Editorial

ALL - IMPORTANT

So often we have been told that operating the affairs of the Town of Kenora, (or any municipality), is not unlike operating a business. In the case of Kenora, it can be truly said that the affairs of the Town constitute big business, with an annual budget exceeding a million dollars.

That being true, it makes each taxpayer a shareholder in the corporation, with elected aldermen being our board of directors. All too frequently do we read of company affairs taking a backward or even a disastrous step, due to wrong decisions by the governing board.

Such a course seldom happens when interested shareholders stay close to the affairs of their company, and elect men and women who have ability to operate efficiently and with the gift of foresight.

Monday, ratepayers in Kenora and Jaffray-Melick will elect their directors for 2 year terms. In Kenora, offices vacant are on council and school boards; in Jaffray-Melick the all-important office of reeve is at stake.

Here the analogy to business ends. But the most important function of the individual citizen is not to safeguard good management, but our democratic way of life. We cannot long allow our voting privileges to go by default without some other force coming in to fill the vacuum. A public which indicates indifference, will not long retain the power of choice.

As good citizens, therefore, it makes good sense to vote as we please on Monday - but vote.

I couldn't afford it he threatened to have the "condemned" house padlocked and my tenants "kicked out on the street."

The pressures brought on us to take water that we can't afford are almost unbelievable in a democracy like ours. The good people of Pine Portage and River St. have waited so long for water that now it is almost in sight some of them are becoming slightly intolerant. For instance some of these so called "unsightly shacks" have been around for 20 years without a complaint until the owners refused to sign for water; now suddenly they are "causing concern". These "abandoned cars" have been here at least four years without a murmur of protest till the water question came up. (The owner of one of these cars is my tenant and he is not getting water - poor man). My "condemned" house sat here for over six months without a single

complaint but now that its in a better shape then it ever was it too is "cause for concern". Concern for whom? Let the readers decide why these "unsightly" (Continued on Page 6)

The two letters by Mr. H. E. Alcock, I cannot understand. He states that he voted "yes" on the liquor law so as not to deprive others, or words to that effect. A person is supposed to vote as he thinks is right not what others want, and he states that his conscience would not let him vote "no" on the matter of Sunday shows and sports for gain. He knows very well that the commandments of our Lord say, "Remember the Sabbath and keep it holy." And yet he would vote "yes" on this matter. By voting "no" we are not dictating to the other people. 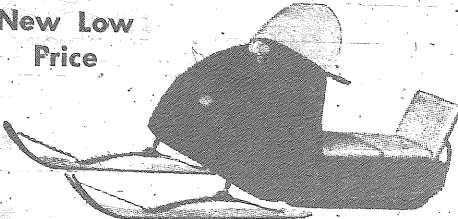

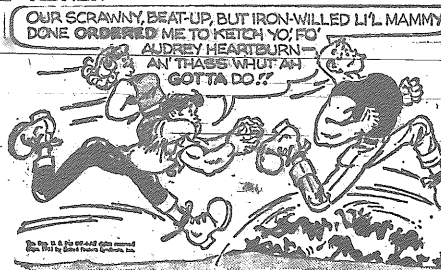

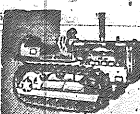

yourself to blame. If your church is a thing that you endure rather than enjoy, you have helped to make it that. You may not like it when your minister preaches the truth as it is written in God's Word, but you will soon tire of the spiritual dishwater that he will dispense when he stops preaching God's word as it is and starts trying to doctor it up to suit you. The audacity of pious man suggesting that God, the mighty Creator should adapt himself to man - Saying in effect, "I'll serve you Lord but only on my own terms. Such pitiful bigotry.

St. Paul describes the conditions of today in his writing to Timothy, in the third chapter of second Timothy verses three and four. "For a time will come when they will not listen to wholesome instruction but will

overwhelm themselves with teachers to suit their whims and tickle their fancies, and they will turn from listening to the truth and wander after fictions." And then St. Paul goes on in the next verse and exhorts the preacher, "do not shrink from hardship, do your work as a missionary, and your whole duty as a minister."

There are those who say that the solution to world problems lies in world government, but I submit to you the daily events of our magistrate's court as evidence that government and law do not take from the heart of

man the desire to do wrong. May I draw your attention to statements made by two well known men. General Eisenhower, a well known military man was quoted as saying that he did not believe that there would be world peace until the world got back to a Bible believing religion. Perhaps you too were listening to Percy Salzman interviewing Mr. Gardiner one of our veteran Canadian politicians from Saskatchewan on television just a few weeks ago, and heard Mr. Gardner make the statement that he did not feel that there would be world peace until the majority of mankind followed the teachings of Christ. I agree with these two men, and say too that only the love of Christ in human hearts will make possible lasting peace.

If there ever was a time in the history of Mankind when the world needed a powerful church preaching, and practising the message of the love of Christ it is now. So friend, instead of hoping that your minister will slip you a spiritual tranquilizer on Sunday, why not pray that God will inspire him with the same divine enthusiasm that lit up the lives of Luther - Wesley - Moody, and other great men of God, and Sunday at your church can become the highlight of your week. Fellow ministers, let us at St. Paul exhort do our whole duty as a minister, and everyone, let's keep Sunday, the Lord's day free from the things that would distract from the worship of God. Our help in ages past - Our hope for years to come - Our shelter from the stormy blast - And our eternal home.

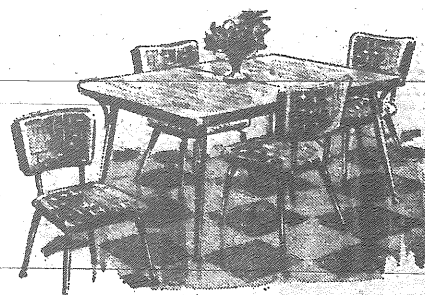
