Plans Finalized For Education Conference

The Ontario Teachers' Federation Educational Conference to be held at the Kenora-Keewatin District High School on October 2 and 3, 1959, will consist of the following. A session on Friday evening open to the general public with two prominent guest speakers. The Saturday session will be for registered delegates from elementary and secondary schools of this district, school boards, and Home and School members.

The Saturday program will consist of: registration, group discussions, an evaluation period, and a summing up of the conference.

The group topics for discussions will be as follows:

1. Aims and responsibilities of the school.
 - (a) the purpose of the public school,
 - (b) the purpose of the high school,
 - (c) the responsibility of parents and the community.
2. Standards in Education.
 - (a) fundamental standards in written and spoken English; reading; the influence of English, or English as a tool subject in the "other" subject areas;
 - (b) Standards of preparation and achievement.
3. Exceptional Children.
 - (a) Gifted children; mentally retarded children; physically retarded children;
 - (a) The reorganization of the school system to meet these varied needs.
4. Cost of Education.
 - (a) What are we getting now for our education dollar?
 - (a) What will further improvements cost and how much are we prepared to pay for these improvements?
 - (s) What could we get for more money?

The success of the various discussion groups depends on the contribution of each individual in the group. It is hoped that many will attend on Friday night in order to hear the two outstanding speakers on the program. All prospective delegates for the Saturday sessions would be well advised to make the necessary arrangements.

Relative to the Norman sewer and water project, the Ontario Water Resources Commission suggested that in view of the project being a joint undertaking between them and the town of Kenora and the consequent difficulty in separating the limits of responsibility, that consideration be given to the Commission calling tenders and letting the contract by arrangement with the Town whereby the Ontario Water Resources Commission would be paid directly by the Town for its share of the project.

The commission will be informed that Council is agreeable to such an arrangement provided the Town is kept informed of proceedings and consulted in the matter of tenders and the letting of any contract for the work.

WINTER WORK

Council endorsed the resolution of the city of Barrie requesting the Provincial and Federal governments include tree trimming and removal in the winter employment scheme. A circular letter from the Hon. W. K. Warrender, Minister of Municipal Affairs dealing with the Municipal Winter Works Incentive Plan was referred to council as a whole.

CPR SUBWAY

Referred to council as a whole was a letter from C. F. Gwyn, C.P.R. Superintendent at Kenora in which he stated that relative to the proposed subway crossing under the company's right-of-way at 9th Avenue.

In studying the plans it would appear that with the proposed 14 foot clearance the project may be feasible—and under the circumstances there would be no objection to developing such a scheme.

The matter of relocating our Yard Office and other facilities and also interruption to Railway Operations would have to be carefully developed before the plans are finalized.

I cannot say what it would be the Railway contributions as this feature would have to be developed with the Management and also be governed by the Board of Transport. Further to the subway, the town's consulting engineer suggested that if matters have been cleared with the local office of the C.P.R. that consideration be given to an application to the Board of Transport Commissioners for an order authorizing

the work to be undertaken. This was referred to a Committee of the Whole for consideration.

ROTARIANS HEAR FUNCTIONS OF NATIONAL EMPLOYMENT SERVICE

The work of the National Employment Service, especially relating to the operations of the Kenora office, in which free services are available to employees and employers to secure employment or help, with the preliminaries carried out by the local office, were ably described to members of the Kenora Rotary Club on Monday by Rotarian William Whitehead making his Vocation talk.

President T. A. O'Flaherty was in the chair and attendance this week was 94.44% and last week, 96.30%. Tickets for the opera "The Barber of Seville" which will be presented in Kenora on November 10th, sung in English, were distributed to the members, and interested citizens should contact any Rotary member for tickets.

Introduced by E. L. Carter, Mr. Whitehead said it was a privilege to speak to employers who

should be familiar with the work of the National Employment Service. His personal assignment was to interview employers advising of the services available and to date some have been unfamiliar with these services or taken advantage of them. Much time and effort could be saved by employers and workers trying to get together.

The problem of labour contacts and relationships went back to Biblical days, stated Mr. Whitehead, for the hiring of help for the vineyard was mentioned in Matthew's gospel, and also a labour dispute re hours of labour is mentioned elsewhere. For years employers and employees met in the market place to discuss employment and later agencies had been started in Europe, and later the North American continent, all on a profit basis.

There have been a great deal of surprises in the National and American Leagues this past summer. In fact, we can't remember a season just like it. After all Doc, the White Sox were picked to finish a solid fourth in the junior circuit and everybody, including Red Smith, picked the Dodgers for seventh in the National.

Now it appears quite likely that these two clubs will meet in the World Series. The Sox made it to the royal road of luxury by winning thirty-six one run ball games and by defeating the only other team in the race, Cleveland, with considerable ease. CP AIRLINES SET FLIGHT RECORD

Tokyo.—A Boeing 707 Intercontinental Jet Airliner with Canadian Pacific Railway President N. R. Crump, and G.W.G. McConachie, President, Canadian Pacific Airlines, on board, set a new non-stop flight record over the nearly 4,900 mile course from Seattle to Japan, Sunday.

In 1909 Great Britain and Germany organized government agencies, and Canada after discussing it in 1918 made it an accomplished fact with the organization of the National Employment service in 1941. Previously the work was done by private agencies and by some Labour Unions to help their members.

Today the service was national, and free, both to employers and employees, and every citizen could register, not only to seek employment but also, to better themselves, or the highly selective system could distribute their application through national agencies. Mr. Whitehead felt that the securing of information from the employees could save employers much time and effort.

Kenora was only one of thirty-five offices in the Prairie Region with Headquarters in Winnipeg, and there were five regions in Canada from Moncton, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg to Vancouver covering the Dominion with their services.

Our area was a large one, approximately 9,000 square miles, and considerable work was done each Spring circulating the report operators to ascertain their needs for the tourist season.

Mr. Whitehead assured the employers and employees of their willingness to serve and to make all possible information available to both.

President T. A. O'Flaherty thanked the speaker for his able and informative address.

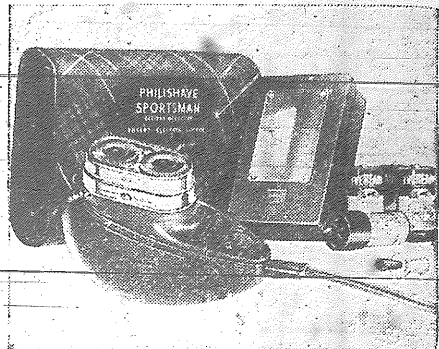

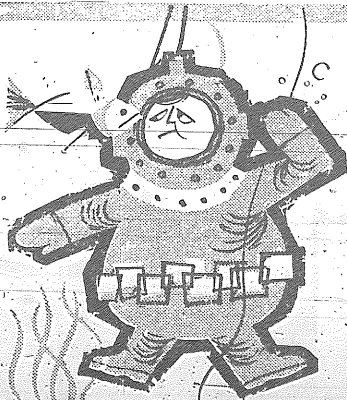
