HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS ASK FOR \$300 INCREASE

The Kenora-Keewatin District High School Board met last evening, December 9th, in one of the longest sessions for some time.

A communication was received from Mr. Emil Uhrnyuk, Chairman of Salary Committee of the Local Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, asking that in view of the Board's action in paying two new teachers \$300 above the basic minimum of \$4,800 for an extra year's training, that the basic minimum be \$5,100 per annum, effective January 1st, 1960, with \$300 payable to all staff members. A further meeting with the Board was requested. The matter was referred to Committee.

Perusal of the Town's letter dealing with the Board's application for a Capital advance of \$25,000 to proceed with preliminary

planning of proposed expansion, led to discussion. Mr. B. Maritz reported that perimeter and contour surveys had been completed. With the Town's assurance that they would be prepared to recommend that funds be made available when required to meet payments for purchasing of site, survey and architect's fees, further planning will go ahead. Contact with Mr. S. D. Rendall, Superintendent of Secondary Education and the Department of Education Architects would be made and then an architect would be engaged to draw up plans suitable to local needs. It was hoped that necessary steps could now be taken with the least possible delay as the growing need for additional accommodation at the High School

TRIBUTE PAID HIGH SCHOOL HONOR PUPILS

At a special assembly at the K.K.D.H.S. on Tuesday afternoon, recognition was given to the members of the High School Honour Society. The members of this Society are students, who have attained 75% or over in the past year's work. Each student was presented with an appropriate pin by Mr. A. G. Richmond. For the first year he qualified he received a No. 5 pin, the second year a No. 4 pin, and so on. In Grade 13, at the end of five years' work, a student may qualify for a No. 1 pin.

Dr. R. G. Davidson, who has long had an interest in education in this community, having spent 25 years on the Board, was the guest speaker. Dr. Davidson praised the students, who had attained the honour standing, pointing out that with radio and T.V. there were more distractions for a student these days. "The record of the honour students shows that these distractions have been put in their proper place and academic studies came first," said Dr. Davidson. Dr. Davidson pointed out that for honest work, constant effort is required, and cautioned students to cultivate good friends, who may lighten a load,

if all live a life of sharing. Dr. Davidson further suggested that all students might, at this time of year when we think of giving, think of sharing all year round.

The second purpose of the assembly on Tuesday was the presentation of book awards to the students of each grade attaining the highest final percentage. On behalf of the K.K.D.H.S. Board, Mr. E. L. Carter, chairman, made

Nels E. Larson Former Resident Died In Winnipeg

Nels Edward Larson, 2115 Pembina Highway, Winnipeg and a former well known resident of Kenora for over 55 years, died at Episcopal Visiting Nursing Home, Winnipeg, Wednesday, December 9th. Born in Bergen, Norway, April 18th, 1867, he was in his 92nd year.

SAFETY RECORD CITED AT MANDO BANQUET

The safety record at Mando's Kenora mill was poorer this year than in 1958, despite concentrated efforts by management and the safety committee. Mr. E. E. Crandall told some 115 mill supervisors, foremen, safety stewards and guests last night, at the 14th annual Safety Banquet held in the Kenricia Hotel. Citing figures which showed a higher frequency rate for man-hours worked, Mando's resident manager noted that while the lost-time accidents remained constant at 41 each year, there was an actual increase of 10 in the number of accidents requiring medical attention. The figures cited were 167 in 1958 and 177 this year.

"What causes accidents?" the speaker asked. "We wonder what the reasons are. We have worked hard on an education program. We have a system of follow-ups to see that safety ideas are carried out. We study the accident incidence by age groups, the time of the day, for old employees and new employees and for old employees who change jobs. Accidents just don't happen. The Kenora mill is well guarded by safety devices... the house-keeping is good."

Mr. Crandall said that the Safety Committee, composed of both management and labour members, is puzzled. Safety stewards are doing a fine job. Safety devices and safety clothing (hats, footwear, safety glasses, etc.) plus an intensive education program has failed to reverse the trend. The Mill's proud safety record of 204 days, established some time ago, has not been approached in recent years.

Mr. Crandall concluded that accidents are a personal problem, but one which goes beyond the individual to his families. He urged renewed effort in the coming year, suggesting that the National Safety Council's slogan, "Safety in the Sixties," might well be adopted.

Greetings to Mando on the occasion of their 14th annual banquet of Mando's Plant Employees Safety Committee were extended by Mayors Ratuski and Hoekinson and by Reeve Byers. Reflecting the growing importance of the event, this year marked the initial visit of the elected representatives to the function. The speakers praised the safety program in effect in Mando's operations, saying that the results carried far beyond the confines of the plant.

Greetings from Canadian vice president, J. F. McKellar were

read by the chairman, Mr. Crandall, who also conveyed the regrets of other senior Company officials who were unable to attend.

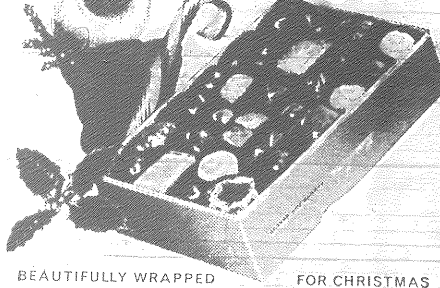
Xmas Is For

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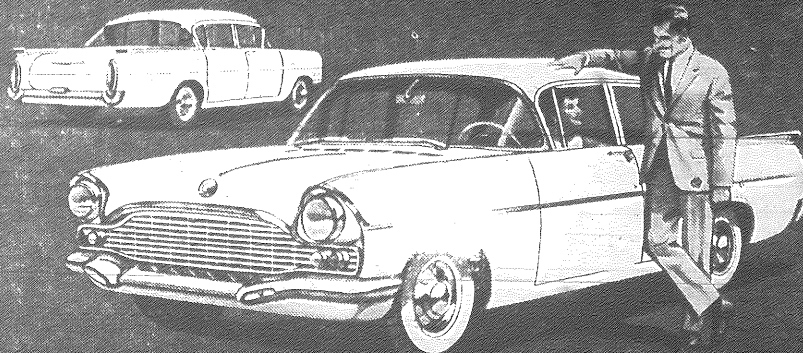

Health Minister Dymond To Tour Ontario Sanatoria

Health Minister Matthew B. Dymond announced today that he and other senior officials of his Department will tour all the

tuberculosis sanatoria throughout the Province. This tour, he added, will be conducted in support of the annual Christmas Seal Campaign of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association and it is planned that all sanatoria will be visited between December 12th and 19th.

"I have recognized the tremendous strides made in the tuberculosis field over the past ten years but unfortunately in this respect, the true picture has not always been presented to the public so that they understand that tuberculosis is still a major health problem," the Minister said. "I think it is important that the public realize that tuberculosis is far from being beaten and that organizations such as the Ontario Department of Health and the Ontario Tuberculosis Association are still waging a continuing battle against this disease."

The Minister also stated that

through the purchase of Christmas Seals the citizens of Ontario are giving their support to the work presently being carried on by the Ontario Tuberculosis Association in the fields of rehabilitation, health education, mass chest x-ray surveys and tuberculin testing programs. He emphasized that every citizen can contribute to the ultimate victory over tuberculosis by giving their wholehearted support to the Christmas Seal Campaign in their area.

Timber Cutting Permits Reported In Heavy Demand

This season in the Kenora District there has been an unusually heavy demand for district timber cutting licences, or, as they are commonly called, timber cutting permits. Because of this heavy demand, the Department of Lands and Forests has been forced to restrict the issuance of permits, and restrict the quantities allowed per permit. There is only so much wood available to be cut annually, and if this quantity is exceeded, the result will be a drastic reduction in the future cut and a breakdown of the entire sustained yield programme.

To guard against this there must be no cutting in excess of the amounts permitted on the permit. Any cutting over the allowed quantity, with a 10% margin for error, will be considered as a trespass, and penalties will be levied accordingly.

New Facilities Added To Parks In This Area

Since the closing of the parks in September after a very busy season, many improvement projects have been carried out in the Kenora District parks.

At Rushing River Park a hall a mile of new road has been constructed along the shore of Dogtooth Lake and new camping sites along it have been underbrushed for the 1960 season.

A large picnic shelter has also been erected beside the river. Except for the cement floor which will be poured in the spring, the structure will be completed within the next few weeks.

When completed a large sign and traffic island will give the park entrance to Rushing River a new look.

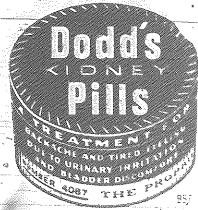
At Sioux Narrows the entrance road to the park has been brushed a chain wide and dead trees and windfalls removed on both sides. The west side of the park was also underbrushed where up

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Bells Always Associated With Christmas

Bells have long been associated with Christmas and New Years as well as hundreds of other joyous occasions, but there are fewer today than there have been for centuries.

During World War II thousands of bells were melted down for metal or were shattered by bombs. After the war only three churches in all London had bells that could be rung. In Germany, the Nazis melted down an estimated 150,000 bells only a fraction of which have been replaced. Italy restored more than 11,000 church bells lost or damaged in the war.

Because of this shortage, there has been a demand for bells ever since the war, but there are probably less than 20 foundries engaged in casting the huge

bronze bells that peal in towers throughout the world.

One foundry belongs to a Tory New York family that has been manufacturing bells since Revolutionary days. Another family concern is located in Sinn, West Germany, and has been turning out bells for 350 years. A London foundry still making bells was established in 1370.

ORIGIN LOST

The origin of bells has been lost, but the business of making them hasn't changed much since the Chinese Emperor Hwang ordered a set in 2697 B.C.

To make a bell, a foundryman builds up a "cope" of brickwork and fine clay bound with hair to shape the vessel. The mold's outer portion is similarly sculptured inside an iron casting. When the two molds are finally prepared and clamped together, metal is poured into the hollow between them. In the old days, casting called for solemn ceremony, and tribes gathered to toss offerings of gold and silver.

COMPOSITION

For this reason, many an old bell is reputed to ring more sweetly, but the truth is that a bell owes its sonorous notes to its time-honored content of about four parts copper and one part tin.

Big bells are always made to order. The world's largest has never pealed. The 193-ton "Tsar Kolokol" was cast in Moscow in 1733 and allowed to cool off in its earth-covered molds for 103 years. It lost an 11-ton bit of its lip before being hung.

A second Moscow bell, 128 tons, is the greatest in actual use. An 18-ton bell in the Riverside Church, New York is the largest bell ever tuned.

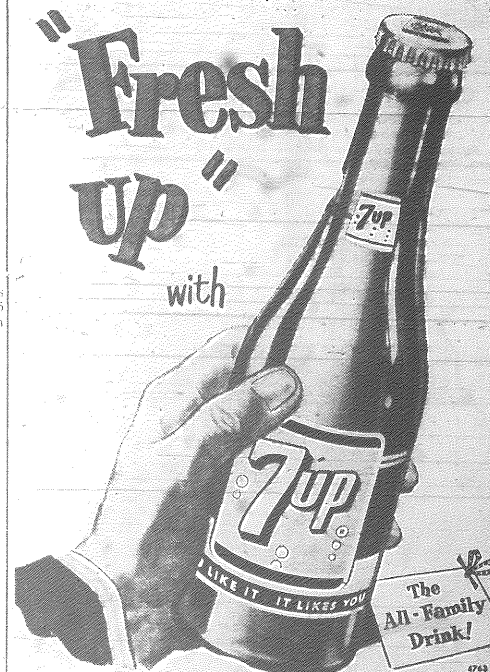

Safety Record Cited

(Continued from Page 1)

Mando's Safety Committee, gave an interesting report on the 47th National Safety Congress which he attended in Chicago last month. The 4-day event was again packed with worthwhile conferences. Mr. Minor noted that over 700 speakers at 192 gatherings for the 43 sections covering most industries, were so well attended that P.A. systems had to be installed to carry addresses to overflow audiences. The workshops were most productive, with many fine new ideas being advanced. Colored slides and movies were used extensively by the speakers. Mando's 7 delegates found the trip most worthwhile, Mr. Minor reported. The slogan for the coming year is "Safety In The Sixties," he concluded.

Mr. Ken Gwyn, superintendent of the CPR said that his Company, like Mando, is experiencing

a letdown in safety. Records show our program is "not so good" he said, and officials are at a loss to "put their finger on the cause." He wished Mando well in the new year.

Dr. R. G. Davidson, in noting that far too many accidents occur, suggested that "we can't avoid the human element, but it is one which we can train... if the people want to be trained." Some people are accident prone, and suggestions that accidents are "an act of God," are not correct. Somebody is behind it, the speaker continued. Safety education is fine but it is largely up to the individual. Attitude will largely determine the direction of the accident graph, the Doctor continued, concluding with the statement that improvement will come only through a co-operative effort.

The bright spot in Mando's safety record was presented by Mr. George Potts, logging superintendent who told his listeners that the annual accident rate

has dropped from 70 in 1957 to 38 this year. He believes that that downward trend will continue.

Wally Piercy, Safety Committee Chairman said that the workers have the most at stake, where accidents are concerned. He suggested that Unions can do much to break the lethargy of the individual worker towards accident prevention programs, which, he said are vital to all. Complacency of the individual, and not unsafe machines, are to blame for almost all accidents said Mr. Piercy. He is hopeful that the message of safety is presented in such a way as to reach the rank and file of all Mando workers.

Jack Owen spoke of the Mill's poor safety record, and suggested that the next step was to try out the plans already formulated "to see if they work."

Dinner music was played by Jim Calder, who also played the accompaniment for Mando's own "Les Girls" who performed two spirited Can-Can numbers. An

accordion solo by Miss Myrna Lysen rounded out the entertainment.

"You must be very proud of him," he remarked.

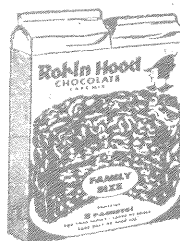
