Tourists Important Revenue Source

Importance of the tourist dollar and its impact on all forms of business was stressed today by James McHattie, director of the development branch of the Ontario Department of Travel and Publicity.

Speaking at the morning session of the Northern Ontario Tourist Outfitters' Association convention in the Nickel Range Hotel, McHattie urged all merchants to take a good look at the tourist dollar and study its impact on business.

Using a departmental survey made in Bracebridge during the tourist season, he showed that tourists' expenditures that are accounted for 70 per cent of the business done by gas stations and garage, 67.9 per cent of the business by the meat and provision dealers, 90.3 per cent of the business by the hardware stores. All this was over and above the business done by the resort operators themselves.

The breakdown of the actual tourist dollar showed 19.2 cents spent in restaurants, 19 cents spent on gifts, 16.5 cents spent on accommodation, 14.3 cents spent on accommodation without meals, 12.7 cents spent on entertainment, 11.5 cents spent on auto expenses and 6.8 cents spent on fishing licenses and boat rentals.

The speaker maintained that in this one area, in seven weeks, tourists spent an amount equal to the payroll of an industry employing 14 people.

It was pointed out that on this particular survey over a period of one week, 15 government employees interviewed some 6,200 persons in various types of business outlets.

McHattie stated that his branch of the government would be happy to do a similar survey in this area.

WATER SAFETY— Captain F. J. Ballock of the department of marine regulations, Ottawa, and author of the book, "Ships of the Seaway," spoke on the importance of water safety and public responsibility in this connection.

He maintained that more reckless boat operators are to be found among adults than among the youngsters, despite the fact that so many pleasure boats were being operated by teenagers and those just approaching the teenage status.

He pointed out that in Canada, the average is one boat to every 23 people and the country's huge expenses of water make it impossible to thoroughly police these areas. He stressed that it is the duty of every citizen to help curb the number of the reckless boatman by reporting him to the authorities.

"For our collective safety it is our individual duty to guard those waters on which we take our pleasure," he said.

Capt. Ballock outlined the concerted efforts being made by the government and by private groups such as the Red Cross to promote water safety and provide examinations and licensing for all boat operators in the near future.

Some idea of the size of the boating industry can be obtained from the fact that the five major companies manufacturing or selling outboards in Canada in 1958 had a turnover of 47,000,000.

Warren Fennie, general tourist agent for the CTC, told the convention that the "cash 125" program in the States may affect the tourist trade this year to some extent and urged that the various trade groups and communities put on a greater drive to overcome this situation.

VISCOUNT LOGS ONE MILLIONTH AIR HOUR

MONTREAL, The Victoria Viscount, with which Trans-Canada Air Lines introduced turbine travel to North America in 1955, this week logged its one-millionth air hour on this continent.

More than 100 Viscounts, powered by Rolls Royce Dart turbo-prop engines, are presently in service with 41 airlines around the world, including two in Canada and three in the United States.

In addition, a number of the four-engined Viscounts are being flown in North America as executive and government transports.

Trans-Canada Air Lines, which now operates 50 Viscounts on domestic transborder routes, put the first Viscount into regularly scheduled passenger service in Canada on April 1, 1955, more than a year before any other

North American carrier. TCA's Viscounts carry 43 first class passengers at more than 225 miles an hour.
