GREY CUP QUESTIONS ANSWERED LAST NIGHT

Members of Kenora's Little League Football League, the champion Eskimos, the Lions and the Blue Bombers last night were guests of their sponsors, the Kenora Rotary Club at their 7th annual award night dinner. The Blue Bombers fullback told his listeners that he has been in Kenora before, playing on the St. Paul's College team against the High School Mustangs. He predicted great things for Wally Moroz, who may well be on his way to the Blue Bombers. For his young listeners, Mr. Latour, who had a message. Magistrate's Court

Asks Citizens To Support Winter Work Program

T. J. Wakeman, Manager of the Kenora Office of the National Employment Service, urged municipal citizens to get behind an aid program to provide employment during the winter months. "Many winter workers of our city find themselves voluntarily unemployed," he stated in an interview today. "This affects not only the immediate members of their families but also has a common effect on the economic welfare of the entire community."

Mr. Wakeman outlined three areas of action that could be taken to assist in creating winter work.

"Homeowners should be en-

couraged to carry out construction, renovation, decoration and maintenance work in their premises during January, February and March," he said.

"Homeowners should be asked to arrange to have all types of inside work such as renovation, re-decoration, repair and other maintenance work in their homes done in the winter. All citizens in the community should be encouraged to schedule the purchasing of clothing, furniture, etc. to the winter months in order to maintain steady year-round economic buoyancy. Retail businesses could encourage winter time purchases by offering special discounts."

"City, Municipal and Provincial authorities should also be encouraged to schedule construction and maintenance of public buildings, roadways, sewer and etc. where possible, in the winter months."

Mr. Wakeman went on to say that it is most encouraging to note that a number of business places have in past years carried out such practices as outlined thus assisting in keeping men employed. It is also heartening to hear that the town of Kenora is again planning to take advantage of the Municipal winter work program.

Local Citizens To Act As Safety Contest Judges

Attorney General, Nelson Roberts, has announced the names of the judges for the 1959 Highway Safety Suggestion Award Contest which is presently in progress. The names announced are: The various districts of Ontario include well known citizens of Kenora and Kenora's own residents.

Judges for District 17, which comprises the Kenora, Rainy River and Patricia areas are: T. G. Gowan, District Inspector, O.P.P.; Judge L. A. McEwen of Kenora and Mr. Grand, retired public school principal of Kenora.

District Inspector, M. W. Erickson, Ontario Provincial Police at Post Arthur is one of the judges for the Thunder Bay area and Judge H. J. M. Donley of Toronto is one of the judges for District 5, comprising the counties of Ontario, Peel and York.

The highway safety contest has been created for the purpose of stimulating public interest in the ever increasing problem of highway safety. District residents are asked to send their traffic safety suggestions to the Ontario Provincial Police, headquarters at Kenora. Excellent cash prizes are being offered for the best entries. Entries must be in by noon, December 18th. They must be 150 words in length or less and must clearly outline some concrete suggestion for promoting highway traffic safety. Submissions will be judged for merit and originality.

BILL JOHNSON, ED NORTON AND RON CHURCHILL GAIN COUNCIL SEATS

Kenora voters yesterday decisively named Charlie Bergman, a former alderman and acting mayor to fill the chief magistrate's chair for the next two years. In voting which attracted somewhat less than an expected turnout of only 44.3 percent of the eligible voters, Mr. Bergman swept into an early lead over his opponent, former alderman Eric Newman, as returns were tabulated at election headquarters. Final totals showed Bergman with 1,627 votes and Newman, 820 votes.

THREE NEW ALDERMEN

The aldermanic race offered no pre-election favorites as all five candidates, seeking the three vacant council seats, ran without previous council experience. Not until the final two polls at South Ward School were received, was the composition of next year's Council known. Final returns showed:

- John McLaughlin - 1,325
- Kelvin Winkler - 382

PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD

Possibly the biggest surprise of the election came in the public school board balloting where Evert Larson, a former trustee, was given the decision—for the third seat over Mrs. M. E. Holland, a veteran member of the board. The totals are:

SEPARATE SCHOOL BOARD

Dr. J. C. Edie, a comparative newcomer to Kenora, was the surprise candidate in the election, defeating sitting members on the Separate School Board. Mrs. Helen Dubenski led the seven candidates seeking the three vacant seats, with 228 votes.

BUS FRANCHISE

There was little doubt, even before the election, that Excel Coach Lines Ltd. would be given a vote of confidence for the manner in which the Company has served Kenora, Norman and Keewatin. The ratepayers, by a

9 to 1 margin, gave Excel the franchise for another ten years, subject of course, to terms of the agreement with the Town. The totals: in favor, 2,101; against, 279.

ADVANCE POLL

Possibly the advance poll, which was higher than a year ago, told the story. In the by-law, the totals were 36 'yes' votes and 6 opposed. Mr. Bergman was given 34 votes to Mr. Newman's 8.

The advance poll failed to name the correct alderman, although it indicated the race would be close. The totals showed Churchill high man with 30 votes; Johnson with 29 and Norton and McLaughlin tied with 27 votes each. Winkler received 7. In the public school race, the advance poll told the story, although not in the correct order. Nelson received 26 votes; Larson, 24; King, 22 and Holland, 16. The elected separate school candidates each received 6 votes; the others less, indicating again the theory that a well-conducted 'gallop poll' is quite frequently correct.

Some 2,347 voters went to the polls of an eligible list of 5,520 or 44.3% of the electorate.

ter works plan" whereby the Federal Government pays one-half of the labour costs for approved projects. The Provincial and Federal Governments also arrange as much as possible, their building and repairing during the winter period.

However, homeowners of summer places, could be of greater assistance by scheduling their repairs and redecorating for the winter months. Many people say that it is too inconvenient to do it in winter, however, inconvenience is not a high price to pay for a buoyant economy.

While it is certainly not possible to successfully do everything in winter there are many things that can be done. Proper planning is the key to successful winter work.

Mr. Wakeman pointed out that at the end of February last winter there were approximately 500 men in the immediate Kenora-Keeewatin area who were unemployed. Among that number were many construction workers, carpenters, electricians, plumbers, painters, etc. At the end of November this year there were approximately 320 men in this immediate area, seeking work.

7 MILLION SEEN BY '76

Toronto — Ontario's population will rise by 1,000,000 to 7,000,000 by 1976. George Gathercole, Ontario's deputy minister of economics said Thursday.

During the 17-year period the province's "golden horseshoe" around Lake Ontario between Oshawa and St. Catharines will grow to 4,500,000, he told a conference of provincial and municipal planning officials.

To accompany the growth, Mr. Gathercole predicted:

Many new Ontario cities will spring from towns; industry will increase by 40 to 50 per cent; 1,000,000 more children will attend elementary and secondary schools and 70,000 more the universities; an additional 2,100,000 motor vehicles will travel Ontario roads, bringing registrations to 3,000,000.

No other area in the world has matched the population and industrial expansion of Ontario since 1945, he said.

HE SOLD HOT DOGS

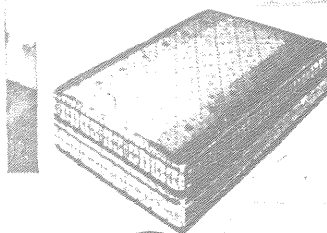

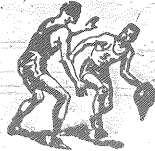

The high flying St. Boniface Canadians Juniors of the Manitoba Junior League know they were in a hockey game last night, as they tackled the Kenora Thistles on their home pond.

The Canadians who have been skating since September had to go all out to gain victory all tie with the Red and White men.

The Thistles, who were playing their third game of the season, are looking better every time out, and with the opening of the Ontario Minnesota League on Friday, against the Warroad Lakers, on Saturday night the Fort Frances Canadians.

The Canadians grabbed the lead again at 17:35 Pearson hitting pay dirt on a pass from Hambrink, four seconds ticked by on the clock when Ron Morgan got number two for the night unassisted to end the scoring. Ontario Outfitters Warned Of Greater Tourist Competition

Greater co-operation is needed among members of Ontario's tourist industry if the province is going to meet outside competition, Ontario Travel Minister Cathcart said Monday.

He told the opening session of the Northern Ontario Out-

fitters Association's three-day annual meeting at Sudbury that tourist areas in the United States and other provinces are making strong bids to divert tourists away from Northern Ontario.

"Too many businessmen who depended on the tourist trade for their living are content to sit back and let the burden of publicity and promotion be carried on by the outfitters' association," he said.

"You've got to tell them about it and keep prodding them," he said. "Treat them the way you

treat me, and the department of travel and publicity when we fall down on the job. You make sure we hear about it."

During the discussions by representatives of the association's 23 district, Lands and Forests Officer P. O. Rhynas appealed to camp operators to help cut down the number of hunting accidents among their customers.

He said there have been 54 accidents involving firearms so far this year and about 20 more can be expected before the end of December. During the last five years there was an average of 70 accidents a year, 15 per cent of them fatal.

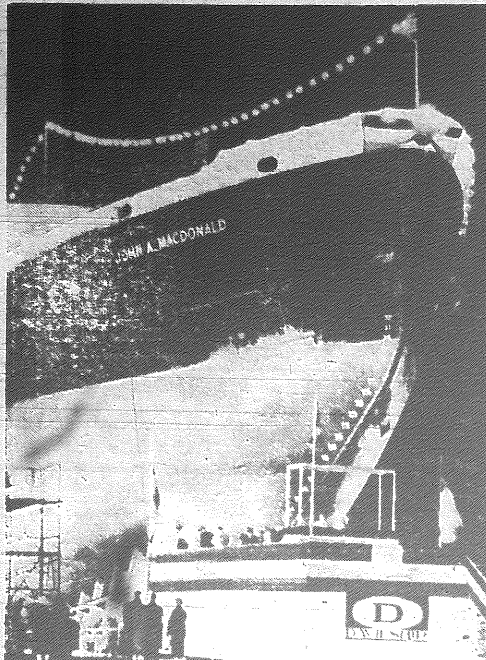

Dominion Bureau of Statistics

FOOD and AGRICULTURE

Overseas wheat exports in the current crop year to November 4 were just over 4% above last year's. This year's milk production to the end of October was practically the same as in 1958. Fluid milk sales to the end of September were 2% above last year.

HOUSING

Number of new housing units started in the first nine months this year was nearly 10% smaller than in the same period last

year and the number completed a little less than 4% smaller.

MERCHANDISING

Estimated sales of wholesalers proper in the first nine months this year were almost 10% above last year. With sales in September up a smaller 9%. Most of the trades had gains in both periods, farm machinery in both cases showing the largest percentage increase. Sales of new passenger cars to the end of September were 13% larger this year than in 1958. Beer and Blatney vehicles increased by nearly two thirds of the numerical increase.

The Trans-Canada Highway, now nearing completion, will stretch 4,400 miles, including Newfoundland and Vancouver Island.

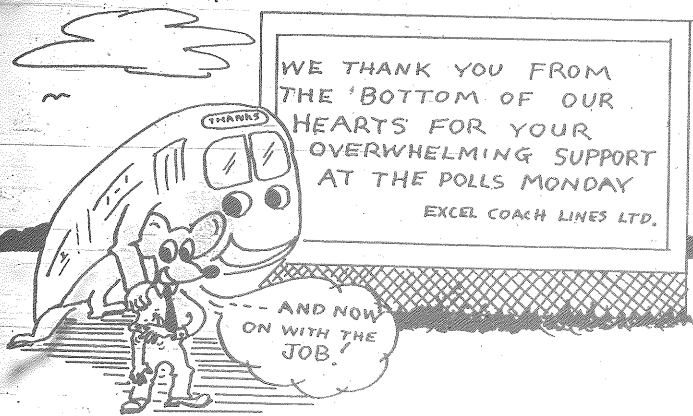

Quetico Foundation Accepted

The Quetico Foundation, during the past decade, has concerned itself particularly with the preservation of wilderness parks in Ontario for recreation and scientific use. It endeavours to increase public awareness of the recreational values to be found in our provincial wilderness parks and has at the same time assisted in the sponsorship of scientific studies. Major accomplishments to date include assistance in making possible the production of the film "Quetico," the publication of authoritative but popular monographs on the Indians, geology and canoe routes, of Quetico Provincial Park, and sponsorship of three annual expeditions into northwestern Ontario to record and study the mysterious rock paintings executed by Indians of centuries ago.

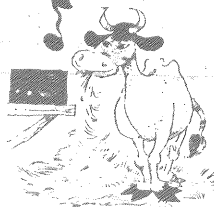
Moosical Interludes?
