TELEVISION SERVICE WELCOMED TO KENORA DISTRICT SATURDAY

Television service officially came to Kenora and district Saturday evening. At a gathering of distinguished local citizens and Winnipeg guests in the dining room of the Kenwood Hotel, Mayor Peter Ratuski turned a switch which officially launched station CBWAT on the air at exactly 5:45 p.m. Several years of hope and planning reached fruition. Members of Council from Kenora, Keewatin and Jaffray Melick were joined by chairmen of other elected bodies representing the judiciary and clergy and other guests to witness the blessing ceremony. Citizens of the district listened in via radio to the pre-launching activities. Jack Thomson, Station CJRL's program director, painted a word picture for his listeners, detailing the events leading up to the "on-the-air" ceremony and introduced the guest speakers.

Reeve Byers of Jaffray Melick, Mayor Walter Hodgkinson of Keewatin and Mayor Ratuski each

voiced words of appreciation for the new service, acknowledging TV's power to bring pleasure and information to the community. Mr. James Findlay, leading a small group of CBC officials, in turn paid tribute to the spirit of co-operation he had received on every hand.

Said CBC's Prairie Director, you may have wondered what was going on during all those months since the station was first announced. Believe me, we were just as impatient as you. He paid special tribute to the co-operation of Station CJRL, for assisting in the opening ceremonies. "This is no short-run wedding," said Mr. Findlay. Radio will continue to play a vital part in community life here, said, noting that radio sales had reached an all-time peak in Canada last year.

The CBC acted as hosts at a reception which followed. Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Tough, host and hostess at the Kenwood, served a most delicious buffet luncheon. The delicacies were most attractive and drew many compliments.

S. Karlsson and George F. Welch were present. All speakers paid tribute to the Kinsmen Club in sponsoring this worthy community effort.

The meeting adjourned after a short question and answer period.

St. Boniface Canadians Here Tonight

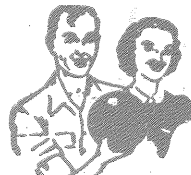

7,256 Ship Passages At Port Colborne

Port Colborne, Dec. — A check of vessels passing through the Port Colborne entrance of the Welland canal, shows that during the month of November, 876 vessels navigated the waterway. This was the lowest number of ships per month, since the canal opened in April.

The upbound total of ships

was 396 with 311 of these being Great Lakes inland vessels and 85 ocean ships. Downbound stood at 306 Great Lakes inland vessels, 173 ocean ships and one naval vessel for a 480 total.

From the beginning of the season to Nov. 30 the check shows 7,256 passages—3,649 upbound vessels and 3,607 downbound.

CAMEL HUMPS ARE SAGGING; WHAT TO DO ?

WASHINGTON — The problem confronting officials of the National Zoo today is what, if anything, should be done about the sagging humps on a camel.

Should they just be allowed to flow over, or should they stand firm and upright?

The director of the Dallas, Tex., zoo, worried about the sloppy appearance of a baby bactrian, or two-humped, asked the question of the national zoo. It turns out there is no easy answer.

Dr. Theodore Reed, director of the National Zoo, found on a recent tour of European zoos

that most of them put a sort of leather corset on their camels to keep them straight.

Arabs who use bactrians for transportation also put a sling around the sagging humps to give themselves something solid to sit on.

But some bactrians naturally have fine, upstanding humps, leading to a theory that diet may have something to do with the problem.

The fact is, however, not too much is known about camels, humps or otherwise. Dr. Reed and his associates can get no help in the slumping hump problem by observation. Their only bactrian has one hump up, and the other down.
