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Citizens Applaud Council's Work

EXCELLENT REPORTS; VOTE APPEALS FEATURE OF TOWN HALL MEETING

The spotlight was turned on civic affairs last night when approximately 150 interested ratepayers attended the annual Joyce-sponsored Town Hall meeting in the Legion Auditorium. Near the conclusion of the three-hour meeting, following reports on trusteeship by elected representatives, a verdict of confidence and appreciation was given in the form of a standing ovation to Mayor Peter Ratuski, Aldermen Sewell, Paterson, and Stratton who are retiring from civic life this month.

Almost without exception, the 25 men and women on last night's platform praised the efforts of the Junior Chamber in arranging the worthwhile meeting. Keen attention was given to all speakers, despite the necessary length of the presentations. No small credit was given to the able chairman, Ken McInnes, who kept speakers moving promptly to and from the platform.

Kenora's business affairs were again outlined by the various chairmen last night, and their excellent reports indicated that Council and School Board matters were handled by keenly enthusiastic men and women.

Mayor Ratuski and Aldermen Sewell, last night's meeting was their 11th and final. Completing six years and also leaving active civic life is Alderman Paterson. The fourth retiring Council member, Alderman Stratton, as did other speakers, expressed appreciation for help and encouragement received during his term of office.

Praise for the excellent service rendered to this community by Excel Coach Lines Limited was expressed by many speakers. Said Alderman Minor, "If Council had the power to grant a 10 year extension, it would have done so. It is noted that the Company had increased its service, its fleet, built and operated a first class depot and service garage to keep its units in top shape; had asked for no financial assistance and hired competent, courteous drivers. Those speaking on this subject asked for a "yes" vote Monday.

Always a highlight of any Town Hall meeting, but this year doubly so because of the mayoralty contest, was the speeches of candidates for various offices. No less than 11 of the 18 candidates on this year's ballots made their appeals from the Legion platform.

FINANCE

Kenora's financial affairs were outlined by Alderman George Sewell, finance chairman, the first speaker. A feature continues to be the extremely satisfactory collection of taxes, indicating confidence in Town affairs. Demands upon Council have been heavy, but nevertheless the Town will enjoy a small surplus again. Taxes will yield slightly over a million dollars in 1959 with other revenues bringing the total receipts to an estimated \$1,446,387. No new debenture debt was added in the past 12 months but capital repayment of \$105,000 will be made. Capital expenditure from revenue was given at \$85,500.

FIRE AND POLICE

Alderman A. E. Minor gave an excellent report on Kenora's fire and police protection services, but unfortunately time did not permit a complete presentation. Relations with men of both departments continues good, said the chairman, noting that the fire department is operating now on an experimental basis. With the exception of the ambulance and black maria, all vehicles are in good condition. Because of the disastrous Fenner Motor fire, \$170,000 losses this year are high at \$200,000. There have been 14 fires from 95 calls in the 10 month period reported; 220 ambulance trips, 30 on the highways. Park bus lots have been opened and

PARKS BOARD

Chairman Jim Armstrong told his listeners that local parks were well patronized during the season. Growth was noted in the Lakeside Park where additional land was acquired this spring. It will be a policy decision of Council to determine the eventual use of the park, he added. When the new bridge is completed, it will be possible to rebuild part of Memorial Park, said the chairman. Memorial Park and Congo Island were kept in fine condition again, and became increasingly popular near spots. Mr. Armstrong thought that Government assistance was warranted for future expansion work as the district is served by the Kenora authority.

PUBLIC WORKS

The daily services operated by the Public Works has been generally satisfactory this past year, said chairman Ald. Roy Stratton. He noted the completion of the new bridge on Parsons Street which will form part of the Minaki Road link soon. The hospital bridge is progressing well and local parking facilities improved. No paving was done this year. A survey of the proposed 9th Street subway was received and plans for this development are progressing. The speaker said that he had contacted property owners along the waterfront between First and Second Streets, with a view to exploring the possibility purchase of the waterfront lots. These latter have met once with Council in an exploratory talk. The plan, said the speaker, was to push out the water by use of fill, thus providing more downtown parking area, beautifying the waterfront and adding boating facilities.

WELFARE

Alderman Larry Johnson said that his first year on Council had been "an eye-opener" as far as

welfare work was concerned. He listed the numerous forms of aid available to those in need. Costs to the Town are about the same as a year ago, and he commended the "Do It Now" campaign and the winter works program. Some 1,300 people have been helped to date this year. The staff of the Welfare Department is doing a splendid job, the chairman concluded.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Summing up his feelings on the completion of 10 active years on Kenora's Council was done with

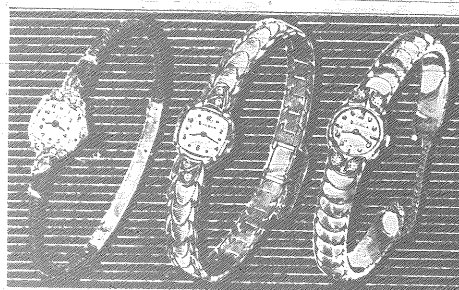

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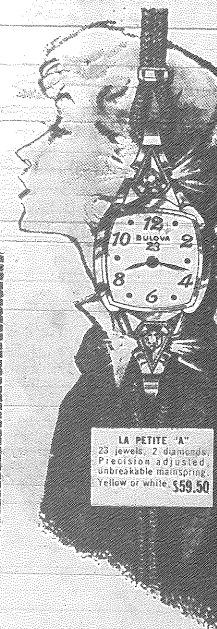

feeling, and sincerity by retiring Mayor Patruski. "I wish to start with a word of appreciation to the citizens for giving me the opportunity of serving you first as alderman and later as mayor. It has been an interesting and rewarding experience. His worship continued, "The progress of the past 10 years has not been inconsiderable. The future still holds a list of formidable work which to date has not been financially practical to undertake". He suggested that a master plan of priority, to blueprint the growth pattern, should be established and followed. He then mentioned several major municipal undertakings which previous speakers had omitted. In conclusion, His worship, recalling the many meetings in the last decade, said "I deem it an honour to represent the Town of Kenora. All I can offer you is a brief, thank you."

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD

This has been a year of steady progress - nothing outstanding, said the chairman of the Public School Board, Dr. S. M. Bairis. "We feel we have had a good year". He had words of thanks for the 3500 members, teachers and principals. All have given good service and have worked hard. Harmony has prevailed. Rising costs of education were not to be deplored, as the speaker said our concern should be with "better education". Presently 1,694 children attend our schools and next year the figure will be about 60 more. The cost per pupil is just under \$300 per year to educate. This compares well with Toronto which is \$241. The 1933 budget was \$171,000 and next year will exceed a half million dollars.

The speaker appealed for greater interest in our schools. "Children are your greatest asset. You cannot expect the teachers to do it all", he concluded.

SEPARATE SCHOOL BOARD

Mr. R. D. Proulx gave a brief, but important summary of

Separate School Board Problems. The standard of education is equal to public schools, he said, noting too that the 165 pupils presently attending the new Mount Carmel School's 13 classrooms, is averaging capacity. Two new rooms, plus a general purpose room must be added for next September, he stated.

CANDIDATES SPEAK

The two candidates for mayor delivered the first of 11 appeals from the 18 candidates seeking office. Four were absent. Mr. Charlie Bergman recalled highlights of six years "he has spent on Council, and said that today's 1 1/2 million dollar budget is getting beyond the capacity of the present 2,930 taxpayers to pay. He felt that greater cooperation was needed between the Council, Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Board and the Trades and Labour Council to find the solution to our lack of industrial expansion. Vigorous action is long overdue, he stated.

After a year's absence from Council, Eric Newman told listeners he is anxious to serve again. Many of the plans made during his 1 year on Council have become reality; others are still awaiting fulfilment, he said. He would like to have the opportunity of working for Kenora's continued development and prosperity, said the candidate for mayor. Experience well qualifies him for the high office as he had his 32 years in Kenora have been spent working with his hands and his mind in management of his firm, he said. He paid tribute to citizens employed by senior town employees.

ALDERMANIC CANDIDATES

Few concrete proposals for improvement of administration were advanced by four aldermanic candidates who addressed the meeting. Bill Johnson, the fifth candidate, is presently returning from Toronto. Speakers generally told of their experience which would be helpful to Council work. All agreed that employment opportunities must be found for Kenora's youth, if the Town is to prosper.

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD

Financial and administrative aspects of the schools operations were outlined by Mrs. E. Holland. The challenging and involved work of the Board had been a source of interest, said Mr. Vernon Kling, who felt that he was better equipped now to meet future problems. The third member of the Board to seek reelection, Mr. Earl Nelson, said that major repair jobs had saved many local schools which had "reached the stage of no return". He believes that future maintenance costs will be less than 1933. Mr. Evert Larson, a former alder-

man and school trustee, said he was again free to offer his services to the public, and asked for support at the polls.

SEPARATE SCHOOL BOARD

Three of seven candidates for Separate School trustees were absent last night. Two newcomers, Dr. J. C. Edie and Jack Hamer gave personal backgrounds as introductions while Mrs. Helen Dubenski, seeking reelection, asked for continued support for a lady candidate.

Lands And Forests List Winter Works Projects For District

With the release of many staff from fire duties due to the winter months, more time can be given to major repairs, renovation and replacement projects at the various headquarters in Kenora District, reports the Department of Lands and Forests.

Chief among these projects is the planned renovation of a portion of the District Garage in Kenora, to provide facilities for repairing, testing and storing of fire pumps and outboard motors. The addition of a garage at the District Forester's residence is now nearing completion. Many other smaller projects are now underway in the Kenora area.

Work is still progressing on the installation of a remote V.H.F. unit for the Dryden Chief Ranger Headquarters. A steel mast 150 feet high has been erected on a site west of the town of Dryden. Radio signals received there will be carried over telephone lines to the Chief Ranger's Office.

The miracle story of Pat and Mike and the freight train is being told throughout Rainy River

District this week. Patrick who is 2, and his older

brother Michael, 3, were in the back seat of the family car driven by their father Hugh Morrison, 42, of Pinewood on their way to visit their grandmother.

Morrison went to cross the CNR tracks in Pinewood when he noticed a freight train passing the village station only 250 feet or so

from the crossing. He slammed on his brakes before realizing that the front end of his car was already on the rails. Quickly he gunned the motor to attempt the crossing ahead of the fast moving freight.

The car wasn't quite fast enough. The diesel locomotive clip-

ped the last two feet off the car, shearing the 1959 car body just behind the back wheels.

Little Pat and Mike were thrown through a window and landed on a siding. They also landed running. Beyond a scratch to Mike's face that required a band-aid dressing, neither boy was injured.

Their father wasn't hurt either except for a case of shock.

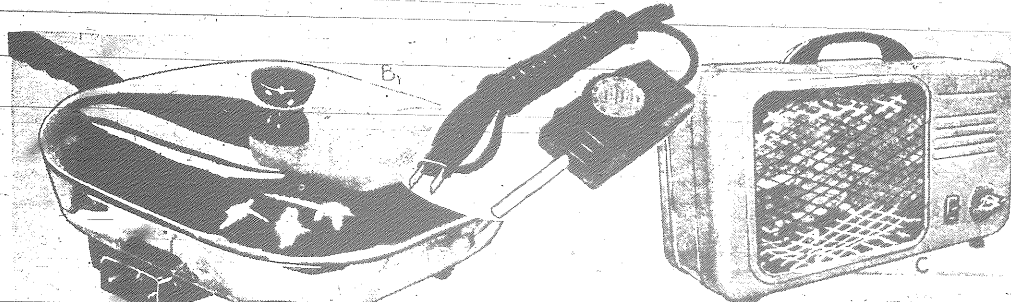
The west bound train was doing about 50 miles per hour. It was almost a mile past the accident before the engineer could get the heavy train stopped. By that time Pat and Mike were in full gallop.

The accident occurred Sunday morning but was just reported in Port Frances and International Falls today.

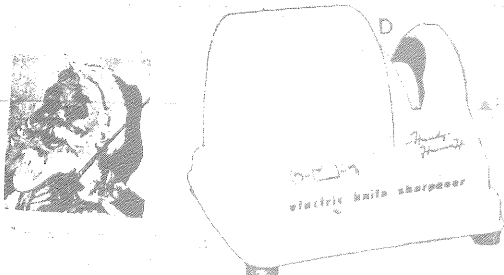
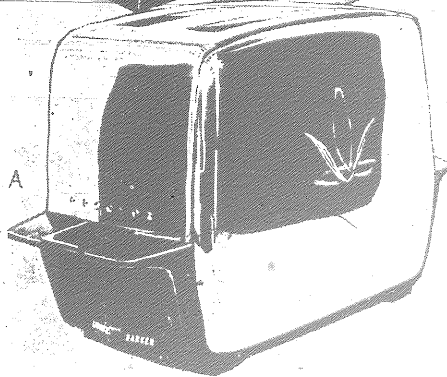

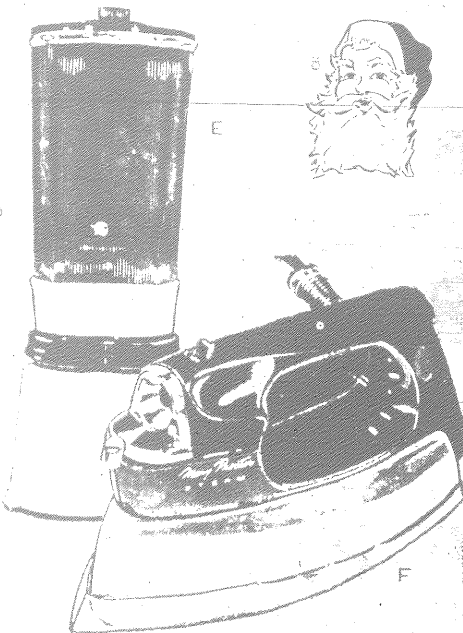

Three Youths Committed on Morals Count

Three Falls youths pleaded guilty today to carnal knowledge charges and were committed to long terms with the youth conservation commission. All three are minors.

Anderson said they will be transported to the YV reception center, presumably at St. Cloud, as soon as commitment papers are prepared.

The girl's condition is "unchanged," the hospital says.

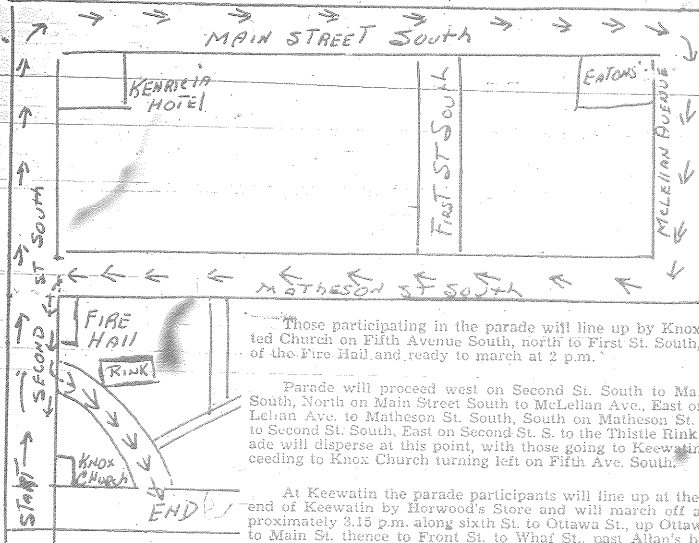

Her husband is a sculptor, Harry Moore. He is 46.

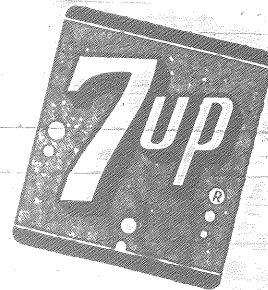
She said she had devoted many years to studying the secrets of living.

The Company shall maintain a transportation system as warranted by the requirements of the Town from time to time upon such streets and upon such schedules as to days of the week, daily service, frequency of service and fares to be charged as shall from time to time be mutually agreed upon by the Council of the Town of Kenora and the Company.
7. The Company shall keep all vehicles insured against public liability to passenger and public and property damage.
8. Any change in fares to be charged shall be made only with the approval of the Town Council.
9. The Council of the Town of Kenora shall have the right at any time and from time to time during the term of the agreement to appoint someone to examine the books, accounts, vouchers, records, balance sheets and other papers and documents

relating to the affairs of the Company and to take extracts therefrom.

10. The granting of the franchise shall not in any way conflict with the operation of ordinary taxi cabs within the Town of Kenora.

11. Any dispute arising out of or under the terms of the agreement shall be referred to the judge of the District Court of the District of Kenora as arbitrator and his decision shall be final and binding.

12. The franchise shall not be transferable without the consent of the Town.

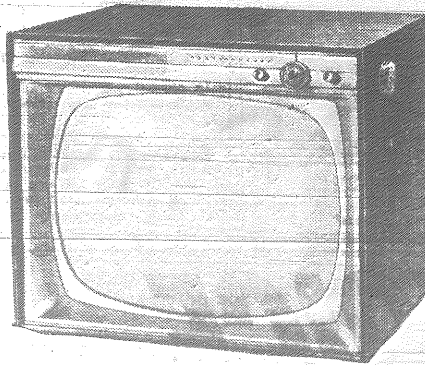
Mr. A. Friesen closed the evening by stating that children

The meeting was closed and a lovely lunch served.

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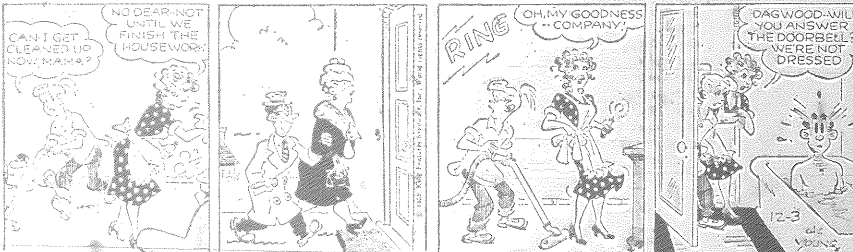
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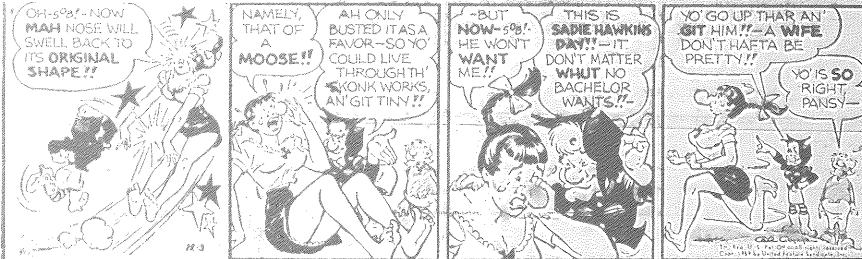

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
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Acclamations Are Feature Of Fort Frances Election
