With the Yuletide spirit of goodwill mounting as friends and families gather, it seems a somewhat depressing necessity to again emphasize the need to guard our lives and those of others, with extra care.

Spokesmen for the Kenora and District Police Association have issued special appeals for holiday safety. It will be the stern duty of Police officers to show no mercy to the drunk or the impaired driver. Apart from this very real source of accidents, though, there are the impaired pedestrians, the general tendency to adopt a care-free attitude and of course, the greater use of streets and longer hours of darkness.

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Safe Walking and Driving Urged for Christmas Holidays

Here are some tips for safe walking and driving. These rules should be remembered and practiced by everyone interested in protecting himself and others from death or injury during the hazardous holiday season.

Drivers

- Come to a complete stop at stop signs.
- Don't drive or walk in traffic after drinking.
- Follow other vehicles at a safe distance.
- Stay alert; don't daydream about holiday doings.
- Slow down in bad weather; adjust to conditions.
- Dim lights on highway when oncoming driver doesn't. Look at right shoulder to keep control.
- Yield right-of-way to pedestrians in crosswalks. Don't pass a car stopped to let a walker across.
- Stay on own side of road at intersections, grade crossings, passing zones, or hills and curves.

Walkers

- Obey traffic signals and signs.
- Cross at intersections only.
- Look left and right for traffic while crossing.
- Watch for turning cars before stepping off curb.
- Never walk into street from behind parked cars.
- If you must walk on road, walk on left facing cars.
- Wait on sidewalk, not in street, for green light or "walk" or gap in traffic when there's no light.
- At night wear reflective something white or reflectorized to help driver see you.
- White crossing streets don't obscure your view with packages, an umbrella or hat.

TESTED RECIPES AND HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Crisp banana tarts with fresh banana filling glazed with currant jelly are wonderful fresh fruit finales for holiday feasts.

Banana Christmas Tarts

- 3 tbsps. cornstarch
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup sugar
- $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. salt
- 2 cups milk
- 3 eggs (beaten lightly)
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 4 bananas
- 6 4-inch tart shells, baked and cooled
- 2 to 3 tbsps. currant jelly
- Whipped cream, sweetened

Mix first three ingredients together in top of a double boiler. Gradually stir in $1\frac{3}{4}$ cups of the milk and cook and stir over hot water until thick and bubbly. Combine remaining $\frac{1}{4}$

cup milk with eggs and blend with cooked mixture. Continue to cook until very thick, stirring constantly. Stir in vanilla and remove from heat. Chill. Mash one of the bananas with lemon juice and stir into custard. Spoon filling into cooked tart shells. Arrange remaining bananas sliced over filling. Melt currant jelly over hot water. Spoon a thin layer over top of tarts. Chill. Garnish with whipped cream.

With ham serve $\frac{1}{2}$ whipped cream with 1 tsp. prepared horseradish, 1 tsp. sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt.

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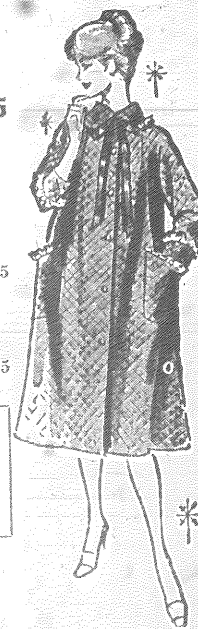
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
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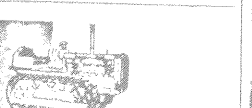
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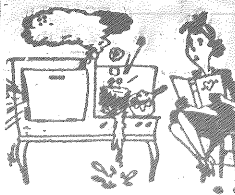

Fruit Chews In Christmas Hues
Oh, look at the delicious ingredients that go into the recipe for Christmas Fruit Balls, and you know the reason for their "chewy" texture and superb flavor. Candied pineapple, dates, ginger and nuts are the main character ingredients of these rich and tantalizing little sweet cakes. The mixture is baked before it is rolled into balls and coated with tinted sugar. These delectable confections can be wrapped in gaily colored foil to help stuff a stocking, or placed in cones and used to decorate a Christmas tree. Since they keep extremely well, the fruit balls can be made well ahead of time and kept on hand for entertaining throughout the Christmas season.

CHRISTMAS FRUIT BALLS
Yield—about 4 dozen balls
1 cup chopped mixed red and green candied pineapple
1/2 cup cut up pitted dates
1/2 cup finely chopped candied orange peel
1/2 cup coarsely-chopped walnuts or pecans
1/2 cup once-sifted all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup fine granulated sugar
1/2 cup raisins, butter or margarine melted
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup tinted sugar
Grease an 8 inch square cake pan. Preheat oven to 350 deg. F. (moderate).

Preheat and combine candied pineapple, dates, walnuts and nuts. Mix together over fire in heavy boiling pot, and add raisins. With finger, mash all fruit so fruit pieces separated. Then stir well, combine heat on fire. Add one cup of sugar, one method better of pineapple and walnuts. And as well as the mixture, add ground and combine well. Can be prepared just ahead of time. Bake in preheated oven, in moderate heat, for 25 minutes. Let cool in the pan. Cut into squares, and roll in the middle.

PARKS GROWING IN POPULARITY

Toronto— Public patronage of Ontario provincial parks this year was up 59 per cent from 1958, Land and Forests Minister Spooner has reported.
Figures show 5,172,000 visits to the 73 parks this year compared with 3,232,000 in 1958.
Mr. Spooner said that as well as the 73-existing parks the province still has "about a score more, almost" suitable for future needs. He predicted that when department plans were completed visits to provincial parks would exceed 10,000,000 every year.

Mayor P. Ratuski Pleads For A Safe Christmas

Joyful celebrations are quite in order at this season of the year as long as they are not at the price of a human life.

This was the advice that Mayor Ratuski gave today to his fellow citizens in referring particularly to highway tragedies that sadden Christmas and New Year's holidays.

"Moderation in all things applies more than ever and can only help make gatherings of family and friends more enjoyable," he observed.

A heavy responsibility weighs on those who place the lives of their guests in danger by serving from too large quantities of alcoholic beverages, Mayor Ratuski noted.

"It better to soberly" he suggested, "that a good number of your guests are driving and not have to be persons on the road. A friendly reminder to be served just a good cup of strong

coffee to your guests before leaving will help them to be more alert on their way home."

Mayor Ratuski urged motorists and pedestrians to co-operate without reservation with the police. "Regard the traffic police as your friends who wish you well who want nothing more than to save you from needless accidents," he said. "Obey their signs and the traffic regulations. They only exist in your interest and for your protection."

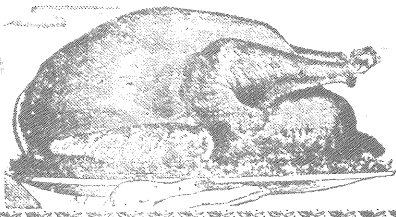

No Risk Of TB From Refugees

Canadians should not worry about the risk of infection from tubercular refugees admitted into the country, Health Minister Dymond of Ontario said Saturday.

The patients are not allowed to mix with the public and their families, are given examinations under the regular provincial program, Mr. Dymond said during a visit to the Niagara Peninsula sanatorium.

Earlier, Mr. Dymond said in Hamilton that the Ontario cabinet may hold a special meeting to make it easier for European refugees suffering from tuberculosis to enter the country.

The meeting would make clear

how many tubercular refugees Ontario would be willing to take following Citizenship and Immigration Minister Fairclough's statement Saturday that Canada would take as many of the refugees as the provinces would accept.

Mr. Dymond said that "so long as we can help the underprivileged in the world, they shouldn't be allowed to suffer." Ordinary regulations on tubercular refugees were revised recently when Canada decided to accept 100 refugees and their families as a contribution to world refugee year.

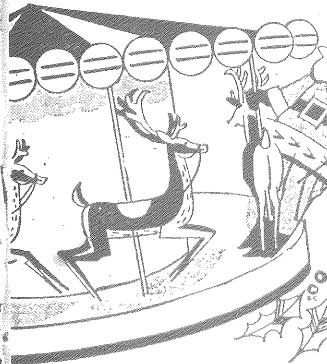

Christmas Cards "Real Square"

Christmas cards tend to be "real square" this year. Sick humor and the slim jim style are being replaced by the square card with the conventional message.

While cards are wider, Santa is slimmer. St. Nick—with a waistline—romps across cards selling well in every province.

Most popular in card stores across the country are packs of 25 cards of one design. D. R. Wallace, district manager for the Prairies of a large card manufacturing company, estimates that 50 per cent of total sales will be solid packs.

"The sender used to look at a card and say, 'It suits Aunt Sue or Uncle Ben.' Now the receiver gets a card and says, 'Isn't this just like good old Joe?'" Mr. Wallace says.

This reflects the change from 10 years ago when the sender matched cards to the personality of the receiver. Now cards reflect the sender's personality.

Winter scenes, popular everywhere, are especially popular along the west coast. At Vancouver, citizens can buy boxes of assorted Vancouver scenes. The snow scenes are used extensively for both personal and business cards at Edmonton. Personalized cards are in vogue on the Prairies this year.

Contemporary humor, popular in the East last year, has gained mild popularity in the West this year. Called studio, contemporary, sick or heat, the cards sell for 25 cents each. Sample greeting:

"Hope a very special friend has a very special Christmas and I hope yours is nice too."

Religious cards have wide appeal in the province of Quebec. One firm, which produces cards in French, turns out 50 per cent of its work with religious motifs. Reproductions of contemporary Canadian art and the old European masters are growing in demand. Half of the 30 designs by a six-year-old Quebec firm were done by Canadians. One of the Canadian reproductions is a felt-brush drawing of John Haworth, 43-year-old Montreal

public relations executive who draws in his spare time.

Pastel shades, particularly turquoise and pink, have made great inroads into the traditional red and green shades in Ontario and Quebec. Gold and silver sparkle on many Ontario-sold cards.

In the Maritimes, the demand for religious cards appears to be confined to elderly people. In the West they make up about 15 per cent of the card market.

At Vancouver, one retail outlet reported the sale of religious cards down 40 per cent but other outlets reported the cards were major sellers this year.

Prices, generally, run from \$1 to \$4 for a solid pack of 25 cards and, assorted 50-to-a-box cards sell at 90 cents. They feature typical Christmas symbols—holly, candles, wreaths and bells.

Wonderful Breads — For Yuletide Eating

One of the oldest holiday customs has been the serving of Christmas breads. Many new Canadians from other lands can teach us a great deal about such delicacies as the "Kolach" bread, Pampushky, and the Christmas Stollen. Many bakeries now feature these special breads during the holiday season. But the busy homemaker who wants to "keep her hand in", so to speak, can fashion her own fancy breads by dressing up plain loaves of enriched white bread or brown 'n serve rolls.

GLAZED COCOANUT CHERRY LOAF

- 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons strained honey
- one slice loaf enriched white

bread
2 tablespoons shredded coconut
4 maraschino cherries, chopped.
Combine brown sugar, cinnamon, butter and honey. Spread each slice of bread with sugar mixture and reassemble loaf. Hold stack firmly and, with a sharp knife, trim away crusts. Turn loaf on its side and set in a greased shallow pan. Loosely tie a string, lengthwise, around the stack. Spread remaining sugar mixture over top of loaf. Then slice lengthwise, cutting completely through center of loaf, but not cutting string. Gently pull tops of slices apart in several places and sprinkle coconut over loaf top. Pat cherries with absorbent paper to dry them. Arrange cherries among shreds of coconut. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F) for 8 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes 15 servings.

MINT COCOANUT ROLLS

- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons shredded coconut
- one tablespoon melted butter or

margarine
2 teaspoons water
1/4 teaspoon mint extract
one drop green food colouring
1/2 dozen brown 'n serve rolls.
Combine sugar, coconut, butter, water, mint extract and green food colouring. Put 2 teaspoons of mixture into each of six ungreased muffin cups. Place rolls, tops down, in cups. Bake in hot oven (400° F) for 15 minutes. Let rolls stand in pan for few minutes after baking. Invert pan to remove rolls so that coconut side is up.

MINCEMEAT COFFEE RING

- 1 1/2 cups prepared mincemeat
- one package brown 'n serve rolls
- (9)
- one cup confectioners' sugar
- 1 to 2 tablespoons milk

Place half the mincemeat in bottom of a greased ring mould. Cut the rolls in half, horizontally. Place top half of the rolls, tops down, onto mincemeat. Cover with remaining mincemeat and top with bottom halves of rolls, bottoms up. Bake in hot oven (400° F) for 15 minutes. Allow ring to stand in pan for five minutes after baking. Invert pan and remove coffee ring so that mincemeat side is up. Combine sugar and milk. Frost top of coffee ring and serve warm. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

CRANBERRY FRENCH TOAST

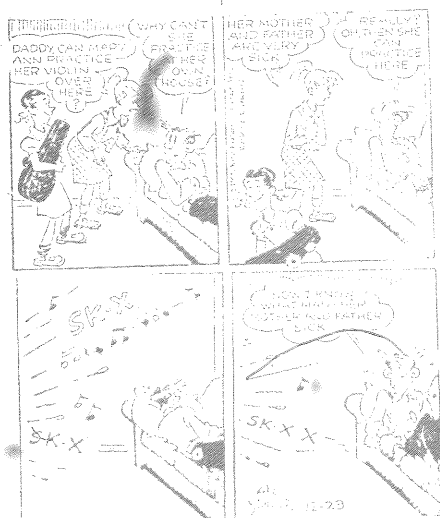

ite French toast recipe. Between squares of toast, serve a slice of cranberry jelly. Let it snow, let it snow" down on the toast, by sprinkling liberally with confectioners' sugar.

JEWELLED SNOW DRIFTS

Make a meringue from one egg, 1/2 table-spoon sugar, salt and 1/4 teaspoon vanilla. Chop 3 red and 3 green maraschino cherries and drain on paper towel. Heap meringue on each of one dozen round plain cookies. Sprinkle a few cherry pieces over each. Place cookies on baking sheet and heat in slow oven (325° F.) until lightly browned. About 15 minutes.

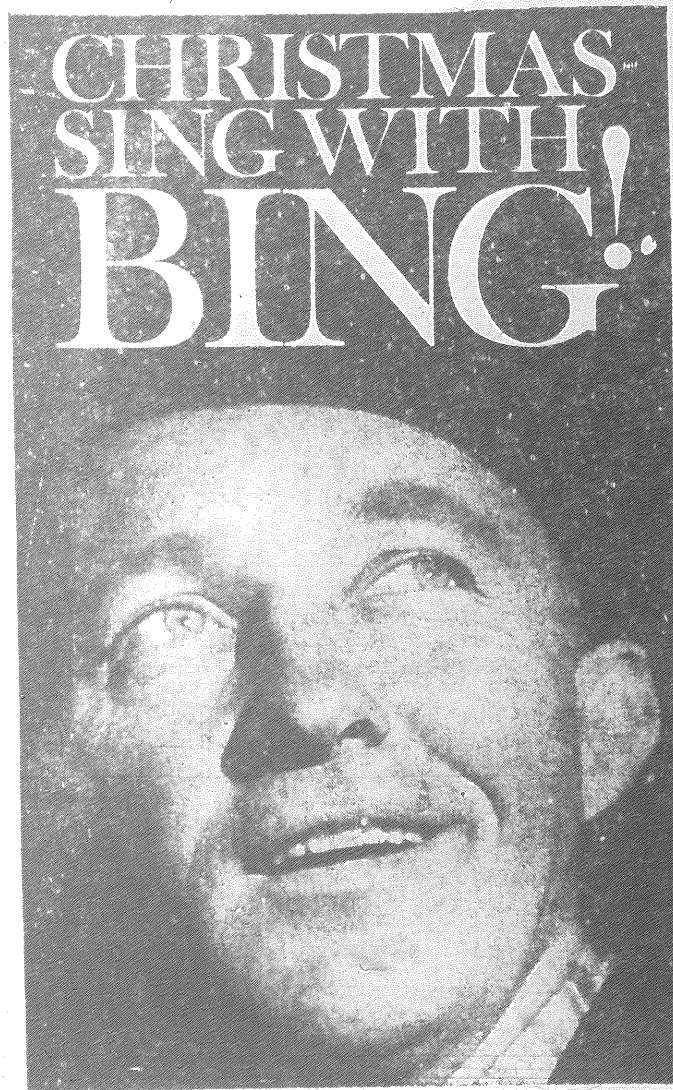

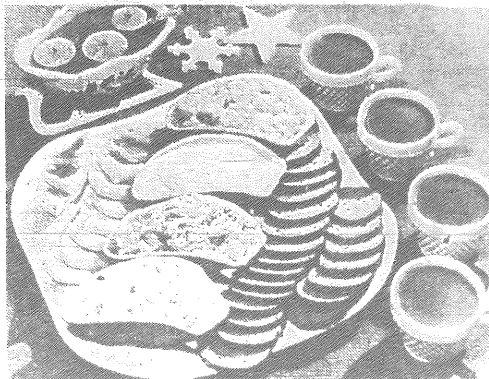
Sip 'n Dip Party Pleases People

To go with the soup, why not crisp loaf triangles and thin slices of party rye bread? They're the "dippers", when arranged with a variety of interesting dips, ready for guests to make their own snacks.

Best part of this party is that refreshments can be made well in advance of your guests' arrival. No excuse for the hostess to be hiding in the kitchen while fun's at its peak! Soups can be blended and preheated, or ready to "turn on", in the top of the double boiler or the electric cooker. Breads can be sliced and buttered, wrapped and stored for last-minute arrangement on platter or snack



tray. Bread triangles can be cut and arranged on a cookie sheet, ready for toasting under the oven grill. And the dips or spreads for the breads and the "toasties" can be mixed, heaped into serving bowls and refrigerated— even a day ahead! Here are some well tried favourites to add to your list, and to make your guests happy as they sip 'n dip.

SMOKEY SHERRY DIP

Combine 1/2 cup of smoky cheddar cheese spread with 1 tablespoon sherry wine and 2 teaspoons caraway seeds. Makes 1/2 cup.

GARLIC SOUR CREAM DIP

Whip together 1/4 cup prepared sour cream and 1/2 package (4 ounce) white cream cheese. Add one package of dry garlic salad dressing mix, and blend well. Makes one cup.

AVOCADO COTTAGE CHEESE DIP

Blend together 1/4 cup mashed avocado, 1/2 cup cottage cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash celery salt, 2 teaspoons lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce. If cottage cheese is dry, add cream until a "dip" consistency is obtained. Makes 1/2 cup.

Mince Pie Treat

From Across The Sea

Mince pie is a decidedly British addition to Christmas. Originally

known as a shredded pie, this delicacy symbolized the gifts of the Wise Men to the Christ Child, representing a compound of the choicest spices of the world.

In Canada, when we refer to a pie, we mean one large enough to serve at least 6 persons. It may be made with or without a top crust. In Britain, however, one mince pie is just enough for one person—and always has a top crust. We'd be inclined to call it a "tart with a top". Today in Britain there exists a belief that you'll have a month's happiness for every mince pie (small version) you eat in a different home; twelve different pies—a year's guaranteed happiness! Depending upon whether you live north or south, the qualifications vary. In the south of Britain, the pies must be eaten on 12 consecutive days. In the north, a month's extension on this must be observed.

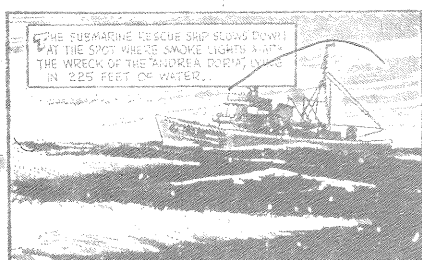

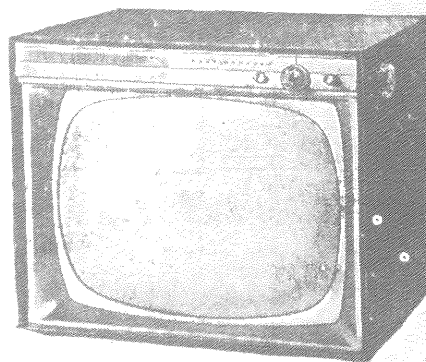
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
