What kind of people reside in Kenora? That, surely, must be the principal reaction of citizens from coast-to-coast who have listened to and read the almost inspired type of racial-discrimination propaganda originating here and fed to sensation-hungry reporters. Are we Indian-haters? heartless individuals who stand idly by watching the brutal beating of a man because he was an Indian? Does the small criminal element represent the people of this community?

Locally the question arises - Why this sudden outburst of publicity? What acts of racial discrimination prompted the levying of the charges by Mr. Ivan Robson? The public knows only of his one attempt at proof, when he selected three Indians to make a test for a Free Press reporter and failed miserably. In each of three cafes where tests of discrimination were made, the Indians were treated with equal courtesy to others. And while on this subject, the imaginative Free Press reporter who dreamed up the stunt might have really had a story if he had taken the same three Indians to Winnipeg and followed the same procedure at the best Portage Avenue cafes and at leading city hotels.

However, the question remains, why this sudden outburst of publicity? The answer seems to come from this same Winnipeg Free Press reporter who quotes Mr. Robson in his latest column as saying: "I prepared the sermon because I was tired of the hush-hush policy of the Kenora newspapers." (the full text of the report appears in the next column).

We are the first to admit that Mr. Robson is entitled to his opinion on the editorial policy of this newspaper. We share his displeasure apparently, with the Daily Reminder. Why? We are anxious for Mr. Robson to elaborate.

If the Free Press has correctly quoted Mr. Robson, the facts are clear. Mr. Robson, asked to fill the vacant pulpit at the Presbyterian Church September 20th (a week after the Bearman beating) preached his discrimination sermon. His sermon highlights reached a correspondent for Canadian Press.

To the best of the writer's knowledge, Mr. Robson has never made any written or oral complaint or suggestion of criticism of editorial policy to this paper. Mr. Robson has been given free radio time (a half hour each Sunday afternoon on CJRL - our sister company) to air his worthwhile work. We would be most happy to make space available to him in the Miner and News. He may have constructive criticism to offer.

Of the principles which guide the editorial policies of some of the larger Canadian dailies, we can find no excuse. The power of a newspaper lies in its ability to tell its story quickly to a vast reader audience. For that reason it must be sure of its facts, knowing that no amount of explanation, correction, excuse or apology can right the initial wrong of an incorrect report. A newspaper has an opportunity for service; to build and not to tear down. The privilege of service and a recognition of its responsibilities to society should be its first concern.

The Winnipeg Free Press reporter found little, if any basis for fact in the charges levied by Mr. Robson. Certainly he found no condition here more acute than he would find in his own home town. He has not rendered a service to anyone, and a distinct disservice to the people of Kenora and district.

## YOU BE THE JUDGE!

When reporters from Toronto and Winnipeg descended on Kenora this week to report, first hand, charges of racial discrimination, one of the charges investigated was that Mrs. Pat Bourgeault of the Miner and News, staff had "threatened" Mr. Robson during a telephone conversation with him.

Mr. Robson, together with reporters from the Winnipeg Tribune and the Free Press gathered in the M & N office to clarify the charges. The following are the reports as published by their respective papers. Are they talking about the same meeting?

### WINNIPEG FREE PRESS

KENORA (Special) — Ivan Robson, the Presbyterian missionary who lit the bonfire of publicity under this town's Indian problem, reaffirmed Friday that he had been warned about the consequences.

Mr. Robson said he considered several conversations with Kenora residents as warnings, but not as threats.

"I interpret the word 'warning' as one of caution," Mr. Robson said. "I have never been threatened with any consequences of a physical nature."

### TELEPHONE CALL

Asked about a telephone conversation with a Kenora newspaper, which he first said contained a warning about publicity, Mr. Robson said he could not recall the exact words.

He said the first part of the conversation was occupied with the reporter's efforts to find out how Winnipeg and Toronto newspapers heard about his sermon, which blasted race prejudice in Kenora.

"I was asked if I had sent copies of the sermons to the newspapers, and I said no," Mr. Robson said.

### A HOPE

The missionary said the reporter then expressed the hope that the publicity would not harm him or Kenora.

"I think some of the words used were 'I hope you won't get hurt by it,'" Mr. Robson said.

Mr. Robson said he told the reporter later and had told a Toronto newspaper that he'd preached the sermon to draw attention to the problem. "I told them," he said, referring to the Toronto paper, "that I prepared the sermon because I was tired of the 'hush - hush' policy of the Kenora newspapers."

### FAVORABLE REACTION

Mr. Robson said he had received the backing of Keewatin police chief Jack Beckworth in this matter. And he had received only favorable reaction to the sermon and to the newspaper accounts which had reached Kenora.

"I realize the people who disagree with me aren't talking directly to me," he said, "but I have had a great number approach me with congratulations, both on the sermon and on the newspaper accounts."

"Some Kenora people in high places may have been hurt by the publicity," Mr. Robson said. "I think that is what was meant when I was told Kenora would be hurt."

### WINNIPEG TRIBUNE

Already shaken by the missionary's sermon last Sunday, based on a recent fight in near-by Keewatin between four white men and an Indian, Kenorans received another shock Thursday when they picked up a certain Winnipeg newspaper and read — "Kenora Pastor Warned — Told Publicity on Beating Indian Harmful!"

The story said the Kenora newspaper had warned the missionary, Rev. Ivan Robson, that "the publicity will hurt both your cause, and the town."

Toronto newspapers, picking up the story earlier Thursday started telephoning Mr. Robson at 7 a.m. to ask him about the "warnings."

"Warnings" Fade  
Fortunately, the "warnings" faded away Thursday afternoon when newsmen brought Mr. Robson to the office of the Kenora paper, where he met the news editor who had telephoned him.

"I only told you I hope the Toronto papers treat this in the right light," said the editor, a woman.

"That's right," said Mr. Robson. "Was that a warning?" asked the editor.

"I guess not," said Mr. Robson. "Everybody was happy except the editor, the local correspondent of the Winnipeg newspaper which published the 'warning' story. The newspaper somehow had failed to contact her before the story was written."

## Fire Damages Campbell Bros. Store, Friday

Fire of unknown origin last night did considerable damage to the repair section of Campbell Brothers store on Second Street. Firemen were called to the scene at 7:15 p.m. Two booster lines were used to extinguish the flames which had secured a good hold in the one corner of the store. The fire was under control in a matter of minutes and the bridge was back in the fire hall within half an hour.

Considerable damage to contents by heat and smoke is reported. No estimate of damage is yet available nor is the cause of fire known.

ing that Gellenbeck be fired for being under the influence of alcohol when on duty.

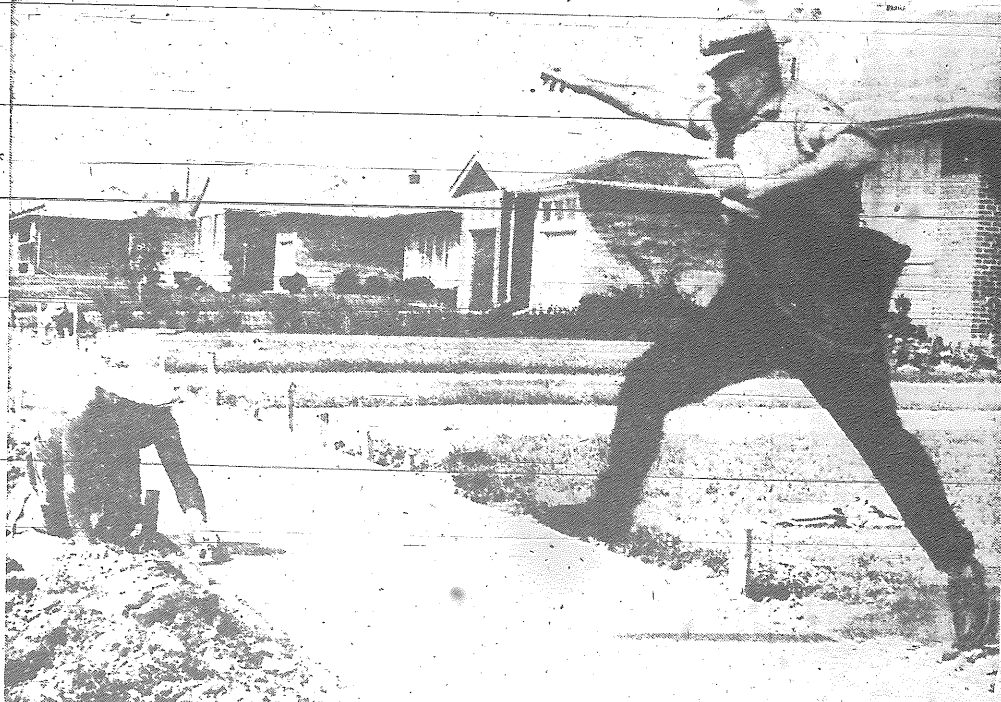

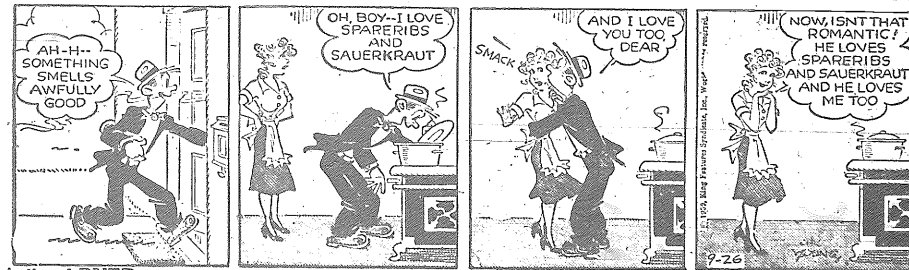

**KITCHEN CLASSICS**

Today's recipe for Squash Currant Buns is a good example of how a little ingenuity can turn a simple yeast-raised bun into a very special taste treat.

These large, rounded buns, generously dotted with currants, have a soft and moist texture. Their rich and golden color is due to the squash, the main flavor ingredient in the recipe. Although squash is a fall vegetable, it is readily available all year round in the frozen state. Just before baking the tops of the buns are brushed with melted butter or margarine and sprinkled with a mixture of sugar and ginger. This gives the crusts a spicy and sugary glaze. They would make a most appropriate addition to the traditional Thanksgiving menu.

**SQUASH CURRANT BUNS**  
Yield - 1 1/2 dozen buns  
1/2 cup milk  
1/3 cup lightly-packed brown sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 cup shortening

1/2 cup lukewarm water  
1 teaspoon granulated sugar  
1 envelope active dry yeast  
1 well-beaten egg  
1/2 cup mashed-cooked fresh squash or thawed frozen squash (at room temperature)  
4 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour  
3/4 cup currants, washed and dried

Melted butter or margarine  
2 tablespoons granulated sugar  
1 teaspoon ground ginger  
Scald milk; stir in brown sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm.

Meanwhile, measure lukewarm water into a large bowl; stir in the 1 teaspoon granulated sugar. Sprinkle with yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, then stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, well-beaten egg and squash. Stir in 2 cups of the flour and beat until smooth and elastic. Stir in currants and sufficient additional flour to make a soft dough - about 2 cups more. Turn out dough on floured board or canvas and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 1 1/2 hours.

Punch down dough. Turn out on lightly-floured board or canvas and knead until smooth. Divide dough into 2 equal portions. Shape each portion into a roll 9 inches long; cut each roll into nine 1-inch pieces. Shape pieces of dough into smooth balls and place, well apart, on greased cookie sheets. Grease tops. Cover with a tea towel. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk - about 45 minutes. Brush buns with melted butter or margarine and sprinkle with a mixture of the 2 tablespoons granulated sugar and gin-

The debate pertaining to education is going on at all levels of society with increasing momentum in the sense of the number of speeches made, the articles and books written as well as the many meetings and conferences held.

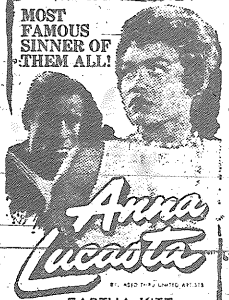

School Football Awards Planned

An All Star Football Awards program for high schools—the first in Canada—was announced Monday.

Under the program an all-star team will be selected from each province from among the leagues competing in senior high school football.

"In this initial year the program will be confined to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. However, next year we hope and expect to extend it to every province where high school football is played."

Top lineman and top backfielder in each province will be awarded a \$250 scholarship to the university he attends.

An award will also go to each coach, who produces an all-star player.

All-star players would be chosen by high school coaches, football referees, and sports-writers. He said scoring would be based on the average number of points a player received from each of those voting for him.

"Playing skill is not the only element to be considered in voting. Players will also be scored on a co-operativeness, sportsmanship and aggressiveness. In this way, the Awards Program will work not only towards the development of better Canadian players, but also, towards the kind of positive character development that good competition can produce in young athletes."

Elevator Collapse Creates 12 Foot Wave In Superior

Port Arthur Ont.—Collapse of one section of a huge waterfront grain elevator spilled more than two million bushels of grain into Lake Superior Wednesday night.

Wheat, oats, barley and flaxseed slithered into the water as tons of concrete gave way.

The combination created a 12-foot wave which flooded a nearby pumping station grounded a tug and dislodged a half-dozen float planes, moored nearby. Some pulp log rafts were washed ashore.

There were no reports of injuries.

The elevator is owned by The United Grain Growers Ltd.

Police estimated the total damage at about 10 million dollars.

The 150-foot high workhouse center of the elevator, is flanked on the north and south by annexes. It was the south annex, which contained 64 bins, each 96 feet deep, that collapsed.

Recently, the Thunder Bay Harbor Improvement began driving steel pilings along the water edge beside the concrete front of the elevator to help stop deterioration. A retaining wall is known to have been damaged previously.

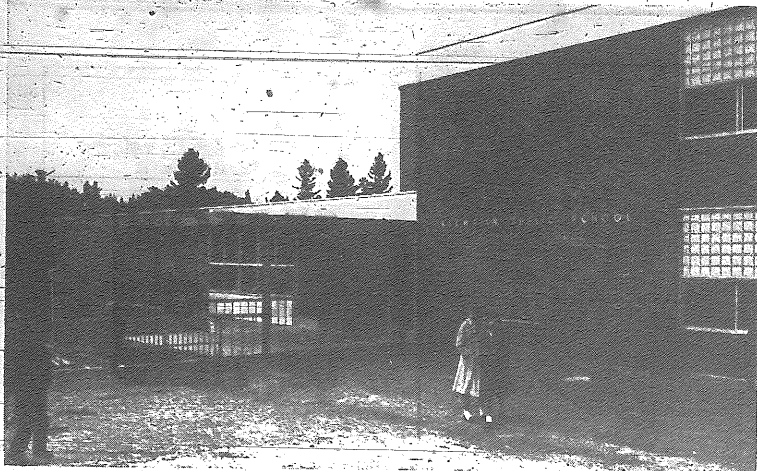

**Steel Work On Rainy River Bridge Set For February**

Cement work on the international bridge between Rainy River and Baudette will be completed this week, Ralph Knutson, bridge supervisor, reported on Tuesday. With the completion of this phase of the project, there will be a lull on bridge activities until early 1960 when the structural steel will be erected.

Work on the bridge construction started on March 15 by Barnett-McQueen Company and continued through the past six months.

Mr. Knutson said the pouring of pier number 7 on the Canadian side would be completed Thursday, but that the work crew would be in Rainy River for another week cleaning and storing equipment. Many of the huge pieces of machinery used on the job have already been removed to other locations of work in Canada.

Work completed to date on the bridge includes the erection of seven piers, four vents and two

abutments. Approximately 2,100 cubic yards of concrete was used for the job, requiring 12 carloads of cement.

It is expected that structural steel delivery will begin in December 1959, and that erection will begin in February, 1960. Completion date is still set for June, 1960.

Three hundred tons of steel bridge decking has already been delivered to the bridge site in Baudette. With the arrival of 800

tons of structural steel, starting December, all materials will be on hand for completion of the job.

In the current fiscal year the federal government will collect from the public and then turn over to the provinces -- in the form of subsidies, grants and other payments -- a total of \$1,212,000,000, a sum about equal to the amount that the provinces will collect on their own behalf.

1/2 cup lemon juice (4 lemons)

6-1/2 cups (2-3/4 lbs.) sugar  
1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin  
**FIRST PREPARE THE FRUIT.**

Peel and core about 1-1/2 quarts fully ripe pears. Chop very fine or grind. Add 1 cup canned crushed pineapple and mix well. Measure 4 cups fruit into a very large saucepan. Grate the rind and squeeze the juice from 4 medium-sized lemons. Measure 1 tablespoon rind and 1/2 cup juice into saucepan with fruit.

Then Make The Jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1/8-inch hot paraffin.

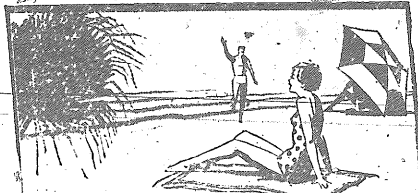

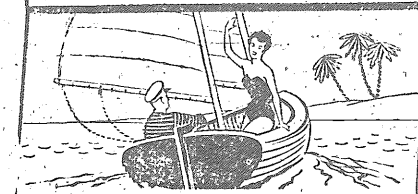

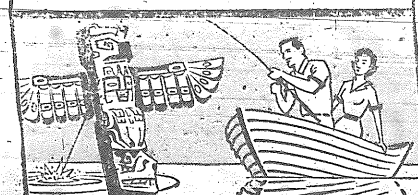
