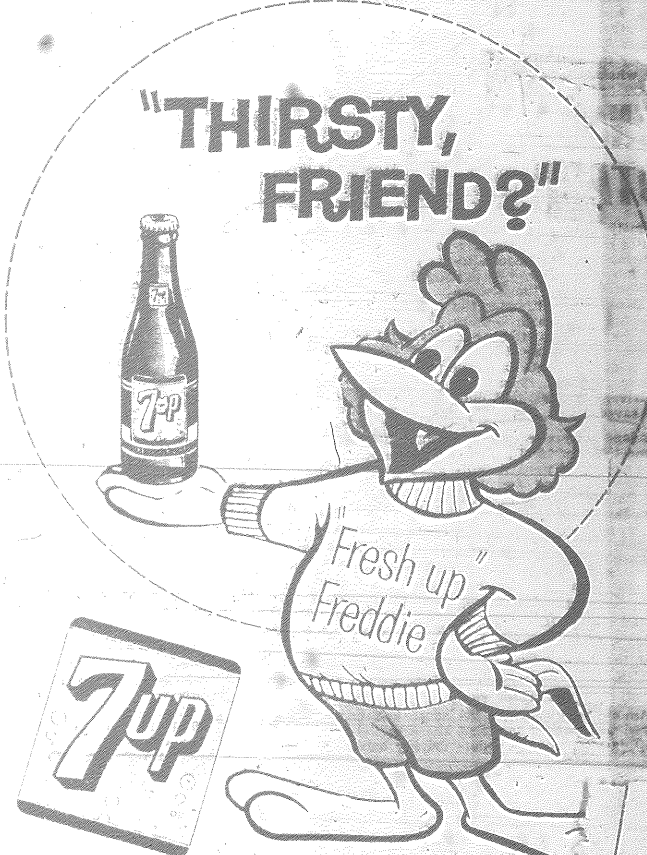

Magistrate's Court

Saturday, Magistrate J. V. Fregeau heard four cases dealing with infractions of the liquor laws.

A Kenora youth charged with consuming liquor while a minor was given a six month's suspended sentence and posted a bond of \$25 to keep the peace. Two second-offence drunks each paid \$50 and costs or 15 days while a first offender paid \$10 and costs or 7 days.

This morning at court, three youths, two from Kenora and one from Keewatin each paid \$10 and costs or 7 days for consuming liquor while under age.

A 73-year old man charged with being drunk was given a six month's suspended sentence and was placed on probation after posting a bond of \$25.

A Kenora man and a man from a Mando camp, charged with fighting in a public place each paid \$15 and costs.

Two women charged with intoxication each paid \$10 and costs or seven days.

Three charges laid by the Keewatin police resulted in a Pine Falls man paying \$10 and costs for having a wing at a place other than a residence and two drunks each being fined \$10 and costs.

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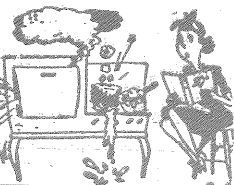

NEVER-FAIL Pastry
1 pound pastry lard
5 cups unsifted cake and pastry flour

1 heaping teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 tablespoon lemon juice and enough cold water to make 3/4 cup liquid

Blend pastry lard into dry ingredients with pastry blender until mixture is like coarse meal. Add beaten egg and liquid. Mix with pastry blender, cutting the mixtures with the blender, not stirring. Chill, if desired. (This makes enough pastry for 3 double crust pies or several dozen tarts. It stores in the refrigerator for a week or freezes well for several weeks.)

Safe Toys For This Christmas

Christmas is coming soon, and little boys and girls are already dreaming of the toys they'll get under the tree on that magic morning. It's the season for toy shopping. SAFE toy shopping.

With so many wonderful toys to choose from, perhaps too little thought is given to whether a youngster will be safe playing with a certain toy. We think perhaps of a toy's value, its durability, and the delight it will give a child. Let's think, too, of the most important thing of all, is the toy a safe one?

A study done by the Ontario Safety League has brought out some interesting facts, which should help parents in their shopping this year.

Here is a guide to safe toy shopping:

1. Avoid fireworks, gang that shoot any missile, darts, chemicals, sets, sharp edged toys and toys with small detachable parts.

2. Always teach children how to use their toys.

3. Be sure to choose toys suitable to the age of the child. NEVER give a toy that is too "adult" to a young child.

In the age group under two, toys should be too big to swallow, light in weight, washable, have safe colors and rounded corners and edges. Some suggestions are: Rattles, ruddy animals, floating toys, balloons, balls, take-apart toys, cloth books, blocks, toys to hang, and push-and-pull toys.

From two to four, toys should induce physical play, train the eye and improve coordination. Some suggestions, push-and-pull

toys, wagons, wheelbarrows, play equipment, cubs, under supervision, tricycles, modelling clay, hand puppets, block letters, paint and crayon sets.

In the age group four to six, or Kindergarten age, toys should develop imagination and initiative, stimulate play with other children, and in case of mobile toys, be sturdy and well balanced. Suggestions: Play clothes, simple construction sets, cars, trucks, planes, simple games, doll houses, small sports equipment, boats, and sand toys.

Then, from six to eight, the beginning of the "toy" age, as well as the competitive age, toys which encourage individual interests and those which induce group play are both good.

Suggestions: Carpenter tools, road staves, play chess sets for playing street, tank, filling station, or the train, marked with either USA, or U.I. scale, books, and easy make rifle.

Over eight years of age, boys should encourage the child's changing and developing interests. "Dobbies" will have a strong appeal.

Suggestions: Hobby equipment, photography, coin and stamp collecting, puppet shows, one musical instruments, gym and sports equipment, science sets, model kits, weaving looms, sewing sets, table tennis, and games.

All in all, toys may be made and sold, but they must be safe. And there are many more safe toys than you can count on your hands for a really Merry Christmas.

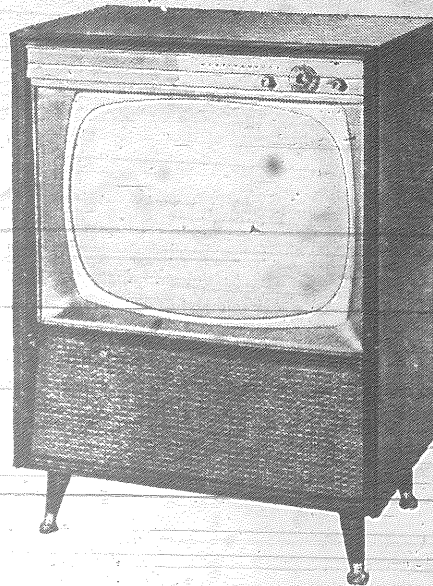

'Grammy' Program Hits Dull Moments

NEW YORK — Historically, the Awards Show (the giving of Oscars and Emmys) is a television format which has run the gamut from complete fiasco to plain dull.

It would seem, however, that a show where the makers of the year's best phonograph records are given statuettes and also repeat their winning performances would be a natural for a musical show. Unfortunately, the Grammy Show on NBC Sunday night ran into the same snags that slowed down and often stopped the earlier ones. They are those awkward moments of presentation.

The "grammy" is a small golden replica of the old-fashioned talking machine which is awarded by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences. The show made 34 awards and presented a double handful of performing stars.

The producers did a handsome job of dressing up many of the numbers.

But there were also the long, awkward moments. For instance, Van Cliburn mixed up the cards so thoroughly in making some presentations that it was hard to tell whether Jussi Bjoerling and the Boston Symphony won a statuette or whether it was Roberta Peters and Mozart. But anyway, the Grammy people stopped all that rushing up from the audience and those breathless thanks to all the good people who made it all possible.

Who won? Lots of people including Ella Fitzgerald for best feminine vocal performance, Bobby Darin for the best record of the year (Mack the Knife) and the best new artist of the year, and Duke Ellington for the best musical composition of the year (Anatomy of a Murder).

Frank Sinatra's album, Come Dance with Me, won him two awards. John Horton got top billing for country and western performance with The Battle of New Orleans and Jimmy Driftwood was honored for writing it.

"Well, then it's his problem."

UNDERWORLD POKE JIBES AT POLICE

STOCKHOLM — The underworld of Stockholm is in a position to insult the cops and get away with it—unless the police switch off their car radios.

This unrivaled opportunity for crooks to pay off old scores happened when thieves stole a complete police transmitter from a garage at headquarters.

The theft was discovered Saturday night and Sunday morning the police realized the full extent of the joke against them.

The thieves had installed the transmitter somewhere in Stockholm and spent the long, dull Sunday hours broadcasting messages and orders over the police network. The crews of the patrol cars had to listen to a string of imaginative insults from anonymous callers who also tried to direct the cars to fake addresses.

Within a radius of 30 miles of Stockholm the police broadcasting system was a mess. Chances of tracking the sender are said to be small, and reduced police reported that unless the thieves ceased their broadcasting, there will have to be a change of frequency.

PLAN DRIVE TO WEED OUT ENGLISH WORDS

PARIS — Watchdogs of the French language have set

aside next April 1 for a new campaign to weed out English words.

The French press will be examined line by line on that day by the French Vocabulary Office. The newspaper which dips least into English to inform its readers will receive a loving cup.

Despite repeated cries of alarm and remonstrance from French purists, such heresy as this is frequently heard or seen along the Champs-Élysées:

"Je prends mon sandwich au bar avec mon boy friend."

"Tel Stars' Night Club, Strip-tease show et sexy girls. Drinks au bar."

French couples tend to "flirt" these days.

When old friends meet, they go through a "shake-hand" routine, they may have a "glass" at the neighborhood bistrot.

Madame goes to a beauty shop to have a "peeling" (a good face scrubbing).

Then she may go off to buy a "pull" (pull-over in pure English).

DIFFICULT TREK

MOSCOW — The tractor train of Russia's fourth Antarctic expedition Sunday completed the first leg of its trek across the center of the icebound continent. The Soviet news agency Tass reported. It said the expedition encountered difficult conditions on the 320-mile trek inland with temperatures of 40 degrees below zero and more.

CONSTANT CHATTER ON TOKYO BUSES

Tokyo — The voice of the conductress rang out in the jam-packed bus:

"We are about to make a left turn. Please watch your balance. Next stop, Roppongi. We are sorry you have had an uncomfortable ride. Thank you very much for our patronage."

This sort of perpetual patter is standard procedure among Japanese conductresses. By virtue of a seemingly unlimited capacity for patience, stamina and courtesy, they engaged in one of Japanese most exhausting female occupations.

Every alighting passenger gets a polite "thank you."

When leapers spill as others push and shove their way into an already over-crowded bus, the conductress apologetically appeals:

"We are extremely sorry you should be subjected to such discomfort, but will you please make your way farther to the rear."

Then "aw-ral," she shouts to the driver. This is a Japanese variation of "all right," used to signify the bus may start.

It's the conductress's job to know the "bumps" on the road along her route; for she must warn passengers to "please hang on, the road is rough ahead."

These women range in age from 15 to 23. They work an eight-hour day six days a week and get paid \$22 a month.

In Tokyo, which has 4,400 buses, applicants spend a month to six weeks in training.

The Japanese bus rider has long since become oblivious to the conductress's talk.

"But," a city official said, "courtesy is our motto. We must keep it up."

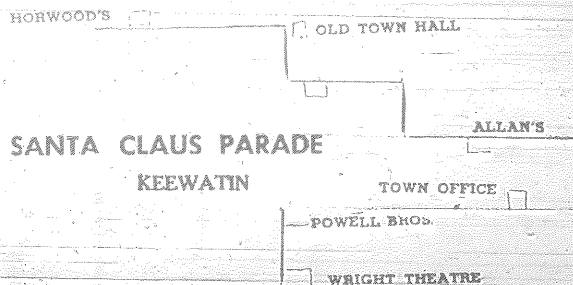


Those participating in the parade will line up by Knox United Church on Fifth Avenue South, north to First St. South, west of the Fire Hall and ready to march at 2 p.m.

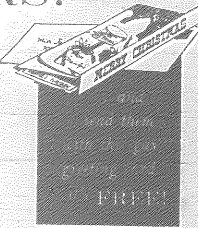

CPA INTRODUCES "NEW LOOK" IN AIRCRAFT

Vancouver, B.C.—Introduction of a "New Look" in aircraft flying across Canada was completed Tuesday when Canadian Pacific Airlines' newest Britannia jetliner, powered by four turbo-propellers, was introduced into service between Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal. The 400-hp-100-hp, 100-passenger aircraft is one of two Britannia's recently ordered from Bristol Aircraft Company (U.K.). Both airlines will now be operated exclusively on the airlines cross-Canada service. These aircraft incorporate a

completely new interior design featuring a combination of pastel shades and gold. Gold-trimmed cabin bulkheads, carpets, seats and other interior furnishings have prompted CPA employees to dub the aircraft "The Golden Britannias".

For the first time in Canada, air travellers will be served gourmet meals from two galleys, to ensure more efficient passenger service.

As part of the new service, first class passengers will have a choice of meals. At each meal serving, these passengers will be able to choose from such delicacies as steak, golden-brown chicken and other mouthwatering examples of gourmet fare.

ANGLICANS PLAN AID FUND

TORONTO—A special fund to provide quick financial aid in emergencies in this country and elsewhere has been inaugurated by the Anglican Church of Canada.

Most Rev. Howard H. Clark, Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, said today a national appeal will be made February 21 for contributions to the fund, to be known as the Primate's World Relief Fund.

Mr. Clark said at least \$100,000 will be contributed to World Relief's Year by the church. He said the church will launch a campaign to make Anglicans fully aware of current world relief needs.

The November Meeting of the Mount Carmel Home and School Association took place November 23rd in the Notre Dame Parish Hall. The Meeting opened with a Prayer lead by Rev. Father Savic, followed by C. Canada.

Mr. R. Prefontaine, vice president was in the chair and conducted a short business meeting, followed by the program.

Rev. Father Savic, Religious Education Chairman, introduced a panel of guests, Rev. Father P. Gorich, the Spiritual Director of the O.M. of Sacred Heart Parish in Winnipeg; Dr. M. Grace and Dr. J. Grace who are active workers in the marriage preparation courses for Winnipeg Youth. The subject of their panel discussion dealt with the Social Life Conference held October 9th-11th in Sudbury, which all had attended. The theme of the conference was Family Life, stressing the need in this modern world for work done with the parents, family, friends and parents and the needs of the child.

The principal needs are:
1. Love and respect of himself before he can do same toward others, love as a human being.
2. A condition in the household to encourage self sacrifice and generosity in the child.

By this discipline, it was pointed out, the child in his early life will be more prepared to face the inevitable setbacks in later life. Father Gorich explained that the vocation of parenthood, the

responsibility of parents to their children, was the most difficult job today, in the eyes of God.

It is also necessary for the parents to make the child feel loved and to be available for the child's needs. In this way, a bond will be made between the parent and the growing child from youth to mature adult.

The program closed with a question and answer period by the audience. This was followed by a social hour.

Idea For Traffic Safety May Be Worth \$50 To You

Cash prizes for highway safety suggestions will be the newest aid to solving Ontario's traffic problems. The awards, to be known as the Jack Hammett Highway Safety Suggestion awards, were announced by Mrs. Hammett in commemoration of the late mining figure's great interest in traffic safety.

All members of the public are invited to submit ideas on traffic safety improvements in Ontario. Seventeen prizes of \$500 each will be awarded for the best ideas from each of the Ontario provincial police districts. For the best idea from the Province of Ontario an additional award of \$1,000 will be presented.

Suggestions should be simple, practical and based on saving of life and the preservation of property on the streets and highways of Ontario.

Suggestions should be properly identified with the name and address of the sender, should not exceed 150 words in length and

must be postmarked not later than noon December 9, 1959. They should be mailed to The District Inspector, Ontario Provincial Police, Kenora, Ontario.

Judging the contest in each Ontario Provincial Police district will be a panel of well-known citizens. The contest is being supervised by the attorney general's department.

Ont. Gold Mine Production Down For October

In October, 30 producing mines reported the milling of 794,030 tons of ore which yielded 227,192 ounces of gold and 31,733 ounces of silver, with a total value of \$7,555,867. In the same period in 1958, the same mines reported milling 801,365 tons of ore yielding 230,251 ounces of gold and 35,097 ounces of silver, with a total value of \$7,812,437.

The daily averages for October were 25,914 tons milled, 7,329 ounces of gold and 1,127 ounces of silver, and a production value of \$243,825.

The average grade of ore was \$9.52 and the average number of wage earners was 11,000.

WANTS WOMEN IN GOVERNMENT

CHATHAM — A plea for more women to get into government at all levels was made by Senator Muriel Ferguson of New Brunswick, addressing the Women's Civic Association here.

The senator noted that Ontario is giving a lead to other provinces in the number of women taking part in government. Ontario has a senator, three members of the House of Commons, including a cabinet minister — Hon. Ellen Fairbairn — six mayors, four reeves, five deputy mayors, four controllers, 42 aldermen or councillors.

"I hope you will have many more women who will be willing

to give of their time and talents to participate in government which, I believe, would be better for it," she said.

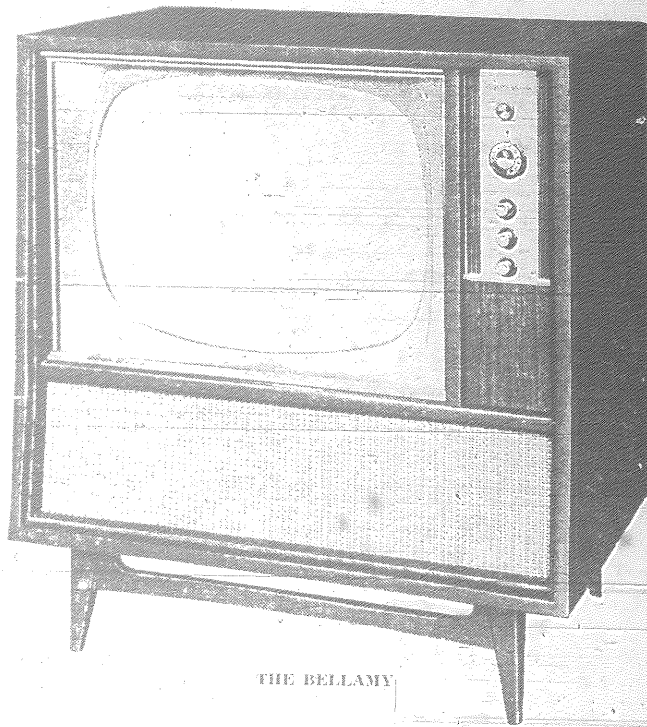
