## SPEAKER DISCUSSES INDIAN PROBLEM AT ROTARY MEETING

The early history of the Indians in Canada when the courier du bois and the Traders covered their rich lands and wealth and finally succeeded in driving them onto reservations has much to do with the present Indian problem, Rev. Father St. Jacques, superintendent of St. Mary's Indian Residential School, told members of the Kenora Rotary club at their weekly luncheon on Monday.

President T. A. O'Flaherty was in the chair and birthday congratulations extended to Rotarian Eric Apps. Attendance was 88.89% and last week, 96.30%.

A brief report was received on the opera "The Barber of Seville" which will be sponsored and presented by the Rotarians in Kenora on November 10th. Tickets will be \$2.50 and \$2.00.

Twenty-one years of work among the Indians in various parts of Canada, had permitted him to see almost everything there was to see, said Father St. Jacques, introduced by Rotarian D. Bruce. He knew particularly of the Indian problem in Kenora, and of the opinions generally held that almost everything had been done to raise the Indians to our level of civilization.

"One had to go back far into early history to get at the root of present day problems. We know of the high respect they had for Jacques Cartier the famous French explorer, but from then on the battles between Indians and white men had started.

All over the famous trails throughout the west the Courier du Bois and the trappers had left the marks of uncivilized people. They had come as invaders and often as robbers, said the Indians and had coveted the Indian lands and wealth they had at that time. The Indians were happy then for they had their independence and freedom. Father St. Jacques had talked to the old half-breeds around Winnipeg and the prairies and heard countless stories of cruelties and rapine. He had known Peter Falcon and would have liked this fine old Indian to see what the white man had done to the lake.

## Nykola Zubresky Died Early Today

Terrien will officiate and interment will be in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. Prayers will be said in the Chapel of the Brown Funeral Home on Wednesday night, September 23rd at eight o'clock.

An 86 year old gentleman, from the Pinecrest Home for the Aged, became lost, while going for his daily walk, in the wooded area near the Old Folks Home yesterday. Mr. Noah Brunette, who realized he was lost, sat down on the South shore of Rabbit Lake, near Horse Beach.

Three youths from the Rabbit Lake area, who noticed the elderly gentleman sitting there, as they passed by in a boat, notified the Kenora local Police who

were in the area, along with the Kenora Bush, Search, and Rescue Unit, who had come to the elderly gentleman's assistance. Mr. Brunette, said, "I knew I was lost, and it would be only a matter of time till the police found me. Mr. Brunette, had been missing since, 3:40 Tuesday afternoon and was found at 8:30 p.m.

## New C. A. S. Case Worker Hails From England

The District of Kenora Children's Aid Society has obtained the services of Mr. Sidney Sanders as case worker for the Sioux Narrows and Red Lake areas. It was announced today by Mr. W. B. Powell, chairman of the board of directors. Since coming to Canada from England in 1956, Mr. Sanders has entertained the thought of settling in Northwestern Ontario and when he met Mr. Ken McGeachy of the Kenora agency at an in-training course for social workers at Toronto last Spring and learned more about the country he became more than ever interested in the Kenora district.

Mr. Sanders was born in Birmingham England and obtained his education in that city. After graduation from the Birmingham University he was engaged in managerial work with the Odeon Theatres and he continued in that work until the outbreak of World War II. He joined the Royal Navy, gunnery division in 1939 and remained from then until 1946 with the service. Mr. Sanders' navy duty took him to many parts of the world, including Russia, Turkey, Egypt, the West Indies, and a hitch on the Murmansk convoy. This experience with the navy has played a part in causing him to enjoy meeting new situations and he looks forward with great interest to the challenges which this district offers.

After his war service Mr. Sanders felt a strong inclination to enter the social work field, and to this end he joined the Church of England Welfare Service. He was sent to Egypt and worked in liaison with the British Army

## GREAT RIVER ROAD MARKER TO BE ERECTED BY MINNESOTA

A small but significant ceremony will take place at International Falls on Wednesday, September 23rd at 11 a.m., standard time, when the Minnesota Department of Highways will erect their first "Great River Road" marker, indicating the first designated connecting link from Bimidi to the Trans-Canada highway at Longbow Corners, 13 miles east of Kenora.

The Great River road will eventually encircle Lake of the Woods with Manitoba to construct a highway south from Falcon Lake to the Northwest Angle, which will then be constructed jointly through Middlesboro, Manitoba, and thence to Warroad, and south to connect with the Great River Road immediately south of Bimidi.

It is understood that Ontario has also its markers available to designate the portion of the Great River Road through Ontario, and they will be erected simultaneously with Minnesota, so that the junction of the two great highways, Great River Road and Trans-Canada

highway can be publicized for the benefit of the tourists travelling this great mid-continent highway from the south.

It is hoped that Mr. Charles Young, pilot of the Mississippi River Parkway Planning Commission will fly up from Muscatine Iowa, for the ceremony, and that Minnesota delegation to the Parkway, and other government and Parkway officials will be on hand for the ceremony.

W. M. Noden, M.P.E., will probably represent Ontario, and J. A. Sherrett, Ontario chairman of the Parkway Commission and Canadian Co-Pilot or vice-president of the Parkway Commission will be on hand to participate.

An invitation is extended to interested Kenora and Keewatin citizens to attend, and invitations have been extended to Chambers of Commerce representatives throughout Ontario.

## Trio Arrested In Kenora

The R.C.M.P. Detachment at Whitemouth assisted by the O.P.P. at Kenora, arrested a man and two juveniles in Kenora in connection with the armed holdup of a British Columbia man near Winnipeg, Saturday.

The man, William P. Putecher had picked up two hitch hikers near Medicine Hat and a third man in Winnipeg. He told police that the men had bound and gagged him after one of them had pulled a knife. He was later dumped from his car near the Ontario border.

## Magistrate's Court

Four Kenora youths have now been charged with the beating of a man from Hudson which occurred in Keewatin two weeks ago. The man is still in hospital recovering from the injuries he received. The quartette received a further remand till next Monday.

Monday afternoon in Court, five cases were on the docket. Two Red Lake men charged with supplying liquor to minors were found guilty. One a second offender, paid \$200 and costs or three months and the other paid \$100 and costs, or thirty days. A Red Lake woman appearing as a second offence, drunk paid \$50 and costs or thirty days.

A Winnipeg motorist charged with careless driving was fined \$10 and costs and a motorist from Michigan paid \$15 and costs for speeding.

This morning in Court, the docket was light with only seven charges heard. A local man charged with driving without a licence paid \$10 and costs.

A third offence drunk was fined \$150 and costs or three months, four second offenders paid \$50 and costs or thirty days and for obtaining liquor while a minor, a local youth paid \$10 and costs or seven days.

**Plan Study Of Nurse Training**

TORONTO — Health Minister Dymond of Ontario announced that he will convene a conference here next month to study all aspects of nurse training, recruitment and working conditions.

He indicated the emphasis should be placed on recruitment, including male nurses.

He said salaries and working conditions of nurses are in dire need of revisions.

A plan being studied by the minister and senior health department officials is believed to include higher pay for floor nurses and a new approach to nurse training.

"There is thinking that the course is too long now," Dr. Dymond said. "A doctor receives 42 months training and a nurse now requires 33 months. It doesn't seem relative."

"There is a strong feeling that the course should be changed, not just compressed."

"General conditions for hospital nurses should be improved. The conference, we hope, will help provide us with the answers."

he discovered years ago.

Then the Indians had been asked to make a treaty, give up their lands and their rights and receive education and money and be put in reservations. It was probably an easy solution at that time, but socially it was bad. All this remains in the minds of the Indians as the start of their misfortunes.

The Lake of the Woods Indians were probably the most primitive in the history of Canada. They had their old pagan way of living and this meant fishing and hunting in plenty and not too much hard work in the process. What can be done?, asked the speaker.

Father St. Jacques had one definite solution, and that was to make a moral plowing around the reservations and clear away the parasites, who hang around and propagate sex and liquor. Try putting in good seed. Locally we should be united and put our forces together and try and improve the mentality of the Indians. It can be done, but will take time and effort. We have to gain their confidence and help improve their way of life. There should be more understanding in high officialdom, and he felt such organizations, such as Rotary, could help to solve Indian problems with love and understanding and the chasing away of prejudices.

Father St. Jacques told his hearers that they will never assimilate the Indians, but we should learn to respect their traditions and admit them as one of our own.

Rotarian E. L. Carter thanked the speaker for his understanding and sympathetic approach to the Indian problem, and felt that many avenues yet awaited the white eager and willing to understand and to help.

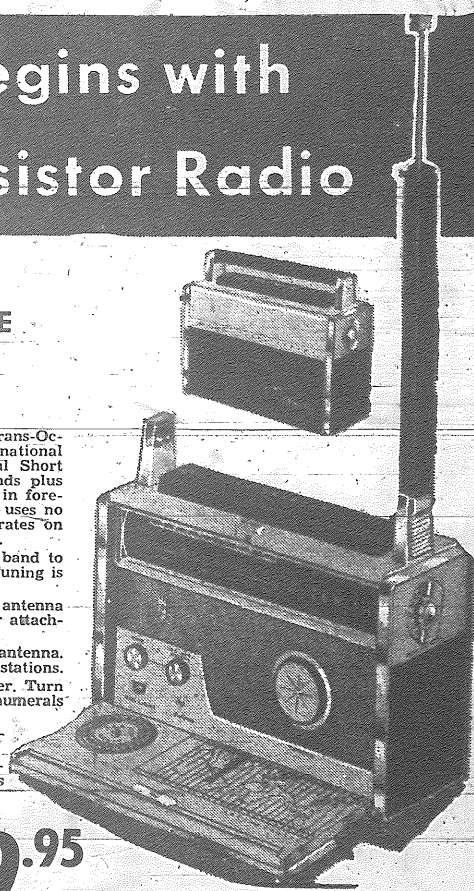
