## KENORA WELCOMES TELEVISION

### Public School Trustee - A Job Of Responsibility

The coming election for Public School Trustees again focuses attention on this important public office. Too often the trustee is "someone who is a transition from an ordinary mortal to a politician. In a recent speech at Saskatoon, Lt. Col. Kurt Swinton, Chairman of the National Conference on Education made the following statement: "let us say first that I consider the school trustee to be the unsung hero of Canadian public life."

The school trustee carries a heavy load of responsibility. The primary one is to provide the highest possible standard of education for our children, who must be prepared for the vastly different conditions that will be encountered in the coming years. What was good enough for Dad and Mom is not satisfactory for Junior in the year 2,000. This is closer than we think for the child who started to kindergarten last September 8 will be only 48 years of age in 2,000 A.D. and 95% of the pupils in the schools today will be living and working in that year.

The second and only slightly less important responsibility is to make sure that the standard achieved is within the capabilities of the municipality to finance. In recent years we have heard criticism from some municipal authorities with reference to the cost of education, as if the needs of our children can be equated with the needs for sewers, sidewalks, parking lots, and liquor licences! It is usually conceded that the money spent for education is the most important spent by any level of government. It is to the credit of our democratic way of life that this is administered not by the Federal or Provincial

government or even by the municipal council but by the school trustees, the low men on the political totem-pole. It is now generally acknowledged that every dollar spent on the education budget is worth many dollars of the national defense budget. It is not inconceivable that in the battle for men's minds it is the only line of defense that will hold.

This leads to the trustees' most important and often most frustrating responsibility - to make the community want a better and better standard of education. Their duty goes beyond building and maintaining schools, hiring teachers and seeking more funds for the support of the schools. They must provide the necessary leadership and guidance to the community so that the best possible educational system can be developed.

The school trustee in Ontario renders this service for the benefit of the community and receives no remuneration for it. The work load carried is large and statistics show that in the first eleven months of this year, the Kenora Public School Board met more than fifty times. Such is public service!

## WPG. MAROONS EDGE RED AND WHITES 3-2

Twelve hundred local hockey fans witnessed a close checking but exciting game at the Thistle Rink last evening and, while the Thistles were edged by a score of 3 to 2 by the clever Winnipeg Maroons, it is evident that Coach Charlie Rayner will have a real contender this year in the Ontario-Minnesota Hockey League. The score last night was 1 to 0 for the Maroons at the end of the first period, 3 to 0 at the end of the second and with two well executed goals by Ron Morgan and Merv Dubchuk in the early part of the third period it looked like the game could be tied. Coach Rayner pulled his goalie, Mort Johnson, in the last minute of play in an effort to get the tie and, if not for two terrific saves by agile Jim Henry seconds before the final whistle, would have had his tie. For the Maroons, Jim Henry in goal was his usual calm and capable self. Morgan's quick shot from a pass by Frank Leroux gave him no chance, and Dubchuk's drive from close in on a break-away was labelled. Morgan had an opportunity at

the fifteen minute mark of the third period to notch his second goal of the evening but Henry slid out to cover the fake and smothered the shot. Fred Dunsmuir and Murray Balagus were outstanding for the Maroons particularly in stickhandling and fast skating. The Winnipeg club plays were clean hockey and their players are certainly a model of deportment on and off the ice. They would be worthy representatives of Canada in any foreign tour or exhibition series.

Dennis Lambert and Bill and Eddie Devins played a standout game on defence as Rayner had to go with just three defencemen after the early injury to Gawley. Ron Morgan and Alex Slobodian look better than ever this year - perhaps Ollie finds the centre position more suitable to his style of play than the former right wing spot. Merv Dubchuk already looks like an all-star. This Monday St. Boniface Canadians play the Thistles here at 8.30.

The Spanish dancers, Susana and Jose, thier soloist, pianist and guitarist came to town last night to present the first concert in the current Overture series.

Well, they certainly were different; that they are professionals and masters of the dance, I'm sure no one will deny; but they were so different that the art of the dance as they portrayed it was a little difficult to understand.

I rather imagine that the majority of those present expected as I did to see Spanish dancing such as we see in the movies, a coquettish senorita complete with mantilla and fan and a torreador swashbuckling senior. We were in for a surprise were we not?

The Spanish dancing seen last night could be compared to heavy classical music. Most of us do not understand it, therefore we do not enjoy it. This could be truly said of the first half of the program. As the evening wore on however, the audience warmed to the dancing.

The footwork was intricate and really first class. The knowledge of the art of dancing is limited and footwork is I know, not the proper word. The dancers too were as good at playing the castanets as they were at dancing. The costumes were eye-catching and colorful. The lighting was well done and most effective. Susana was mistress of many moods and Jose as handsome as we expect a Spaniard to be.

The pianist, who is by the way Susana's husband, was excellent as an accompanist and charmed with his solo and encore. The guitarist too was tops and a master of his instrument. The soloist, well to my mind I could have done without him but there again I do not understand Flamenco singing and he is billed as Spain's best. He redeemed himself in the closing numbers and I decided that he did fit into the picture after all.

The evening though gave us something to think about, didn't it? We learned something too, some of Spain's ancient traditions. We saw dancers who have been acclaimed throughout Europe and other parts of the world as the best in their field. We saw and experienced something so different than we have ever had before in Kenora. I believe it was an experience we will treasure, not relay but later on. We are bound to read of or see more of this type of dancing, then memory's picture of what we saw on the stage of the high school will have so much more meaning. I did enjoy most of it, I hope you did too.

It was rather a shame that we knew so little of what we were to see. The program I think could have been a bit more explanatory and too, a little light between numbers so we could have read what was on them would have helped.

A number of well deserved bouquets to the following: The artists themselves for being patient with us; the back stage people, who helped with the costumes and dressing of the artists; those responsible for the lights and let us not forget the Overture executive who had the courage to bring something so different to Kenora.

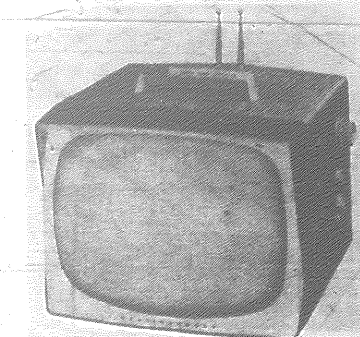
