## JUDGE COMMENDS IDEA FOR HIGHWAY SAFETY

Sixteen year old Rick Baehler of Atikokan today was congratulated by Judge L. A. McLennan for submitting the district's winning entry in a Province-wide contest sponsored by the Attorney-General's department, directed to the discovery of new ideas which will promote highway safety. At a pleasing ceremony held in the Judge's Chambers this afternoon, His Honour presented to the winner, a cheque for \$50.00, which was donated by the late Jack Hamell. In attendance too, were OPP Inspector Tom Cooke, Crown Attorney T. A. O'Leary, Sheriff Dave Bruce and Corporals Forrester and Rollie of the Ontario Provincial Police. Each extended his personal congratulations.

Judge McLennan noted that the tragic toll of lives claimed on streets and highways must always be a challenge to all citizens to eliminate, and to that end Attorney-General Roby, assisted by funds made available from Mr. Hamell's estate, launched the contest to seek new ideas. It was not an essay contest, as many entrants had assumed. The Province was divided into 17 districts, with a \$50 prize offered in each. Rick's idea was the best submitted in the Kenora-Rainy River and Patricia electoral districts.

The winning idea suggested that all big trucks be equipped with large bumpers on the rear. Judge McLennan stated that accidents where cars, unable to stop, crash into the rear of these trucks or transports, usually prove fatal to most occupants of the car. The forward portion of the car plows under the truck, slicing off the top part. The bumper design offered real merit in the opinion of the judge, said His Honour.

"Rick has not got received in driver's license," continued the Judge, "but it is pleasing to note that he is doing his thinking now. It is not the thinking of a boy who becomes involved in accidents."

Rick made the trip to Kenora under OPP auspices, and said he didn't mind the arrangement at all. Born at Timmins, he is the second oldest of five boys in the family of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Baehler. The family moved to Atikokan seven years ago. Bob is a

grade 9 student. He planned to take his cheque home with him, and not do his Xmas shopping in Kenora.

## XMAS BUSINESS BRISK

# LAST-MINUTE SHOPPERS ASSURE FULL STOCKINGS

With Christmas just hours away, local stores are busy with last minute shoppers. A Miner and News survey indicates that business had been "spotty" this year, television sales have topped this list of sales by a large margin, with some other lines of business possibly suffering a little, because of this fact. Spending has been fairly free, with citizens apparently feeling confident of the community's economic future.

Across Canada, few records will be set by Christmas shoppers, although some types of stores are running 10 percent ahead of 1958.

While merchants in most of the large cities anticipate an increase in sales over last year, they are cautious of predictions. If any pattern is emerging, it is that shoppers are showing more discrimination, spending well but wisely.

Apparently only one major city faces a decline in spending. In Edmonton, the grain failure and a general shortage of money has hit Christmas business, described as "spotty."

The volume of customers is the same, if not higher, but "selective" buying is down, said a department store executive.

From big spending last year on refrigerators, television and high coats, purchases have shrunk to small articles, shoppers are "being more careful looking for quality means, not junk."

A Calgary store, though is doing bigger business than ever before. "Maybe it's the cattle farmers" and a spokesman.

Winnipeg cash registers are making records. Last year the city led Canada in percentage increase over the previous year's Christmas.

The casual, snowless weather has discouraged shoppers in Montreal and Toronto, but the stores are standing by for a last-minute rush expected to push sales above last year's figures. Extended night shopping is expected to help.

"You need a snowfall and a Santa Claus to bring out the shoppers," said a Toronto department store spokesman.

Vancouver shoppers have also made a late start, taking advantage of night shopping for last-minute buying.

Ottawa, another late starter, reports business picking up briskly. With a large volume of goods on sale, Quebec City stores are experiencing sales as good as or better than 1958.

Merchants in Saint John, N.B., estimate sales will be up to five per cent higher than last year. Most popular gifts are clothing items.

St. John's Busy  
Halifax stores report Christmas buying equal to or slightly better than 1958 volume.

In Newfoundland, St. John's stores have been "packed" since Dec. 12 when they started re-opening open six nights a week.

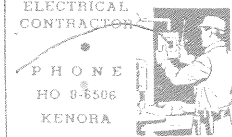

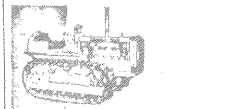

Donlin Bureau of Statistics

**External Trade:** Commodity imports during October were slightly lower than a year earlier in the first decrease this year. As total exports were higher in the month, there was also a decrease in the month's trade deficit. Over the ten months, however, imports gained over 9% and exports under 4% with the result that the overall deficit more than doubled to \$823,300,000 from \$239,500,000. In trade with the United States, imports in the ten months increased somewhat more than exports to \$603,500,000 from \$584,100,000. Net inflow of capital from security transactions to the end of September this year was down moderately to \$479 million from \$495 million last year.

**Housing:** Both the number of new dwelling units started and completed during October declined in contrast of 5,000 population, but with earlier gains the ten-month total of completions remained slightly higher than last year in contrast to a drop of nearly 14% for starts.

**Manufacturing:** Steel input production in the base ended December 5 eased down from the record level of the previous week but was still 102.1 of rated capacity. November production was at the high level of 828,286, 984 tons, raising aggregate output for the eleven months to 8,268,994 tons, 37% greater than in 1958. The iron content in the period was 30% larger. 440,000 of motor vehicles fully built in November, leaving the cumulative annual output for the year just under 4,000,000. A monthly shipment of 244,000 were in early 95% for electric motors, 85% for washing machines, over 100% for radios, slightly lower for television sets.

Trade on the import by the value of the month was above a year earlier this year, the major part of the rise being in value of exports.

**Merchandise:** Imports in October totalled 1,014,000, nearly 10% higher than in 1958, compared to a year earlier, bringing to 87,416,000 for the ten months. Exports for the same period totalled 874,000, 11% higher than in 1958, and brought the cumulative total to 8,740,000 for the ten months. The net result of the year was a 10% increase in value of exports over imports.

**Prices:** The consumer price index moved up slightly between October and November to a new peak of 128.3, although the food component - main factor in the increases of preceding months - moved lower. The November index is two points or 1.6% above the standing a year earlier.

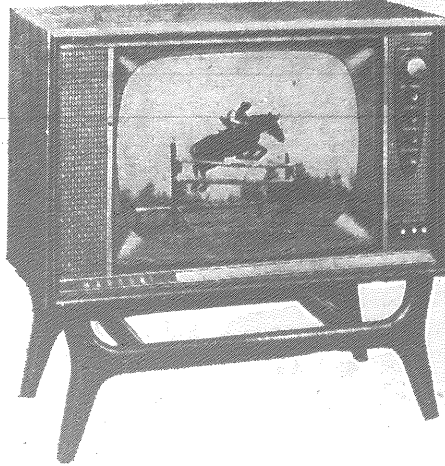



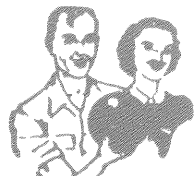

### CHRISTMAS SAFETY

Since this is the season when small children are particularly apt to be picking into all sorts of odd corners at home, the Home Economic Service of the Ontario Department of Agriculture reminds parents to keep such things as drugs, poisons, and cleaning compounds well out of reach. Bottles, boxes, pills, capsules, powders and potions of any kind present an irresistible temptation to youngsters.

To help keep fire hazards to a minimum, buy a fresh tree, anchor it securely in a container of water and keep the water supply replenished every day. Be sure your tree is out of the lines of traffic, away from the fireplace and not in a doorway. Christmas trees have been known to topple over in doorways and block exits. Then check the tree lights to make sure they are in good repair. Sockets should be tight and all the insulation intact. Exposed wires and damaged plug, are danger signals. Make sure you don't plug too many lights or fixtures into a single wall outlet. An over-loaded circuit can cause a short or a shock. Don't use in-door lights outdoors where moisture can increase the danger of shock.

Don't let Christmas wrapping accumulate where a careless match or cigarette spark could cause it to burst into flame. If tree lights remain on for too long a period, they may become overheated and dry this tree out, adding to the danger of fire.

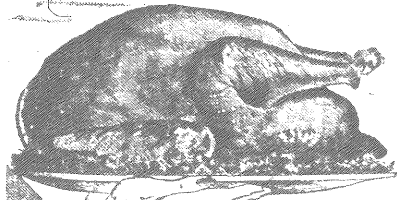

**LICENCE FEES UP FOR GARAGE MEN**

TORONTO - Auto wreckers, auto repairmen, garage and parking lot operators will have to pay more for their licences under new regulations of the Ontario High-

way Traffic Act. The licence fee to store or buy and sell motor vehicles, operate a garage, parking station, parking lot and used car lot has been increased to \$25 from \$10. Licences to buy and wreck motor vehicles have also been increased to \$25 from \$10.

Licences to service and repair motor vehicles have been increased to \$15 from \$5. These are the first increases in fees since 1922. The new regulations, effective January 1, are outlined in the Ontario Gazette released today.

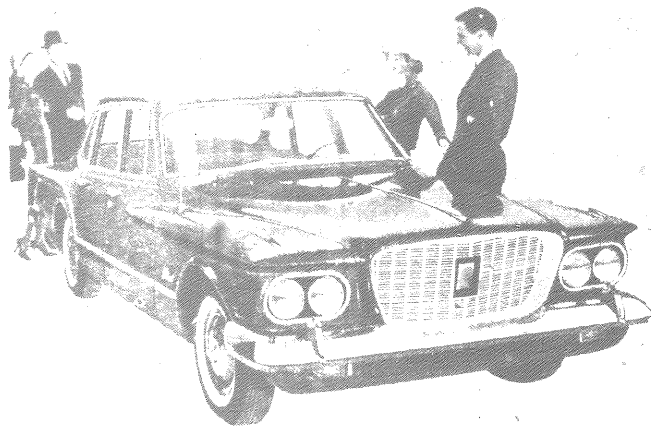

## Newsprint Output Up 45,223 Tons

Montreal, Dec. 18.—The Newsprint Association of Canada yesterday reported production for November at 563,323 tons, an increase of 45,223 tons over the corresponding period last year.

Canadian newsprint mills worked at 91.7 per cent. of rated capacity during the month against 89.8 per cent.

in October to boost daily average production to 22,187 tons, nine per cent. more than in November, 1958.

Production for the year to the end of November stands at 5,855,722 tons, up 4.2 per cent. from the 5,619,321 produced last year.

Canadian shipments for the month went to 594,539 tons, up 66,851 tons from last year. U.S. consumers took 478,231 tons, an increase of 9.8 per cent., to make up 80.4 per cent. of total production.

Total shipments to the end of the month were 5,874,766, 5.8 per cent. higher than the

5,549,063 shipped last year. Shipments to the U.S. were 4,681, 829 against 4,435,446.

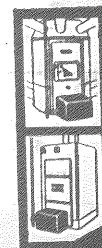

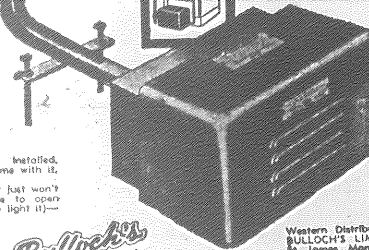
