliberately train her child to bully and ill-treat another? It is through the love that binds each family that we are made aware that we are part of a great plan. The family is the medium through which God creates.

Teach all nations. Every mother in the world who has the slightest idea of the Christian truths is teaching in one form or another the truths which Jesus Christ taught to His disciples and the multitudes that flocked to hear Him.

But, and there is always a But. The impression we make depends upon individual conviction. Surely all grow sick with worry and anxiety over the future, when we watch the growth of our families, yet have to listen to the rumblings of international discord which is the scourge of our time.

If the heads of families in the past had done their missionary work more thoroughly - if the Christian families of England, of the United States and Russia, had felt just a little more keenly their position as transmitters of the Gospel, would things not have been a great deal better than they are today? Isn't it written that the sins of the fathers fall upon the third and fourth generations, of them that hate me. But our ancestors did not hate God, you will say.

The word hate means to like less, and we are all well aware that many people enjoy worldly things to worship and obedience to God. We reap only that which we sow. Because the Jews were so family conscious He made it easier for them to understand God. They came to learn that the so-called frightful God loves each one - even as they loved their wives and children. Today we should be keenly aware of the high responsibility that is ours - not only in evangelizing within the family, but also without, for the sake of Him who is Father of us all. How can we have a true faith in His promises if we haven't got the conviction and initiative to recognize our duties as evangelists? We do not stand

Hydro's Appliance Program To Benefit Future Homemakers

Ontario home economics students will have an opportunity to learn how to be first-rate future homemakers with top-of-the-line electrical appliances. An important new program supplies such appliances free of charge to the home economics classrooms of schools throughout the province.

The program carries the theme, "learning today to live better electrically tomorrow."

Backed by a three-way agreement between Ontario Hydro, the municipal utilities and manufacturers, and endorsed by the Association of Municipal Electrical Utilities, the new program means that home economics stu-

dents will have the advantage of learning how to be good homemakers through practical use of the very latest and best in electrical ranges, refrigerators, dishwashers and automatic washers and dryers. In some schools, installations will be made of electric hot water heaters.

The plan is made possible through co-operation of appliance manufacturers and municipal electrical utilities. School boards, working with their local utilities, may have the equipment installed without charge.

Through a two-year replacement scheme, new models, as developed, will be immediately available to the schools.

The home economics teacher, under the plan, will choose the make, style and color of the appliances to be installed in the school.

It is felt that this public-service plan will not only assist

schools to obtain the most up-to-date and efficient electrical appliances, but will give the students a much better understanding of how to get the most from their future homes.

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Unemployment Insurance Claims Show Decrease

Claimants for unemployment insurance benefit numbered 225,900 on July 31, up 2% over June 30 but 25% below July 31, 1958, according to an advance Bureau summary. The month-to-month increase in claimants is associated with plants closing for annual holidays, for inventory taking and model changeover and with industrial disputes, particularly on the west coast.

Initial and renewal claims totalled 122,300 during July, an increase of 14% over June but a decline of 27% from the July 1958 total. The failure rate on initial claims processed during July was 23.3% compared to 26.1% in June and 22.6% for July 1958.

The average weekly estimate of beneficiaries was 164,800 for July in comparison with 197,000 for June and 294,800 for July 1958. Benefit payments amounted to \$14.5 million in July, \$18.2

million in June and \$26.3 million in July last year. The average weekly payment amounted to \$20.04 for July, \$20.95 for June and \$20.67 for July 1958.

India Engineer Views Causeway

FORT FRANCES — A young engineer from India came to Fort Frances last week to view construction of the Rainy lake causeway. He was Robin Banerjee, 33, whose trip to Canada was financed by the Colombo plan that assists development of less fortunate countries.

Banerjee spoke to the Fort Frances Kiwanis club last week and described the problems of his homeland. One problem is a dense population of 400,000,000 people, and another is a severe shortage of food, he reported. Yet India is gradually making progress, he said. The visiting engineer left Sunday to see other bridge-building projects at Calgary and Victoria, B.C. He said two other Indian engineers are also visiting Canada this summer.

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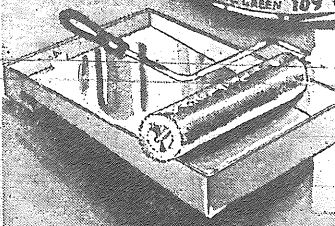

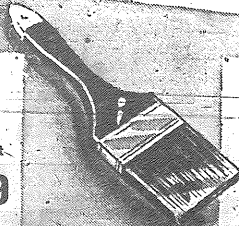
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
