The driver suffered cuts to his hand which required 3 stitches to close.

## E. A. Myles To Make Last Trip For CPR Sunday Evening

Edward Andrew Myles, Passenger Conductor on the Kenora Division, will make his last trip into Winnipeg, arriving on Train No. 1 "The Canadian" on December 13th, 1959, before being retired on pension.

The number of days' care utilized by patients in chronic hospitals and chronic units of general hospitals, represented 13.3% of the total number of days care provided in the province, although the number of patients is less than 1% of the total number treated in all public hospitals during the year.

**Hospital Beds**

At the end of 1958 Ontario had a total of 29,700 hospital beds, a ratio of 5.06 beds per one thousand population. Of these 24,349 beds were of the active treatment type in public general and Red Cross Outpost hospitals. The balance were for the treatment of psychiatric, convalescent and chronically-ill patients. During the year 1958 the Commission dealt with 82 hospital construction and renovation projects and approved Provincial capital grants in the amount of \$7,817,426.88.

Ontario is experiencing a very active period of hospital expansion at the present time. The number of public hospital beds in Ontario has now passed 31,000 and, in the first nine months of 1959, the Commission approved Provincial capital grants totaling 10.2 million dollars.

**Ontario Hospitals Have Busy Year**

Every 38 seconds during 1958 a patient was admitted to one of Ontario's public general hospitals and babies were born in hospital at the rate of one every 3 1/2 minutes. This represents a total of 896,643 adults and children admitted for treatment and 147,356 babies born. Including the patients who were still in hospital on the first day of the year, 974,050 adults, children and new borns were given active treatment during 1958 - 26,048 more than in 1957. These figures are released in the Ontario Hospital Services Commission Annual Report on Public and Private Hospitals for 1958.

**Cost Of Operation**

The total cost of operating all public hospitals in 1958 - general hospitals, hospitals for convalescents and the chronically ill and Red Cross Outpost hospitals - including allowances for depreciation of building and equipment and interest on hospital debt, was \$462,470,294 or \$17.80 per patient day - an increase of

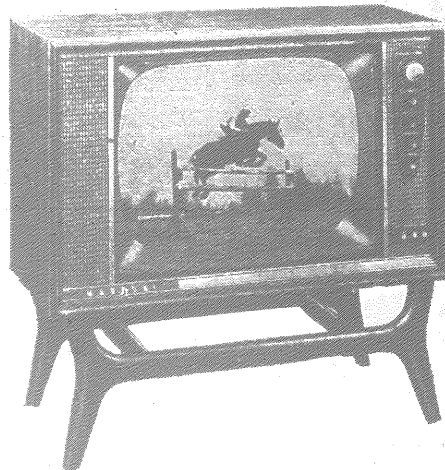
1.46 over the daily cost in 1957. The hospitals experienced a deficit of \$8,312,794 on the year's operation.

**Days of Care Utilized**

Public General and Red Cross Outpost hospitals provided 6,498,307 days of active treatment care, the average length of stay being 8.5 days in public general hospitals and 5.4 days in Red Cross Outpost hospitals. The shorter length of stay in Red Cross Outpost hospitals is attributable to the fact that, in general, the cases they treat are not as serious as many of those cared for in the larger general hospitals.

Hospitals for the chronically ill treated 5,956 adults and children - hospitals and camps for convalescent patients treated 3,385 patients last year. The chronic and convalescent units in public general hospitals treated 1,856 and 1,677 patients respectively. In all, chronically-ill patients received a total of 1,327,094 days of care and convalescent patients 150,915 days of care.

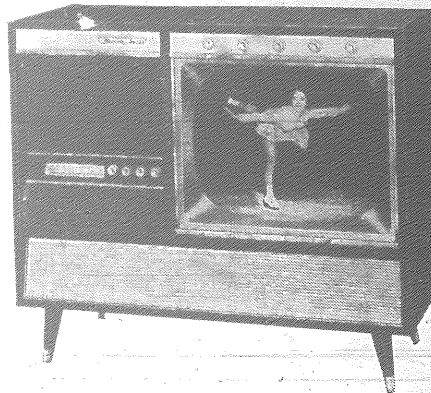
The number of days of active treatment, convalescent and chronic hospital care utilized per one thousand of population showed a slight decrease from 1.733 in 1957

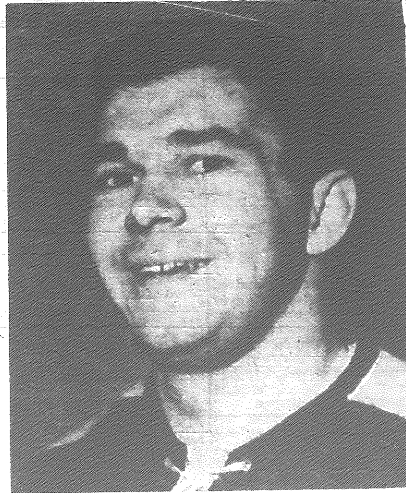

## British Columbia Harvesting Giant Crop Of Holly

VANCOUVER — British Columbia holly, considered the world's finest, has resulted in a record crop this year and will be available to almost every Canadian housewife this Christmas.

It is expected to hit the prairie and eastern market about December 15.

Canadian Pacific, which moved 25-temperature-controlled express cars last year to the eastern Canadian market, expect this year's crop will be even greater than the 100,000 pounds moved last year.

The fruit, with the bright red berries and shiny green leaves has blossomed into big industry.

An area of 1,000 square miles

around the cities of Vancouver and Victoria, in British Columbia is one of the few spots on the continent where the soil and climate are suited to this unusual tree.

"The holly industry is increasing rapidly and British Columbia could eventually become the major source for the world's supply of commercial holly", said Peter Lakes of Vancouver. His plantation output is about one-third of the entire 30-member B.C. Holly Growers' Co-Operative

Association.

He said science, combined with grading and packaging standards, are producing a uniform product and as holly farms expand, the industry may extend its export into the United States, where little holly can be grown successfully.

British Columbia peat, like holly, considered among the best harvested, is now playing a part in the successful marketing of the plant that graces most

homes during the festive season.

Holly wreaths, once based with peat in a crude design, are now uniform, thanks to peat moss sticks, cut from long slabs of peat with specially designed band saws. The raw ends of the holly is stuck into the peat, which prolongs the life of the holly, because of the high moisture retention qualities of peat.
