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## Young Girl Saves Brother's Life

The Miner and News learned this afternoon of a heroic act of a young Kenora girl, who saved her 2 year old brother from possible serious injury. Her name could not be confirmed at press time. A subscriber relates the following story and those concerned could not be reached for details.

Apparently the car of Ken Tittlemier, 623 14th Ave. N. was parked in the inclined driveway of the residence. His 2 year old son climbed unnoticed into the car and released the brake. The vehicle rolled back into the roadway, and because of the manner in which the wheels were turned, cut across and up onto an adjoining roadway. From there it rolled forward downhill and headed for a telephone pole.

It was at this point that the fast-thinking sister sprang into action. Far from freezing at the sight she raced up, grabbed the steering wheel and held on. With feet dragging on the road, she directed the car until she could get into position to spring into the car. This she finally did, bringing the car to a stop. It is estimated that the car was doing better than 20 miles per hour down the hill moments before.

## Parents To Serve 18 Months In Jail For Starving Son

A blistering condemnation of the conduct of a young Red Lake couple was directed to the pair by Magistrate J. V. Fregeau Thursday afternoon during a Court session held in that centre. The couple was jointly charged with neglecting their five month old son.

Evidence in the form of testimony and pictures was presented to the Court which showed that the infant was near death from starvation and neglect. The 21 year old husband and his 29 year old wife apparently separated, though living in the same house, as was a male boarder. Testimony revealed that the baby, when found, weighed 6

ounces less than at birth five months ago. Its body was covered with scalding burns and quite obviously it was unwanted. The child will likely suffer some permanent damage to his body.

Both parents are Hungarian. Magistrate Fregeau sentenced each to serve 18 months in jail, and will recommend in the strongest terms, that they be deported when they have served their sentence.

Meanwhile the Children's Aid Society has been given temporary custody of the baby boy and his 18 month old sister.

Crown Attorney T. A. O'Flaherty went to Red Lake to present the case for the Crown. Ted Burton acted for the defence.

## Magistrate's Court

At Court this morning a Kenora youth was given a one year suspended sentence and ordered to report to the probation officer once a week when found guilty of stealing from an auto body shop. He also posted a bond of \$150.

A local trucking company was fined \$10 and costs for not having a permit. An out of town firm paid \$20 and costs for not possessing a commercial licence.

Having liquor at a place other than a residence cost one man \$10 and costs or 7 days and for supplying his friends he paid \$25 or 10 days.

A second offence drunk paid \$50 and costs or 30 days, while three first offenders paid the usual \$10 or seven days.

A man of no fixed abode charged with vagrancy was given the option of six months in jail or getting out of town in twenty-four hours.

## Adult Immunization Stressed During National Week

"National Immunization Week, 1959 will lay emphasis on the importance of adult immunization," stated Dr. Gordon Bates, General Director of the Health League of Canada, which organization has sponsored Immunization Week for the past seventeen years.

"In the case of poliomyelitis, there is a lingering belief in the minds of the public that polio is a disease of childhood, and that adults have a natural immunity," he said. "While it is true that a natural immunity is acquired over the years by many adults, there are other adults who have not that immunity."

Since the discovery of the Salk vaccine, polio has moved up from being a childhood disease to being an adult crippler. Only last year in Ontario, ALL deaths from this disease occurred among adults over the age of 25. Adults between the ages of 25 and 40 and pregnant women are particularly susceptible to polio."

Dr. Bates pointed out that the entire course of injections, which are given over an eight month period, must be taken before immunity is obtained. He said that a combined tetanus and polio

preparation was available, and would provide protection for adults against the two diseases in a single dose. This procedure is being recommended by medical authorities.

For children, a quadruple preparation immunizes against diphtheria, whooping-cough, tetanus and polio.

Dr. Bates stressed the need for immunization on a wide scale. "The aim of the Health League of Canada is to see that every man, woman and child in this country will be ultimately protected against diphtheria, whooping-cough, tetanus, polio and smallpox," he said.

"Until this is achieved, Canada as a nation is still wide open to the threat of crippling epidemics, with all the attendant distress."

## J. Thompson C.A.S. Director Leaving For Sudbury

Various problems and discussions were reviewed by the Board of the Children's Aid Society at the meeting held Monday night September 14th.

The Resignation of Mr. W. J. P. Thompson, Local Director, was accepted with regret. Mr. Thompson has transferred to Sudbury where he will continue his fine work and untiring efforts for children in the Children's Aid Society of that city.

Miss Mildred Parry will take over the Local Director's duties until such time as a new Local Director can be contacted. Steps are being taken to find an assistant for Miss Parry in her field work.

Mr. McGeachy of the Dryden office and Rev. Mr. McLean of Dryden were given authorization to find office assistance there, so that the Dryden office may be contacted when Mr. McGeachy is out of town on field work. Thus better contact can be made when the need arises.

Treasurer, Mr. D. Lemoine read the financial statement, showing 163 children in care with an expenditure of \$4,723.00 for boarding homes.

Mr. Thompson in reading his report stated that the Northern Regional Conference will be held on September 24 and 25 at Fort William. Staff members would greatly benefit by this conference and much knowledge would be gained by them of our Northern problems, he said.

Some of the members should take advantage of this opportunity, as will Mrs. Johnson of Sioux Lookout, who has done a great deal of work for the agency in that area, in helping out in many emergencies.

Mrs. J. Doner, Campaign manager, reported for her committee stating that plans are completed and the Drive for funds is in progress. Canvassers will be busy for the next two weeks calling at the homes. Mr. Powell thanked Mrs. Doner and her committee.

## TRAVELLER FROM INDIA FINDS NO DISCRIMINATION IN CANADA

Travel to see the world, is a well known phrase even though it doesn't state what means of travel one can take. This porter, in the past two months has interviewed a great many "travelling" people of both sexes.

When word reaches this office that another person is travelling across the country, the thought that immediately runs through one's mind is — oh no, not another one. Surprising fact is that every traveller is a distinct personality, each is interesting in his own right and all have a different story to tell. Their stories are as different as their mode of conveyance as are their reasons for their trips.

Most widely travelled person to reach this town was the 21 year old Hindu who stopped off in Kenora on Wednesday. Ram Basu who hails from Calcutta, India, has the distinction of having

travelled the most miles and has done it all by means of a 1/2 horse power motor bike. By all, that is the 60,000 miles and 30 countries that he has visited on his three year tour. This enterprising young man left Calcutta, travelled to China, Australia, the middle East, Russia, the countries of Europe, England, and this spring Canada, the United States and Mexico.

He has been all the way to the west coast and is now on his way to Toronto where he will study engineering at Ryerson. While at the coast, he discovered that for the first time in three years, he was out of money and so he took his first job, picking raspberries. He appeared on television while in B.C. which resulted in an interested person giving him a small foreign car to complete his trip. His trusty motorbike is stored in the luggage compartment of the car, this is one thing that Ram wants to keep.

Another interesting thing about this remarkable young man is that while at the coast he wrote the entrance exams for Ryerson and passed with such high marks that he won a scholarship. He receives \$40 a month from his mother and this will have to see him through his engineering course. He hopes to be able to get a job in Toronto. His three brothers were all educated in India. One is an engineer, one a marine engineer and the other is an architect. Very dark skinned and posses-

sing the friendliest grin, Ram said that he has met with nothing but kindness on his trip across Canada. Not once, he said, have I encountered racial prejudice. This is a wonderful country and I look forward to completing my education here. When he gets his degree he will return to India to help his native country.

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## Dairy Industry Notes Big Increase

Banff Springs, Alberta.—In his report to the Annual Meeting of The National Dairy Council of Canada Executive Secretary W. K. St. John, stated that "during the past 20 years the Canadian Dairy Industry has experienced the following growth—

1. Milk production has increased by 2,500,000,000 pounds or 12 per cent.
2. Fluid milk and cream sales have risen by 800,000,000 quarts or 60 per cent.
3. Creamery butter output has risen by 50,000,000 pounds or 17 per cent.
4. Ice cream sales have increased by 22,000,000 gallons or 157 per cent.
5. Production of concentrated milk products have risen by 350,000,000 pounds—or 151 per cent.
6. Total cheese consumption in Canada has increased by 58,000,000 pounds or 103 per cent; AND
7. The total gross annual value of dairy foods has increased by over 200 per cent.

"During the same period", Mr. St. John said, "it is noteworthy that despite the vast increase in output the actual number of

dairy plants in Canada have declined by 2,000 from 4,677 to 2,679, a drop of 43 per cent. This certainly testifies to the increased efficiency of the dairy processing industry to the benefit of farmers, processors and consumers," he stated.

### EARLY TEACHING OF FRENCH URGED

Montreal—Teaching of French at earlier school ages in the English-speaking provinces of Canada was advocated at closing weekend sessions of the annual seminar of the National Federation of Canadian University Students.

A resolution adopted unanimously by the 40 students expressed the view that in a bi-cultural country the study of French would be advantageous to the general culture of Canada as a whole.

## Over the Spider's Web by Eltoros

**THE ROCK'S RETURN**  
The late Irvin Shrewsbury Cobb wrote this twenty years ago: "It smells like gangrene starting in a mildewed silo, it tastes like the wrath to come, and when you absorb a deep swig of it you have all the sensations of having swallowed a lighted kerosene lamp. A sudden, violent jolt of it has been known to stop the victim's watch, snap his suspenders and crack his glass eye right across."  
That was his report on how to define "Corn Licker" and the reason we mention it here is for an obvious reason. The reaction of the drink is somewhat on the same parallel as the jolt we received when we heard the news bulletin that Rocky Marciano has planned to enter the ring again. He may change his mind, but old warriors are a determined crew and for some reason they just sail on with their inflated hopes. The Bronx Rock was no fool in the ring. He wasn't the master of artful boxing but he made up for that with gloves of iron which his opponents declared were symbols of modern hydrogen weapons. He also had a definite mauler instinct. Backing challengers the king of the rope men decided to call it quits for life. It made the front pages, the magazines, and it also made money for the champion who wrote countless articles on the way to retire. It was all common sense. Who, in this world of two camps, wants to get his brains squashed

by the hammer blows of enterprising boxers. His critics admired the way he finished, and it was all tout fini.  
Then there was talk, then there was the Rock making an announcement of a comeback. In short, after a few years of rest, Mr. Marciano has changed his philosophy. There was spontaneous reaction to all this news by a few of the local boxing fans. Some claim that he should consult a head-shrinker before his head is "shrunk" by Ingo and company, others say that he will win back his golden throne without too much trouble. We think he should consult Joe Louis.  
Marciano's proposed comeback will stir the boxing society. The question that will be debated on is simply this: "Is Marciano the Marciano of old, or is he one of those who does not believe in the theory that things always look better on the outside?"  
It is hard for any athlete to make a comeback after laying off his selected sport for a number of years. Marciano probably knows this, and he will likely train for many months before taking on anybody of due importance. The temptation of a big gate, the glory of winning back the championship for old America, the inner emotional feeling of getting back to work and to see whether he can actually accomplish the near impossible, are all tremendous factors in Marciano's change of policy. Perhaps the Marciano case was inevitable. Perhaps it just had to happen... as it does to so many boxers. You can wallpaper your house with their names. Some have succeeded, the majority have failed. Success brings pride and new life to them, but defeat wrecks their real boxing name and all they have stood for in the ring.  
His chances against the current champion, if they should meet, are hard to predict at this time. The Bronx Italian is no longer the youth he once was and he still has to get into shape. He has something on his side. He was a good fighter while he was champion. If, and only if, he can return near that championship peak, he could give the Viking a good fight, but then, time and age are no slouch.

Then there's the story about Kenora's Joe Garrow when he met Joe Louis in a heavy-weight golden gloves fight when the Brown Bomber was just gaining boxing fame. Kenora's Joe was knocked out in the first round and he is reported to have said, "All I heard was the bell, the sound of Louis' punch hitting me on the head and the thud when I hit the canvas."

## KITCHEN CLASSICS

Homemakers alert to good fruit buys will find this the busiest week of the preserving season. Peaches, pears, and prune plums and crabapples are all on the market in colorful array, just asking to be taken home and put down into sparkling jams and jellies, spicy pickles and preserves.

To combine pears and peaches in a marmalade, try this delicious recipe:

### PEACH-PEAR MARMALADE

- 1 unpeeled orange
- 4 large peaches
- 3 large pears
- 3 cups sugar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- Dash each salt and ginger
- 6 maraschino cherries

Put orange through food chopper, add 1 cup water; cook 15 minutes. Add chopped peaches and pears, sugar, lemon juice, salt and ginger. Cook until two thickdrops of syrup will run to gettier off edge of spoon about 40 minutes, add chopped cherries last few minutes of cooking. Seal in sterilized jars. Makes 4 half-pint jars.

### HEAVENLY JAM

- 4 oranges
- 2 lemons
- 1 dozen pears
- 1 dozen peaches
- 1 dozen apples
- Sugar as needed.

Put oranges and lemons through chopper. Place over low heat to boil gently while preparing other fruits. Peel peaches, pears and apples, put through chopper. Add to first mixture. Measure and add 1 cup sugar for each cup fruit. Cook to jam stage, about 40 minutes. Seal in sterilized jars.

This colorful conserve is one to reserve for special occasions. Note the unusual addition of seedless grapes.

### HARLEQUIN CONSERVE

- 12 peaches, chopped
- 1 cup cubed pineapple
- ½ pound seedless grapes, halved
- 5 red or prune plums, chopped.
- ¼ orange, sliced.
- Sugar as needed.

Measure combined fruits and add ¾ cup sugar for each cup

of fruit. Cook rapidly until starting to thicken, about 35 to 40 minutes. If desired, add a few shredded blanched almonds last few minutes of cooking. Seal in sterilized jars.

Pear Amber is just as delicious as it sounds. The recipe makes about 4 pints of deluxe jam.

### PEAR AMBER

- 12 pears
- 2 oranges
- 20 oz. can of crushed pineapple.
- Few maraschino cherries.

Dice pears, put oranges through food chopper. Combine with pineapple and its juice. Measure and add ¾ cup sugar for each cup fruit. Boil rapidly to jam stage, about 45 minutes. Add sliced cherries last few minutes of cooking. Seal in sterilized jars. Makes about 4 pints.

When you see a good buy in pears, use some of the case to make this luscious mincemeat.

### SUMMER MINCMEAT

- 8 pounds of pears
- 1 orange
- 1 lemon
- 1 apple
- 1 cup grape or other fruit juice
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon cloves
- 1 tablespoon all spice
- 1 pound of seedless raisins
- 1 pound of currants
- 6 cups of sugar
- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt

Peel and core pears. Put pears, unpeeled orange, lemon and apple through food chopper. Add remaining ingredients, cook gently 2 hours or until quite

thick. Seal in sterilized jars. When using, add about ¼ cup suet to enough mincemeat for each pie.

Four cups each of diced peaches and pears, plus the usual ratio of sugar and a little lemon add up to 4 pints of good flavoured jam.

### PEACH AND PEAR JAM

- 4 cups sliced peaches
- 4 cups diced pears
- 6 cups sugar
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- Combine ingredients, cook to jam stage, about 30 minutes. Seal in sterilized jars. Makes about 3 pints.

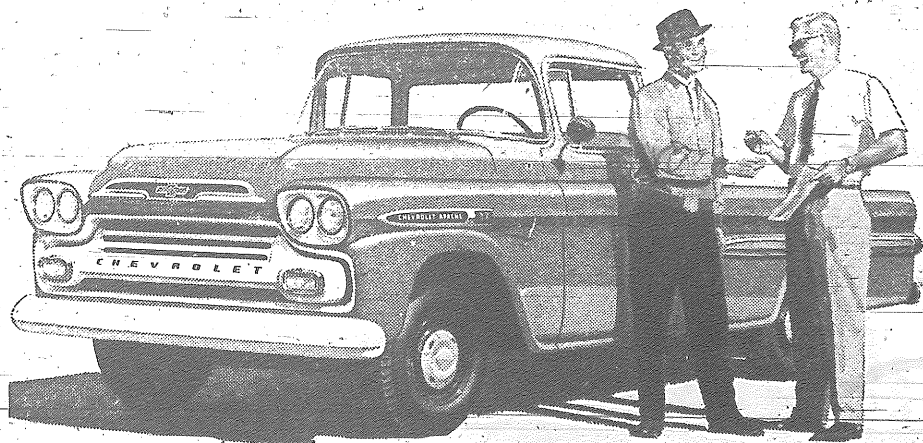

## Pike Could Aid Tourist Industry

**TORONTO**—The great northern pike may be the salvation of Ontario's tourist fishing industry, tourist baitfitters and operators suggest.

Faced with tremendously increased fishing pressure both from Canadians and visiting Americans, experts say it would be impossible to completely stock all available fishing waters through hatchery or even natural processes with such game fish as speckled trout, lake trout, bass, maskinonge and pickerel. But the pike — some of which grow to 30 pounds or better — stand up to the fishing pressure seem to be on the increase, according to reports.

Most Ontario fishermen, particularly those in southern Ontario, scorn the pike as a spineless coward who gives up without a struggle. This is not true of the Great Northern, found where the waters are deep and cold. U.S. fishermen travel as much as 1,500 miles for pike fishing in Ontario.

Ontario Department of Lands and Forests observers, have carried out a check in Fort Frances district where maskinonge and black bass are particularly numerous.

Questioning of about 600 non-resident anglers revealed pickerel led in numbers taken (1,508) with northern pike second (823). The pike feeds mainly on other fishes, including smaller pike, but will also take water insects, crayfish, frogs, mice, small muskrats, ducks and small mammals. Most are caught, however, on artificial baits of almost all types.

brine that hasn't been kept free from scum will cause pickles to turn soft or slippery. Any scum that forms on top of brine must be removed immediately and a weighted cover or lid used to keep pickles completely submerged in the brine. Don't overcook and be sure pickles are stored in a cool place.

Shrivelled or withered pickles may be caused by too much salt or sugar, or vinegar that's too strong. That's why some recipes begin with a weak solution, adding sugar, or vinegar, every day.

Hollow pickles, usually from large cucumbers, often are the result of faulty growth. Such cucumbers usually float to the top of the kettle when being washed and can then be set aside for sliced or chunk pickles.

Pickles that turn very dark may be blamed on too hard water or iron kettles. Copper Utensils, on the other hand, turn pickles abnormally green. Ground spices give a much darker product than whole spices. Cloves and cinnamon sticks left in the jar with fruits such as pickled pears or peaches often discolor the fruit and even develop a bitter flavor.

**DENTISTS FAVOUR FLOURIDATION**

**KITCHEN CLASSICS**

**PICKLING PROBLEMS**

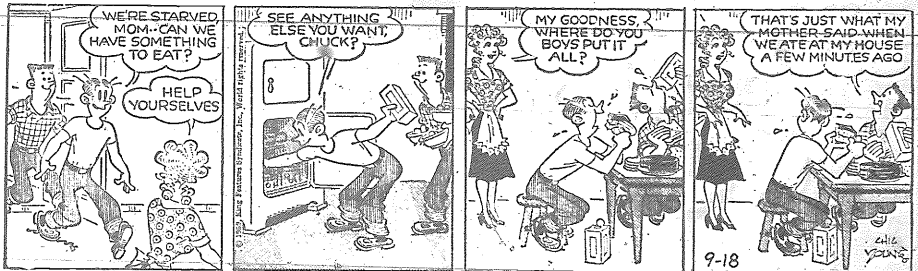
While there is little, if any, food value in pickles and relishes, people eat for enjoyment as well as good nutrition and pickles are a delicious companion to a well balanced meal. Having an array of homemade pickles is a matter of pride with homemakers but no matter how much care is taken with ingredients, equipment and recipes, results can be disappointing. Instead of turning out crisp and firm, pickles sometimes are soft or slippery. Again they shrivel, are hollow turn dark or develop a bitter flavor.

Food specialists of the Home Economics Service, Ontario Department of Agriculture, advise that the choice of fruits and vegetables used for pickling is important. Only those that are firm, fresh and unbruised give good results and for pickling or spicing fruits, those which are under-ripe keep their shape and appearance better than over-ripe ones. The sooner fruits and vegetables are pickled after gathering, the better. Cucumbers in particular should be pickled or at least in the brine within twenty-four hours after picking. Another rule for pickling cucumbers is that they should have a stem at least an eighth of a quarter inch long left on.

Pure salt gives best results. free-flowing table salt was never meant to be used for pickling. Vinegar should be clear and free from any sediment. Whole spices, tied loosely in a thin cloth bag, are advised. Soft water is best but if not available, hard water may be boiled, let stand twenty-four hours, any scum removed and then strained. Either cane or beet sugar will be satisfactory. Lime water is called for in certain recipes, to give crispness to unfermented pickles such as watermelon or green tomatoes. Authorities say alum isn't necessary if proper methods, ingredients and recipes are used. Enamel, Aluminum, glass or stainless steel equipment are excellent but copper, zinc or iron kettles are not satisfactory for cooking pickles.

Soft or slippery pickles actually have spoiled. The brine may have been too weak or salt of the wrong kind used. Be sure the recipe is right and measure accurately. Vinegar that's too weak or

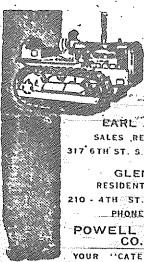
