Magistrate's Court

Three Kenora youths charged with beating another man on Saturday night in Keewatin were placed on bail and their case was remanded till next Monday.

Subdivision No. 2 Plans Approved

Plans for the new housing development in the Pincerest area have received the green light from all parties concerned. At the council meeting last night, council approved the revised plans of the Department of Planning and Development, of Ontario, which revision will better take care of the requirements of the Public and Separate School Boards and the area allotted for park purposes.

With respect to the low rental housing in the area, council authorized the completion of the documents relative to financing the project.

A communication from E. J. LeBleu, Secretary-Treasurer of the Pincerest Community Association referring to the revised plan of Sub-Division Part 2 of the Federal Provincial Land Assembly Project in the Pincerest area stated that the Association is happy to note the incorporation of a permanent recreation site and expressed that body's appreciation of Council's co-op-

eration in that respect.

They further requested the opportunity to present to Council various suggestions with respect to the completion of sidewalks and curbing in the presently developed area which would enable residents to complete their driveways and plant trees.

The Association will be informed that their interest in improving the area in question is appreciated by Council who will endeavor to meet their wishes when finances and other conditions permit.

Members of the Kenora Rotary Club saw a most interesting and historical film at their Monday meeting, when "City of Gold" depicting the story of Dawson City in the famous gold rush days, was shown. This was of particular interest, for before the rush to the Klondyke, the Lake of the Woods mining field was then one of the most prominent in the United States and Canada, and it was the fabulous "free gold" story that sent thousands of people flocking to the Klondyke.

President T. A. O'Flaherty presided, and this week's attendance was 92.59% and last week, 100%. Birthdays and congratulations were extended to Rotarians Bill Cockerell and Jack Penner.

Marathon Votes For Cocktail Bars

Marathon voters went to the polls on last Wednesday and overwhelmingly voted in favor of liquor sales in dining rooms and cocktail lounges.

With over 50 per cent of the eligible voters turning out to cast a ballot, the vote for sale of liquor in dining rooms was carried by a majority of 80 per cent while for lounge licences over 88 per cent were in favor.

For sale of liquor in dining rooms 524 voted in favor and 125 voted against and for lounge licences 586 voted in favor and 74 were against.

Of the 1,267 eligible voters a total of 710 cast a ballot.

Robert Peterson Died Early Today

Robert Peterson, a pioneer resident of this community for sixty-seven years, died early today, Tuesday, September 15th, at the Kenora General Hospital, following a lengthy illness. Born in Norway, January 17th, 1872, he was in his 87th year.

He came to this district in 1892 and was married here September 19, 1898 to the former Wilhelmina Eliason. In early life he worked on the CPR, for the Keewatin Lumber Co. and operated a Hardware and Second Hand Store in Kenora. Later he was a commercial fisherman on the Lake of the Woods and retired in 1944. He was a member of Bethesda Lutheran Church.

He is survived by his widow, one son Erlend of Kenora; three daughters, Miss Clara Peterson of Winnipeg, Mrs. B. K. (Eleanor) Johnson of Winnipeg, and Mrs. W. G. (Julie) Wright of Dorval, Quebec; one brother in Noi-

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Thursday afternoon, September 17th at two o'clock. Rev. Floyd Johnson of Bethesda Lutheran Church will officiate and interment will be in the Lake of the Woods Cemetery.

Motorists To Pay More To Park

Wednesday morning in Kenora, motorists will note a change in the parking regulations on down town streets. The price of parking will be double the rate that has been in effect since 1949. Motorists will now pay 10 cents an hour and 5 cents for half an hour. Further more they will not be allowed to buy time for a penny as was the habit before. A bylaw changing the original parking meter bylaw was given final reading at last night's council meeting. As a matter of fact all three readings were given last night.

It is expected that some changes will yet be made in the Bylaw. Discussed last night were 3 minute meters for in front of the Post Office and 12 minute meters in front of hotels and the liquor store. This will be further discussed in committee.

Motorists will not only have to dig deeper into their pockets but they will also have to brush up on their driving, since parallel parking will also be in force on all downtown streets with the exception of one block on Chipman Street. Parallel parking on Main Street and Second Street is of necessity since these two streets are part of the Trans Canada Highway and regulations call for either parallel parking or no parking at all.

Town workmen are busily engaged in re-painting traffic lines and it is hoped that all will be in readiness for Wednesday.

The proposed Norman sewer and water project came in for attention at last night's regular council meeting. Council was in receipt of a communication from the Ontario Water Resources Commission advising that the Ontario Municipal Board had granted tentative approval of the project to permit final plans and specifications to be prepared and firm tenders to be called, to ascertain if the project could be completed within the specific amount - \$187,180.00 to be paid by the Resources Commission and \$137,820.00 by the town.

Council gave final readings to three bylaws relative to the matter, the first two readings of these bylaws having been given last June. One bylaw was for establishing water rates, and the other two were for financing.

Final readings were given three other bylaws, authorizing agreements between the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, between the Kenora Civic Employees Union and between the Kenora Firefighters Union.

PETITIONS

Two petitions were received, one from the residents living on Machin Drive who requested the following improvements to the area: levelling and surfacing, completion of construction with barricade and warning sign, erecting of fire hydrant and snow removal in the winter. This was referred to the Public Works committee for estimate of cost.

Residents of First Street North, east of Matheson Street requested improvements to the street. The town engineer was authorized to repair same.

FINANCE

Municipal accounts of \$25,138.50 and Utility accounts of \$44,448.98 were authorized paid. Accepted was a cheque for \$1,273.16, the town's share of fines and fees for August from Magistrate's Court and a cheque in the amount of \$733.00 from the police office which included August parking fines of \$681.00. For accounting purposes costs connected with the building up and protection of a new section of road leading to the General Hospital were treated as a grant to the Hospital.

OTHER BUSINESS

The Ontario Water Resources Commission will be advised that no decision respecting completion of Kenora's sewage disposal system has been reached due to the difficulty in financing the project.

A request made by Mr. Roy Broad for a rate for electric home heating and suggesting that there is no specific rate as presently set up in Kenora for that purpose, the rate presently in force in many municipalities in Ontario as well as that provided by the Ontario Hydro was adopted, namely 1 1/2c per kilowatt hour less a 10% prompt payment discount with no service charge and no minimum bill. Council recommended the sup-

ply of new type traffic signs with a view to their being erected from time to time so that the entire installation will be completed by the August 31, 1960, deadline.

Alderman Paterson and F. Greenslade, Supt. of Electric Lighting and Telephones were delegated to attend the O.M.E.A. convention to be held at Sioux Lookout.

Application is to be made to the Department of Transport for renewal of a temporary certificate of license for the winter air base in Lakeside.

The following is a copy of a letter received by W. M. Benidickson M.P. for Kenora Rainy-River in connection with the federal Roads-to Resources program.

 Dear Mr. Benidickson:
 Thank you for your letter of August 24th concerning the Roads to Resources Agreement with the Province of Ontario. We have ironed out all the outstanding problems, although the formal agreement with the province has not yet been supplied. For your confidential information I can

say that it is presently before Cabinet and I hope to receive authority to execute the agreement in the very near future.

You will be glad to know that the road from Minaki south connecting with the secondary Highway No. 596 at Pellatt is included in the agreement.

You also asked for information as to the amount of work that has been done on this road either under the Forest Access Road Program or under the Roads to Resources Program since my letter of February 13th. I do not have this information immediately available but I will get it and write to you again.

The youngster is interested in resigning rocket ships and missiles and believes that there must be some better way measuring the heat of the sun than has been discovered.

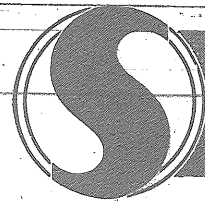

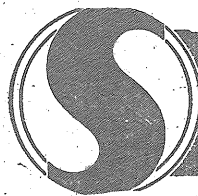

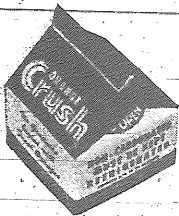

PHILLIPS FAVOURS LOTTERIES VOTE

Toronto—An Ontario-wide plebiscite on the question of making hospital sweepstakes legal was advocated by Mayor Phillips.

He was commenting on a resolution adopted at the Ontario Municipal Association in Sudbury calling on the provincial government to make sweepstakes legal.

"This is a provincial and not a municipal matter," said the mayor. "But there are many thousands of Ontario residents who buy sweepstake tickets. And I feel the question should be put to the people and a decision made by a province-wide vote."

Attorney-General Roberts said the sweepstake issue was a federal, not a provincial matter.

It is expected that these changes together with provision for off street parking will result in improved traffic and parking conditions in the downtown area.

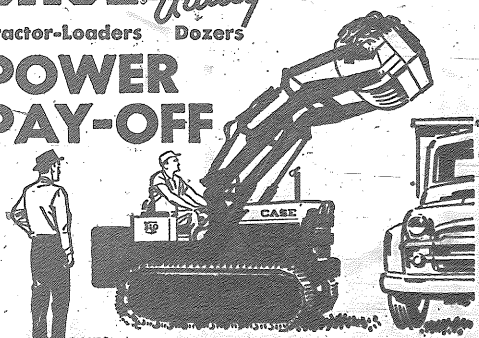

For something delicate and utterly delicious, try a fresh peach chiffon pie. You can use either a graham wafer or baked pastry shell.

Peach Chiffon Pie

1 envelope plain gelatin
1/2 cup milk
1 cup sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
2 eggs (separated)
1 1/2 cups finely chopped fresh peaches
1 tbsp. lemon juice
Drop almond flavorings.
1/2 cup heavy cream whipped
Soften gelatin in cold milk in top of double boiler, place over hot water. Add 1/2 cup sugar and salt, stir until gelatin and sugar is dissolved. Pour over slightly beaten egg yolks, return to double boiler and cook until slightly thickened. Remove from heat, add chopped peaches to which lemon juice and almond have been added. Cool until starting to thicken. Fold in egg whites beaten with remaining 1/2 cup of sugar. Fold into peach mixture along with whipped cream. Pile into baked pastry or crumb crust, chill until set. Garnish with fresh sweetened peach slices.

Hint for Today

Soften white cream cheese with a little cream. Place a dab in the bottom of baked tart shells. Fill shells with sliced peaches, sprinkle with lemon juice and top with sweetened whipped cream and cinnamon.

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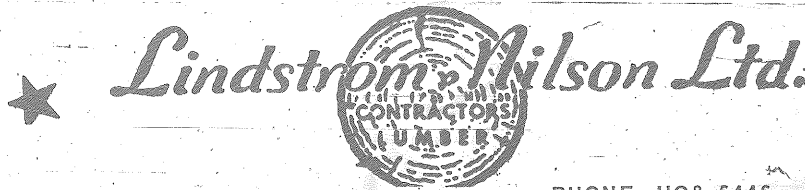



The C.N.R. is busy putting in a long cement walk in the front of the station which will be a great improvement over the old board walk.

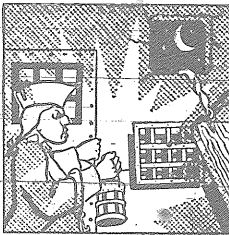

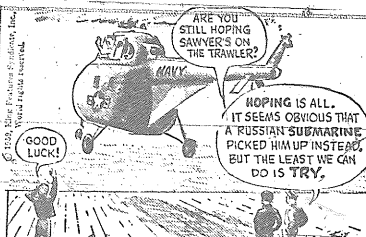

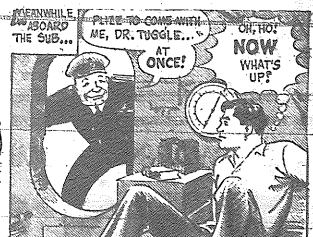
