The Kenora Lions Club are busy finalizing plans for their second annual Christmas Carol Concert which will be held around the Main Street Christmas Tree, Sunday, December 20th at 8:15 p.m.

This year the Salvation Army Band will supply the accompaniment. A heated van with side opening doors will be provided for the bandmen so that they will experience no difficulty in playing their instruments. The Cecelia Jeffrey School Choir will also assist.

A special public address system will be set up and song sheets will be available to all.

NEW HOSPITAL BRIDGE TO GO IN SERVICE SOON

Workmen for the Con Bridge Company this afternoon completed the pouring of cement for the wing walls of Kenora's new hospital bridge. The section completed today is at the north end of the bridge. Work on the south approach was completed last week. This marks the final construction stage before the structure can be placed in service.

Mr. F. B. Whiteley, district engineer for the Department of Highways said today that the curing of the concrete will take a full ten days. Steam-heat will be kept on the north end approach to the bridge until December 22nd. At that time the approaches can be filled and the bridge placed in service.

However, Mr. Whiteley was of the opinion that the bridge will not be a new year's gift to the community. There is considerable work entailed in placing the temporary girders along the sides of the structure. The permanent side rails cannot be added until spring weather permits. Also incomplete when the bridge goes into service will be the deck. It will be paved in the spring when weather permits. Meanwhile the concrete base will set.

One interesting feature of the bridge is the saw-tooth arrangement at each end, which allows for expansion and contraction. The joints have been allowed for a temperature spread of 120 degrees, although the facing teeth can mesh possibly 6 inches.

Immediately the structure is placed in service, the experienced bridge men of Con Bridge Company will carefully mark the present structure, before taking it down. The present bridge will

be salvaged, and stored in the Department of Highways yard for use in some other place.

Extreme care must be taken by workmen in order that undue stress doesn't buckle any of the sections. The job will provide winter work for the crew.

Adults To Get Third Polio Shot Monday Night

Doctor R. D. P. Eaton, Medical Health Officer stated today that a clinic for giving 3rd. Doses of polio vaccine to adults who attended the Legion clinics for 1st and 2nd doses in April and May, 1959 will be held in the Legion Hall on Monday, December 14th, from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Further clinics for those who attended in May and June will be held in January.

150 DELEGATES ATTEND RIVER ROAD CONVENTION HELD AT NEW ORLEANS

The largest attendance of any meeting of the Mississippi River Planning Commission was recorded at the New Orleans meeting, November 29th, and 30th, December 1st and 2nd, and one hundred and fifty delegates were registered, reports A. J. Sherrett, Tourist and Publicity manager for Kenora.

In the past the interest in the parkway has been much less in the Southern States of Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi and Louisiana, but this meeting sparked a tremendous enthusiasm, and considerable publicity was given to remarks of the Kenora delegate to newspapers, in the fact that Canada was spending approximately 100 million dollars of tourist money in the States more than U.S. tourists were spending in Canada, and that most of this money so far was going to Florida, California and Arizona. He pointed out that if these state residents came north to Canada in the summer months, quite a large Canadian business could be expected to the Southern States in the winter months, with central States also benefitting accordingly.

CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights of the convention included the following:
A resolution was passed for \$2,000,000 in federal funds for construction or completion of the Great River Road linking the Trans-Canada highway with the Gulf of Mexico. Assurance was given by Senator and Congressmen present that this would be presented in the form of a bill to be introduced among the two States bordering the Mississippi River.

Governor Orville Freeman, of Minnesota, said there are 37 million people counting on the River road, and the States in the parkway are only beginning to realize the vast potential. The highway would not only bring tourists but industry to all States and the two Provinces.

John Conroy, former Food Safety Council member, said he would introduce the necessary legislation in Congress to push completion of the 2,000 mile road.

Colonel Lester Wings of Louisiana said the highway along the coast hung is completed, and the west half in Louisiana is 70% completed.

Governor Harold G. Loveless of Iowa, said the Great River

Road should be a "boon" in these days of fast development. All speakers urged greater interest and enthusiasm in development of the highway at the earliest possible moment.

Ontario, Minnesota, have completed the erection of "Great River Road" markers and other States are following suit as fast as possible.

Officers elected were: Pilot, Charles H. Young of Muscatine, Iowa; Pilot pro tem, Colonel J. Lester White of Baton Rouge, Louisiana; Secretary, Harold E. Olson, of St. Paul, Minnesota; Treasurer, J. C. Gillespie of De Soto, Wisconsin; Co-Pilots—J. A. Sherrett, Kenora, Ont., District No. 1; Ray Eckstein, of Caseyville, Wisconsin, district 2; Senator Lillian Schlagbaum, of Quincy, Illinois, district 3; Robert W. Bell, Jr. of Jackson, Mississippi, district 4.

The next convention will be held at Memphis, Tennessee, in 1960.

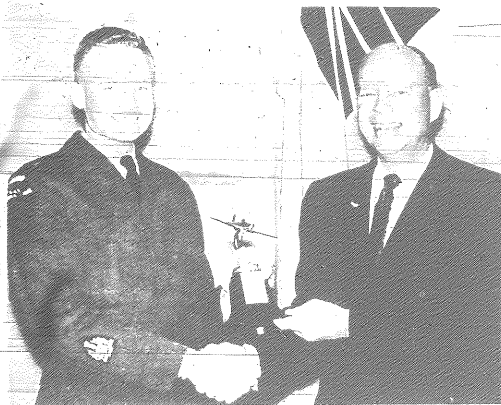
One of several witnesses protesting the phone company's billing procedures, Mrs. Nye said her daughter had been

NBC Startime Shows Leading TV Parade

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The Tuesday night, NBC Startime shows are proving to be the most distinguished and enjoyable programs of the current season. And Tuesday night's My Three Angels must rank among the best of them.

It was a Broadway show of some six seasons back and some of the TV cast were members of the original company, including the incomparable Walter Slezak. It was a merry, sly, and thoroughly wicked comedy by Sam and Bella Spewack, whose plot may seem defiant and outrageous with all the current concern over television's moral standards.

Three Devil's Island convicts—a swindler and two murderers—arrive at the establishment of a Cayenne shoemaker at a moment of great trouble. The kindly convicts solve all his problems by arranging the violent demise of the absentee shop owner and his heir and by committing a little incidental forgery and black mail.

A number of forbidden words were used. It is doubtful, however, that many were collected by the 90-minute play. It was obviously all in fun.

Slezak was wonderful—funny, lovable and knowledgeable. Barry Sullivan and George Grizzard were the other two angels and complemented him beautifully.

The National Association of Broadcasters' TV board recently pointed up its code to ban rigged or controlled quiz shows, deceptions, misleading advertising and plugs. Only about half the TV stations in the United States,

however, are members who subscribe to code requirements. . . . Rock 'n' roll music again wound up at the bottom of the list of musical popularity in a listener survey—this one by Ohio State University—but the 14- to 18 crowd said they preferred it over all other types of music.
