POST OFFICE BUSIEST PLACE IN ALL KENORA

Mr. Carney stated today that he has the best group of workers in Kenora. They are really doing an excellent job, he said, and the extra help hired to aid the postmen are doing a first class job. A total of 22 extra workers have been taken on. Twelve are out on the routes, with the other ten helping out in the post office. Five extra trucks are helping with the parcel delivery.

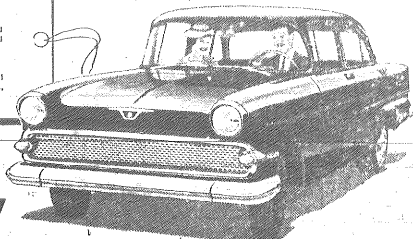

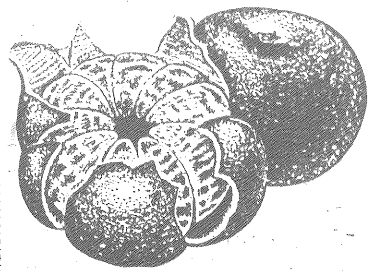

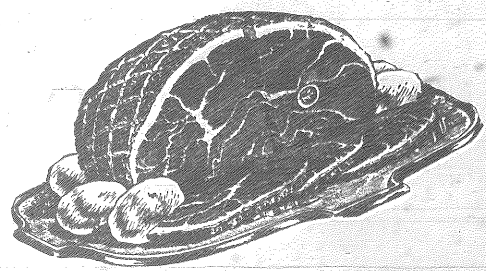

CPA To Cut Air Freight Rate To Orient In Half

Vancouver, B.C. — Rates on general air freight shipments between Canada and the Orient will be slashed by 50 per cent effective January 1st, Canadian Pacific Airlines announced here today.

The airline will also introduce a new simplified method of applying these rates on its Vancouver-Tokyo-Hong Kong service. Under the new arrangement, the rate per pound of a 22,000-pound shipment in either direction will be cut by more than half from the present \$1.62 to 75 cents.

"The new rates will introduce a new era of air cargo carriage in the Pacific," said T. W. Brown, CPA Cargo Manager. "Shippers from Canada and the Orient will send more and different commodities by air in amounts never thought possible previously."

"It is very obvious that the new low cargo rates will spur Canada-Orient trading relations when thousands of shippers and importers start using the aircraft

to market their goods on both sides of the Pacific," added Brown.

"As a result, CPA expects to double its air cargo traffic between Vancouver and the Orient during 1960."

Agreement on the move to reduce cargo rates in the Pacific was reached at the recent International Air Transport Association Meetings in Honolulu. Terms of the agreement, are subject to the approval of the government's concerned.

The present commodity-by-commodity rating system will be replaced by a system establishing only one rate for all types of goods within each weight class.

"The principle behind the new system," said Brown, "is simply, the heavier the shipment, the lower the rate per pound. There will be five 'weight breaks' or weight classes — under 100 pounds, up to 850 pounds, up to 1,100 pounds, up to 5,500 pounds and up to 22,000 pounds."

Applications For Tree Seedlings

Anyone who intends to apply to the Department of Lands and Forests for tree seedlings for planting on private lands should make their application as soon as

possible. Tree seedlings are distributed on a "first come, first served" basis, and demand consistently outruns supply. So if you intend to put a few trees to replenish the woodlot, make a shelterbelt or start a plantation next spring, call in or write to the Department of Lands and Forests for information and application forms for trees.
