## MAYOR, THREE ALDERMEN PRESIDE AT THEIR LAST COUNCIL MEETING

The last council meeting for the year 1959 was also the last meeting for Mayor Peter Ratuski and three aldermen, George T. Sewell, J. Bruce Paterson and Roy Stratton.

Mayor Ratuski thus completed a year of service to Kenora, five years as mayor and seven as alderman. George Sewell also completed ten years as alderman. Paterson finished a six year term and Roy Stratton three years.

On this last meeting of the council, the emphasis of the Council Chambers was most noticeable. No delegations or representatives of organizations were present. Four men retired after serving a combined 29 years of service to their town. No one was here to say thank you for the work of the council.

Alderman A. E. Minor expressed his appreciation to the retiring members for their co-operation in the past year. He said he was sorry to see you leaving. It was a privilege to work with you and I am glad to see you going.

Mayor Ratuski stated he was leaving with a feeling of regret. I have enjoyed my ten years of service to the community and was proud that I have had a part in making Kenora a better town.

Aldermen Sewell and Paterson echoed the sentiments of the mayor. Alderman Paterson said he hoped to be back again in the future.

A routine agenda finishing off the year's business was attended to as follows:

On a recommendation of the fire and Police Committee, no change will be made in the handling of parking meter violations. It was pointed out that at some warning notices were sent out but due to lack of appreciable suits and added clerical work needed, the practice was discontinued.

The lowest tender for supplying gasoline for town owned vehicles, that of British American Oil Co. was accepted. The tender price was 27.7¢ per gallon for 100 gallon and 20.74¢ for 25 gallon.

Council approved installation of underground storm water to the Imperial Oil Bulk Plant.

Authorization was given for re-lease and the chairman of the Public Utilities Committee to attend the Hydro Electric seminar to be held at Port Arthur in January.

Council endorsed a recommendation of the Ontario Water Resources Commission for the abatement of water pollution in this municipality.

Two applications for taxi driver's licenses were refused and one application was accepted for three month probationary term.

**FINANCE**

Municipal accounts totaling \$3,817.50 and Utility accounts \$9,081.09 were authorized paid. The town assumed the cost of additional plastering at the telephone building in the amount of \$200. A grant of \$150 was received from the Fire Department's annual banquet. Membership was renewed in the Canadian Welfare Council at a fee of \$30.00.

**1960 COUNCIL**

**Fort Frances Liquor Vote Set For January 27**

## Macaulay Predicts Bright Picture For Province

The Honorable Robert Macaulay, Minister of Energy Resources for the Province of Ontario has released the following forecast for 1960, relative to his department.

The demands of Ontario's mounting population and expanding industry set new records in the consumption of energy fuels and power during 1959 and, as we enter the New Year, it can be predicted with confidence that these resources will be surpassed by a margin.

The minister of the Department of Energy Resources of Ontario, formed to coordinate the efficient and safe use of all sources of energy both within the province and brought into it, believe these increases are as a harbinger for a continuing healthy economy.

Perhaps the reason for this optimism will be better understood by these capsule observations:

## Natural Gas

Ontario is the largest consumer of natural gas in Canada. Consumption of this fuel increased from 33 billion cu. ft. in 1958 to about 50 billion cu. ft. in the first year of 1959.

It is estimated that consumption in 1960 will increase to about 125 billion cu. ft.

Production of natural gas in Ontario from one well was increased by about 10 per cent to more than 175 billion cu. ft. in 1959 and there are sound indications that there may be a substantial increase in 1960.

## Uranium

Ontario contains the world's largest reserves of uranium ore, estimated at 263,000 short tons. In the last 10 years there has been a fantastic expansion of Canada's uranium industry with a capital investment of about \$100,000,000.

Recent decisions by the United States and the United Kingdom to increase uranium orders beyond 1963 have created concern for the industry's future. Because the industry comes under Federal control, the Government of Ontario already has made representations to Ottawa to assist in facing the difficult years ahead.

In an effort to stimulate a broader knowledge of the industry...

Here again, Ontario leads Canada in the consumption of this fuel.

December 28, 1959 was the retiring date not only for Mayor Ratuski and three aldermen, but also for four well known town employees. C. S. McGinnis, A. D. Sorenson, A. Rodgers and G. S. Jacobson retired from active service with the town of Kenora as of Monday.

Mr. McGinnis, town assessor, holds the record for the longest service to the town, having commenced work on November 17, 1920. Mr. Sorenson, mechanic, has been employed by the town since June 8, 1936. A. Rodgers, incinerator attendant began his employment on October 11, 1939 and G. S. Jacobson started work with the Public Works Department on April 9th, 1941.

## Magistrate's Court

The Monday afternoon session of Magistrate's Court saw all persons appearing being charged with infractions of the liquor laws.

## THISTLES LACK FUEL TO STYMIE ROCKETS

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## IN APPRECIATION

On January 1st, 1950, citizens of Kenora looked hopefully ahead to a new decade. The war, which had blighted the 1940's, was behind. Great things might be expected in the succeeding ten years.

George Carmichael took office as Mayor on New Year's Day, 1950 with Albert Olson elected acting mayor. To that Council came two newcomers who were to remain for the decade, G. T. Sewell and Peter Ratuski; the former as chairman of Finance and the Town's representative on the Kenora General Hospital Board and the latter as chairman of public welfare and representative for the Town on the Planning Board.

In January, 1950, several hundred citizens journeyed to the City Station to inspect one of the first dress suits which was made in Kenora. It was a suit made by the late Mr. J. J. Vaughan, the owner and News of 1950 and onward laid a continuous pattern of changes and improvements to our town and our way of life. It was in January, 1950 that a pension scheme was studied for police and firemen, and a quarter of a million dollar sewer and water expansion program initiated. The list is inexhaustible.

In each of these achievements, Mayor Ratuski and Ald. Sewell played a part. It would not be improbable to state that each attended over 1,500 meetings in the course of performing his civic duty. Certainly, both the planning and the administrative aspects of operating a Town of 10,000 people does not come about without real hard work. Kenora's present enviable situation testifies to the wisdom and devotion to duty of these two gentlemen, and all others who served during this period.

Last night four members of the 1959 Council attended their last regular meeting. In addition to Mr. Ratuski and Mr. Sewell, Aldermen Bruce Paterson and Ald. Roy Stratton bow out, for the time being, at least. For Alderman Paterson, his six years have been spent during Kenora's most active period. Ald. Roy Stratton, who has served for half that time, likewise has been a valuable addition to Council in days when many decisions faced the elected body.

To the retiring councillors, who have labored constantly, with the welfare of the Town their first consideration, last night's meeting must have been tinged with emotion. Memories might well have recalled some moments of raucous, of discouragement and the feeling of lack of appreciation. Bolstering this latter feeling, surely, must have been rows of empty seats in the Council Chambers. Not a single interested ratepayer was on hand to say "well done."

In operating a Town, like operating a business, things just don't happen... they are the result of effort. Citizens of Kenora do appreciate the sincere, honest endeavors of these retiring gentlemen.

Mr. Yaremko said of the 114-640 drivers receiving demerit marks, 11,429 have four points against them, 6,773 five, 2,553 six, 853 seven, 277 nine and 157 over nine. The balance have either three or two demerits.

In the same April-Nov. 30 period, Mr. Yaremko said, 6,000 other licenses have been suspended on convictions for criminal negligence, drunk or impaired driving, and misrepresentation in connection with drivers' licenses.

Ontario instituted its demerit point system last spring. Drivers convicted of "counting" violations such as careless driving, improper changing, have two to 12 points charged against them. Twelve demerits accumulated in any twelve-month period bring automatic suspension.

At six-point drivers received a letter warning them of the possibility they have reached. At nine points, drivers must report for an interview or face suspension.



The object of the game is for the teams to identify the name of the advertiser in every case - the team who has the most correct answers is the winner.

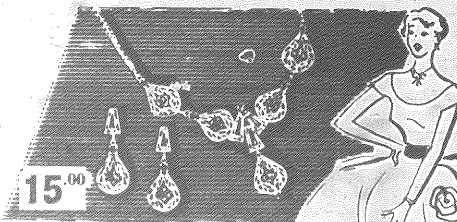

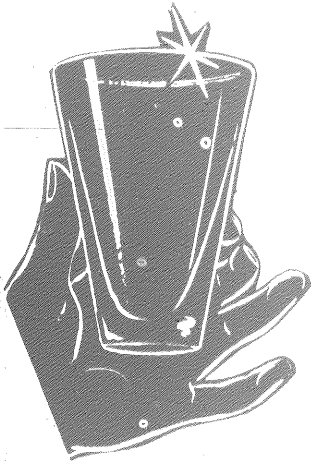

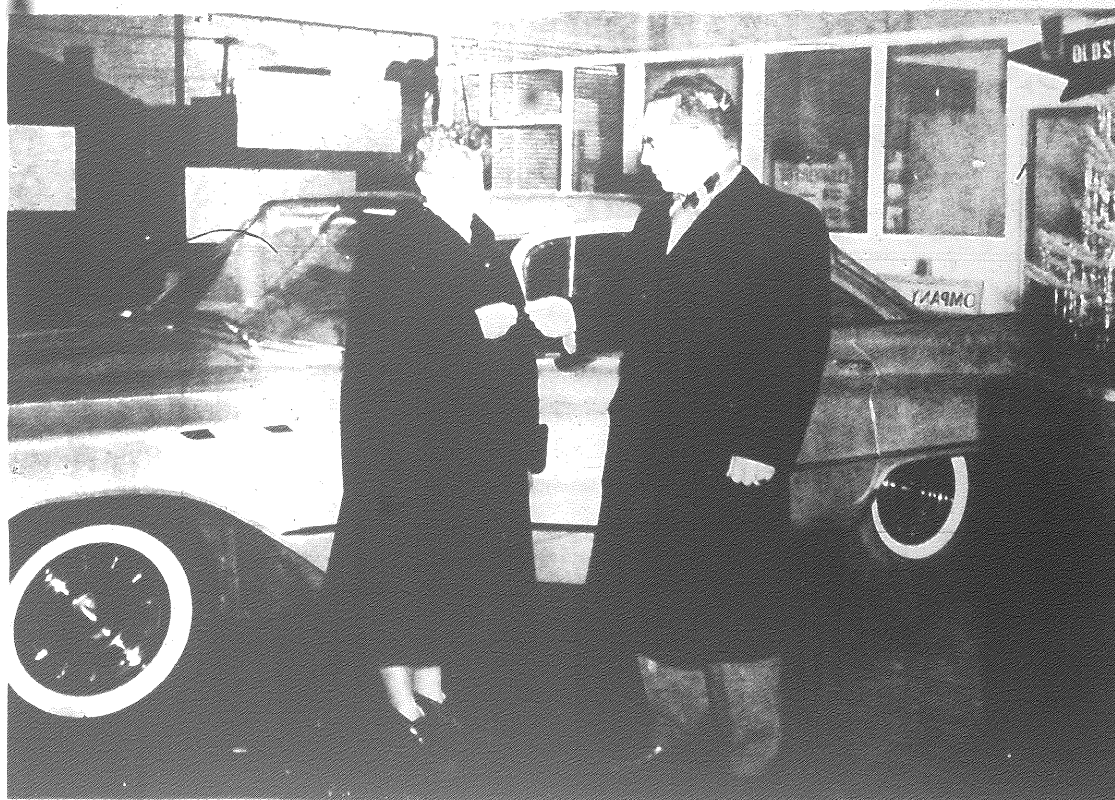
