Storm Picks Up Garage Which Lands On Barn

"I've never seen anything like it since I came here in 1919", Mr. A. J. Murray, who resides on Black Sturgeon River, some 6 1/2 miles north-east of Kenora told the Miner and News, following a small cyclone which crossed his property late Saturday night. "The house lifted in the corner, then settled back with a thump. I thought she was going over."

With terrific force, the wind struck the south-west corner of the 2-storey, 20 x 26 frame house, tearing shingles from the roof, then picked up the 16 x 22 foot garage, which was located 75 feet to the rear.

The garage apparently went almost straight up, for it cleared a half-ton truck which was parked behind it, and carried 50 feet or more. Most of the garage landed on top of a small barn, with one side going northwest and the other 200 feet to the north-east.

Articles inside the garage remained standing undamaged. "I didn't come out to look around until Sunday morning. I couldn't see the garage for a moment," said Mr. Murray. "I walked up into the bush and found shingles 600 yards away."

42 Pound Muskies Caught Sunday On Lake of the Woods

Mr. A. W. (Art) Schubert of Cincinnati knows what it means to take an order. As executive vice president of Emery Industries Incorporated, it is often his duty to see that operations proceed as directed. So when he and Mrs. Schubert left for a 2 week holiday at Devil's Gap Lodge, Kenora, it was natural that he should remember an order from his daughter - to bring back a muskie larger than the one she caught here last year - a 23 pounder which is presently mounted in their den in Cincinnati.

Within a few days of arrival Mr. Schubert caught two muskies, but both failed to measure up. Sunday was the last day in camp, and the idea of the "big one" was almost forgotten. A party in three boats headed west

towards Emerald Lake to fish for Bass, but they never made it. Near "S" Island, Mr. Schubert decided to explore some rocks with a "suicks muskie thriller," on the end of a 20 lb. nylon line. Harry Albater, his brother-in-law was the first to jump. He knew there was a fish on the end of the line by the way the boat moved.

What was landed is probably the largest fish caught in the area this season, a 42 pounder which measured 50 inches long and 22 inches in girth. The trophy has been shipped for mounting and Mr. Schubert returned home happy in the knowledge that another executive order had been filled.

Funeral services for the late Mrs. Sarah Ann White who passed away Saturday, September 5th, at the General Hospital following a short illness were held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Tuesday afternoon, September 8th, at two o'clock. Rev. S. G. Tomes, of St-Albans Pro-Cathedral officiated and interment was in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery. Pallbearers were Messrs: E. Adolfsen, R. Gibson, R. Hamilton, F. Langness, L. Jorgenson and R. Sherrington. A well-known life-time resident of this community, the late Mrs. White was born in Rat Portage in 1883 and was 76 years old. Predeceased by her husband John in 1936, she is survived by one son Jack of Kenora, one sister Mrs. R. Palmer of Vancouver and two grandchildren.

Magistrate's Court

Liquor charges and speeding offences made up the majority of the cases on the docket at court this morning. A man from Jones, Ontario, who failed to report a traffic accident was fined \$100 and costs, and lost 9 points on his license. The same man also paid \$10 and costs or 7 days for being drunk. Speeding in Keewatin cost a local man \$20 and costs or 3 days, another man paid \$10 and costs for speeding in town, a Jaffray-Melick motorist paid \$20 and costs on a similar charge, and a man from Dryden paid \$10 and costs for driving without a licence.

A local man charged for a second time with assaulting his wife, surrendered the first bond of \$100 and was ordered to post another for \$250 and ordered to keep the peace for one year. Dr. David Halliwell chairman of Apple Day which will be held on September 11th and 12th, reported plans were in progress to make this Kenora's most successful Apple Day. Arrangements have been made with Publicity chairman Wes Rowson for radio time for speakers, A. D. C. Wingfield, Cub Master - liaison scouter E. Larson, and chairman Dr. Halliwell. Notre Dame Parish Hall was selected as Headquarters for operation "Apple Day". Dave Forster was appointed to handle financial responsibilities. It was reported by President Ray Brown that for the first time in Kenora's history the Scout Council would be host for the Manitoba - Ontario Provincial Council Meeting on October 3rd. Some 250 delegates are expected to attend. Reports on summer scouting activities were heard from Comm. Wilson, A.D.C.'s Cairns, Prefontaine, Wingfield, and S. M. Balchin. All indicated that scouting was growing and looking forward in the Kenora District.

Labor Day was a busy day at the Kenora Golf and Country Club; the sun shone brightly and one hundred and thirty six golfers teed off in the fifteenth annual Labor Day Open Golf Tournament. Amateur golfers with handicaps of eighteen and under and twelve professionals were entered in this popular tournament. Professional prize money totalled three hundred dollars with one hundred and fifty dollars going to the first place winner. Merchandize prizes were awarded to the winners and runners up of all six flights in the amateur class, and the championship flight.

The picturesque Kenora Course provided a lot of thrills for the visitors, and after the heavy rains of the past week, was very wet in dips along the fairways. A hole in one was also recorded on the short sixth hole by golfer, Jim Morrison of Selkirk, using an eight iron. The sixth hole is one hundred and thirty yards. Morrison also won the prize for the closest to the cup on the ninth hole, on second shot landing two feet six inches away, and he also shot a 34 for the first nine which is two under par. He shot a 76 for eighteen four over par, and won the second flight.

Len Harvey of St. Boniface came in with a 73 to win the Professional event and the one hundred and fifty dollars first place money. Jim Doyle of Sandy Hook was second with a 74. Bill Thompson of Southwood and Gord Letton of Selkirk were tied for third with 78's.

The sensational Fort Frances golfer Jerry Traux, capped a brilliant season by winning the championship flight, shooting par 72 golf. Traux takes home a set of silver for his winning round. Second place went to Bob Fair of Assiniboia with 74. Third spot went to Bill Penninger of Elmwood with a 74 and fourth to Roy Kepron also of Elmwood with a 77.

Former New York Ranger Hockey Star Scotty Cameron, shot five over par 77 golf to win the first flight, Cameron plays out of the Kenora Club. Second was Art Johnson of Kenora with 78 and third was Les Eveys of Kenora shooting a 79.

Brandon Bags Booty in Baseball Final

3,000 ENJOY HOLIDAY SPECTACLE AS EIGHT TEAMS BATTLE AT KEEWATIN

The Brandon Clover Leafs, playing outstanding baseball defeated the St. Boniface Native Sons three to nothing in the final game of the Keewatin Kinsmen's eighth annual Labor Day Baseball Tournament, to take top prize money of four hundred dollars. The Native Sons won second place money of two hundred and fifty dollars. Eight teams participated in the two-day tournament. Besides the two big money winners, Keewatin Indians and Elmwood Giants, the 1958 Tournament winners took third and fourth place money of one hundred dollars each. The other entries represented Dryden, Kenora, Baudette, Minn. and Fort Whyte.

In the final game Brandon took a two to nothing lead in the bottom half of the first inning and never looked back. Mort Wright the Brandon catcher hit a sharp double right along the left field foul line with two and two on, the third and final Brandon run came off the booming bat of Lloyd Brown who smacked his fourth home run of the day into deep right field. Brown's batting paced the Clover Leafs through their three wins in the tournament as he batted eight for thirteen, with four home runs and a double. Lorne Lilley pitched the big win giving up three hits.

Eddie McDonald was tagged for six hits in the losing effort.

In the first game Sunday, Keewatin defeated Kenora 8-3, Brian McLay was the winner. St. Boniface took Baudette, Minn. 6-2 with Al Johnson hurling the victory. Both winners advanced to the semi-finals. Monday morning saw Elmwood squeak by Dryden

2 to 1 with Herb Kaletzke getting the victory and Brandon defeating Ft. Whyte 12-0 with Lorne Lilley again chucking the win in the semi finals in the after-

noon, Garney Boutet and the St. Boniface Native Sons downed the Keewatin Indians 11 to 5. Brandon, winning their second game (Continued on Page 9)

Synod Approves Revised Anglican Prayer Book

St. Anne de Bellevue, Que. - The Anglican Church of Canada's 20th general synod gave virtually unanimous approval to the revised edition of the Book of Common Prayer.

Approval came with startling swiftness only a few minutes after Bishop Howard Clark of Edmonton, chairman of the central revision sub-committee, presented the book for the synod's consideration.

Rev. H. W. R. Short of, St. Catharines moved the whole report be accepted without debate.

Only a few moments later the synod's lower house voted in favor - there was only one negative vote.

Many observers had expected the revised edition to cause more heated debate than any other topic on the calendar and two full days were scheduled for its discussion.

The book must still be given official confirmation by the next general synod - in 1962 - but this is largely a formal step and the revised book now may be used in churches which have their bishop's permission.

The chief affect of the revisions has been to remove obvious archaisms, eliminate words which have changed their meaning and generally to shorten many services.

In addition several verses and in one case a whole psalm have been removed altogether because it was felt they were hang-overs from the harsh traditions of reformation era theology which emphasized an angry, almost cruel diety and humanity stepped in original sin.

Other revisions reflect changing social and political conditions.

The word "obey" has been removed from the bride's pledge in the marriage ceremony so that she now promises only "to love and cherish."

Actually the word "obey" has not been used in many Anglican marriage ceremonies for nearly a decade if the couple objected to it.

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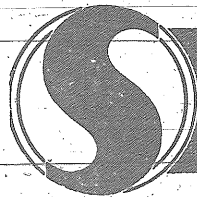

Man Gets 'Hot Seat' In Car Accident Near Dryden

Three persons were injured, one receiving an extremely "hot seat", in two separate accidents on the Trans-Canada Highway at Dymont and Oxdrift last week.

John Flesch suffered three broken ribs and a bruised right leg when a half-ton truck rolled on the Trans-Canada Highway 3.5 miles east of Borups Corners around 11.30 p.m. Wednesday. The driver, John MacKenzie, of Dryden, escaped injury. The vehicle is reported to have rolled three times and suffered \$600 damage. The mishap was investigated by Constable C. Smart.

William Bouchard of Eton-Rugby suffered scratches, bruises, cuts and severe burns to his right buttock around seven p.m. Saturday after an old half-ton truck he was driving locked bumpers with a 1959 Dodge driven by Joseph Trawa of Camp 32, Dryden Paper Company. Both vehicles were travelling in a westerly direction when Trawa attempted to pass the truck. The old vehicle rolled over several times and wound up "disintegrated," according to Ontario Provincial Police Constable John Crain who investigated. Damage to the Trawa car was only slight.

Mr. Bouchard lost his trousers in the "crazy flight" of the half-ton as it literally flew to pieces and ended up in a sitting position on an extremely hot exhaust pipe.

A passenger, Paul Thiffault of Dryden, was not injured. Bouchard is expected to be confined to Dryden District General Hospital for some time.

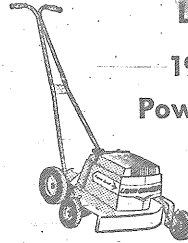

PLUMP

STEWING FOWL

A 5 pound stewing fowl will serve 5 to 6 people.

1. Clean and cut into pieces.
2. Place in a stewing pan and bring to the boiling point: 3 cups water
1 sliced carrot
1 small sliced onion
2 ribs celery with leaves

3. Drop the fowl piece by piece into the boiling liquid. Do this slowly so as not to disturb the boiling point. As the liquid will increase in volume, the fowl need only be covered to the depth of 1/2 inch. Cover the pot closely and simmer the fowl until it is tender, 2 hours or more, but do not boil at any time. At the end of the first hour of cooking add: 1/8 teaspoon paprika or 3 or 4 peppercorns.

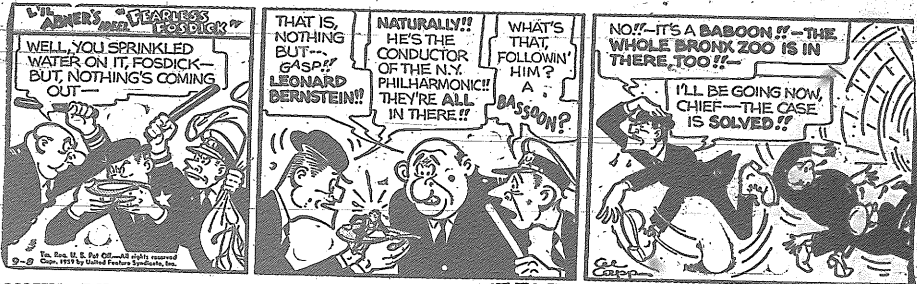
FLORISTS SAY JUNE LOSING OUT

University Park, Pa.—Take it from the florists—June is losing out as the favorite month of brides, a flowery bit of scientific research disclosed.

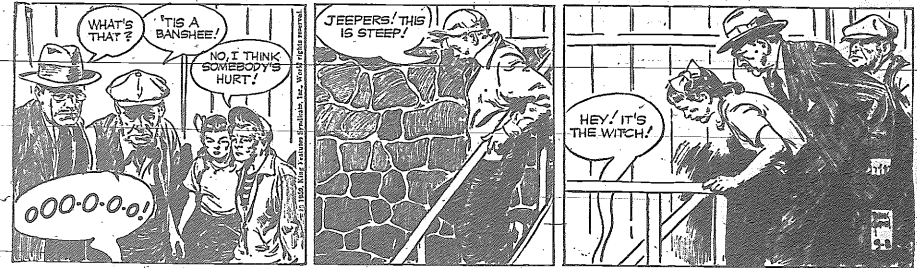
August is looming as a strong threat, and even September and November are coming up fast, though these latter still are below the average of other months

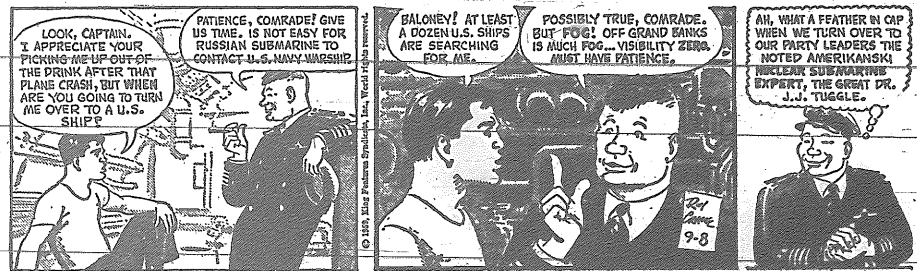

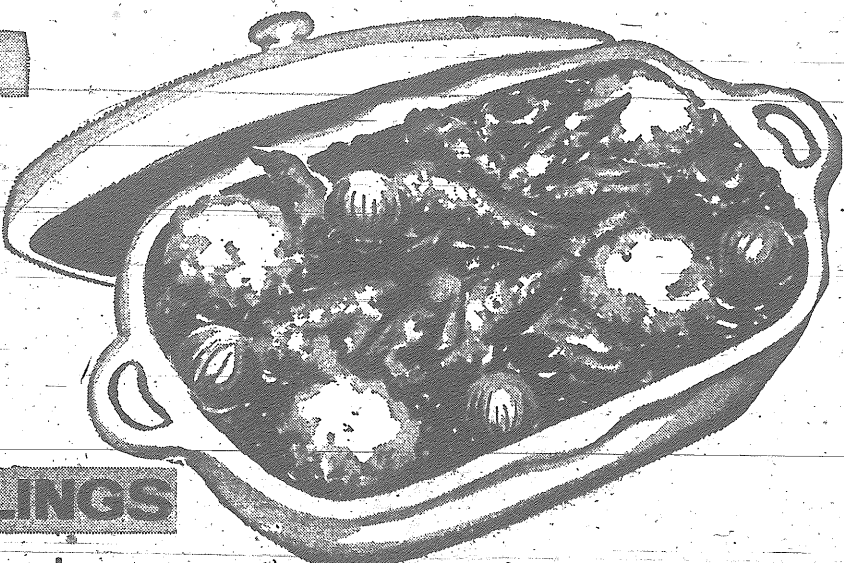

Lakehead College Secures Mine For Students' Use

The Silver Mountain mining property, located some 40 miles west of the Lakehead has been set aside by the Provincial Government for the use of the mining and geology students at Lakehead College. The property is made up of two separate mines known as West End and East End; Silver Mountain Mine. It consists of some 300 acres. The East End mine consists of over a mile of underground tunnels which are easily accessible. The West End mine is accessible only by vertical shaft and the workings are flooded. There are no buildings on the property.

Lakehead College offers a two-year course in Mining Technology as well as first year Mining Engineering and Geology at the University level. The mine will permit students to study geology and mineralogy in the field both on the surface and un-

derground. It will also provide practical experience in surveying, under actual mining conditions and give them a better appreciation of the practice and techniques involved in this type of surveying.

The mine was discovered by Oliver Daunais - the "Silver King" of Thunder Bay. A Cleveland syndicate headed by Samuel Mathers agreed to purchase a 5/6 interest in the East Mine for \$250,000 but after spending \$25,000 in exploratory work they abandoned it. Daunais con-

tinued the work himself and after drifting for about four feet, discovered the vein which carried silver in large quantities. Much of it assayed over \$1,000 per ton.

A group of Liverpool financiers now became interested and Frank Tobin came over to Canada to inspect the mine. On October 20th, 1886, the Liverpool group purchased the mine for \$175,000. A new company, Shuniah Weachu Mine Co. Ltd., was organized and Captain Thomas Tritheyway was appointed gener-

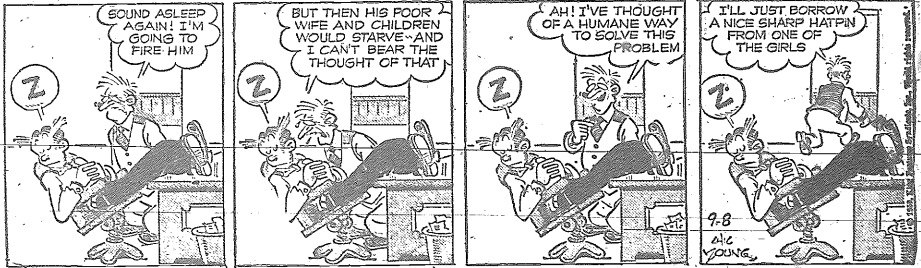
al superintendent. Two levels were established, one 700 ft. and one 1,400 ft. and a vertical shaft. The vein varied from four to twelve feet in width. The silver occurred as native and glance silver. The operation of the mine was suspended in 1892.

The East End and West End Silver Mountain Mines together produced about \$500,000 worth of ore. The West End was the richer of the two. Operations in the West End mine were not suspended until 1902.

Recent Work.
During the period 1948 to 1951 the McWilliams Beardmore Mines Ltd. rehabilitated the East End mine and extended the main tunnel several hundred feet. The West End was also de-watered but it has become flooded again.

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Moving Steel For Causeway

A new phase in construction of the impressive Rainy Lake causeway has begun as the Atlas Construction (Toronto) Company tackles the transporting and erection of thousands of tons of girders, pier caps and pilings.

A sturdy tug, the "Salta", and steel barges that are being assembled on the waterfront near J. A. Mathieu's old sawmill will carry the tremendous loads — 176 girders, each weighing 27 to 45 tons, more than 80 pier caps weighing 61 tons apiece and 37 carloads of big steel pipe that will be welded together for the piling.

The girders and pier caps are being built at a rapid rate on the

lake's edge near the Indian school by the C. A. Pitts Construction Company. One of their engineers, Bob Shorter, declared this operation is the largest prestressing concrete job underway in the British Commonwealth today.

Building Trestle

To load the giant components of the causeway onto the barges the Atlas Company will have to build a trestle from the Pitts storage site. The trestle, it was learned will be left on the site after the job ends for use by anybody interested.

90 men are busy on the spectacular job of prefabricating the girders and pier caps, and 25 or more employed on the start of the Atlas job. Capt. Bill Martin of O-M "Hallett" fame is at work supervising assembly of the Atlas barges.

Announce Winter Works Program

Ottawa—The federal government again will pay half the labor costs of approved municipal works projects as a stimulus to winter employment, Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced.

Following a cabinet meeting, Mr. Diefenbaker said he expects a federal contribution to this program will total about \$15,000,000, a 50 per cent increase over the \$10,000,000 spent last year.

He said the projects that will qualify are the same as those included in the program last winter: 1, construction and major improvement of municipal roads, streets, sidewalks, bridges and underpasses; 2, the construction and major improvement of water and sewage facilities, excluding building; 3, construction and development of municipal parks and playgrounds.

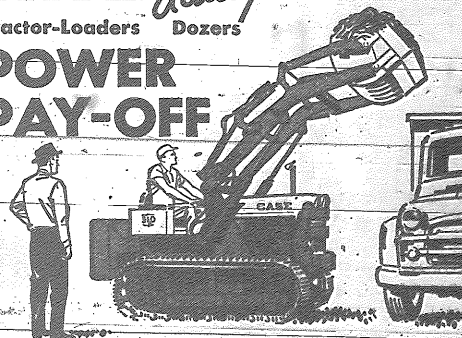
The program again will go into effect Dec. 1 and will continue to April, 30, 1960. As in the past municipalities will be required to submit proposed projects through their provincial governments.

Mr. Diefenbaker said that by announcing the winter works program almost two months earlier this year than last he hopes

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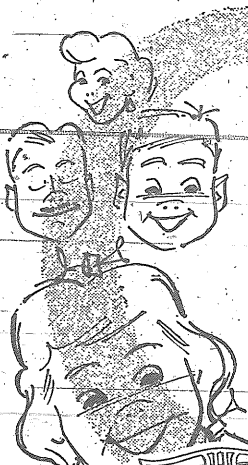
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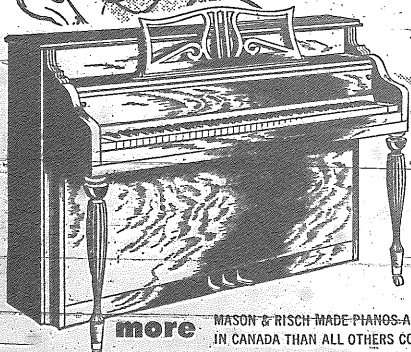
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
