## 120 ATTEND WOMEN'S INSTITUTE CONVENTION AT RAINY RIVER

One hundred and twenty women attended the Women's Institute area convention held at Rainy River September 15 and 16. The theme of the convention, "Today's Children are the Citizens of Tomorrow."

Delegates from the Rideout Branch, Laffray Branch and Pellatt-Lacul attended the two day convention which was chaired by area vice-president, Mrs. A. Davidson of Kenora.

Mayor G. Gruchy welcomed the ladies and following opening ceremonies, conveners gave yearly reports of various activities.

Mrs. J. Haggerty, president, said six institutes had been organized and four disbanded. In 1958 there were 1,476 institute branches with 38,549 members. She stressed that work be publicized through home economics service.

Tuesday afternoon Mrs. R. Orme, Emco, presided and the meeting opened with two minute silence for departed members and memorial service. Ladies from Kenora branch put on an interesting skit of an Institute meeting and D. Heard, Dept. of Agriculture, Emco, spoke on farm safety program and showed interesting slides. In the evening a banquet was held in the Knox United Church. Following the banquet 4H Homemaking Club girls gave an interesting demonstration of

their projects with commentary by Miss Elsie Irvine, home economics.

**4H CLUB REPORTS**  
Miss Elsie Irvine, home economist stated 396 girls completed 615 projects in 97 clubs and 17 leaders attended the Royal Winter Fair; 11 girls went to Guelph; two attended the CNE; 48 girls received country honors; 12 girls received provincial honors.

Mrs. P. Moen, Atikokan, presided Wednesday afternoon and Mrs. A. Davidson, Kenora, invited members to Kenora and Keewatin for the next area convention.

**OFFICERS ELECTED**  
During the election of officers, Mrs. A. Davidson of Kenora was the unanimous choice for area chairman. Other officers elected were representative of the different Institutes attending the convention.

**RESOLUTIONS**  
A resolution urging that the Mothers Allowance Act provide a standard income all over Ontario was passed at the final session as were two other resolutions.

The resolution on Mothers Allowances was sponsored by the Atikokan branch also urged that the mother be allowed to work to supplement her income as long as the children were not neglected by her so doing.

Another resolution by the Pellatt-Lacul branch from Kenora urged that whereas there are more car accidents now and whereas there is a majority of young drivers, therefore be it resolved that driving lessons be made part of the secondary school curriculum.

The third resolution came from the Barnhart branch and urged a change in the awarding of life memberships in the Women's Institute organization.

Len Klyne former well known Kenora resident has been making a name for himself in the circles in Sault Ste. Marie. The following write-up appeared in the Sault Ste. Marie paper. For picture of Len see inside page.

Have you ever looked into a dictionary to learn what the word "enthusiasm" really means? To be enthusiastic is to permit the mind to grasp certain facts, reason draws certain conclusions, and imagination binds them with the fires of enthusiasm. In that genial glow, the heart warms.

Thus, enthusiasm for a certain field that has lured so many men and women, has brought back into our group Len Klyne. Due to pressure of business Len had to give up the Workshop last season. But this year, sees Len back with as much if not more enthusiasm than before.

## LAKE LEVEL ASSURES AMPLE POWER - BOARD

For the first time in many years, the Lake of the Woods Control Board met in Kenora, with meetings being held Thursday and Friday and members all leaving for their respective homes by Saturday. Scheduled meetings are held about every three months with special meetings often being called on specific problems.

Mr. R. M. Watts, the Board's engineer and also an alternate member of the Board representing the Federal Government, told the Miner and News that no special problems confronted the meeting in Kenora. Board members were extremely pleased with the continued recovery of the level of the Lake of the Woods and contributory waters, and feel sure that there is now sufficient water in the storage basins to fill all requirements until next season.

The special function of the Board is to see that regulations are carried out and these deal mainly with the fair distribution of water between the various users and the most beneficial allotment. In this regard, the Keewatin Flour Mills have first call on the water in the Lake, having been the first to stake its claim. This fact was established in a Court case when judgment directed that the mill's installed capacity be first served, with other claims on available water settled after the Lake of the Woods Milling Company had a sufficient supply.

The Board has control of Lac Seul water and in special cases, water of Lake St. Joseph. Thursday the Board inspected physical facilities for regulating the water outlets from the Lake of the Woods, including an inspection of mills and power houses. Safety factors are not overlooked. The Board also inspected the new hydro dams at Whiteog and Caribou Falls.

Among those attending last week's meeting were Ontario delegates, Dr. Otto Holden, chief engineer for the Ontario Hydro Electric Commission and C. H. Fullerton, former surveyor-general for Ontario. Their alternates were also present—O. E. Johnston, hydraulic engineer with Hydro and R. G. Code, surveyor-general's office, Dept. of Lands and Forests, Toronto.

Federal delegate J. D. McLeod, chief engineer, Water Resources Branch, Dept. of North-

ern Affairs and Natural Resources and his alternate, Mr. R. M. Watts, were both here.

For the first time, Manitoba has been given representation on the Board, and Kenora was picked as the meeting place to mark this special occasion. The Manitoba delegate, Mr. Nestor Murdy, water resources branch and his alternate, C. G. Mills chief engineer of the Manitoba Power Commission, were in attendance.

It is of interest to note that the Board functions only when the water levels on the Lake of the Woods stays within prescribed limits as measured at Warroad, Minnesota. On February 24th, 1925, a joint United States-Canadian Convention set these limits at 1656 feet above sea level as minimum and 1681 feet as maximum. When either of these limits are exceeded, the Lake of the Woods Control Board ceases to function temporarily and administration is by the International Joint Commission. In 1950 the Lake measured 1654 feet; matched only once before (in 1916) in the past 65 years.

## Karl Korba Retires From CPR Today

Karl Korba B. & B. Foreman at Kenora, will work his last day on September 21st, 1959, before being retired on pension.

Mr. Korba entered the service of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company as a Section Foreman December 5th, 1920; at Dymont, worked in the B. & B. Department on the Kenora Division as Labourer and Painter Foreman from 1921, and was promoted to B. & B. Foreman at Kenora on May 24th, 1959.

Mr. Korba was born in Poland on October 19th, 1894 and married the former Stefania Kryszewski, in Winnipeg on July 1st, 1923. He is a member of the Maintenance of Way Lodge 238 Fullerton, former surveyor-general for Ontario. Their alternates were also present—O. E. Johnston, hydraulic engineer with Hydro and R. G. Voters will receive two separate ballots from the deputy returning officer. Each will be a different color and are to be marked with an "X" only.

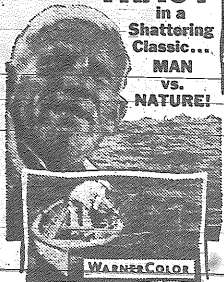

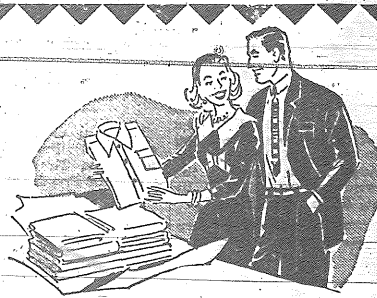

### Valiant To Be Shown Here Soon Says Bud Gibson

Windsor.—Chrysler of Canada will start manufacturing and marketing its new economy passenger car, the Valiant, early this fall, Ron W. Todgham, president, announced today.

The new addition to the Chrysler fleet of automobiles will be built at the Corporation's plants in Windsor, Mr. Todgham said.

"When the Valiant is introduced this fall it will give the majority of our dealers fine products to sell in every price range," Mr. Todgham said. "This policy also will provide an added plus in the area of readily available service facilities in virtually every city and town in Canada."

The Valiant will be produced as a four-door sedan and as a station wagon in two series. Both vehicles will be capable of seating six passengers comfortably.

This Chrysler-made economy car will be powered by a new six-cylinder engine, specifically designed and engineered by Chrysler of Canada for the Valiant. It will be mounted in the conventional position at the front of the vehicle.

Valiant's new three speed manual transmission is designed for motorists desiring utmost economy in operation. The optional three-speed automatic transmission is a completely new design tailored to match the output characteristics of the six-cylinder engine. It is more than 100 pounds lighter than the Torque-Flite used with V-8 engines, but constructed to the same high qualities.

Many of the features now found in other Chrysler of Canada passenger cars will be included in the new Valiant, as well as new construction and accessory improvements which will be introduced in all of the 1960 model Chrysler of Canada passenger cars, Mr. Todgham said.

Mr. Bud Gibson, president of Westario Motors Ltd. said today, "we expect to be showing this compact car in about 8 weeks time. The advance information we have received makes us proud that we will be able to offer the Valiant to our customers."

## Record Spending Year For Roads, Streets - C.G.R.A.

OTTAWA — All levels of government are spending more this year than ever before on Canadian roads and streets.

The Canadian Good Roads Association reported Wednesday that federal, provincial and municipal governments are spending \$1,157,200,000, up \$79,500,000 or 6.9 per cent from 1958.

However, it noted that the rate of increase is easing off, compared with other post-war years. This may be due to completion of large capital expenditures on toll facilities and a leveling-off of inter-city highway construction, the association said.

The association said its figures show Ontario is the biggest single highway builder, with total spending of \$268,600,000, up from \$241,600,000. Quebec is the next largest, though it reduced its budget to \$147,000,000 from \$177,000,000 last year.

British Columbia, third, will spend \$74,200,000 this year, down slightly from \$75,800,000 in 1958. White Manitoba, fourth, has

raised its budget to \$65,000,000 from \$35,600,000.

**Fort Hockey in Doubt With Crawford, Arena at Odds**

While the handsome, C. J. Boyle trophy for championship hockey in the Thunder Bay intermediate A circuit is being displayed in Fort Frances as a reminder that one of the two best amateur hockey clubs in Western Canada performed here last winter, the home club is contending with its usual pre-season difficulties.

President Morris Crawford of the Fort Frances Canadians reported that inability to come to terms with the Arena management has made operation of the club questionable in the season ahead.

He said the Arena board made an offer on renting the rink to the Canadians that the hockey club found impossible to accept. Based on last year's receipts — even though the 1958-59 season brought forth better-than-average crowd support—the higher rental cannot be considered, Crawford stated.

A meeting of the Arena board planned for this week may clear the issue, however, he hoped.

The Boyle trophy, won by the Canadians for sidelining both Kenora Thistles and Marathon Mercuries last spring to advance out of the Thunder Bay district, is on display in the window of McTaggart's store. It was won by Kenora the first year it was put up for competition and the Thistles, no doubt, will be anxious to get it back again this coming season.

# Sugar-Spice Scent Always Appeals

No matter how cookies are made, that sugar-and-spice smell that comes from the kitchen is the same in every generation and forms an attraction kitchenward that never fails. Molasses cookies, especially, give off a wonderful aroma. If you've lost your grandmother's recipe for these childhood delights, here is one you may want to use. Shape them like footballs if you want to make a real hit with the young aspirants for the back-yard team.

### Molasses Football Cookies

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3/4 cup unsulphured molasses
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 small egg

Melt shortening in saucepan large enough for mixing cookies. Stir in molasses and sugar; cool. Sift together flour, salt, soda and spices. Stir a small amount of dry sifted flour-spice blend into molasses mixture. Beat in egg. Add remaining flour, blending until smooth. Chill dough about 2 hours. Shape into 1 1/2-inch balls; form into oval shapes. Place on baking sheets about 1 1/2 inches apart to allow cookies to spread during baking. Bake at 350° F. 15-20 minutes. If desired, put "lace" on "footballs" with the following frosting.

- 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 egg white
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla

Sift together the sugar and cream of tartar; add egg white and vanilla. Beat with rotary beater until frosting holds its shape. Cover with damp cloth until ready to use.

If you want a variety of cookies for school lunches and your cookie jar with some left over to freeze for another day, here is a recipe that makes seven kinds of cookies. They number about 16 dozen, depending, of course, on the size of those you make. Bake at 425° F.

### Seven-From-One Cookies

- 2 cups shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1/4 cup milk
- 4 teaspoons vanilla
- 5 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

Mix shortening, sugar, and eggs thoroughly. Stir in milk and vanilla. Sift dry ingredients together, and stir into first mixture until well-blended.

Divide dough: 1/2 to use as plain dough, 1/4 as spiced, 1/4 as chocolate.

**Plain dough:** Divide into 3 portions; wrap and chill.

**Scalloped Cookies:** Roll and cut. Decorate with small colored candies. Bake about six minutes.

**Crescents:** Work into dough 1/2 cup moist coconut. Shape small portions of dough into crescents 1 1/4 inches wide in center. Chill. Bake 8 minutes. Trim with tinted uncooked icing, if desired.

**Nut Waters:** Sprinkle dough with chopped nuts or macaroon crumbs. Roll; cut into desired shapes. Bake 7 minutes.

**Spiced Dough:** Mix 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves and 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon into basic dough.

**Frosted Spice Cookies:** Chill half of spiced dough. Roll and cut. Bake 7 minutes. Cool and frost.

**Cherry Drops:** Soak 20 glazed cherries in warm water 5 minutes. Drain. Cut in quarters. Work cherries and 1/4 cup chopped nuts into remaining spiced dough. Drop by teaspoonful onto cookie sheet. Bake 10 minutes.

**Chocolate Dough:** Pour 1/4 cup boiling water over 1/4 cup cocoa. Stir to blend. Mix into remaining 1/4 of basic dough.

**Pecan Crisp:** To 1/2 the chocolate dough add 1/2 cup chopped pecans and 1 cup cream halves. Drop by teaspoonful onto cookie sheet. Top each with pecan half. Bake 8-10 minutes.

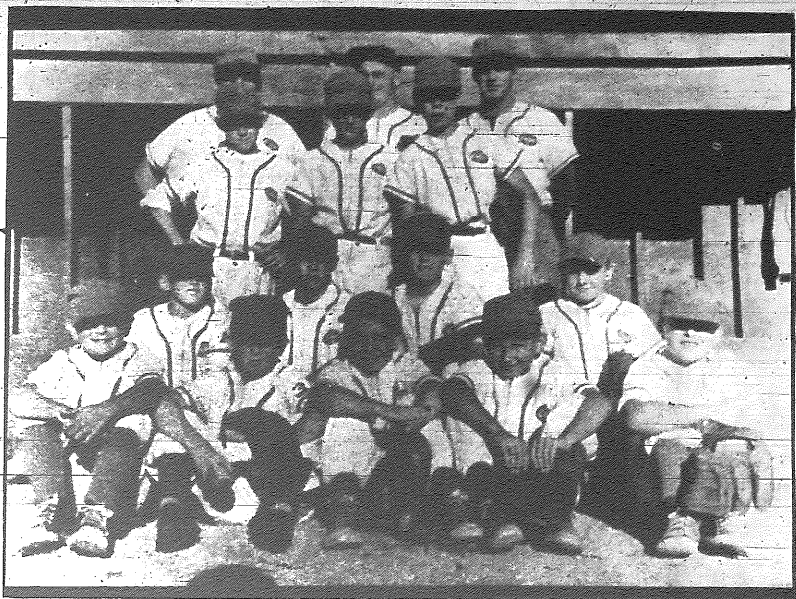
**Date Wrap-Up:** Use a rounding teaspoon of chocolate dough to completely cover a pitted soft date. Bake on cookie sheet 10 minutes. Cool; sprinkle with confectioners' sugar.

To go with your fruit dessert or eat alone at any time of day, try the honey-nut bars pictured.

### Honey Raisin Nut Bars

- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup honey
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup ready-to-eat bran
- 1 cup seedless raisins
- 1/2 cup nutmeats, chopped

Beat eggs until thick and lemon colored; beat in honey. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add bran, raisins, and nut meats. Add to honey mixture; beat well. Spread batter 1/2 inch thick in greased shallow pan 10x10 inches. Bake at 375° F. about 25 minutes. Cut into bars while warm and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Makes 40 bars 2x1 1/4 inches.

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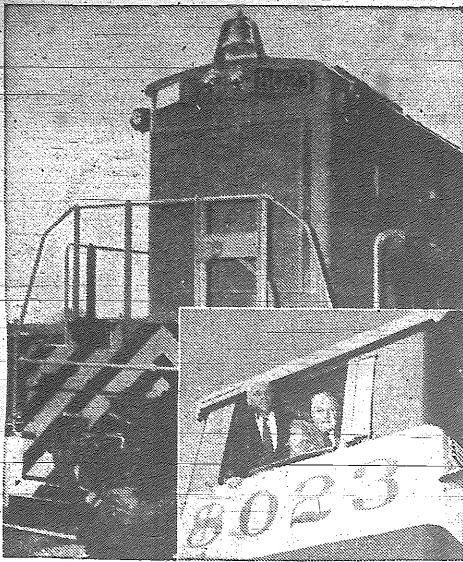

ting a bike until somebody fetched the leading lady back to finish her role!

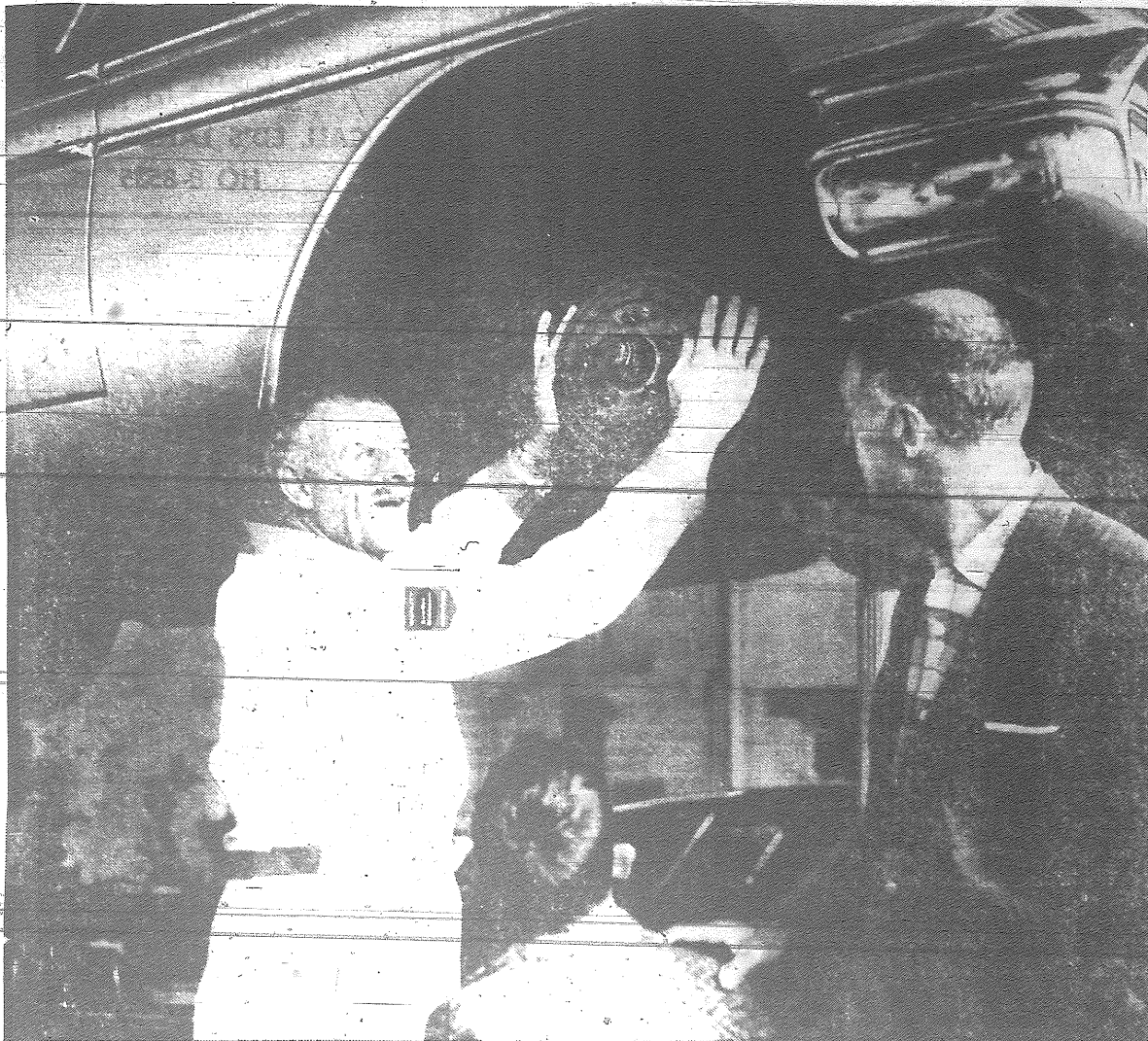

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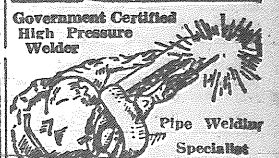
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
