## Hospital Fund Tops \$200,000 Mark

### DISTRICT HEALTH UNIT REPORT FOR NOVEMBER

At the November meeting of the District of Kenora Health Unit, the following reports were presented:

During November the usual immunization clinics were held in all major centres with average attendance. Plans were completed for adult clinics to be held in Red Lake and Kenora for the giving of 3rd doses of diphtheria vaccine.

The first of these in Kenora was held December 14th and two more will be held in January. In Red Lake two clinics will be held in December.

There have been a number of cases of Shigellosis (Dysentery) reported during the past two months, October and November. These cases have been widely scattered and it has not proved possible to find any common factor or means of transmission from one case to another. It appears that across the province there has been a widespread flare-up of this organism, with only cases being reported from many areas. Such a widely disseminated outbreak is difficult to explain.

Intestinal Hepatitis is still hanging on and seven cases were reported from the Kenora-Keelewin area during the month. One case was reported from Red Lake.

A single case of Meningococcal

Meningitis (Cerebrospinal Fever) was reported from the Dryden (eastern rural district). This is another disease that seems to occur quite sporadically across the district with no direct connection between one case and the next.

One new case of Tuberculosis was hospitalized from Nestor Falls. One trip was made by the Director and two by the staff nurse of the district to give and read tuberculin skin tests to contacts. Positive reactions are to be sought in by ones for X-ray, since many of these are from the rural areas. The Provincial Department has agreed to underwrite the cost of transportation.

Two cases of theft from and operated vehicles have come to light during the month. Two snow tires were found to be missing from one vehicle and had not been traced, and a bathroom weight scale was taken from another vehicle while this was standing outside a garage. Fortunately the weight scale was an old one which had already been replaced for office use but was being used to carry out some work in the field.

The unit was visited during the month by Mr. George Powell of the Division of Environmental Sanitation and by Miss Ethel Irwin, Nursing Supervisor for the

### GENERAL HOSPITAL DRIVE GAINING MOMENTUM AS INTEREST INCREASES

Although activities of the General Hospital Expansion Campaign are not too obvious during the pre-Christmas season, planning goes on and contributions keep coming in.

The Committee held its regular weekly meeting on Wednesday, December 16th, and is able to report that pledges and cash contributions have crossed the \$200,000.00 mark.

The canvass of businesses and out-of-town subscribers is not at all complete. The figure quoted does not include the contribution to be made by the Ontario Minnesota Pulp and Paper Company. 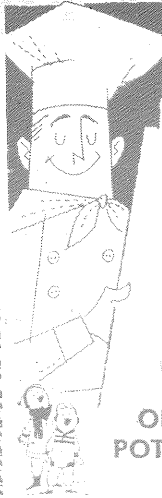
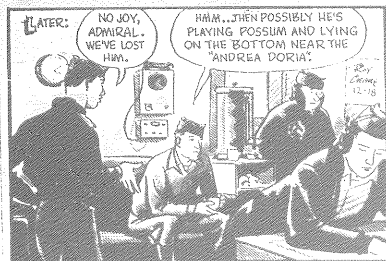



### Bacall Returns To Stage

NEW YORK — A dazzling array of show folk turned out Wednesday night to cheer Lauren Bacall back in work on Broadway.

The throng, far surpassing the usual White Way first night crowd in name glories, was on hand for the premiere of Goodbye Charlie, a comedy, at the Lyceum Theatre.

The show marks Miss Bacall's first stage venture after 15 years of movie-making, and her first movie-making since the death of her husband, Humphrey Bogart, two years ago.

Bacall's husband as well as Broadway stars filled the night's program, but the message of eternal regrettable was not matched by the play.

Goodbye Charlie, written and directed by George Axelrod of Screen Year, Bob Fosse, is an awkward and dark effort. There is an interesting idea in the charade which concerns a lusty playboy who returns to earth (after being slain by an irate husband) in the

shape of an alluring but innocent damsel.

Turnabout complications develop when the transformed being falls in love with his (or her) best friend.

Miss Bacall, who has a throaty way with words and a facile comic sense, distills delightfully amusing moments.

The moments come rarely, however.

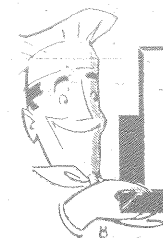

**52 Died In Traffic Safe-Driving Week**

With nine more traffic deaths than in 1958, Canada's Safe-Driving Week, which ended Dec. 7 at midnight, proved conclusively that Canadian motorists still have a long way to go to raise the status of "safe drivers". This is the opinion of W. Arch Bryce, Executive Director of the Canadian Highway Safety Council, national sponsors of the campaign. Mr. Bryce gave full credit to active participation provincially and locally for the forestal promotion of the drive.

Between Dec. 1 and 7, 52 people were killed in Canadian traffic compared to 43 in the same 1958 period, 47 in 1957. While this was

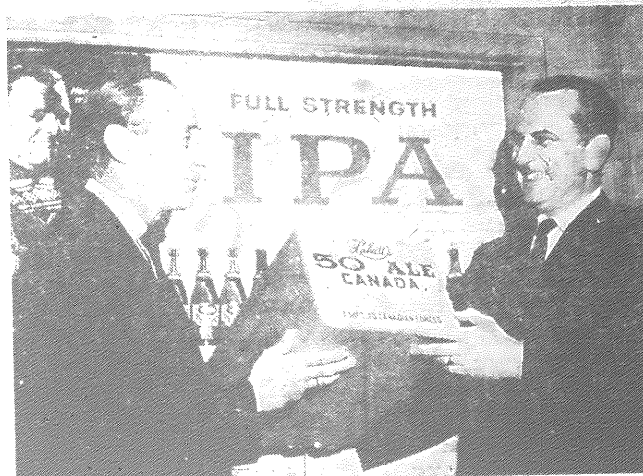

will follow the 10 per cent average for the last six months of the year based on past experience. Mr. Bryce expressed the hope that the campaign would serve to emphasize the need for greater respect and pedestrian stability and capability on the highway.

Only one province reported a death in Safe-Driving Week. Both Newfoundland and New Brunswick reported no highway deaths during the campaign, the first consecutive year.

The western provinces account for 17 of 52 West traffic deaths during the week. The most were in Alberta.

With more than 40 per cent of the province's population concentrated in the Greater Toronto area, the 1957 Week traffic deaths, 100 per cent of the total, were reported in the Greater Toronto area. The Ontario Highway Safety Council is the province's official sponsor of the drive and the campaign is also being promoted in other provinces.

More than 100,000 motorists are on the road in Ontario, and it is estimated that more than 100,000 are on the road in Ontario.

**Dept. Of Mines Reports On Area In Kenora District**

The Wapese Lake, Tully Lake area, in the District of Kenora (Patricia Portion) is the subject of the most recent geological report to be issued by the Ontario Department of Mines. The area covered by the report comprises about 1,200 square miles lying north of Sioux Lookout and southeast of Red Lake.

Early interest in the area resulted from lithium finds in the Root Lake area about 30 miles north of Tully Lake. However, no lithium has been reported in the area covered by the report. Additional prospecting followed the discovery of gold in the Red Lake district.

The report was written by

W. R. M. Williamson and P. Hudac who led a field party into the area in 1953. It is accompanied by a coloured geological map drawn on the scale of one inch to one mile.

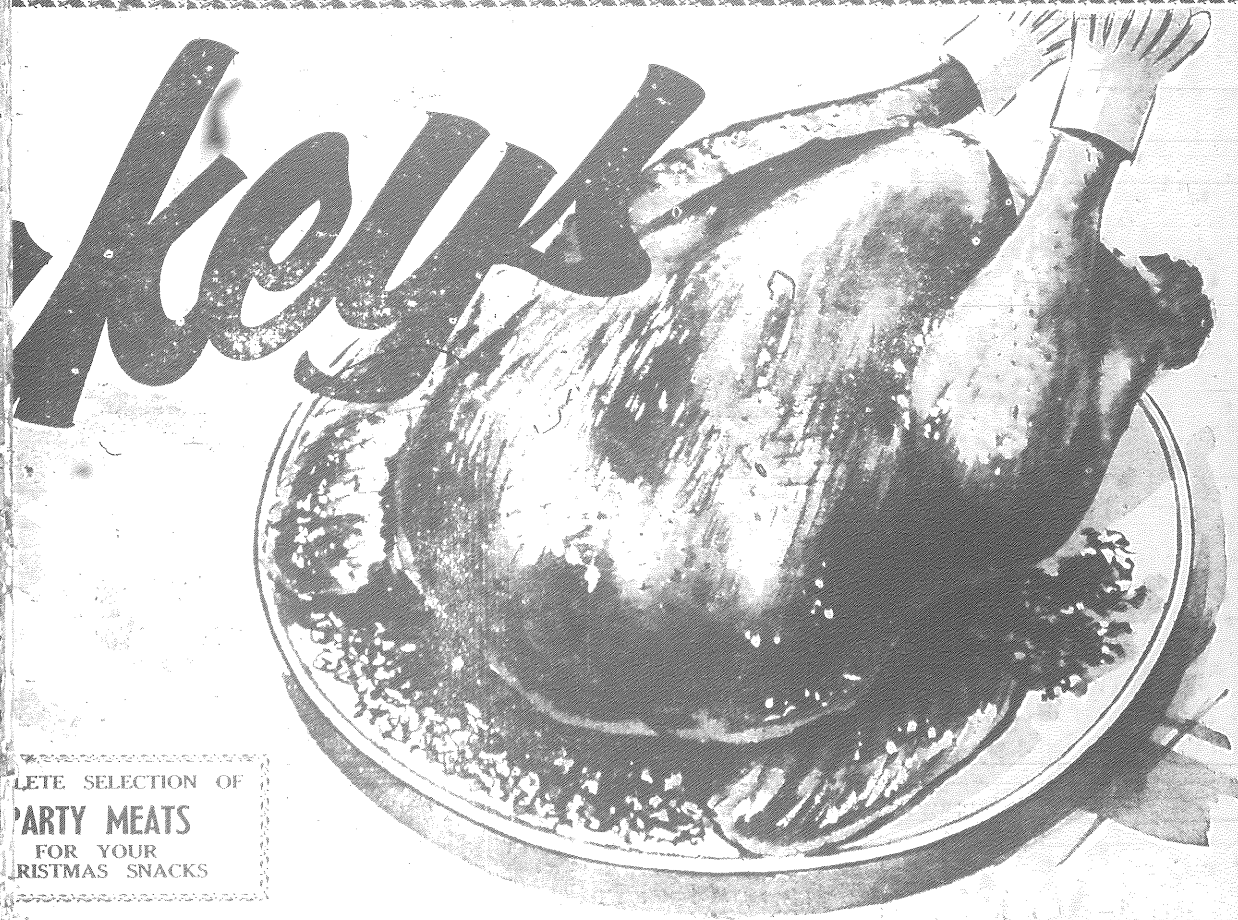

area west of North Bay. Miss Irwin was here for a week during which time she spent time in each of the nursing districts.

It was decided to try to eliminate the problem posed by car and truck hulks which can be seen on a number of properties in the district. These are, at best, a rat harborage and should be removed. A preliminary survey by the Sanitary Inspectors will be followed by requests to those responsible to remove all offending scrap iron, and like refuse to the proper place - the refuse dump.

**SANITATION REPORT**

The following is a report of work in the sanitation field for the month of November 1959.

**Foal Control**

There were 11 inspections made of eating establishments in the Unit area - 13 in the Dryden district and 28 in the Kenora, Red Lake area. There were 7 restaurants that required written directions regarding maintenance

matters that had been neglected. New washroom facilities are being installed in the Pine Tree Coffee Shop in Dryden.

Swab tests of eating and drinking utensils were taken on 141 samples, with 17 samples reported as having a high plate count and 2 positive for E. coli.

Swab tests were taken of beverage room glasses in 14 licensed establishments. Three of the samples were reported as having high plate counts, but all were negative for E. coli. Follow-up samples have been taken.

**Milk Supply**

There were 75 samples of milk and milk products collected for analysis with the following results: - 68 satisfactory, 7 unsatisfactory.

**Water Supplies**

There were 52 samples of water taken for analysis during the month - 21 from public supplies, 18 from private and 13 from rural schools.

A chlorinator was installed on the water supply at the Stouy Narrows school.

All municipal water supplies were tested on a weekly basis and all had satisfactory reports.

The Kenora water department converted their second water truck into a delivery pump unit.

The water intake for the Rabbit Lake school was extended an other 100 feet into the Lake after many substandard reports were received on the quality of the water.

**Sewage Disposal**

There were 5 permits issued for septic tank installations during November with 33 inspections made concerning private sewage disposal systems.

**Refuse Disposal**

Routine inspections were made

of business lanes and disposal grounds in the area and found to be generally satisfactory.

**Interviews**

There were 38 persons interviewed concerning sanitation matters and problems.
