COST IS IMPORTANT IN PUBLIC HEALTH - EATON

"Costs are important in the world of public health," Dr. R. D. Eaton, Medical Officer of Health for the Area Health Unit, told Kenora Rotarians Monday, addressing the weekly luncheon meeting. The title of his address was "Value for Money". Using the vehicle of T.B. to illustrate his point, the Doctor said that on a mass survey basis, the cost of taking a single x-ray T.B. photo was approximately one dollar, and this sum did not include voluntary labour. He praised the Xmas T.B. Seal campaign.

The speaker said that the primary reason for public health was economic—a sick man cannot work and consequently purchasing power suffers. It is a waste when the country cannot afford.

"Health is a good thing to buy

and it is not cheap," the speaker continued. "Thus, if economic reasons apply to a family, a community and a nation, they apply equally to countries beyond the border. Returning to the T.B. preventative campaign for cost comparisons, the speaker said that it costs about \$2,500 to locate a single T.B. case by the mass x-ray technique. He said that the same funds, used in underdeveloped countries, could protect 250,000 people against several common diseases.

"Ten years ago I was in British West Africa, and there I saw the native people use DDT packed in bags marked 'Five Rivers Flour' bags of the Woods Milling Company, Kenora, Ontario. I had no idea at that time" (Continued on Page 4)

KEN McINNES TO HEAD CHAMBER - COMMERCE

Expressing his thanks for cooperation and assistance received during the past year, Mr. Doug Kennedy, retiring president of the Kenora Chamber of Commerce last night summarized an active Chamber year in an excellent report.

Ken McInnes was elected to succeed Mr. Kennedy and Jack Doner will be vice president in 1960. The new directors are Ches Scott and Ager Stone. At the same time the Chamber learned with regret, the inability of Hiro Oshiro, secretary and treasurer, to continue in that capacity due to pressure of other work. Mr. Oshiro will continue to act until a replacement is secured.

The Chamber's major achievements were given by Mr. Kennedy as a more active membership with 159 members on the list; successful efforts towards making TV a reality for Kenora; the start of the road to Minak and the publicizing of the need to hold a plebiscite on the question of liquor outlets. Mr. Kennedy also enumerated a list of 15 resolutions passed during the year, urging action on various local and district improvements. The text of Mr. Kennedy's address will be published tomorrow.

4 Highway Traffic Accidents In Past Twenty-Four Hours

The Ontario Provincial Police report a rash of accidents on the East Highway during the last 24 hours.

Four accidents occurred all within the area of the Department of Highways garage, approximately six miles east of Kenora on Highway 17.

At 10:00 a.m. Monday morning, a car driven by Frank Lefevre of Kenora slid on the ice surface,

extensively damaging the 1949 Ford.

At 10:30 a.m., a car driven by Mrs. Margaret McLean of Elmira, Michigan went off the road. Mrs. McLean was treated for injuries to her eye and she was allowed to continue her visit to Palmer town, where she will spend Christmas with her son.

Half an hour later, at 11:00 a.m., a car driven by John Larry McCallum of Bevelly Street, Winnipeg, skidded on the ice and hit a rock wall. The driver was not injured.

At 1:10 a.m. this morning, Gary Croft a passenger in a car driven by Donald McNally of Emo was taken to Kenora General Hospital with injuries suffered when the car slipped out of control on the icy highway.

Magistrate's Court

At court this morning, a Kenora youth charged with careless driving (driving on the highway) was fined \$25 and costs and had his licence suspended for 6 months. He was also fined \$25 and costs for obtaining liquor while a minor.

A Jaffray-Molek man convicted of common assault, paid \$10 and costs of 15 days. Another Jaffray-Molek resident paid \$10 and costs for not registering a motor vehicle.

A motorist from the Red Lake road was fined \$25 and costs on a careless driving charge and a resident of McMinn, Manitoba paid \$20 and costs of 3 days for driving without a licence.

For obtaining liquor while a minor a Kenora girl was placed on a month's probation and posted a \$25 bond.

Monday afternoon in Court, three girls from Whitefish Bay were given one year suspended sentence for obtaining liquor while minors.

A man from Northwest Angle charged with supplying the girls with liquor was fined \$100 and costs of 30 days.

Heading without a licence cost a Minak man \$25 and costs of 5 days.

Operating a motor vehicle with out Ontario license plates, resulted in a Winnipeg truck operator paying \$15 and costs.

Town Council Clears - Up Year End Business

Last night saw members of the council dealing with a routine agenda, preparatory to the close of the year's business. All councillors were present and Mayor P. Ratuski presided.

A petition asking for year round water service to their places of business on Railway Street was received from: North Star Oil Ltd., Texaco Oil Co. Ltd., British American Oil Co., Lindstrom and Nilson and Bergman and Nilson. This was referred to the town engineer for a report and estimate of cost.

On a recommendation of the Fire and Police committee, effective as of July 1st, 1959, the rate of pay for volunteer firemen for fire calls, practices and ambulance calls will be \$3.00 per hour.

A request from Fire Chief Davey for an increase in staff since the forty hour week was instituted, was referred to the 1960 council.

Alderman J. H. Armstrong was named council's appointee to the Thistle Hockey Club committee to make arrangements for the visit to Kenora of the Japanese Hockey Team.

The Keewatin Public School Board will be advised that their request for the Kenora Utility Department to assume part of the

cost of equipping the Keewatin School Home Economics room cannot be entertained, since the department makes no contributions to any schools, including the Kenora Schools.

Third and final reading was given a bylaw to stop-up part of a lane adjacent to the General Hospital.

FINANCE

Municipal accounts totalling \$123,542.31 and Utility Accounts \$98,184.91 were authorized paid. Accepted were cheques in the amount of \$708.46, being the town's share of fines and fees imposed during November at

1 VOTE ELECTS DREW AS KEEWATIN'S MAYOR

Jim Drew has been declared elected mayor of Keewatin for the coming two years, following his one-vote victory at the polls yesterday in which must be the closest contest in the Town's history. Returning Officer Ed Holmes, after checking and re-checking the totals, released the following results:

DREW, James - 307
HODKINSON, Walter - 306

A one-vote margin would indicate a re-count by the district judge. The vote was close to a 60 percent turn-out. There are 1,046 names on the voters' list and 613 votes were cast in the majority contest.

A newcomer to Keewatin topped the contest for council seats. Mr. G. E. Styles won a two-year term with 448 votes with Luke Francis, 390 and Cecil Gilley

with 371 being the other two to win two-year terms. Elected to serve for a single year were Paul Bouchard with 348; C. Rusak with 324 and Sven Flostrand with 244 votes.

Gordon Otter topped the polls in a five-way contest for 3 school board seats. He was given 466 votes; Mr. S. Karisson, 318 and H. Devlin, 294 votes.

Tuberculosis Still Serious Problem

FORT WILLIAM Tuberculosis is far from conquered in this area despite provision of some facilities for care of other illnesses. Hon. M. B. Dymond, M.D., Ontario minister of Health said here Saturday.

Dr. Dymond made his first field visit to Fort William Sanatorium Saturday and after a tour of the building spoke at a luncheon attended by officials, craft and voluntary workers on behalf of the Christmas seal campaign.

Many sanatoriums have been operating considerably under capacity due to earlier detection of TB, shorter periods of treatment, better drugs and generally improved efficiency.

Dr. Dymond said his policy is to make other use of beds not required for TB patients, and this has been done with several sanatoriums in Eastern Ontario.

Fort William Sanatorium serves a large Indian population which remains susceptible to tuberculosis, particularly in the outlying areas. Since early detection is often difficult, the local sanatorium has not witnessed a decrease comparable to other parts of the province.

Dr. Dymond said one person in Ontario died of TB every two days. This record proves the disease is still a serious problem

Local initiative led to construction of Fort William Sanatorium 30 years ago. Previously TB sufferers from Northwestern Ontario had to travel east, and many were reluctant to take the big step.

Dr. Dymond paid tribute to W. C. Lillis, original board member who attended the Saturday luncheon, and Dr. W. P. Hogarth, one of the prime movers. He said medical superintendent Dr. George Jeffrey gave substance to the visionary plans of those who made the sanatorium a reality.

Dr. Dymond commended voluntary workers and said similar groups are playing an important part in assisting the chronically and mentally ill.

Dr. Dymond was introduced by R. E. Lee, president, Sanatorium board of directors, and thanked by director Porter Bailey. Following the luncheon, Dr. Dymond boarded a plane for Toronto.

Mr. T. A. Saul of Kenora, Provincial President of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association attended the meeting. He was accompanied by members of the Kenora-Patricia District T. B. Association.

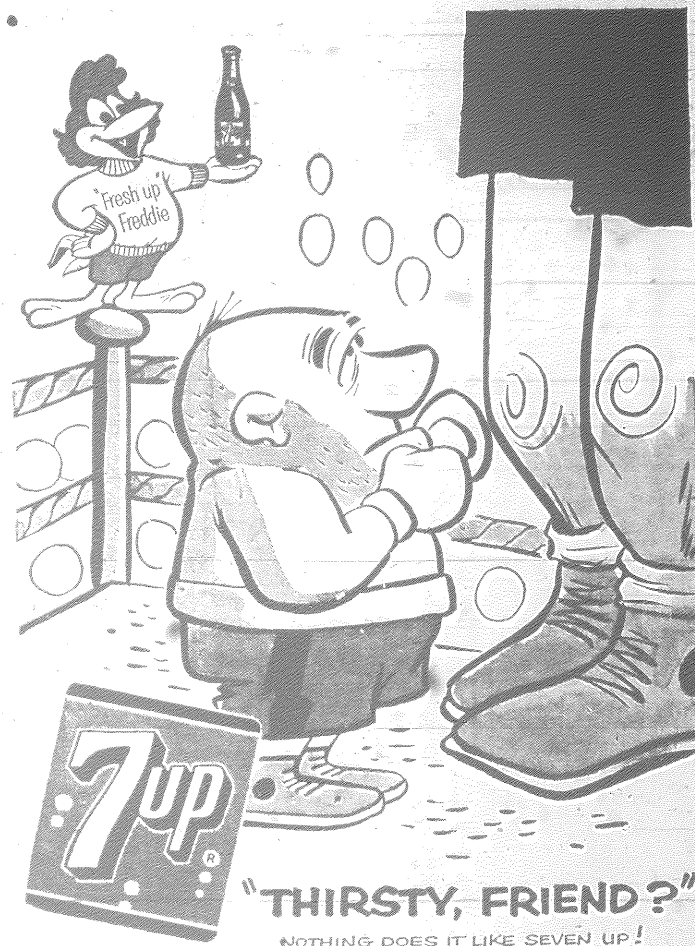
