Queen To Broadcast On Christmas Day

Now a tradition in Canadian homes Christmas morning - as in lands throughout the Commonwealth - the Queen's Christmas greeting to her peoples will be heard in Canada on radio at 9 o'clock Dec. 25.

The Queen's voice recorded previously, will be heard from Sandringham in Norfolk, concluding the 27th annual round-the-world Commonwealth Christmas broadcast of the British Broadcasting Corporation, which this year originates with the Australian Broadcasting Commission at Sydney.

The Canada-wide Christmas Anthems program with contributions from coast to coast occupies the afternoon radio from 1 to 5 p.m.

The Canadian Christmas radio roundup includes, from Quebec, folk music by French-Canadian fiddlers and singer Jacques Lafrenque, and a visit to the Benedictine monks of St. Benoit du Lac. This is followed by carols sung by a choir at Lunenburg, N.S., and an interview with the lighthouse keeper at Bond Portage Island, N.S. Stories of Canadian Bay fishermen and orchestral music are Newfoundland's contribution.

The program wings to Alberta for western music and a report on Prairie highways at Christmas. Back again to the Maritimes, there is music from Fredericton and a visit with a Prince Edward Island farm family.

Interviews with nuclear scientists at the Chalk River atomic energy establishment are included in the Ontario portion. British Columbia provides an Indian school service in native dialect, from Lytton, singing by the Benedictine monks at Mission, B.C., and songs from Prince George.





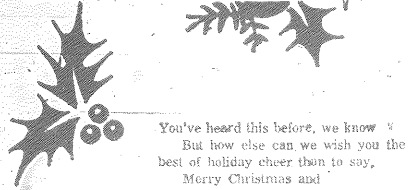

Advisory Board C.N.I.B. Enlarges Scope Of Work

In November 1957, a committee of the National Institute for the Blind was formed in Kenora. Its officers were:

Mr. D. B. Lawby, National Consultant of the C.N.I.B. initiated this committee and guided it through the early years. In July 1959, its status was changed from that of a committee to an Advisory Board, with the required creating resolution, under which it still operates. Subsequent Captain R. Edwards was elected

chairman. Through the years interested citizens have acted on this advisory Board administering the affairs of the C.N.I.B. in an area extending from the Manitoba - Ontario border east to Dnrowie, North to Red Lake and South to Nestor Falls.

All phases of work with and for registered blind people and with the important work in Prevention of Blindness, particularly amongst children receive the attention of the Board.

Such matters as Eye Examination, Provision of glasses, Transportation, Subsidies to persons living in the Home for the Blind, Supplying of Talking Book machines, Home teachers of the Blind, Provision for artificial eyes and specialized training for positions for blind persons are some of the ways for which the funds so generously contributed by our citizens at the time of the annual canvass are used.

At present there are twenty seven registered blind persons in this District, seven of whom reside in Kenora at a Kenora four

reside in Cumberland Hall, the residence and service centre for the Blind in Port Arthur, two are receiving training in Toronto, fourteen are at their homes or in hospital.

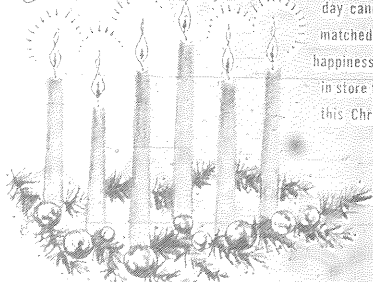

Rideout Community Rink Had Very Successful Year

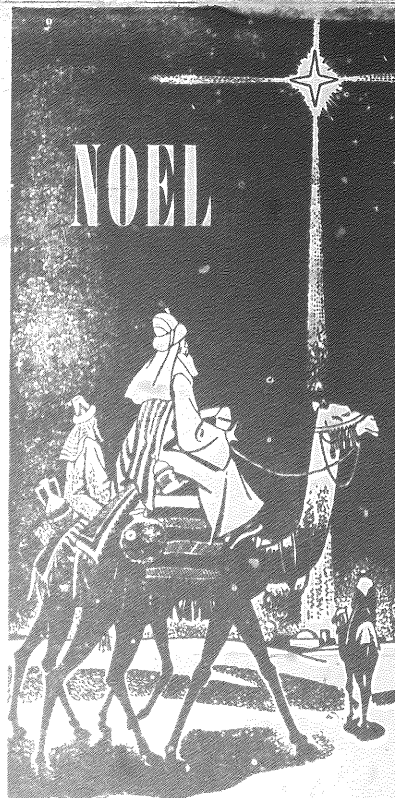

Smokers Anonymous

LONDON — Sixty-five men and women are soon to go off on one of the strangest vacations yet—a holiday without tobacco.

They're going to pay for all this fun, too.

Britain's first vacation in self-discipline is sponsored by the National Society for Non-Smokers. It will be held at the pretty seaside town of Ryde on the Isle of Wight.

People who want to learn how to stop smoking will pay £2 (\$3.40) for their stay at a guest house for a four-day period beginning September 26.

To help them give up cigars, pipes and cigars, the society has provided a staff of specialists, including chest physicians, physiotherapists and medical officers.

Another such vacation is planned for next April at Burt's Mohr residential college for adult education at Liverpool.

In the meantime, the society for Non-smokers, which started smokers' clubs in London three months ago, has a success story beginning.

"About 150 people have registered at our London club," said Rev. H. V. Little, secretary of the London branch. "Twenty of them have completely given up smoking."

The society works on the theory that misery loves company.

"And giving up tobacco is a misery for some of the smokers—at least for a while," says the Baptist minister.

Like members of Alcoholics Anonymous, those enrolled at the non-smoking society find they can stifle their resolution not to puff by meeting regularly and discussing their triumphs and defeats.

"The chance to get together with others treading the same road to freedom from the tobacco habit is the most effective part of the treatment," said Mr. Little.

A few of the smokers have set up miniature clubs in their homes and as a result have given up smoking.

The society believes there is an association between smoking and lung cancer.

"There's proof everywhere," said Mr. Little, "and some people raise the question whether they want to give up smoking entirely."

He cited a woman who wanted to be free to puff an occasional cigarette at parties. Obviously, she can hardly be a member of the National Society for Non-Smokers.

"She's coming in as an associate member," said the minister.

In June Marilyn Gunn and Margaret Ann Jackson attended the Junior Red Cross Leadership Training Camp at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Ont. Then in August, a Peruvian and an Australian girl stayed in Kenora during "Home Hospitality Week" for the International Junior Red Cross Study Centre. Marilyn Gunn was our delegate to this conference held at the University of Toronto, Toronto. Almost one hundred nations were represented.

In September we officially got started with our election of officers. School colours were sold to spur our "Mustangs" on. On Parent-Teacher interview nights, tea was served in the home economic room.

At all public performances, concerts, and high school dances held in the high school, coat-checking is available to those who want it.

In October, a Junior Red Cross regional meeting was held in Fort William. Margaret Ann Jackson, Bob Jordan, and Keith Pawcett were our delegates. In an assembly, the student body heard an account on the

This money is used for either Ontario's Crippled Children, or International Junior Relief. 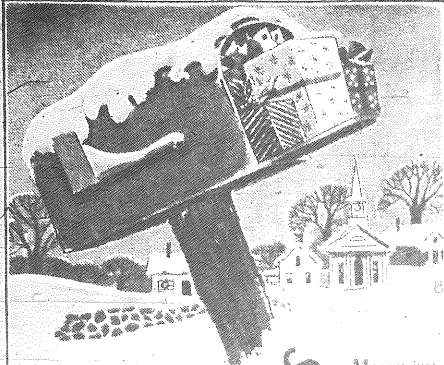

Public School Board Reviews 1959 Highlights

Your Public School Board is pleased to review the highlights of 1959.

The completion of the Evergreen School Addition in 1958 provided adequate accommodation for one year. When classes resumed in September 1959, this school as well as the two schools in Lakeside, South Ward and King George VI, were again in a crowded condition with up to 37 pupils per class. In anticipation of the West Ward Addition being completed during the 1959-1960 school year the Board rented the Norman Community Club building for one classroom. While this project has been plagued by delays, it is hoped that the two classroom addition will be ready some time in the coming year.

The planned site development program has been continued, considerable paving, sodding, and the installing of playground equipment at Evergreen School have practically completed the job there. A start was also made at King George VI and Central Schools. One of the features planned for the King George VI School is a 100 mile track and other track and field facilities.

Major renovations were carried out at all the other schools. This included new heating, electrical, and plumbing work. The new addition at West Ward has been completed and a new set of desks and equipment purchased for the building. At Central School, the new desks and equipment purchased for the building are now in place.

Approximately 1000 children are enrolled in the public schools. The Board is proud to report that all 1000 children are in school. The Board is also proud to report that the percentage of children who are in school is 95%.

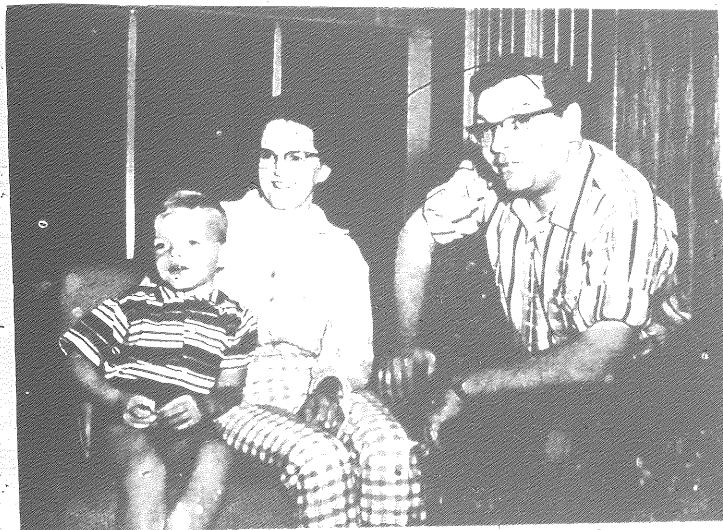

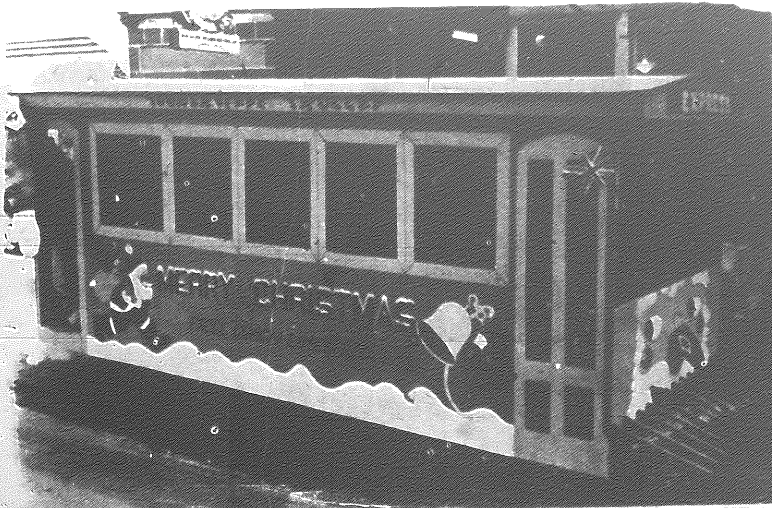

St. Mary's Indian School, Oldest Institution Here

Without being too exaggerated we can probably say that St. Mary's Indian Residential School is the oldest institution existing in the gem town of Northwestern Ontario; Kenora. Built on the shore of the beautiful Rat Portage Bay, St. Mary's School has been promoting education and instruction since 1884 to Indian boys and girls located around the Lake of the Woods, or on the thousands of islands spread across the same lake. More than a thousand Indian children have passed within the walls of this Institution. They learned at least the general rudiments of Education. Indian children from many other places came to St. Mary's in the last fifteen years; even from the far away Manitowick Indian Agency, Qu'bec.

Since its humble beginning, St. Mary's school has developed some very important initiatives worth mentioning. These will enlarge the scope of work attempted long ago. St. Mary's has had

her own High School since 1932 and it has given some very interesting proofs that Indian children can fit quite well in whatever social profession they choose to fulfill. It also has a very modernly equipped Home Economic Class room where Indian girls are taught better house-keeping, cooking, and baking, profitable for their future life and where they are trained to work in similar jobs in society.

The boys have the opportunity to develop their talents in carpentry and other trades. A fully equipped Industrial Art Shop, with a competent teacher, located on the School ground provides the boys with a certain knowledge in those lines that are big business today.

Regarding Sports, St. Mary's has taught boys and girls most of the sports adaptable to youngsters and teenagers. Indian boys demonstrate the great ability and the real ruggedness they naturally possess when playing the different favorite games loved by all.

St. Mary's has often time been the winner of different local trophies, has excelled mostly in the famous national sport, Hockey. The years 1937-1938 and 1938-1939 were particularly brilliant Hockey Seasons for St. Mary's Indian School. 1957-1958 season saw the St. Mary's juvenile team bring home the Chapple Cup as champions for this corner of Northwestern Ontario. 1958-1959 was a "Clean sweep for St. Mary's over all the hockey leagues playing in Kenora." The Indian boy is a clean, neat interesting player usually, in whatever game he plays.

Our children participate also in practically every phase of the District Musical Festival. The stiff competition they manifest in that special education field often brings consolatory rewards.

St. Mary's, in its march ahead, is aiming toward greater successes, and wishes to bring greater ease and love to the poor Indians of this region.

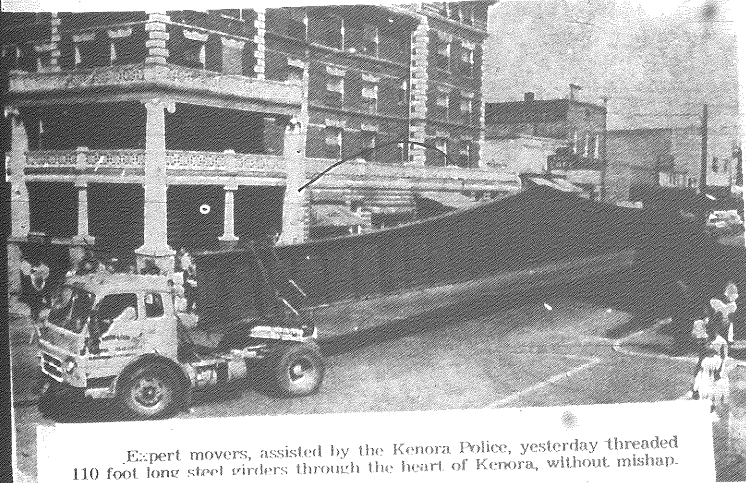

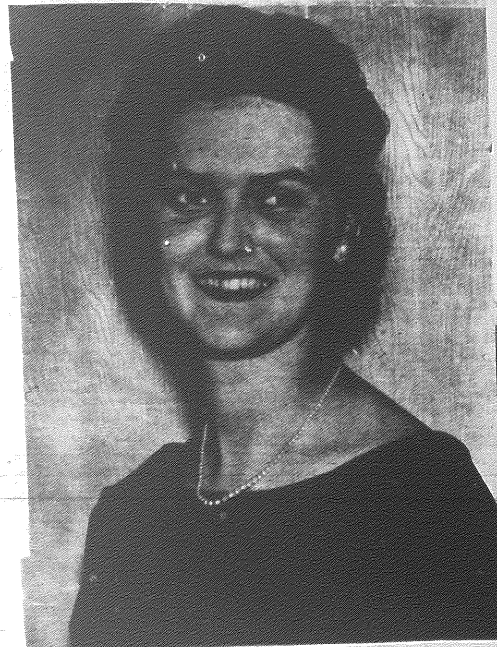
OPENING NIGHT AT THE FAIR

Our organization got off to a very early start this year. In June Marilyn Gunn and Margaret Ann Jackson attended the Junior Red Cross Leadership Training Camp at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Ont. Then in August, a Peruvian and an Australian girl stayed in Kenora during "Home Hospitality Week" for the International Junior Red Cross Study Centre. Marilyn Gunn was our delegate to this conference held at the University of Toronto, Toronto. Almost one hundred nations were represented.

In September we officially got started with our election of officers. School colours were sold to spur our "Mustangs" on.

On Parent-Teacher interview nights, tea was served in the home economic room.

At all public performances, concerts, and high school dances held in the high school, coat-checking is available to those who want it.

In October, a Junior Red Cross regional meeting was held in Fort William. Margaret Ann Jackson, Bob Jordan, and Keith Pawcett were our delegates.

In an assembly, the student body heard an account on the International Conference, and how our Overseas Relief Fund money is used. The annual November campaign was introduced. This money is used for either Ontario's Crippled Children, or International Junior Relief. For the second consecutive year, we are donating to the Overseas Relief Fund because: 1) of the Japanese typhoon, and the money will be used in Japan. 2) The United Nations has proclaimed this World Refugee Year. 3) There is such a great need overseas. No amount of help is enough.

During November the school set a \$855 objective. The forms gave over \$300, and with special donations from the Student's Council, Drama Club and the Junior Red Cross club itself, just over \$1,000 was raised. The 11V's volleyball games against the teachers, and 10A's Honour Havoc rate special mention as fund raising means. 11A took the honours in being the form this year that contributed \$100.

At Christmas, we will be giving presents to the Children's wards at the two local hospitals, and to Pinecrest. A donation will also be made to the Salvation Army.

We have been so busy with our fall programme that we have not made any definite plans for our work in the New Year. The group will make a study of the beginnings of Red Cross, and its varied programs in the local, provincial, national and international fields. The eggs of other projects are still hatching.

Many Contributions Made To CAS Home By Kinette Club

The past year has been a busy one for members of the Kenora Kinette Club.

A fashion show in the spring and a bake sale and sale of mitts in the fall were the two main

projects. In addition to these the Kinettes held a spring dance, entertained the Lionelles, played host to the newly formed Keewatin Kinette Club, and helped the Kinsmen whenever possible. Selling tickets for the fish derby taking part in, and helping with the Variety show, and more recently bagging candy for the Santa Claus parade, were among their duties.

The first interest of the Kinette Club however, is the Children's Aid Society. During the year eighteen layettes were made by members, and wool purchased for the making of approximately 50 pair of mitts. These were either donated directly to the Children's Aid, or sold at the bake sale and the money used for Children's Aid work.

Last spring a clothes dryer was

purchased and installed in the Children's Aid Receiving Home. The girls were asked to collect toys, story books and clothing for the children and \$25.00 was spent on new toys. A table and chairs and a blackboard were purchased. The girls are buying a dishwasher with a meat grinder attachment as a Christmas gift to the home. Recently the children from the Receiving Home joined the Kinsmen's children at their annual Christmas party.

At present the Kinette Club is planning a Mother's March on Polio. It was felt that this would be too big an undertaking for the Kinettes alone, so other women's clubs have been asked to help. The response to date has been very encouraging. This along with their other projects will ensure the Kinettes another

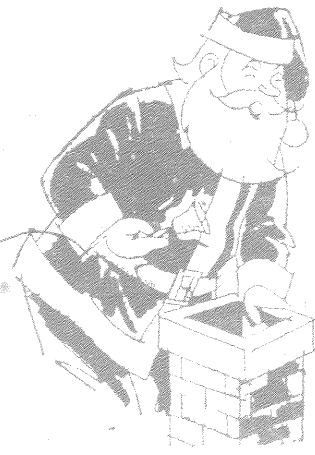

GOOD RULES FOR A FIRE-SAFE CHRISTMAS



THE TREE --

Cut a growing tree or try to buy one that hasn't dried out from prolonged storage. (When too dry, tree branches are brittle and shed needles easily.) Stand the tree in water or snow outdoors until you're ready to use it indoors. Bring the tree indoors just before Christmas and take it out as soon afterwards as possible. (December 26 is recommended.)

The larger the tree the greater the hazard, so don't get one any larger than you need.

Just before setting up the tree, saw off the trunk at an angle at least one inch above the original cut.

Place the freshly cut tree trunk in water and keep level of water above the cut the entire time the tree is indoors. (Check the water level at least once a day for absorption and evaporation.)

Support the tree well. Don't pull it near sources of heat (fireplace, radiators, stoves) or where standing or fallen, it could block the way out of the room and out of the house in case of fire.

LIGHTING --

Do not use candles on the tree or nearby where there is any chance for an open flame to contact the tree or combustibles piled beneath the tree. Use only electric lighting sets that bear the UL (Underwriters' Laboratories) label.

Check lighting sets each year BEFORE USING for frayed wires, loose connections, and broken sockets.

Be sure the fuse on the electrical circuit you use is not over 15 amperes. Cord sets with a fuse on the plug, bearing a UL label are available.

If any extensive holiday wiring is planned, call a competent electrician; don't try to do it yourself unless you are so qualified.

Don't plug too many cords into one outlet. Make certain that all tree lighting is turned off before retiring or leaving the house.

GIFTS --

Don't buy pyrolyn plastic if it's toys or non flameproofed cowboy suits, etc. Toys operated by alcohol, kerosene or gasoline are especially dangerous. They may melt and set fire to the children's clothing, the tree, or to the house itself.

Look for the Underwriters' Laboratories label when buying electrical toys. This means they have been tested for fire and shock hazards and may be considered safe if properly handled and maintained.

Don't set up electric trains or spinners too near a Christmas tree.

and DON'T FORGET --

Don't allow smoking near the tree amidst decorations or piles of wrappings; have plenty of safe ashtrays around and use them.

Play on what you must do if fire breaks out.

Guard against flying sparks from a fireplace with a substantial screen and don't use the fireplace to burn up Christmas wrappings and decorations.

Keep matches, lighters and candles away from tiny hands.

Have water type fire extinguishers that work, buckets of water or even your garden hose connected to a faucet, within reach of the tree. If fire should strike, first get everyone out of the house and then call the fire department immediately before attempting to fight the fire yourself.

DECORATIONS and WRAPPINGS --

Don't let Christmas wrappings accumulate in the home, place them in your metal covered trash barrel or burn them in your incinerator as soon as possible.

Use non-combustible material (metal, glass, asbestos, etc.) to decorate the home for Christmas wherever possible. When you must use combustible materials, be sure they are "flameproofed," particularly if they are to be anywhere near the tree.

Untreated cotton bedding, paper and certain cloth costumeing will ignite easily and burn with great intensity unless they're "flameproofed." Santa Claus whiskers have caused Christmas tragedies, be sure they're "flameproofed," too.

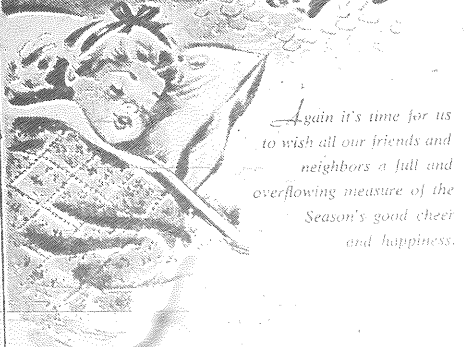

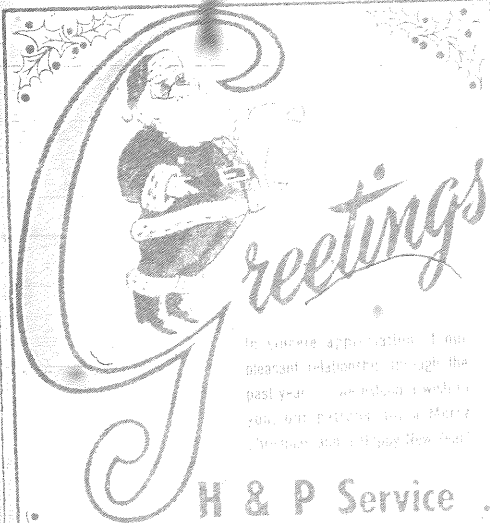

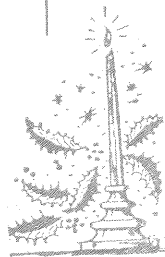
